Chancy elected mayor

A special note from Farwell School Board member

Steve Chancy was elected mayor of Texico Tuesday night. He replaces John R. Hadley, who resigned after moving out of the city.

Chancy, 37, is an engineer for the city of Clovis fire department. He has been a firefighter for 15 years.

He lives at 504 Turner with his wife, Kim, and two children, Preston, 16, and Stephani, 7. He is a Texico High graduate.

Chancy was elected to the city council 4 years ago, then re-elected this year.

At the next council meeting, he is expected to present a candidate to replace him on the council. The council would vote on the candidate.

The voting for mayor took place after a 35-minute executive session where it is believed the council went over the legal ground rules for voting with City Attorney Duane Hamar.

After the public meeting was called to order again, Bryan Kube, acting mayor, withdrew his nomination for himself as mayor. He had nominated himself at the last meeting by letter but no action was taken due to lack of a quorum at that meeting.

Then councilman Doyal LaRue nominated Chancy for mayor, saying Chancy was the only person who has indicated he would take the position.

LaRue and Butch Tharp voted for Chancy, who abstained in the vote. Kube, as acting mayor, was not al-

lowed to vote except if there was a tie.

Hamar swore in Chancy as mayor.

In other business, the council:

- Will review recent amendments to the state traffic ordinance, and discuss them at the next meeting.

- Discussed changing the makeup of the council chambers so that a different table is used. Currently, the council uses a round table and visitors sit at their backs. The council would like a table so that they could face visitors.

- Heard Chancy report that Max Carter has brought up some problems to him.

One concerns water runoff into the school bus barn area from Town & Country and adjacent areas. Hamar said this is a private matter and since the roadway involved is a state right of way, the city ought to stay out of the problem.

Another concerned potholes in the alley behind Burger Barn. The city will use caliche to fill them.

Chancy asked where state highway right of way ends. Hamar said the legal documents need to be checked but basically they end from 20 to 40 feet from the road's center line.

- Heard Tharp say that many city streets need repairs and now is the time to plan for next summer's work. Kube said the councilmen need to check out the streets themselves.

Farwell council discusses young drivers

The Farwell City Council Tuesday talked about going on the offensive against youths who speed down city streets, who have loud mufflers, who drive recklessly, etc.

The problem is with the enforcement. As things stand now, it's up to the parents.

The council once again held a lengthy discussion on police matters.

One scenario calls for the Texico City Marshal Brent Byrum to work part-time in his off hours in Farwell. But before this could occur, a ruling would be needed from the Attorney General on whether this is legal.

If it were ruled legal, and the Texico City Council approved it, then Farwell would provide a car, equipment, etc., for Byrum.

Another scenario calls for a deputy sheriff to be concentrated on Farwell. To achieve this, the city would pay a certain amount to the county commissioners as reimbursement. The legality of this would have to be checked out.

The council also discussed volunteers, and hiring a constable.

Councilman Fred Chandler said he totally opposes having a fulltime police officer, based on past experiences. It was said that city taxes could increase 50 percent to cover this.

Councilman Martin Kube said residents have told him a fulltime police officer is not needed in Farwell.

In other business, the council:

Received an update on its crackdown on junked vehicles. Seventeen certified letters were sent out Sept. 1 to persons with vehicles the council feels need moved. Four of the letters were not taken and the council will hand deliver them.

At the next meeting, the council will discuss its next step, possibly having the

sheriff deliver summonses to Justice of the Peace Court.

- Approved about \$4,800 worth of street work, to be done by Eastwood Construction Co., Clovis. Third Street between Ave. A and Ave. E will be seal coated.

- Heard a report that 34 new street lights will be placed along the north side of Ave. A. While there is no cost to the city in installing the lights, it will cost an extra \$250 a month for electricity.

- Decided to continue with Texas Municipal League insurance coverage for city employees.

- Agreed to seek bids on a pickup for the sanitation department.

- Approved digging a new garbage pit at the landfill.

- Agreed to allow the fire department to buy a Suburban, to be used for taking fire department personnel to training seminars. Fire Chief Joel White said he had received two bids, from Doc Stewart, Clovis, and Robert D. Green, Muleshoe.

The Doc Stewart bid was lower by several hundred dollars and was accepted. With equipment to be added on, the vehicle is expected to cost about \$19,000. It was noted that city tax funds are not paying for this. It is being bought with funds raised by the fire department and from county subsidies.

- Agreed to put ash on the street between Kelly Green Seeds and Tri-County Tires.

Fontanilla to give it a shot

Jeff Fontanilla, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chris Fontanilla of Farwell, will give it a shot at the professional golf tour next month.

