The Texico Lady Wolverines Volleyball team will host a scrimmage at Texico on Aug. 27 starting at 8 a.m.

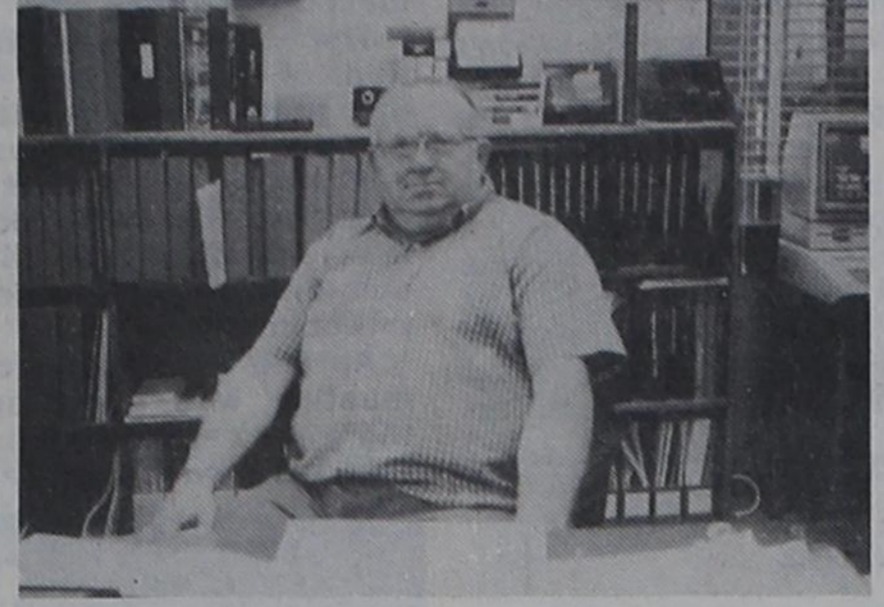
Farwell's first scrimmage will be held at Vega on Aug. 18.

Reynolds moves in

New Farwell High Principal David Reynolds is living in his "Little House on the Prairie," as he calls his camper while he looks for a place for his family to live. He is busy this week moving into the principal's office and familiarizing himself with Farwell High School and its programs.

"I don't plan any radical surgery," says Reynolds of Farwell High School. "What we have here was well planned and well thought out." He is eager to get the year under way.

Reynolds is originally from Texas City, Texas. He earned his bachelor of science degree from Sam Houston State, and his master of science degree from the University of Texas, Permian, Texas. He also has reserve law enforcement certification from Texas A & M.

Reynolds has been in education for 22 years. He started as a teacher and in Yorktown, Texas, where he stayed 2 years. From there he went to Cleveland, Texas. After that he taught and coached in Norman, Texas. For 13 years he taught and coached in Big Spring, Texas.

He left Big Spring to take his first administrative position in Ft. Davis where he was responsible for grades kindergarten - 12 with the

His wife, Nancy, is a teacher. She has 20 years teaching experience; she is certified in physical education and English. She also has middle management certification to be an administrator. She will be staying with her current job until she can find a teaching job closer to her husband.

Their son, Christopher, will be a senior at Farwell High School this year. He played basketball last year and managed the football team and played tuba in the school band. He also worked at a lunch counter in a drug-store as a fry cook and dishwasher. "Nothing is safe in the kitchen now that he knows how to cook," Reynolds jests.

Tax rate approved

The Farwell City Council Tuesday approved the 1988 tax rate at basically the same rate as this year.

The new rate will be .2781 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. The current rate is .2850 cents.

The city's assessed valuation is up and thus will generate more money.

Several points were made during the discussion of where to set the rate, including:

- The city ought to keep its Certificates of Deposit "cushion" where it is.

- The maximum allowable

rate, without going to a public hearing, was 3 percent of .2700 cents.

