V.V.N. Ranch remembered

Arthur C. Haley, who died last week in Amarillo at age 96, was the longtime foreman of the V.V.N. Ranch south of Farwell.

Dee Owen of Farwell might be the last remaining cowboy who worked on the V.V.N. He worked there for over a decade during the 1930's. He remembers Haley quite well. Below is an account Owen wrote about his cowboying days.

The V.V.N.

Mr. W. H. Fuquay of Amarillo owned the V.V.N. He had 125 sections. The ranch was bordered on the west by the New Mexico state line. He ran 6,500 head of mother cows under the able direction of Arthur Haley, the most capable cowman I was ever to work for. My wages were \$40 a month, with room and board.

There were about 20 windmills. Each was named, as were the pastures, and you learned the names and locations of each. The ranch would hire a windmill man for major repair jobs. The cowboys did the minor jobs, such as new leathers and oiling. You also kept up the fences. You carried wire pliers and steeple in your saddle bag. A lot of the windmills were the old wooden Eclipse type. A jug of oil was kept at each mill. If you came to a squeaking mill, you climbed the tower and oiled the pitman.

The boy that thought cowboying was all horseback was in for a surprise. You did what needed to be done! You carried screwworm medicine at all times. You roped and doctored the cattle right in the

pastures. In the years I spent on the V.V.N., I cannot recall any serious injuries. The distance from town or any other person made very careful and capable horsemen. In the fall, we pulled the chuck wagon out. Extra help was hired. Each man furnished his saddle and bedroll. We rounded up the cattle and held them at the branding pens located in the middle of the ranch.

There were some very good cowboys, roping, dragging and flanking calves. You put in 14 hour days, and slept by the chuck wagon. After the calves were weaned, we drove them to the pens at Muleshoe to ship by rail. Fondly, I remember the V.V.N. cowboys. Fred and Cotton Lee, Junior Ross, Jim Lane, Loy Henington, Slim Patterson, Ted Townsend, Clay Neal and Tom Cox were all good men, capable of any chore from a job in the bronc pen to fixing a fence.

In 1932, the ranchers were in trouble... cheap cattle and no market. The Government started the cow killing program to reduce the surplus. The cows and calves were rounded up and brought to the vat pens. The Government men with rifles shot the cattle, and others skinned them where they fell. It was an experience I have never forgotten.

In 1933, a drought hit. In 1934, the grass was gone and the cattle had to be moved. The bottom fell out of the cattle market. A loan company assumed the ranch, and the old V.V.N., as I knew it, was gone. The old two-story headquarters built in 1901 was torn down in 1936. A new one was built and is now a part of the Birdwell Ranch.

Arguelles gets 18-year sentence

Former Farwell resident Pedro Puente Arguelles, Sr., 53, was sentenced Monday in Federal District Court in Laredo, Texas, to 18 years in prison, 5 years of supervised release, and a \$50,000 fine.

Arguelles was one of 6 people arrested in Zapata, Texas, on March 19 on narcotics charges. He was charged with possession of narcotics with intent to distribute 535

pounds of pure cocaine. Its street value was estimated by one of the arresting officers at \$90 million.

The arrest was the result of an investigation that was carried on by law enforcement officers from several jurisdictions over a long period of time. The Parmer County Sheriff's department cooperated in the collection of information which led to the arrest.





According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97 percent survival rate and a 90 percent 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments may be made by calling (806) 238-1116. The mobile breast cancer detection units will

be in Bovina at City Hall, 205 North St., on Thursday, October 13, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and the American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

1. 35 - 40 years of age - one baseline mammogram.
2. 40 - 50 years of age - a mammogram every 1 - 2 years, depending on breast type and risk factor.
3. 50 years of age and over - an annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
4. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk

factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

5. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find every early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The unit accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard and American Express.

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
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Hamlin painting shown

The painting was donated by Judge James D. Hamlin of his home in 1948. It hung in Farwell here for many years.

Judge Hamlin had purchased the painting from a gallery in London in 1929. The face had been overpainted by the time he purchased the painting. It was part of his collection until 1948.

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



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
