Gifted/talented program broadened

The Farwell School Board voted this summer to broaden the gifted/talented program.

In the past the gifted/talented program served a few students in grades 1-6. This year it will be broadened. The program will be implemented in kindergarten, eighth, and ninth grades this year, then in grades 10-12 next year. The revision calls for the program to become a means of academically enriching the students.

Instead of limiting the program to a few gifted/talented students, the plan is to broaden the program to include more students. The new enrichment program in the junior high school will be called the SMILE program: Students Mastering Individual Learning Experiences.

In the SMILE program students will work on individual and group projects. They will also work on higher level thinking skills such as decision making, logic, creativity, and productive thinking.

Some students will work on SMILE program projects throughout the year, and others may only participate a short time. The faculty of

Farwell Junior High School will identify a pool of approximately 20% of the student body who will work on the SMILE program most frequently.

They will be chosen on the basis of several characteristics and skills including: creativity, leadership, learning, motivation, and results from California Achievement Test of Cognitive Skills, reading scores, math scores, language scores, and teacher recommendations. In addition to the students identified by this means, other students will join the SMILE program from time to time.

"Almost any student can participate in SMILE," said Mrs. Kay Ray, "it's up to the student." Mrs. Ray indicated that students would have to complete their regular classroom objectives before they would be allowed to work on SMILE projects.

Three teachers who will work on the SMILE program most this year are Eva Dean Stephens (sixth grade), Kay Ray (seventh grade) and Marcia Cole (eighth grade). They attended special training this summer to help implement the program.

Responsibility to be stressed

The fourth "R" is coming to the 6th, 7th, and 8th grade classrooms of Farwell Junior High this fall.

Along with reading, 'riting and 'rithmetic, students will be taught "R"esponsibility in a new program, Lions-Quest Skills for Adolescence. They will learn why and how to say "no" to alcohol and other drugs, develop healthy relationships and set goals for lifelong success.

Seven Farwell Junior High teachers: Pat Owen, Marcia Cole, Eva Dean Stephens, Liz Phillips, Jolynda Lusk, Kay Ray, and Patsy Camp were trained in a three-day workshop this summer in Amarillo to implement the Lions-Quest program developed for 10- to 14-year old students. Funding for the training was made possible through donations by the Texico-Farwell Lions Club and ESA Sorority.

The program, co-sponsored by Lions Clubs International and Quest International, is one of the most widely-used drug prevention programs worldwide. It reaches more than 800,000 young people in a number of countries including Australia, Bermuda, Canada, the Grand Caymen Islands, Iceland, New Zealand, Puerto Rico, Sweden and the United Kingdom. More than a dozen other countries are preparing to use the program.

Key organizations cooperating in effort are the American Association of School Administrators, National PTA, and the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges.

Experts find three causes of teenagers' problems are low self-esteem, feeling disconnected from family, and poor decision-making and communication skills. Research shows that providing information about the "symptoms" of some problems, such as drug use, is important but isn't enough. To resist pressures and manage challenges they face, teenagers need to understand the changes of early adolescence, gain self-confidence, manage feelings and become better family members.

The Lions-Quest program has three important features. One, the curriculum has been professionally developed by a team of more than 75 experts in education, mental health, medicine, and developmental psychology. Secondly, teachers are required to attend a three day intensive workshop conducted by trainers from Quest International. Three, the program is based on the belief that the involvement of parents and the community is vital in

the development of capable young people.

Parent involvement is strongly stressed through students' homework assignments, a parent book, and a series of parent meetings on drug use and other issues of early adolescence.

"Our association has made an unprecedented commitment to working with Lions and Quest in supporting this program," said Gary Marx, Associate Executive Director, American Association of School Administrators.

Lions Clubs International is the world's largest and most active service organization and is made up of 1.3 million volunteers throughout 162 countries and areas. Quest International is a nonprofit, educational organization that reaches more than a million young people annually, with programs for positive youth development.

Farwell's population up again

Farwell's first day enrollment figures are up again this year over first day enrollment figures of last year.

Total enrollment for school year 1988-89 now shows 504 students.

