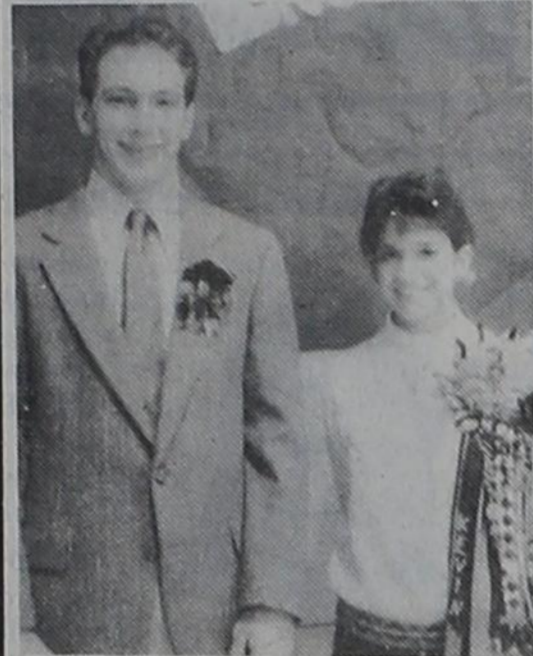

Fontanilla passes first PGA test

Jeff Fontanilla, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chris Fontanilla of Farwell, has passed the first qualifying round for a shot at the Professional Golf Association tour.

Fontanilla was one of 46 players of 119 from throughout the world to pass the first qualifying round at Firewell Country Club in Garland, Texas, last week. The course is 6,625 yards.

To achieve this feat, Fontanilla carded a 2 over par 286 - 74, 71, 70 and 71. His father, the pro at Farwell Country Club, acted as his caddy and advisor.

Now, Fontanilla has to pass a second qualifying round slated for Nov. 15 - 18. He won't be told until Oct. 28 which of 5 sites it will be at but he has told PGA officials he prefers the one in Scottsdale, Ariz.

If he passes this second round, the final qualifying round will be held in LaQuinta, Calif., Nov. 30 - Dec. 5.

Fontanilla, 22, is a Clovis High School graduate. He was Cannon Air Force base golf champion for 2 years, Clovis city champ for 3 years and Friona Country Club champ for 1 year. He also was 1987 Lone Star Conference medalist while attending Eastern New Mexico University.

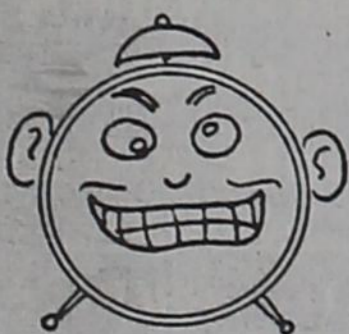

Man charged with burglary

Horacio Ovalle, 26, 112 E. Manana, Clovis, was arrested at the Allsup's Convenience Store in Farwell on charges of public intoxication and indecent exposure at 12:30 a.m. on Oct. 20.

Later he was also charged with burglary with intent to commit sexual assault. He was also charged on an outstanding warrant for writing worthless checks.

Ovalle allegedly broke into a Farwell home and attempted to attack a woman. She chased him out of the house.

Ovalle then allegedly went into the Allsup's store with

part of his anatomy exposed. The Sheriff's office was called, and Ovalle was arrested.

He pled guilty to indecent exposure before Justice of the Peace Albert Smith. He was given a \$200 fine, court costs, and 3 days in jail.

He pled guilty to public intoxication before Smith and was fined \$50.

Smith also ruled that a Grand Jury hearing will be held on the burglary with intent to commit sexual assault charge. Ovalle is being held on \$20,000 bond in Parmer County Jail.

Friona man killed in weekend brawl

Mike Diaz, Jr., 41, Friona, was shot in the chest and killed about 3 a.m. Sunday when a Friona party turned into a brawl.

Friona Police Chief Lloyd Niece said that Diaz was a guest at the home of Juakin Lopez at 808 Jackson in Friona when the shooting occurred.