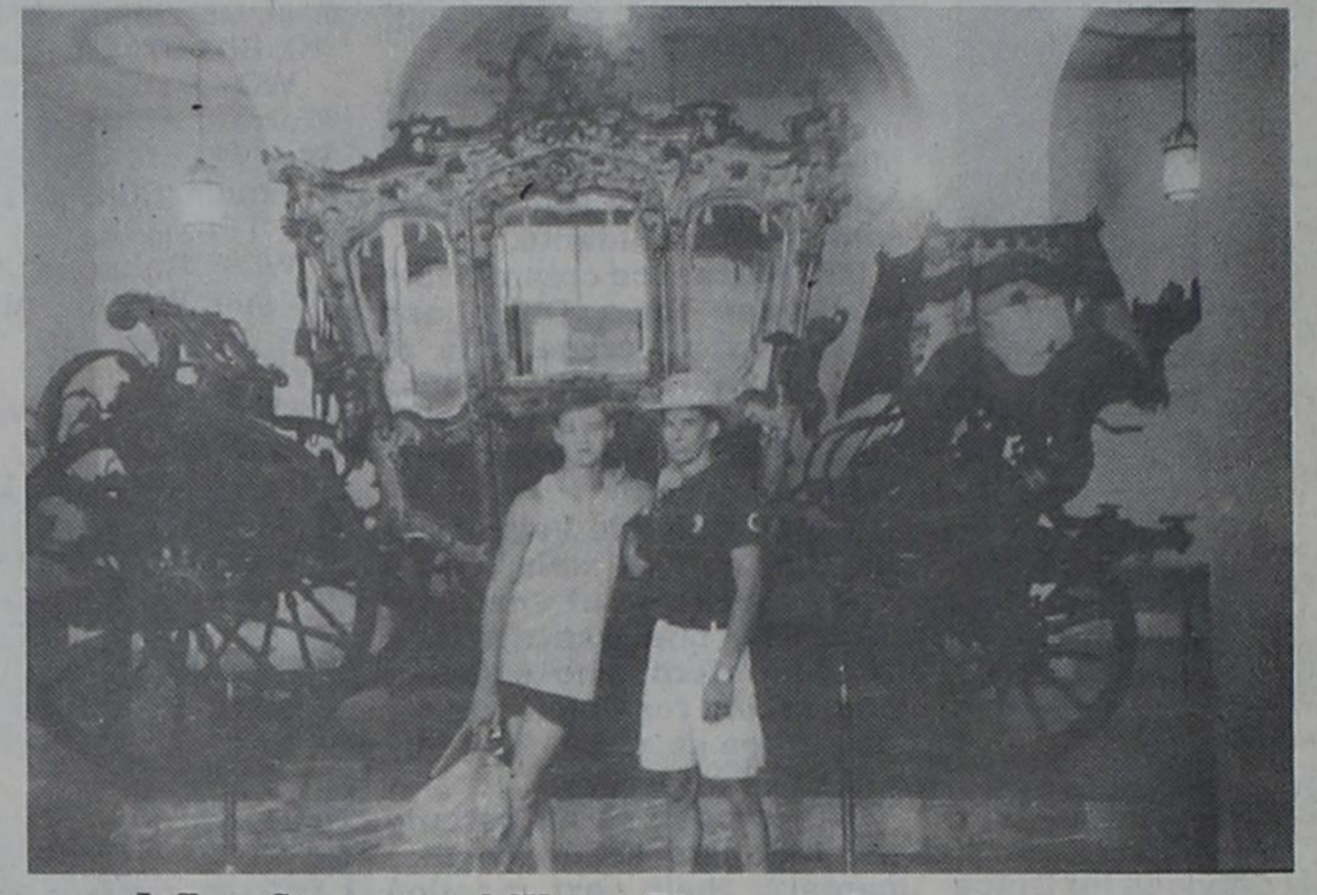
- \$33,000 in funds appropriated for the new sanitation plant will be returned to the city shortly.

- The city wants to remain in the "black" but is unsure of some expenditures, such as buying a new pickup truck and possible salary hikes for city employees.

- The current tax rate is lower than the preceding year because personal property taxes were dropped.

Mayoral decision put off

The Texico City Council had a special called meeting last Friday to discuss appointing a new mayor, but things didn't work out.

Attending were councilmen Doyal LaRue, Butch Tharp and Steve Chancy, and city clerk-treasurer Marie Christian and a resident, Bob Spears.

Bryan Kube, who had been appointed mayor pro tem by

the council after the last city election, wasn't present. He sent a note saying he wasn't given enough notice to rearrange his schedule so he could attend the meeting. He also nominated himself for mayor in the letter.

The special meeting was called by Chancy.

The mayoral post is open because John R. Hadley, mayor for the past 10 years, re-

signed last week when he moved out of the city.

The council has the option of picking one of its own members to be mayor or naming a qualified resident. If it chooses one of its own members, than the councilman chosen mayor will recommend a replacement to the council.

At the beginning of the meeting, Mrs. Christian said there was some talk in town that the councilmen already

had agreed on a mayoral choice before the public meeting. The councilmen said that wasn't true.