He is scheduled to begin testing for it at Garland, Texas. If he passes that challenge (a 72-hole tourney), he moves on to an Arizona course. The third and final test is in Florida.

Record number of participants

Pena captures 1st grid contest

The 30th annual Merchants Football Contest began last week, starting the 12-week season with 4 contestants guessing correctly on all 12 games.

Scores were generally high as most of the favorites won.

Those with 12 right were Christy Pena, T.J. Kittrell, Robin Gregory and Tom Nichols.

Miss Pena was declared the first-place winner by virtue of being closer to the tie-breaker than the others. She was 13 points off the tie-breaker: Capital 26, Texico 21. Kittrell was 27 points off; Mrs. Gregory 41 points off; and Nichols did not fill in the tie-breaker score.

Parmer tax rate approved

The Parmer County Commissioners unanimously approved a county tax rate of .3035 per \$100 at its Monday meeting.

The new rate is up .0091 from this year (.2944).

The new budget's expenses are expected to be at \$2,170,915, up from this year's \$1,997,915. The county currently has a surplus of funds but will need to dip into it early next year until the bulk of the tax money comes due.

The commissioners spent the bulk of the 2-hour meeting talking with Friona officials and members of its volunteer fire department.

Before the discussion, the commissioners already had decided to change a recent decision involving subsidies to county ambulance crews. Previously, the amount for Friona had been cut and made the same as for Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie.

But last week, Friona officials asked the commissioners to reconsider that cut, noting the number of calls they make in the county. Monday, the commissioners approved \$800 to Friona for ambulance subsidy, and \$400 each to Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie.

Friona Mayor Clarence Monroe, speaking for the group, told the commissioners that the re-instated ambulance subsidy was now adequate, but the Friona group was asking for help toward buying a \$35,000 fire truck.

Monroe and Beelee Goodwin, Friona city manager, were the main speakers for the Friona folks.

Their main contention was that Friona residents pay about 46% of the tax funds (\$176,000) the county receives, and they don't get much back. They noted that the funds are split equally between the four commissioner precincts.

Goodwin argued for funds to be shared on a pro-rata share, meaning that the precincts with most of the constituents should get an equal share of the funds available.

"We're not getting our fair share of our tax dollars," said Monroe. "We subsidize the rest of the county and we don't like it."

Friona officials have presented the commissioners with information showing the amount of fire and ambulance calls they make outside the city limits. They noted that Bovina and Farwell crews also answer county calls. But Friona officials said they needed financial help, due to needing a new fire truck, according to state standards.

For the city to send a truck into the county, a standby truck is needed to stay in the city. But neither truck can be more than 25 years old - which is the approximate age of one of the Friona fire trucks.

Ware and commissioner Ray McGehee said that if Friona needs to borrow money to buy a fire truck, then that's what should happen.

Ware noted that the county spends \$40,000 countywide annually on fire and ambulance subsidies.

The commissioners adopted the budget as presented, without extra funds for a

Friona truck. Ware said the Friona request should be taken under advisement and the subsidies might be "pro rated" for next year's budget.

Commissioner Robert White said that the fire and ambulance services should be treated equally since they all have equipment, training, and other needs.

After the meeting, one resident suggested to the commissioners that those members who have Friona in their precincts (Ware, McGehee and Ernest Anthony) give a small part of their road

funds toward purchasing a Friona fire truck. This person said that since each commissioner gets around \$200,000 (roughly) for buying equipment annually, a small portion of this total from the 3 precincts would be a great help toward the new truck.

Such a donation could be made at any time and the budget doesn't need to be changed. The commissioners court needs to approve it. McGehee noted that a commissioner made such a decision years ago, giving funds

The Pep Club will attend the Junior High football game at Bovina on Sept. 15.

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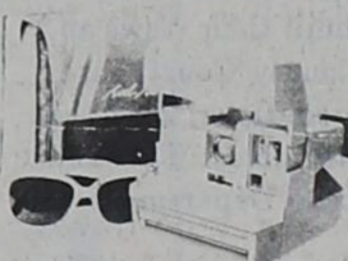