Last year's first day enrollment figure of 484 was increased by 17 a few days later when the pre-kindergarten program was added. This brought last year's enrollment to 501.

This year's figures include 17 pre-kindergarten and 3 early childhood students.

First day enrollment figures include 261 in elementary school, 105 in junior high, and 138 in high school. Last year's first day figures included 236 in elementary school, 108 in junior high, and 140 in the high school.

Lazbuddie's enrollment increases

Lazbuddie's first day enrollment shows an increase over last year's first day figures. This year 244 were certified as enrolled on the first day, up from 238 last year.

There were 127 enrolled in elementary school and 117 in junior and senior high school this year.

First day enrollment figures are subject to change. There are always a few late entries.

Football contest is under way

The Gridiron Guessing Game, known as the Area Merchants Football Contest, is starting its 30th year and local residents are ready.

The top prize for the winner of the 12-week contest will again be two tickets to see the Dallas Cowboys play at Texas Stadium. They play the Philadelphia Eagles on Dec. 18.

The grand prize winner also will get \$50 in cash, a night's lodging for two at the Dallas-Fort Worth Airport Hilton hotel, free use of all recreational facilities at the Hilton, game day breakfast, two welcome cocktails, transfers to and from the game, and transfers to and from the airport.

In addition, weekly prizes will be awarded: \$10 for first place and \$5 for second place.

This year, a new prize is being added: \$25 will be given away in a drawing among those participants who enter all 12 weeks.

And the reason the Tribune is able to offer the contest, and all its prizes, are due to the following sponsors:

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Rules for the 1988 contest will be the same as in the past. A person must be at least 12 years of age to enter.

Games will be divided among high school, college and professional ranks. In case of a tie game, unless a tie is predicted by the entrant, that game will not be counted.

Each entrant must remember to pick a tie-breaker score, a very important feature of the contest since many weekly winners (and some overall winners) have been determined by tie breakers.

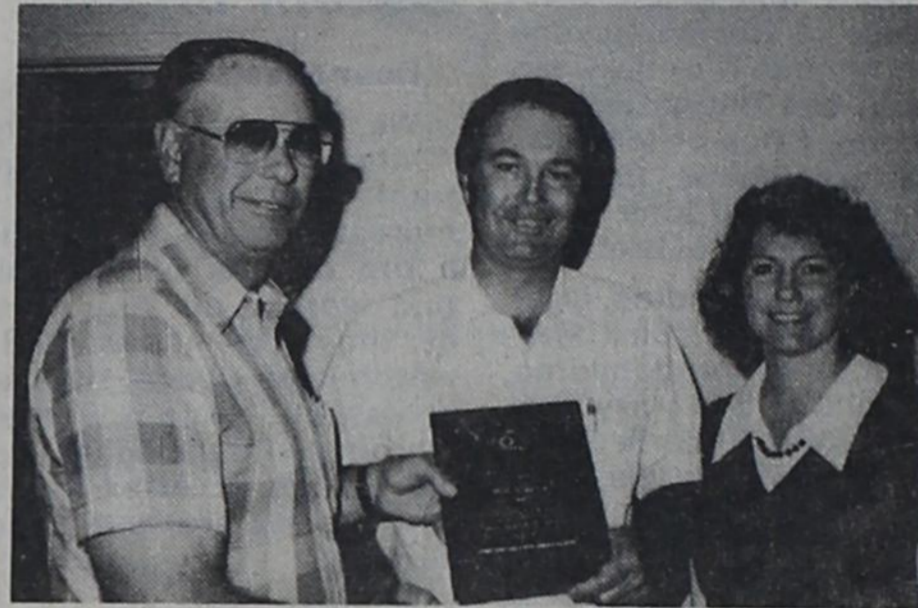
Each week's scoring is tabulated and kept on published view at the Tribune office. Standings are posted each Monday and may be seen during regular business

Schwertners honored

Mark Schwertner and his wife Nancy of Farwell have been selected by the board of directors of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District as Conservation Farmer for the county.

Moisture conservation and irrigation management are the foundation of the conservation work that Mark has accomplished.

