The Farwell School Board
voted this summer to broade the gifted/talented program.
In the past the gifted/ tal ented program served a few year it will be broadened. The program will be implemented in kindergarten, eighth, and ninth grades this year, then in
grades 10-12 next year. The倍 for the program to become a means of aca-
demically enriching the students. Instead of limiting the proented students, the plan is to broaden the program to include more students. The
new enrichment program in the junior high school will
be called the SMILE program: Students Mastering Individual Learning Experiences. In the SMILE program students will work on individ ual and group projects. They
will also work on higher level thinking skills such as decision making, logic, creativit
and productive thinking and productive thinking.
Some students will Som SMILE program projects
throughout the year, and others may only participate a Farwell Junior High School

Texas industrial tech courses are based on a "hands on, learn by doing" approach. Students may select to study high technology areas such as computer application in drafting, using computer assisted equipment to make working drawings. Computer-aided drafting will be used in
all future jobs in industry and manufacturing. Or students all future jobs in industry and manufacturing. Or students manipulation of materials by small programmed industrial robots to locate, place, or distribute needed items.
Industrial tech courses may include communications
activities and activities and research and development in energy studies that conserve resources.
Industrial technology in high school has adapted to a more technological approach to manufacturing and industry.
Lazbuddie has made every effort to provide students with the most modern industrial technology department possible. The school has purchased a new computer and software for computer-aided drafting.
Scissor said that he
Scisson said that he will use this extensively this year, teaching each student how to create a 3-D, computer-
drafted plan before each new project. In other words, dradents will decide on a project, make a computer draft and then build it, using the most advanced tools-from the idea to the completed project. Students at Lazbuddie, grades 7-12, will be able to enrol
in a number of different technology courses, from Tech Systems, which will explore all areas, to specific course Systems, which will explore all areas, to specific courses
of interest, such as Manufacturing Graphics (drafting) and Productions Systems.
Scissor said

Scisson said that he plans to have more group projects this year. He said that the junior high students may design
and build a space station because there is a lot of emphasis on space projects at the new state industrial tech program. He plans to have some of the older groups work together to design and build a storage building or greenhouse, The
senior group will do a scale model of a "dream house" and a bridge that will actually be tested for weight capacity. He said that these group activities will be in addition to individual woodworking projects. He commented that he wa very proud of the individual projects that students did last
year. year.
Sci Scisson said that he will apply for student membership
in the Technological Students Association so that Lazbuddie in the Technological Students Association so that Lazbuddie
may enter projects for regional competition, with a chance to go to state. He said that he attended the regional show last year and felt that his students
would have done well there.