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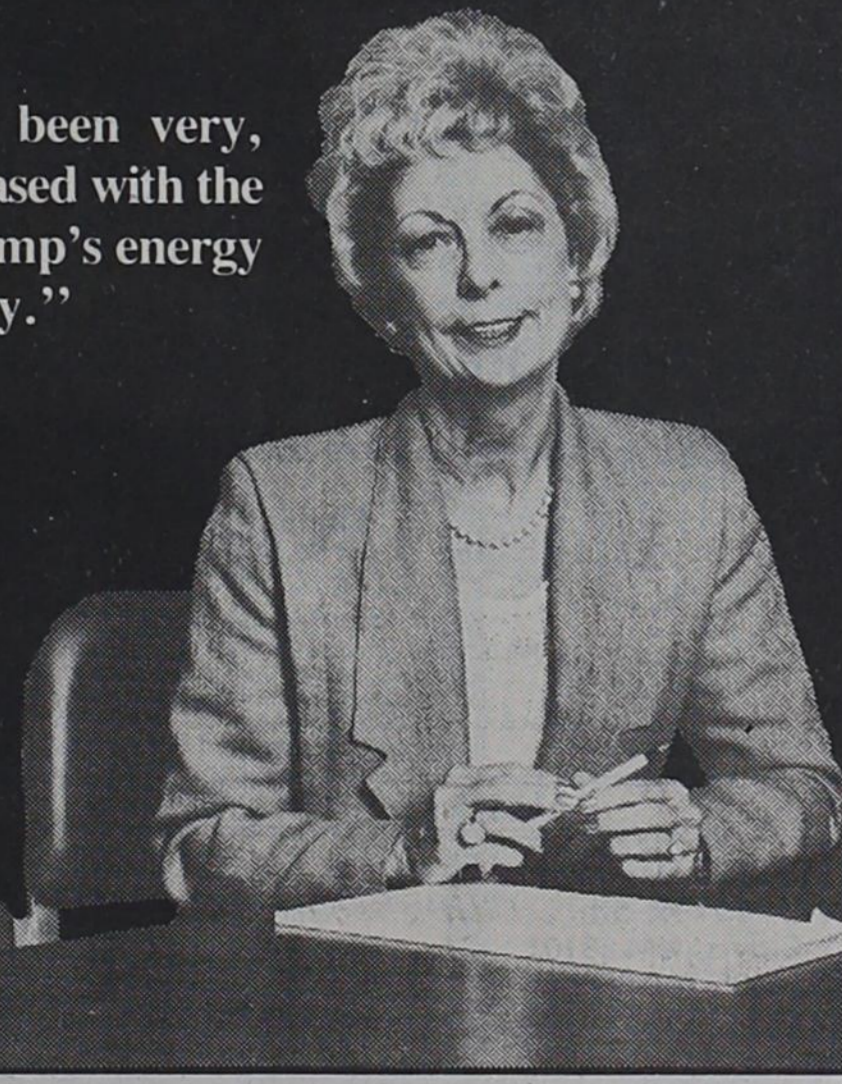
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Ancira was near tragedy

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Hereford firm wins settlement

Hereford Bi-Products Inc. and Southwest Hide Co. recently won an in-court settlement of \$5 million from

Amarillo Bi-Products, Inc. defendant in a civil trial in U.S. District Court in Amarillo.

Grath Merrick, president of Hereford Bi-Products, issued a statement on the suit Friday because of his "concern that the general public is not aware of the outcome of the suit nor the fact that his company is not related to the Amarillo firm."

Merrick added that an article in The Amarillo Globe-News this week brought his attention to the fact that area citizens—including some of his customers—were not aware of the reasons for the court case.

The Amarillo article reported that the Amarillo City Commission had ordered Amarillo Bi-Products to adopt an acceptable plan for treatment of its industrial waste and implement that plan by Dec. 1. The story also added that Amarillo Bi-Products had been a defendant in a Racketeer Influenced Corrupt Organization case, and that U.S. District Judge Mary Lou Robinson had announced settlement terms of a \$5 million payment to plaintiffs Hereford Bi-Products and Southwest Hide Co., with the payment to be hiked to \$15 million if the \$5 million was not paid by a certain date.

Merrick said the in-court settlement was announced on the fourth day of the trial on July 27. The suit filed by Hereford Bi-Products alleged, in part, that Amarillo Bi-Products "conspired to commit fraud and theft" of money and property against the plaintiffs and others. Some of the others allegedly damaged included Caviness Packing, Palo Duro Packing, Great Western Meat Co., and 66 pack. Southwest Hide, co-plaintiff, is based in Boise, Ida.

The suit claimed that the RICO act applied because "the racketeering activities participated in by the defendants include: daily forgery of business records and theft of both rendering materials and animal hides, which has perpetrated, concealed and carried out by the transmission of forged, false and fraudulent documents through the

U.S. Mail; ... by transmission of false and fraudulent information over interstate telephone lines; transportation, receipt, and sale of stolen hides and rendering materials taken out of interstate commerce and shipped across state lines; ... the emulsification of water and sludge into shipments of grease through fraudulent and false pretenses; fraudulent giving low render yield test results."

