

# Countdown starts for 30th football contest

For the football fanatic, it's THAT time again.

The always-popular Area Merchants Football Contest will begin its 30th year in two weeks.

Last year close to 700 persons, ages 12 and up, entered the contest. That figure along testifies to the popularity of the contest, given the number of local residents who are over the age of 12!

But Cumpton is careful not to build their hopes up too high before the Steers have even seen the teams in their new district. The best he promises is that the Steers will be competitive.

At the start of the season, the opening lineup will probably consist of: David Price, center; Chuck Hammit and Bruce White, guards; Dustin Hardage and Jaime Mendoza, tackles; Darron Haseloff, tight

end; Curtis Chisum and Greg Bearss, split end; Greg Actkinson, quarterback; Jeff Actkinson, fullback; Shawn Stewart, tailback; Michael Arce and Monty Delgado, split end.

Jeff Actkinson scored the first touchdown for the Steers on a 5 year run off right guard. Bruce White threw an excellent block to free him. The TD came after a steady drive downfield, including 4 first downs.

The second TD came on a 15-yard run around left end by Michael Arce, who outran the defenders.

Actkinson finished the Farwell scoring with a 25-yard sweep around left end.

Vega's touchdown was the result of 2 successful passes.

Among the standouts for Farwell were Clint Cole, Arce, White and Darren Haseloff.

## School Board okays 1¢ hike

The Farwell School Board Tuesday approved a tax rate for 1988-89 which calls for a 1 cent increase over the current rate.

Originally, a higher tax rate appeared to be on the horizon. But a computer-generated error in the county appraisal district's formula erased that (see correct rate in an advertisement in today's newspaper). Thus, the hearing set for Sept. 6 (mandated if an increase of more than 3 percent of the rate is called for) has been cancelled. The new rate will be 3 percent higher.

In other business, the board:

- Hired Barbara Wyatt, of Portales, as the home economics teacher; David Reynolds, as high school principal, and Nancy Reynolds as pre-kinder garden teacher, with some secondary classes in the afternoon.

- Formerly accepted the resignation of band director Norris Samuelson. The formal acceptance had been held up after some band equipment had been reported missing to police. The board has received reports on the incident, and based on it, found that Samuelson's report was accurate.

- Heard Supt. John Grigsby report that the schools have

received some county funds and hail damage insurance money totalling \$26,000. This was placed in the building fund, bringing that fund up to \$75,000.

- Approved plans for in-service training and high school scheduling.

- Made some changes in teacher evaluation programs.

- Scheduled a special meeting for Aug. 30 to discuss the facilities survey and to approve the final amended budget for 1987-88. The survey deals with major repair work, such as new roofs and windows for the various buildings.

## Harrison scores twice

Texico lost its scrimmage with Clayton, one of the top AA schools in New Mexico, but Coach Curt Cook was pleased with the individual performances of many of the team members.

Clayton scored 4 TD's to Texico's 2.

"Clayton was real smooth," said Cook. "They were state basketball and track champs and runnersup in football. They also have great depth. But, we hit them harder than they did us, and we outperformed them."

Texico's TD's were both scored by Keith Harrison. One was scored on a 60 yard pass reception from Larry Powell, and the other was scored on a 6 yard pass reception from Powell.

Cook lauded Powell for the good job he did on offense. Harrison, a senior, was also recognized for his quick pursuit of opponents on defense.

Jason Longo, tight end, junior, was cited by the coach for both his offensive and defensive plays. "He did an excellent job of staying with blocks," said Cook.

Others recognized by the coach included the following. Junior running back, Robbie Edwards ran well and hit well David Johnson ran the ball well, and played good defense. Byron Martin, a split end ran good routes. Lance Akers, who played defensive end part of the game, appears to have recovered from his

leg surgery. He ran well in the game. He also recovered a fumble during the action.

Warren Martin may have won a starting position with his good trap blocking and quick starts.

"We still have a long way to go, but I felt good about the team after the scrimmage," said Cook. "The team seems to be solidifying as we go into our first ball game against Estancia here at 7:30 p.m. (MDT) on Saturday night. It will be Senior Citizens' Recognition night."

Cook reports that he has several new young players who will be tried at several positions before the Texico

lineup will be finalized for the year.

The center's position is open, and so are the wide receiver and running back positions. Several different peopole are contending for these positions.

"We have to solidify our offensive line before we can go anywhere," said Cook.

"We plan to pass more than we have in the last few years, so we have been working hard on skills," he added.

The Wolverine football team was set back when center Mike Williams broke his foot recently, just as the team lineup had started to shape up. Williams, a senior, will be out of play for several weeks.