A murder warrant has been issued for Ramon Ramirez, 24.

Niece said that several people attempted to crash a party that was in progress, and the incident became violent.

Niece said that six people have been charged with burglary of a residence with intent to commit aggravated assault in connection with the incident.

They are Juan Gonzales, Jesus Pena Romero, Jose Pavia, Jose Caro, Leo Gonzales,

and Martin Molina, all believed to be from Friona.

Parmer County Sheriff's office indicated Oct. 26 that Caro, Romero, and Pavia were in custody at the Parmer County Jail.

Also held were Mike Diaz III, son of the dead man, and Francisco Escobar Pena.

Diaz III has been charged with aggravated assault on a peace officer.

Pena was charged with aggravated assault of a peace officer at the time of arrest. It was changed to attempted capital murder on Oct. 26.

During the fray, a hole was shot in the right side door of the police vehicle.

Gonzales was taken to Parmer County Hospital in Friona. Molina was taken to Clovis High Plains Hospital. Officer Jim Davis was treated and released from Parmer County Hospital.

Some pheasant hunts cancelled

Farmers in Curry County voted again Monday to cancel all county pheasant hunts, including the Pleasant Hill Fire Department Hunt, and to post their land this year to keep people from hunting on it, following a Town Hall meeting they sponsored at ENMU-Clovis.

The farmers hoped to draw to the attention of the game and fish department that there needs to be cooperation between various groups. Several years ago Game and Fish personnel participated in a study that was used by the Environmental Protection Agency to justify a ban of an extremely effective pesticide, Azodrin. The farmers contend that the study was not conducted properly.

For several years farmers were able to continue to use the product, but they have not

been able to do so for the past two years. In the future Azodrin will not be sold in the U.S. at all. Azodrin itself is a non-issue, but it is just one example of many products that have been banned the EPA.

The farmers hope to send a message to the Game and Fish department that their action caused farmers great hardship. By posting land, the farmers hope that there will be fewer places for hunters to hunt, and therefore, fewer hunters in the state of New Mexico this year to pay for hunting licenses.

Gary Singleterry of Pleasant Hill said farmers, hunters and business people agreed to organize a committee with the Game and Fish department to establish communications and try to avoid future problems.

Autrey named to council

Oran Jay Autrey was unanimously chosen by the Texico City Council Tuesday night to fill the vacant council post created when Steve Chancy was named mayor.

Autrey, 32, is a partner at High Plains Ready Mix, Clovis. He is a lifetime Texico resident and a Texico High graduate.

He and his wife, Deborah, have three children: Brandon, 8; Ryan, 6, and Nicole, 9 months.

The filling of the post had been put on hold the past two council meetings until all councilmen could be present. They were Tuesday night.

According to state law, it was Chancy's duty to nominate a new councilman and for the council to "advise and consent."

There was a legal question over when Autrey's term would expire and city attorney Duane Hamar will check into it. Chancy was re-elected for a 4-year council term earlier this year before assuming the mayoral post when John R. Hadley resigned.

Chancy said several residents who were qualified had offered to serve in the post. And councilman Butch Tharp thanked all who had showed an interest.

In other business, the council:

- Heard Tharp report he had received several complaints about garbage pickup. Waste Control officials in Hobbs have been notified. It was noted that a new man is on the job here.

- Heard councilman Butch Tharp note that the state has a retirement fund for volunteer firefighters. He asked if it were possible that Texico firefighters who had 20 years or more service could get a benefit, such as free city water, after they retire. Currently, firefighters pay a reduced water rate. Hamar will check on the legality.

- Approved a new 25-year franchise for the Gas Company of New Mexico.

- Adopted a new traffic ordinance, following state guidelines.

- Heard Tharp say that

a way the city might save money is not to seal coat some streets but to use a mixture of hot mix and roofing tar on street cracks. He will check into this before next summer.

- Approved a telephone contract with AT&T for \$1,900.