Merrick explains that he did not seek publicity about the civil suit, "but the news media did not pick up on the case and little publicity was seen or heard by the public." He added there seemed to be enough confusion on the name identity of the companies involved that he should make a statement.

 Stir baking mix and milk together; it may be lumpy. Drop dumplings into boiling broth. Cover tightly; Reduce heat to a simmer and simmer

 1 egg
 1/2 tsp. vanilla
 3/4 c. shredded carrots
 1 c. whole wheat flour

 1/2 c. raisins
 Cream sugar, margarine, egg, and vanilla together until light and fluffy. Add carrots and mix well.

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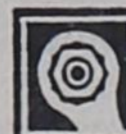
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Farwell Convalescent Center Chit Chat

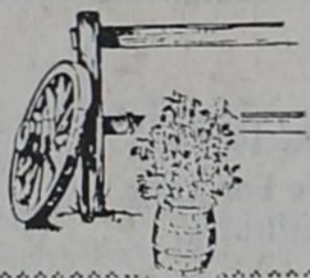

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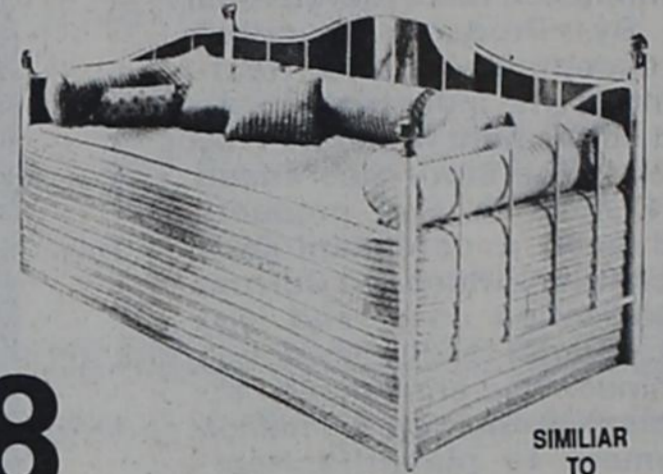

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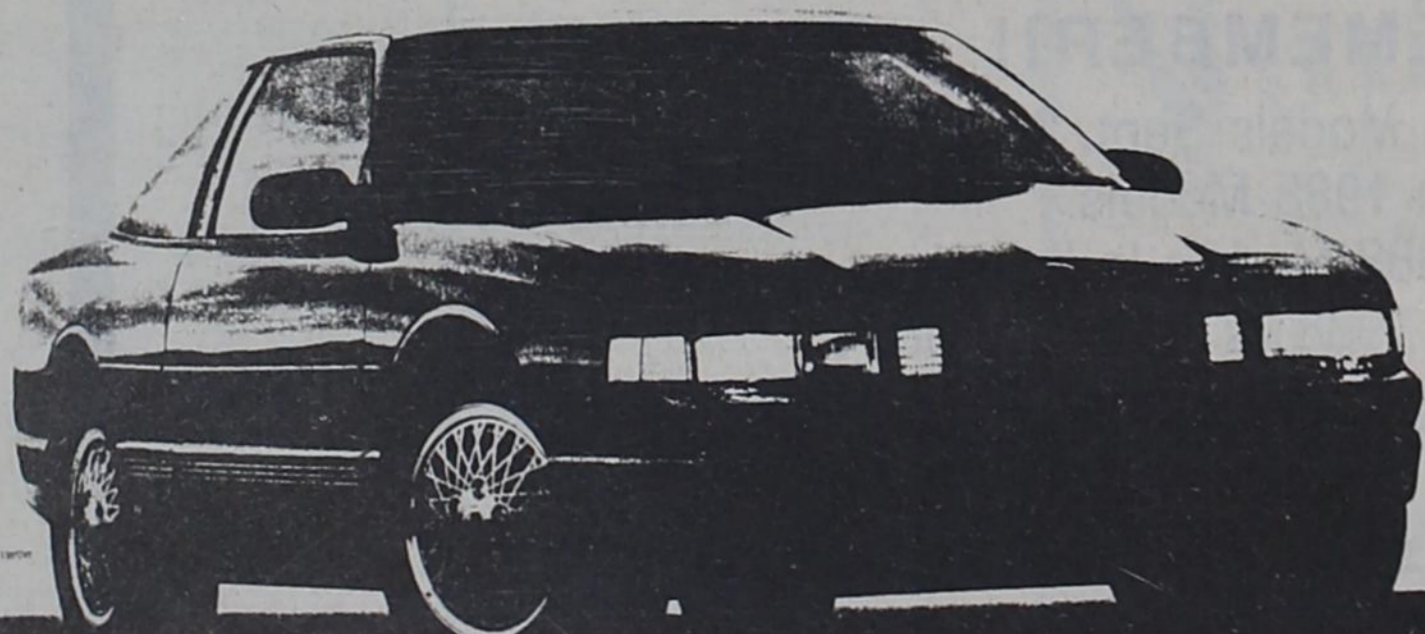