Although Chancy said a mayor should be picked now, Tharp and LaRue felt that since Kube, mayor pro tem, wasn't present it would be better to hold off until he was included in the discussion.

So the meeting adjourned (on a 2-1 vote, with Chancy opposed) without any action being taken.

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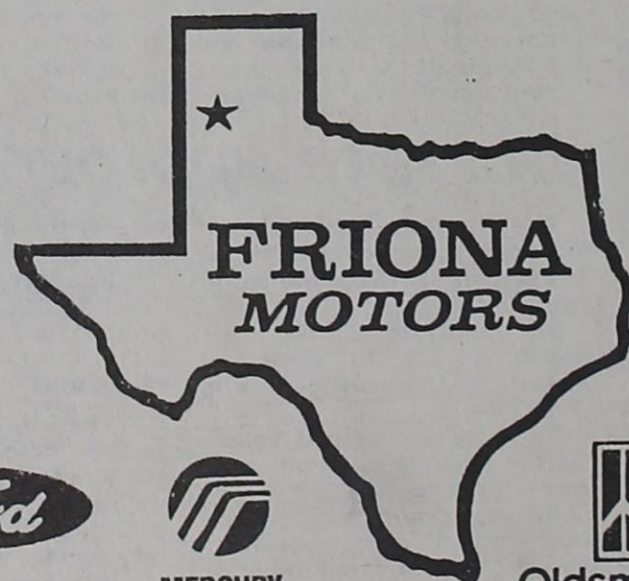
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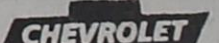
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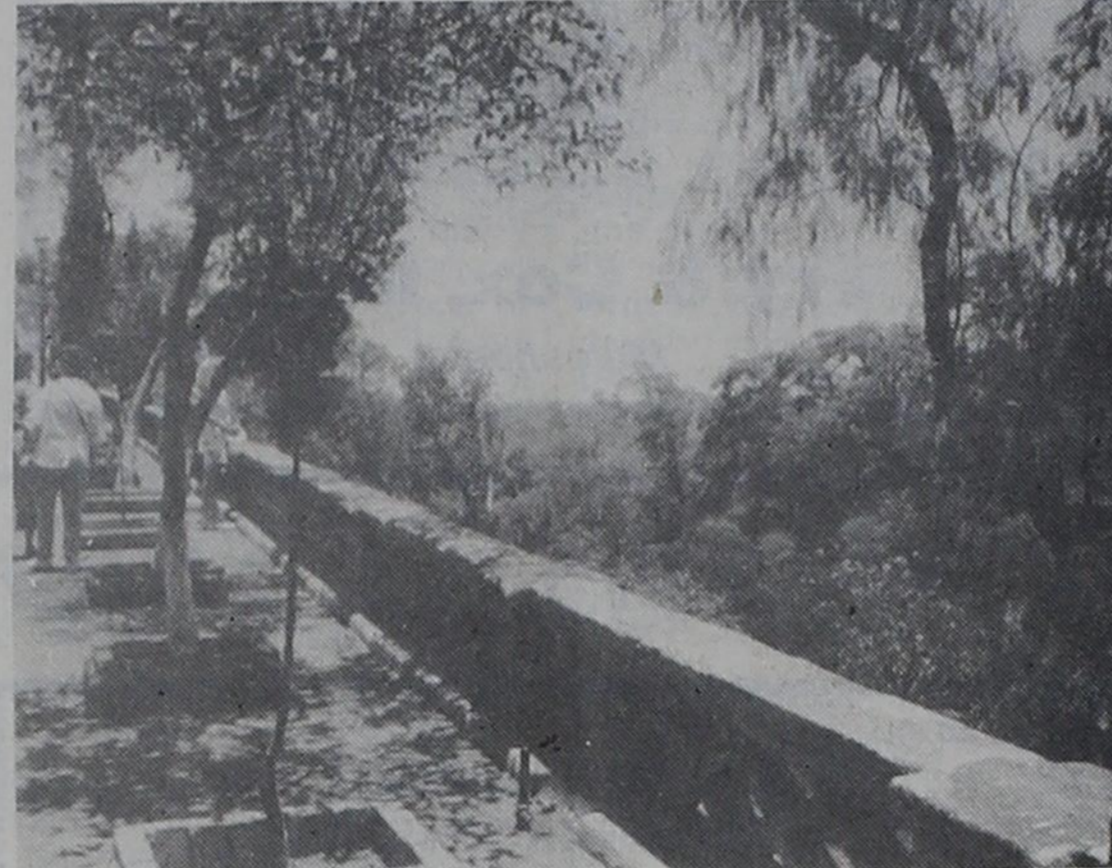

Glover, Miller to be featured

The big question in local 6 man football action is: "How thin is Lazbuddie?"