## No mayor yet for Texico

Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting was cancelled due to a lack of quorum.

With John Hadley's resignation as mayor earlier this month, 3 councilmen are needed to be present for a quorum. Tuesday, only Steve Chancy and Doyal LaRue appeared.

They received a call from councilman Bryan Kube that he had to work late and would be 45 minutes late to the meeting. But City Attorney Duane Hamar told

the councilmen that since the meeting was legally called for 6:30 p.m., it couldn't be held up for that time period.

Councilman Butch Tharp had said at the previous meeting that he would have to miss one or two meetings due to work commitments.

The next regular meeting is set for Sept. 12. The council can call a special meeting if 24 hours notice is given.

With the cancellation of the meeting, it means that the post of mayor remains vacant.

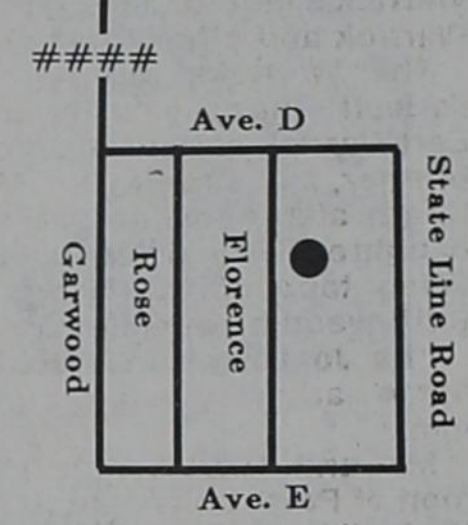

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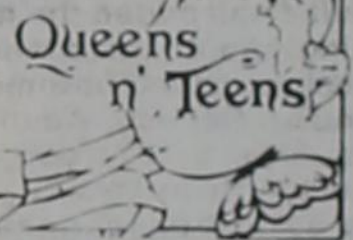

**On avoiding fleas**

Fleas attack both man and animals and often become a major problem during the summer months in Texas. The tiny pests cause annoyance and discomfort and can also spread certain diseases, a major one being bubonic plague. Adult fleas cause the most problems as they have piercing, sucking mouthparts and suck blood, said Mike Blanton, Extension Agent Entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Adult fleas may live from 2 months to 2 years. After each blood meal females lay four to eight eggs which hatch in two to three weeks. They may deposit as many as 500 eggs in their lifetime. Flea control may be difficult due to the circumstances under which the pests occur. Home infestations are often discovered a short time after a pet has been taken out of the home. Immature fleas have completed development and, with the absence of the normal host, turn to man for their life-sustaining blood meal. Satisfactory control of fleas must be eliminated from the home and yard by proper chemical control and sanitation measures, such as replacing infested bedding materials and cleaning carpets and stuffed furniture. Pets must be rid of fleas by using registered chemicals. In the case of rat or mice fleas, these hosts must be eliminated. Reinfestation must be prevented by protecting pets with flea collars or other preventative chemicals during times of likely infestations. The county agent's office can give you a list of the most effective treatments for flea infestations in the home, outside the home, and on host animals.

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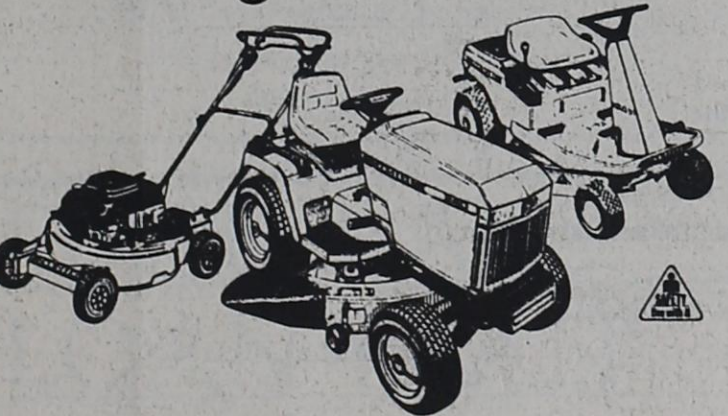

# Will the feds expand student testings?

AUSTIN — An old debate over the proper role of the federal government in education is likely to stir again in coming weeks as Congress continues to debate legislation that would expand Education Department testing of school children.

The legislation, which already has received U.S. Senate approval and

currently is pending in the House, calls for the Secretary of Education to overhaul the 18-year-old National Assessment of Educational Progress and increase use of the test. The test currently is given to a "statistically correct" sample of 120,000 students each year. The new law would require at least 700,000 students to be

tested. In addition, the secretary also would be directed to administer a new test that would measure students' mastery of skills deemed — in the legislation's words — "appropriate to completion of a secondary school education." The test either could be one developed by the department or an existing one available from a testing company. It would be administered only to students who volunteered to take the test.