- Approved a policy putting leave time, such as for sick days and vacations for city employees, into hours instead of days, making it easier for bookkeeping purposes.

- Agreed to have the air conditioner winterized for \$50.

- Agreed to sell some of the city's cold mix, at cost, to Texico School for school parking lot repairs.

- Heard Chancy report about the proposed new Port of Entry to be built on the former campground property. The state says the west-bound entry will be built on that property and the east-bound entry will be placed on existing right of way. The highway will be realigned to provide safe entrance.

"We lost four fumbles and had two passes intercepted during the first half," said Williams. "It seemed like we couldn't keep our minds on the ball."

Lazbuddie, one of the top-rated 6-man football teams in Texas, is now 8-0.

The Longhorns started the scoring in the first quarter when Brian Glover intercepted a 15 yard pass and ran it in for a TD. Then he kicked the point after. Wes Jarman then caught a 30 yard TD pass from Michael Williams. The third Lazbuddie TD came when Eddie Zamora intercepted a 23 yard pass and ran it in for the TD. The point after failed. Kevin McGehee tackled the Three Way quarterback in the end zone to score a Longhorn safety. The first quarter ended with the Longhorns ahead 24-0.

Three Way came back when Roy Suarez scored a TD. The kick was no good.

Lazbuddie continued to roll in the second quarter. McGehee scored on a 66 yard pass from Williams. Then Jarman scored on a 35 yard pass from McGehee. The extra points were scored when Donnie Holt caught a pass from Scott Miller. The half ended at 35-6.

The third quarter got underway after the Homecoming halftime activities. Jarman scored on a 50 yard pass from Williams. The P.A.T. failed. Then Mario Guillen of Three Way scored on a 30 yard run. The kick was no good.

Lazbuddie's Zamora scored on a 34 yard pass from Williams; the point after failed. Zamora then caught a 36 yard pass from Williams to score again. The point after failed again. Jarman scored the final TD on a 33 yard pass from Williams.

The game ended with the score 59-12 in Lazbuddie's favor with 3:27 left on the clock when the 45 point rule was

invoked.

Offensive players of the game were Jarman and Williams. Jarman scored 4 TD's on 4 catches. He gained 153 yards in the game. Williams threw 6 successful TD passes in the game.

The defense held Three Way to only 85 yards gained in the game even though Three Way was ranked third in the area for defense. Miller, Glover, Zamora and McGehee played outstanding defense for the Longhorns, said coach Williams.

Lazbuddie plays Bovina at Bovina tonight (Friday). "This should be a good game," said coach Williams. "We may be quicker, but Bovina is more physical. We'll be up for the game."