At the finals, Jenkins held sixth place in the breakaway roping and moved up to 5th in the step down roping. Jenkins won third in the average in the step down event at the finals.

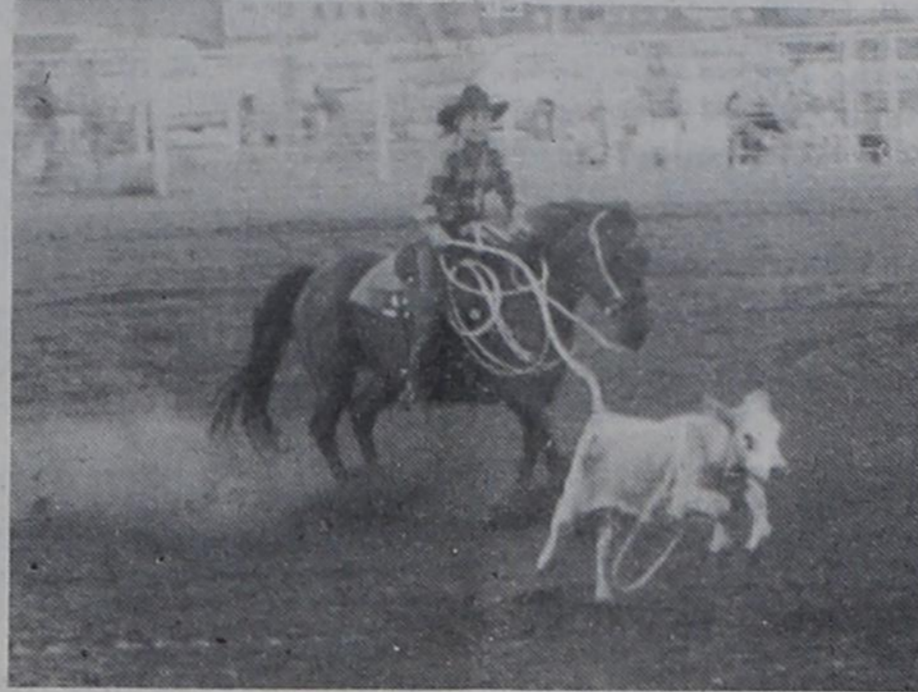

The administration will present a report on it in October, and it will be brought back up for the board's attention in

November.

- Heard a report by Supt. John Grigsby on upcoming meetings, insurance coverage. He also reported on several items that the board may wish to consider in the future including: an Industrial Technology Course, changes in the At Risk program to provide for married and pregnant students, formulation of a mission statement by the board, and upcoming legislation that would affect the school.

Valerie Cavallero served 51 times in the tourney. She had 4 kills, 6 saves, and 27 excellent passes.

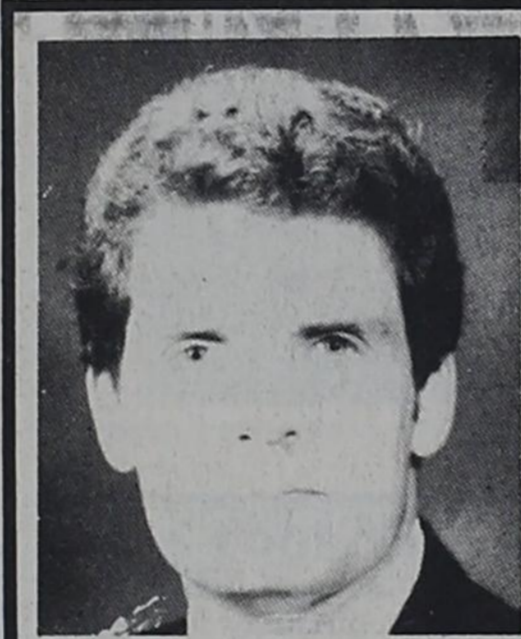

Parmer County will use rules and procedures found in the County Indigent Health Care Program Handbook published by the Texas Department of Human Services. In summary, these are the rules:

- Application forms must be completely filled out.
- Verification of income, termination of income, residence, household composition, and resources is required, if questionable.
- Following rule-approved gross income adjustments, net income cannot exceed:

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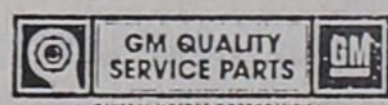

Dent introduces new tractors

Dent & Co. of Clovis and Muleshoe announces the introduction of the John Deere 4-wheel-drive 60 series tractors - "three totally new models that feature a modular design concept for more flexibility in component selection, reduced maintenance and improved reliability": the 8560 (235 hp), the 8760 (300 hp) and the 8960 (370 hp).