Both testing proposals have stirred controversy in Washington and in state capitals around the country because they underscore the tenuous relationship between federal, state and local governments over education policy.

State and local governments for most of this country's history have been the guardians of education policy. The power to regulate education is not one given the federal government in the U.S. Constitution, so by default it is a power reserved to the states.

Beginning in the 1950s and 1960s, though, the federal government began to take a more active role in education, first through court-ordered school desegregation and then through the Congressional appropriation of large sums of money to assist states in funding

education. It was with the latter action that the controversy began to brew.

State and local governments naturally were pleased to have the money, but they bridled at the federal requirements that accompanied the funds. They argued that the requirements interfered with a state's right to educate its students according to its own rules and guidelines. State leaders maintained that each state has unique educational needs, and that undue federal interference hurt state efforts to meet those needs.

Federal officials countered by saying that if all states had been doing a good job of educating their students the extra federal dollars wouldn't have been necessary. Besides, supporters of the federal funding argued, the guidelines merely helped insure the federal dollars were being spent to shore up the programs Congress determined to be deficient.

The debate that is beginning to surround the new testing legislation generally is following the same lines.

Supporters of overhauling and increasing the sample size of the National Assessment of Educational Progress maintain the changes are necessary if Congress is to have adequate oversight of its financial investment. Development of the second test isn't really radical, supporters say, since the test is strictly voluntary.

Traditional opponents of increased federal involvement in education might agree were it not for an additional provision in the new testing legislation that would have test results published on a

state-by-state basis. Opponents of the legislation say publishing the results could force states into a very negative type of competition.

Opponents argue that states will become fearful of "lagging behind" and that classroom instruction will begin to focus on preparing students for the tests. Since the standardized tests are developed nationally, they might ignore skills that are important to a student's ability to compete economically

in his or her state or region. The absence of those skills on the test could lead to less emphasis on those skills in the classroom.

You can be sure both sides already are sharpening their arguments as debate on the legislation continues in Congress. You also can be sure the outcome will have an effect on the continuing discussion of the federal government's proper role in making education policy.

## No adverse comments

Reporters on the trail of a story hate to hear "no comment." But "no comment" was the big story Aug. 3 at a public hearing in Lubbock on environmental concerns related to boll weevil control and eradication efforts. The High Plains Boll Weevil control Program, in its 25th year, drew not a single adverse comment. "To us," program officials say, "that means we must be doing something right."

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) called the hearing to receive public comment in the process of preparing a court-ordered environmental impact statement on a proposed federal-state industry eradication program, spanning the U. S. Cotton Belt. A similar hearing was held August 1 in Montgomery, Alabama, and another August 5 in Phoenix, Arizona.

Only six statements were presented at the lightly attended Lubbock hearing, all of them lauding the High Plains program as a boon to area cotton production and the High Plains economy while posing no threat to environmental safety. In contrast, a USDA source reported, the Alabama hearing produced 25 witnesses, five of whom testified in opposition to the spray program that started last year in 21 south Alabama counties.

## Four workshops offered

The Texas Agricultural Extension service is offering four in-depth Futures and Options Workshops in September 1988 and February 1989.

The two-day workshops will provide market updates and training in pricing alternatives available to producers, emphasizing the use of commodity futures and options.

The first two trainings will be Sept. 6-7 in Tahoka and Sept. 8-9 in Lubbock. Participation in the workshops is not restricted to residents of the host counties.

Registration fee for the session is \$20. This covers the cost of a large notebook with current examples and materials for future reference. Deadline for registration is Aug. 26.

Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension economist and cotton marketing specialist and Dr. Mark Waller, Extension economist and grain marketing specialist, both from College Station, will teach the workshops focusing on cotton.