He has used structures such as low pressure center pivot systems, underground pipeline and surge irrigation methods in conjunction with

management practices such as furrow diking, contour farming and crop residue management to make the most of rainfall and irrigation water.

These same practices also are effective in controlling wind and water erosion.

On land unsuitable for cultivation, such as a lake bottom, Mark has found that this land is better suited to remain in native vegetation for erosion control. This type of cover is also the ideal situation for upland game birds.

Fun Run nears

Last year approximately 300 runners joined the Farwell Elementary Annual Fun Run. This year they hope for even more.

Farwell Elementary students and members of their family are invited to participate in the 2nd Annual Fun Run on Sept. 15 at 7 p.m.

Its purpose is to promote family involvement in lifelong physical fitness. Participants may walk and run the two mile course at their own pace.

Participants are to meet on the lawn on the north side of the Old Gym. They will run east on Ave. G to Page's Nursery. Then they will run south to the intersection where Actinons live. The course then heads west to the Loop, and continues to 4th Street, and then north to Ave. G. The final segment of the course goes

More funds sought

Meet Farwell's Class of 2001

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Lazbuddie offers industrial technology courses

Lazbuddie is one of few schools in this area now offering industrial technology courses to its students, and it is the only school in a wide area that has this program of study set up to begin with junior high school and continue through graduation.

Mark Scisson is the industrial tech instructor at Lazbuddie. He is beginning his fourth year as a teacher, and he said that the program has changed dramatically in the short time since he received his degree. He has attended numerous workshops and has updated his college training in order to effectively teach modernized a program.

Scisson commented that he is very proud of Lazbuddie's industrial technology program and of the importance that it receives in the total school curriculum there.

"The new program is designed to interface with math, science and social studies," he said. "It is not just woodworking anymore. Although building projects in wood is still our main emphasis, we now expose our students to a wide range of interrelated fields of study, all of which will be very practical and useful in the future."

Texas industrial tech courses are based on a "hands on, learn by doing" approach. Students may select to study high technology areas such as computer application in drafting, using computer assisted equipment to make working drawings. Computer-aided drafting will be used in all future jobs in industry and manufacturing. Or students may be interested in robotics which include assembly-line manipulation of materials by small programmed industrial robots to locate, place, or distribute needed items.

Industrial tech courses may include communications activities and research and development in energy studies with construction of models of solar, wind, and other devices that conserve resources.

Industrial technology in high school has adapted to a more technological approach to manufacturing and industry. Lazbuddie has made every effort to provide students with the most modern industrial technology department possible. The school has purchased a new computer and software for computer-aided drafting.

Scisson said that he will use this extensively this year, teaching each student how to create a 3-D, computer-drafted plan before each new project. In other words, students will decide on a project, make a computer draft, and then build it, using the most advanced tools—from the idea to the completed project.

Students at Lazbuddie, grades 7-12, will be able to enroll in a number of different technology courses, from Tech Systems, which will explore all areas, to specific courses of interest, such as Manufacturing Graphics (drafting) and Productions Systems.

Scisson said that he plans to have more group projects this year. He said that the junior high students may design and build a space station because there is a lot of emphasis on space projects at the new state industrial tech program. He plans to have some of the older groups work together to design and build a storage building or greenhouse. The senior group will do a scale model of a "dream house" and a bridge that will actually be tested for weight capacity. He said that these group activities will be in addition to individual woodworking projects. He commented that he was very proud of the individual projects that students did last year.

Scisson said that he will apply for student membership in the Technological Students Association so that Lazbuddie may enter projects for regional competition, with a chance to go to state. He said that he attended the regional show last year and felt that his students, even the junior high students, would have done well there.

"I am excited about what's happening in this field," said Scisson. "I encourage students to enroll in technology education. It can be a very rewarding experience and at the same time, will prepare the students to be productive citizens of tomorrow. We explore many interesting areas, and yet, this is still vocational training, and a 'learn by doing' experience. It is still very enjoyable and creative - perhaps more so because it is very applicable for our times."