"We visited with John Deere owners, as well as owners of competitive tractors, and determined that the ideal design would give us the flexibility to tailor options like transmission, hitch and PTO to best meet customer requirements," said Terry Woods, Deere's project manager of 4-wheel-drive tractors. "These considerations led us to a totally new modular design concept for the 60 series 4 wheel drive tractors."

The 8560 is powered by a 466 cu. in. engine and the 8760 by a 619 cu. in. engine. Both are 6-cylinder diesels with rated speeds of 2100 rpm, using air to air after cooling and high efficiency turbochargers for greater power capability and fuel economy. A 855 cu. in. in-line 6-cylinder diesel engine, with a 1900 rpm rated speed, powers the 8960. Air to liquid aftercooling and a high efficiency turbocharger provide improved fuel economy and lugging ability.

A 24-speed PowerSync synchronized transmission is standard on all 3 models. A power shifttable hi-lo provides no-clutch shifting from 1st to 2nd, 3rd to 4th, and 5th to 6th, and reverse 1 to reverse 2. Optional transmissions include a 12-speed Syncro which provides 3 synchronized shifts in each of 4 ranges and a 12-speed full Power Shift transmission for customers requiring frequent gear changes.

Additional features include oil cooled, hydraulically-actuated brakes that never need adjustment. There's a pressure-compensated, closed-center hydraulic system, with an operating pressure of 2530 psi, providing fast hydraulic response. A full flow charge pump provides 110 percent of the main pump flow, which eliminates cavitation, especially at low engine rpm. The charge pump also provides low return pressure for single-acting cylinders. Three selective control valves are standard; a fourth control

Many new features for operator comfort, safety and convenience have been engineering into the new Sound-Gard body: a 4 post roll-over protective structure, an oversized all-glass door, a 1 piece front glass, optional radar sensor, swivel seat, new interior air quality system, new interior color scheme, optional sound system with 4 speakers, and state of the art electronics built into the new dash.

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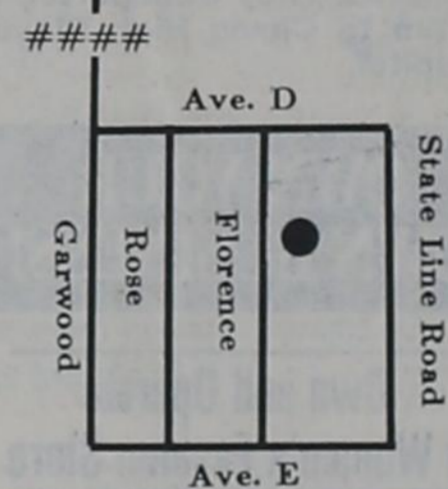
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Steers stun highly-rated New Deal

It was sweet revenge for the Farwell Steers last Friday as they defeated the New Deal Lions, 8-3, at Roberts Stadium.

Last year, the Lions had won, 40-0.

And the Steers were able to accomplish the feat against the highly-rated Lions despite the loss of Jeff Actkinson, starting middle linebacker and fullback. Actkinson was sidelined after spraining a knee during the Springlake-Earth game two weeks ago.

The victory brought the Steer's record to 2-0.

Farwell kicked off and the first three Lion plays were runs up the middle, perhaps trying to take advantage of Jeff Actkinson's unavailability. But the Lions were unable to gain a first down.

They punted and Farwell

got the ball on its 34. Clint Kelley had a 13-yard sprint but the Lions intercepted at their 45. Then the two teams exchanged punts with Farwell getting the best of it with a 46 yard effort by punter Monty Delgado.

During the Lions' offensive series, Chuck Hammit threw the quarterback for a loss, and New Deal punted to the Farwell 37. Both teams were unable to move the ball, and strong tackles were made by Hammit and Dustin Hardage.

The second quarter began with a Farwell score when New Deal tried to punt. The snap went over the punter's head and he fell on the ball in the end zone as he was tackled by Hammit. Farwell was up, 2-0, on the safety.