Last year Lazbuddie walked all over opponents from all over the state of Texas. They were not eligible to play in a six-man district, but they soundly defeated everyone they met no matter what district they came from.

This year they will be playing without 6' 3" quarterback Tim Lust and four others who graduated. They are not as big or as deep as last year.

Supracide OK'd

Area corn growers have not been able to get the EPA to grant a special section 18 permit so that they can use Azodrin to control mites, but they have been granted a section 18 to use Supracide.

This miticide can be used to rescue corn with an extremely high number of spider mites.

To add interest to the season, Lazbuddie will also meet stiff competition from neighboring Bovina which will have its first year as a six-man football team.

Last year Lazbuddie ran up an average of 384.6 yards per game. Many of the games were called early when Lazbuddie led by 50 points. They surprised their opponents with a variety of offensive and defensive strategies.

Lazbuddie's team this year will feature Brian Glover and Scott Miller who both caught more than 20 passes last year to score 7 and 9 touchdowns respectively. It will also include Michael Williams, who will be hard to catch on the field even when the opponents figure out where he is headed.

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Recipe of Week

Cynthia Thigpen's Brunch Casserole

8 slices of bread, cubed 2 lbs. sausage, browned and drained 1/2 c. grated cheddar cheese 1 doz. eggs 2 1/4 c. milk 3/4 tsp. dry mustard 1/2 c. chopped onion 1/4 c. chopped green pepper 1 can cream of mushroom soup (10-3/4 oz.) 1/2 c. milk

Grease a 13x9x2 inch pan. (You may want to use a larger pan or 2 pans 13x9x2 inches because it overflows in one pan of that size. Use a shorter baking time if you use two pans.) Spread bread cubes in bottom of pan; top with sausage, then cheese. Beat or mix in a blender the eggs, milk, mustard, onion and green pepper. Pour egg mixture over ingredients in pan. Refrigerate 1 hour or overnight.

Mix together mushroom soup and milk; pour over other ingredients. Bake at 300 degrees for 1-1 1/2 hours or until a knife inserted into the center comes out clean. Serves 12.

Gladys Hardage's pickled squash

Sprinkle the following ingredients with 4 tablespoons plus 1 1/2 teaspoon full of salt. Let stand 1 hour, then drain off the salt liquid.

36 c. sliced zucchini or white squash
4 big sweet bell peppers cut in 1/2" pieces
6 large onions cut or sliced in pieces.

Make a pickling solution of the following ingredients.

7 c. white vinegar
10 1/2 c. sugar
2 (4 oz.) jars chopped pimento
7 tsp. celery seed
7 tsp. mustard seed

Heat and stir solution until sugar is dissolved. Drain squash and add to the pickling solution. Bring to a boil and boil 5 - 7 min.

Have 6 quart jars washed and ready. Fill and seal.

Juanita Hardage's Squash Relish

10 c. of squash (yellow or zucchini squash)
3 sweet green bell peppers
2 jars pimentos or 2 ripe red sweet peppers
1 jalapeño pepper

Chop the squash and peppers to a fine relish like consistency. Mix with 5 Tbs. salt. Let stand overnight. Drain and rinse several times. Drain in another container mix the pickling solution.

4 c. sugar
2 1/2 c. vinegar
1 tsp. dry mustard

1 tsp. prepared mustard
2 tsp. cornstarch
1 tsp. turmeric
1 T. ground black pepper

Mix vegetables and pickling solution together in preserving kettle. Cook on low heat, stir often. Cook 30 minutes. If cooked over thirty minutes, the relish will be soft.

Pack in hot jars and seal.

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According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments may be made by calling 238-1116. The mobile breast cancer detection unit will be in

Bovina at City Hall, 205 North St., on Friday, August 19th, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and the American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- 35 - 40 years of age - one baseline mammogram.
- 40 - 50 years of age - a mammogram every 1 - 2 years, depending on breast type and risk factor.
- 50 years of age and over - an annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.
- A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find every early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

Another thing she has noticed that is different is the food. People in this part of the U.S. do not eat much fish. In Denmark seafood and caviar are plentiful, so is cheese. Iced tea is a new drink for Helle, who had only tasted the beverage hot before.