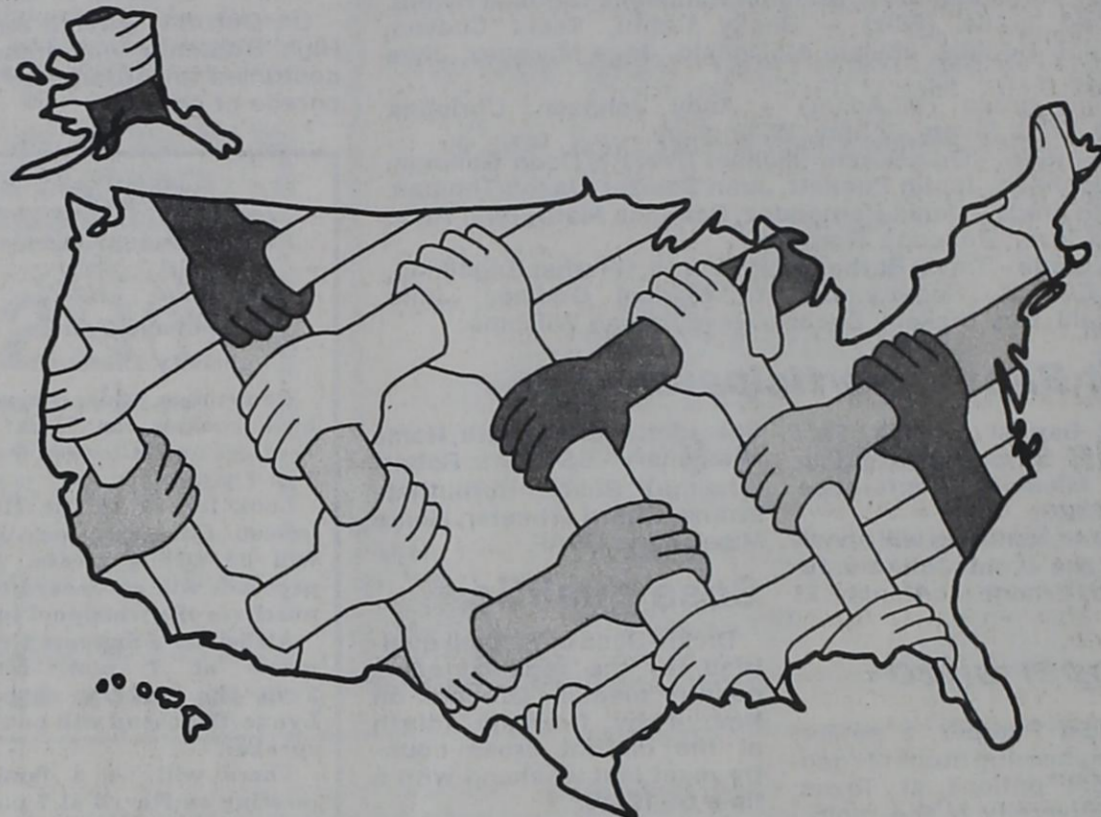
Students go to Amarillo for NASA demonstration

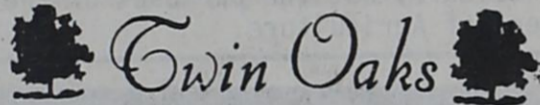

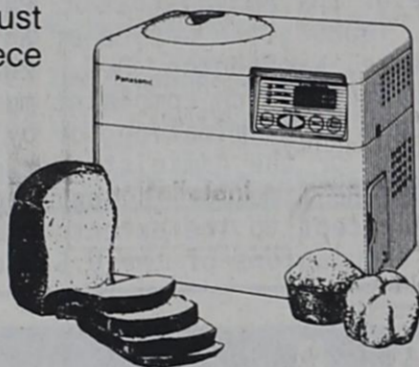

It was decided to have the banquet in March and have Steve Breckenridge, Chamber vice president, run it. Traditionally, the Chamber V-P is in charge.

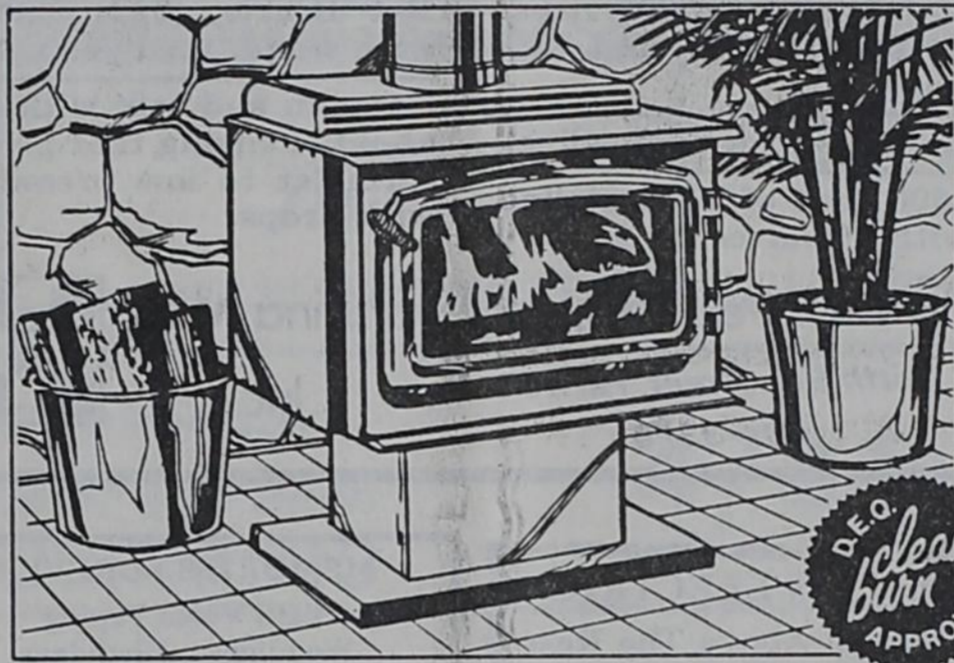
The Chamber will ask ESA to again do the decorating. Fred Chandler agreed to head