New Deal punted but Farwell fumbled on the 50. The Lions then got their 1st first

down but lost a fumble. Farwell again got out of trouble on a 42-yard punt by Delgado. New Deal punted but Farwell lost a fumble on its own 15. Darren Haseloff and Greg Actkinson broke up passes and the Lions had to settle for a 22-yard field goal, taking a 3-2 lead.

A halfback pass from Delgado to Shawn Stewart clicked for 15 yards but Farwell had to punt again. Stewart intercepted a pass and returned it 20 yards, but it was nullified due to a penalty.

The Lions drove to the Steer 1-yard line with 2 minutes left in the half. But a fumble was recovered by Greg Actkinson and Hammit. Farwell was running the clock out when center David Price dislocated a knee.

Stewart opened the second half for Farwell with a

20-yard sprint. Then they had to punt. Stewart intercepted at the Steer 40 and returned it 18 yards. But Farwell was stopped at the New Deal 23 on 4th down. Both teams were unable to move the ball effectively as Greg Bearss had an interception for Farwell.

With just under 7 minutes left in the game, Greg Actkinson intercepted on the Farwell 10 when the Lions had a 4th down and 4 play. The Steers then put on a 90-yard drive, using runs by Kelley, Michael Arce and Stewart.

With 2:10, Kelley swept around right end for a 20-yard TD. The PAT run failed, but Farwell was up 8-3.

The Steers had 186 yards total on offense. They had 13 first downs, and their 6 punts averaged 36 yards each. They had 6 penalties for 55 yards. New Deal had 113 yards

total on offense. They had 5 first downs. They averaged 42 yards each on their 6 punts. Their 7 penalties cost them 65 yards.

Shawn Stewart had 11 carries for 44 yards.

Clint Kelley had 12 carries for 61 yards and 1 TD.

Monty Delgado had 11 carries for 64 yards.

Darren Haseloff made a 2 point safety.

"Our leading tacklers were responsible for 5 or 6 tackles behind the line of scrimmage," said coach Rex Cumpston.

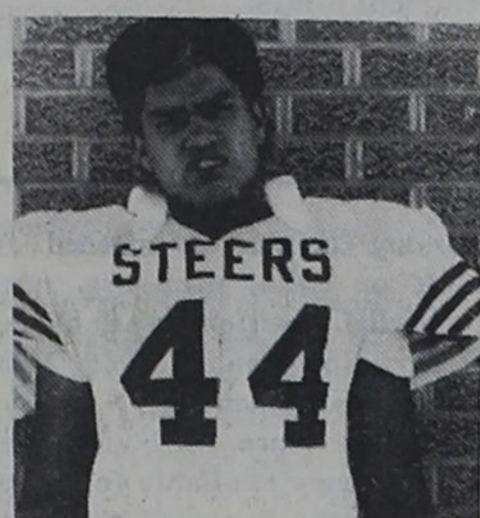

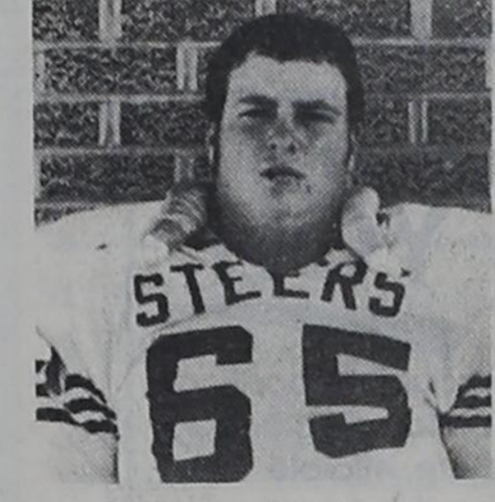

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PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