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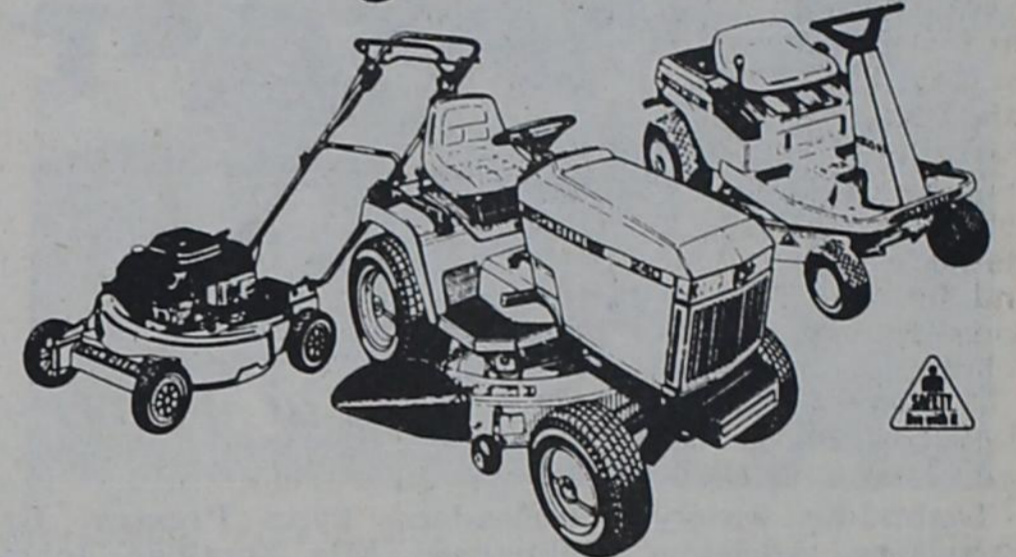

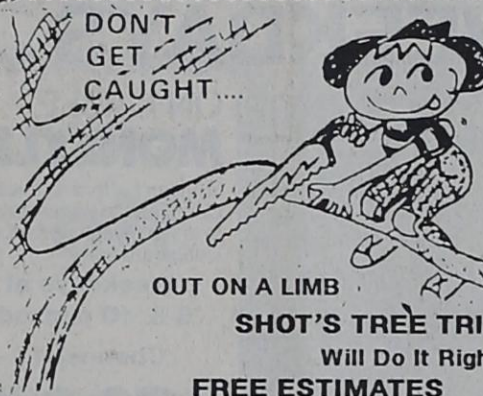
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Wolverines triumph

The Big Lick Award went to Benji McDaniel, corner back

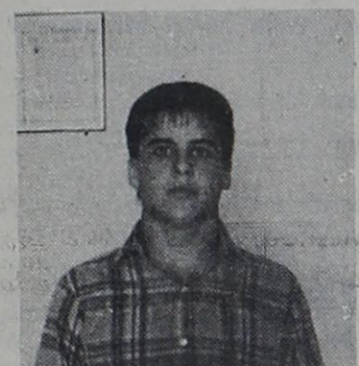

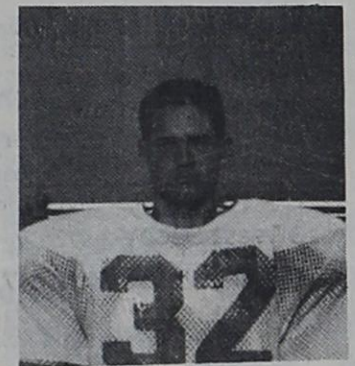

entered. Three CB radios and one radar detector was reported stolen. A Jaguar was also entered, and damage was done to its dashboard.

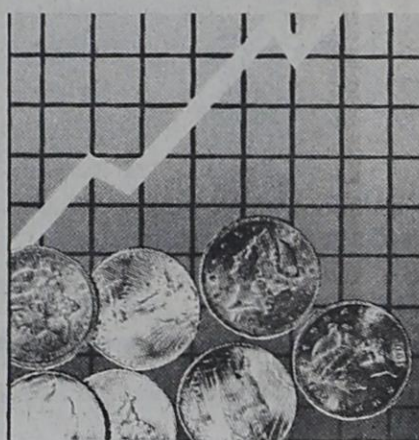