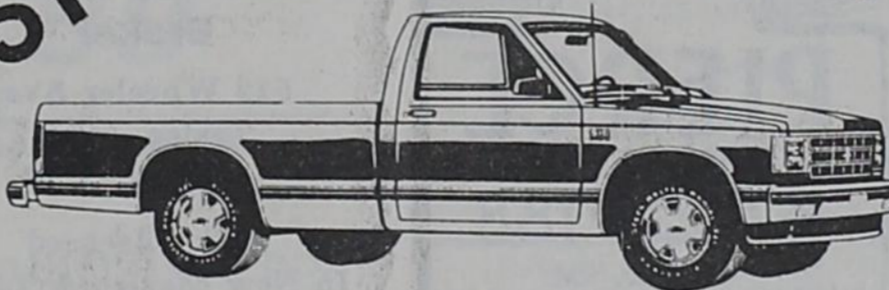

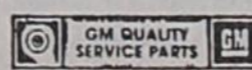

Harvest rolling

Prices quoted in this story are as of Oct. 21

Warm, dry weather during the early fall have allowed this year's harvest to take place at a fairly rapid pace. Many of the vegetables, and most of the corn has been harvested. Other crops are still under harvest.

Farmers in other parts of the country were hard hit by drought this year, but Parmer County got above normal rainfall. Some area farmers are beginning to smile a bit now that their crops are harvested.

"Soybeans are doing good," said Jerry Monk of Kelly Green Seeds. "The yields are good, and so is the price. Monk indicated that the abundant rainfall in Parmer County this year caused good yields - between 40-75 bushels per acre. "The price has been running about \$7 to \$7.50 per bushel this year as compared to \$4.50 to \$5 per bushel last year."

"Sorghum also looks good this season, but it is just getting under way," he said. Corn harvest is about over, except for a little food corn. Prices and yields are both good.

"It's been running between 9 to 11,000 pounds per acre dry yield," said Fred Chandler of Sherley Anderson Pitman's Farwell elevator. "The price has been running about \$5.10 per bushel compared to about \$3.25 per bushel last year."

Chandler indicated that milo prices are also up - \$4.71 per bushel this year, but there is not much milo planted here.

In the Muleshoe area, the corn harvest is nearly complete, soybeans about 70% complete, and the milo just starting to be harvested. Yields are less than last year, but prices are up, said Robert Johnson of Farmer's Cooperative Elevator in Muleshoe.

The sugar beet harvest has just started, but Holly Sugar representatives indicated that yields are up, and prices are, too.

Parmer County Extension Agent - Entomologist Mike Blanton reports that some cotton is being harvested already even though we have

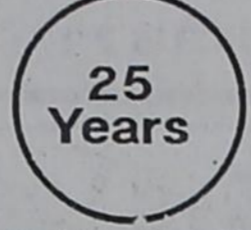

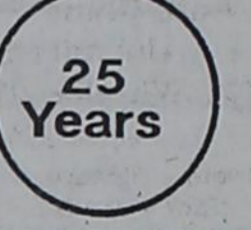

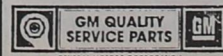