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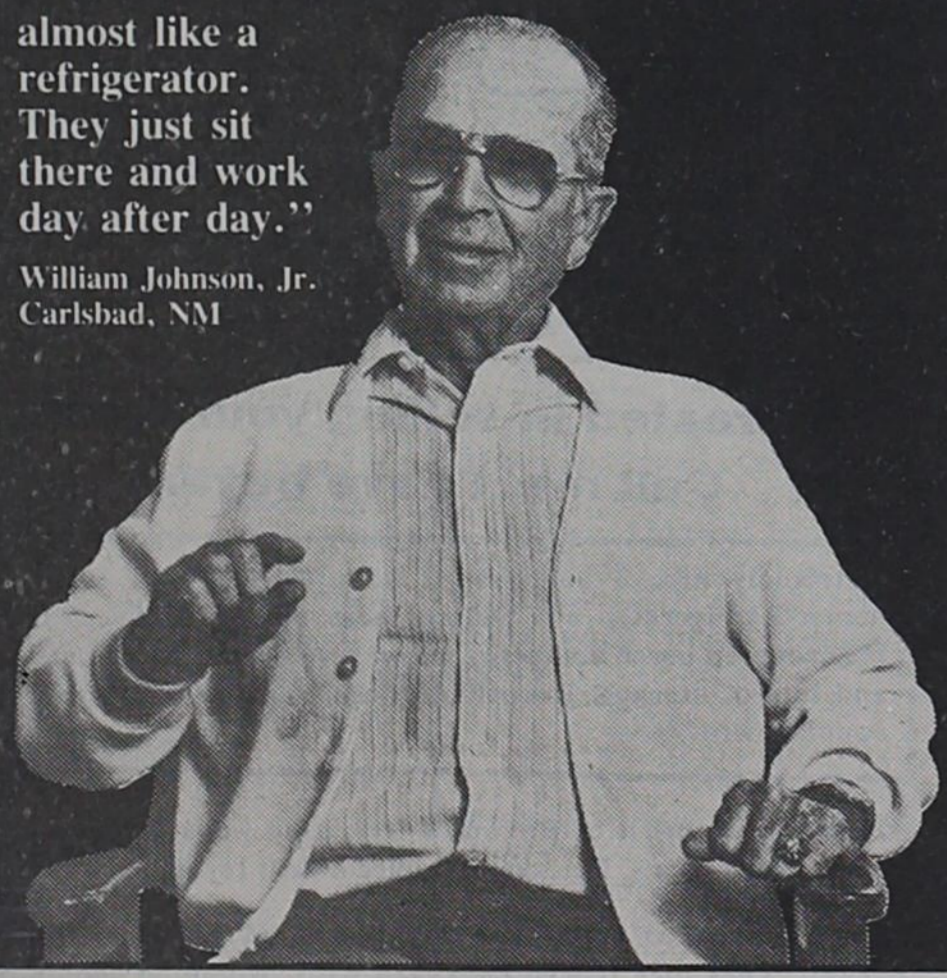

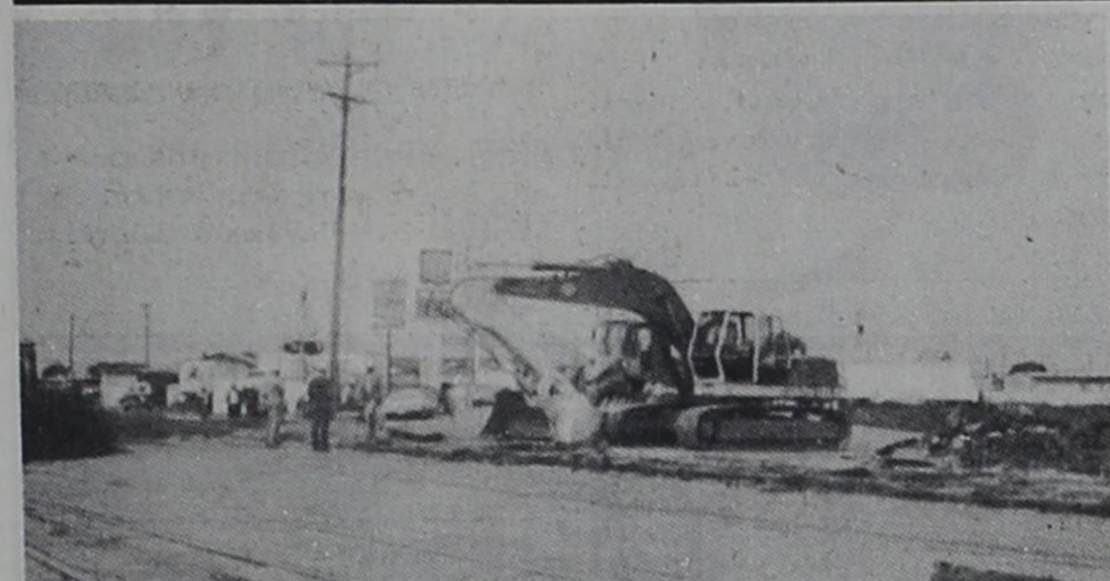

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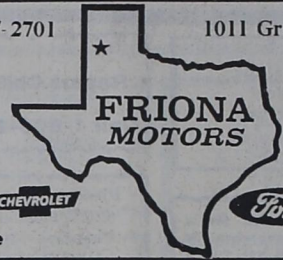