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

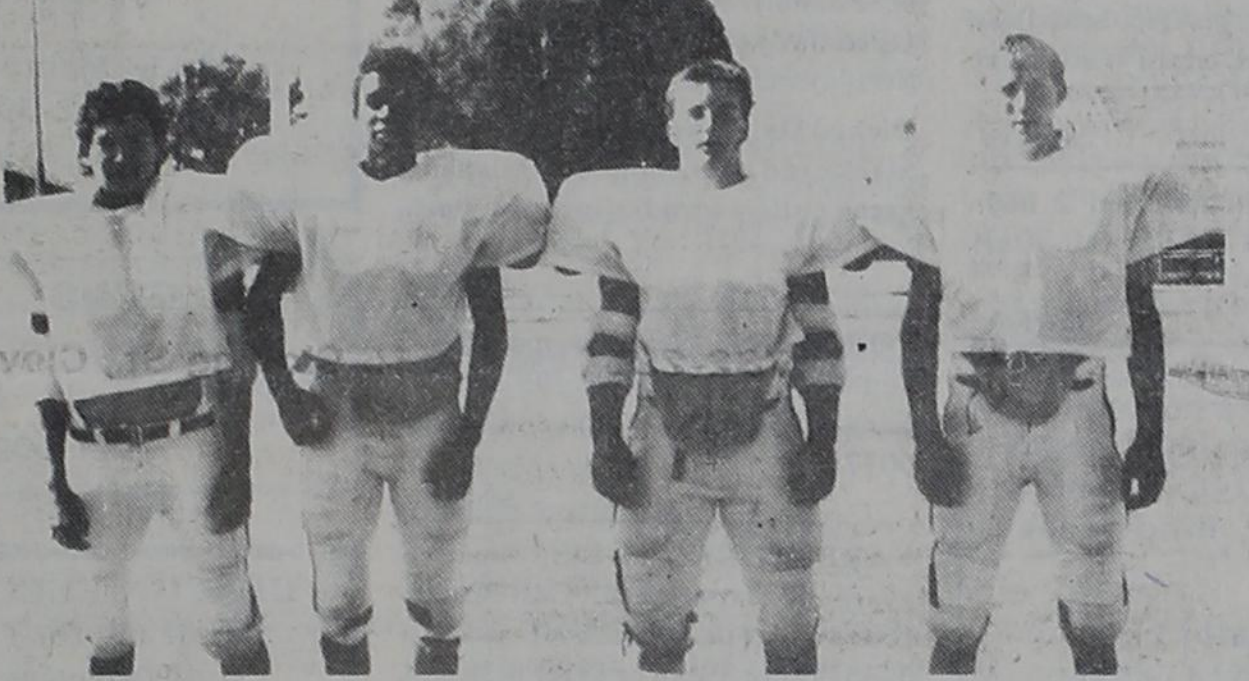

## Hunting petition circulated

Members of the Pleasant Hill Fire Department have been circulating a petition to ban hunting on private land as a protest to the banning of certain pesticides by the EPA. More than 70 local farmers have signed the petition.

"All the farmers we have talked to have signed the petition and have agreed to post their land," said Gary Singleterry of the Pleasant Hill Fire Department. "We will be having meetings to tell farmers how to post their land in the next few months. We have also been working on cards that we will

send to hunters asking them to contact the New Mexico Game and Fish Department."

The protest began when the EPA refused to grant a section 18 permit so that local corn growers could use a pesticide - Azodrin - that was banned by the EPA. The EPA has banned it for use

on corn but not for use on cotton or peanuts which are both grown locally.

The farmers hope to send a message to environmentalists, hunters, and game and fish personnel who have lobbied against the use of certain pesticides that they are unhappy with the situation.

### Corn growers to meet

There will be a meeting of corn growers with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department on Aug. 29 in Dimmitt to voice the growers' stand on the banning of the miticide Azodrin. It is scheduled for 7 p.m. in the County Exposition building in Dimmitt.

"Our immediate concern is the possibility of future opposition not only regarding Azodrin, but any miticide as well," said Carl L. King, president of the Texas Corn Producers Board, in a letter.

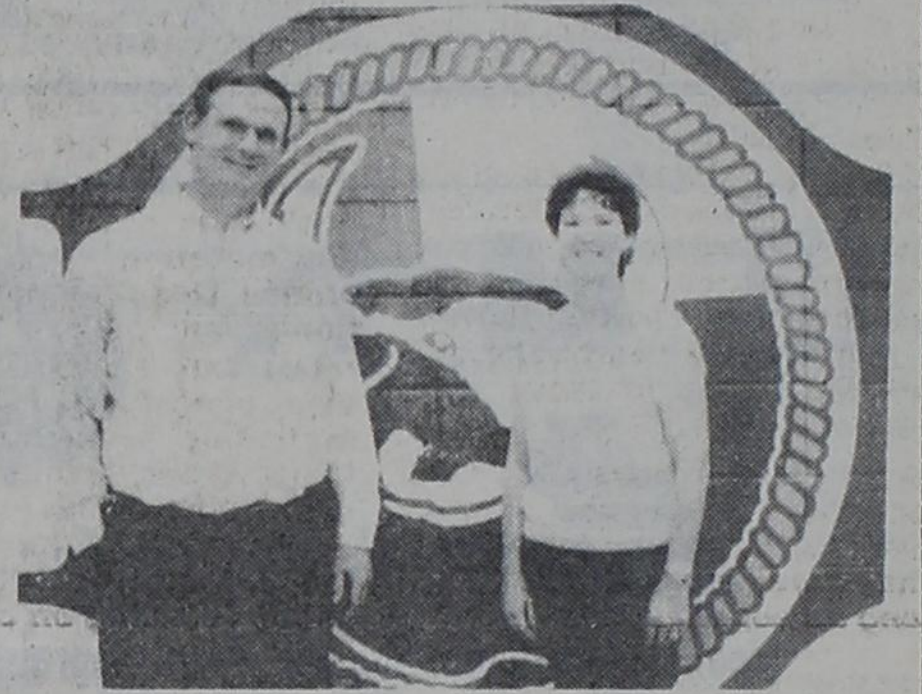

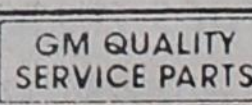

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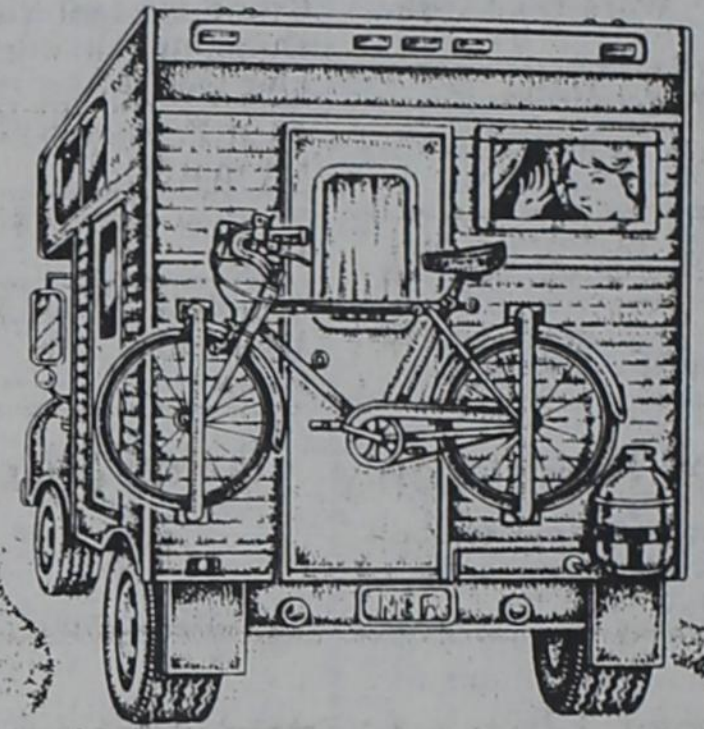

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# Grapes to be featured at field day

Improved crop yields and increased profitability from conservative tillage and rotation systems will be featured Sept. 13, a stop of the 79th annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Grapes, a new crop of the High Plains will also be featured at a stop. Experiment station scientists will explain effects of various rootstocks on adaptability, winter survival, yield, and quality.

Visitors will be transported by wagons to research sites at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center. The facility is located on FM 1294, just east of I-27

at the Shallowater exit. Tours will be conducted from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Conservation tillage and crop rotations are major features of the farming systems research at the center. Continuous cotton as well as wheat-cotton and sorghum-cotton rotations are being evaluated for effects on cotton growth, yield, quality and profitability, said Dr. Wayne Keeling, systems agronomist with the Experiment Station.

Keeling will disclose findings of weed control research studies in a conservation tillage system as well as experiments on weeds such

as lake weed, nutsedge, and lanceleaf sage. Keeling noted that there have been promising findings in work with experimental herbicides for johnsgrass control in corn and broadleaf weeds in cotton.

Commercial producers and home grape growers can learn more about this popular area crop from Dr. William Lipe,

professor of viticulture with the Experiment Station.

Lipe will discuss findings of research which focus on minimizing losses from severe cold. The viticulturist will touch on such topics as matching variety to soil type, rootstock, plant populations, and ground covers. Availability of moisture and nutrients, as well as vine vigor which re-

sult from these cultural practices will also be discussed.

Other stops on the tour will feature cotton developed for high fiber quality, sorghum breeding, oilseed improvement, and results of studies on the Russian wheat aphid.

The field day will also feature displays of equipment, farm supplies and informa-

tion booths. The Texas Forest Service will present red oak trees to 300 landowners who take the field tours.

The program is a cooperative presentation of TAES, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the High Plains Research Foundation, the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Agriculture Research Service and the Texas Forest Service.
