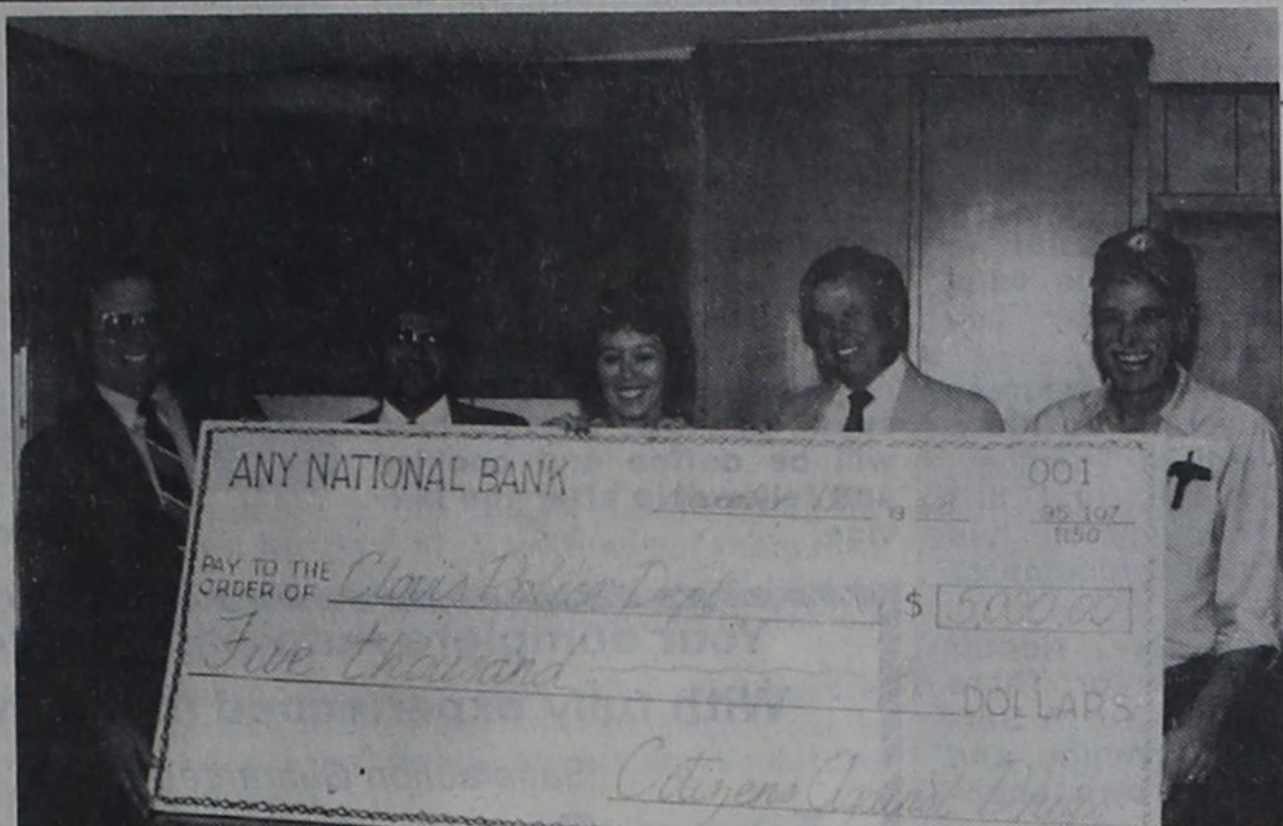

- Approved a permit to allow a fence at the former ASCS building on Ninth Street. A day care center is planned there.

At the previous meeting, the council had denied approval because it thought the fence wasn't conforming with the zoning ordinance. Monday, the council learned that the fence was in conformance.

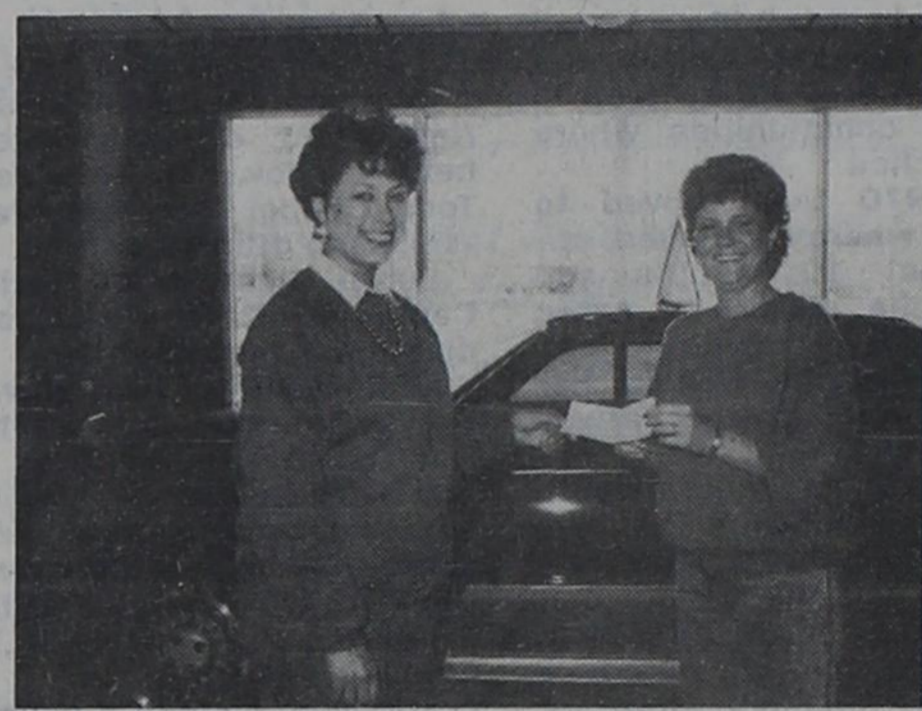

## Lazbuddie dump ground to be closed

The Lazbuddie Dump Ground likely will be closed in early December, Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts reports.

The judge, county commissioner, county attorney Charles Aycock and representatives from the Texas Attorney General's office and Texas Health Department met in Lubbock Nov. 3 to discuss the dump.

Roberts said the county has until Dec. 3 to send a letter of intent to close the dump to the state agencies with an official closing date shortly thereafter.

The state officials had informed Parmer County that a lawsuit had been prepared to force the county to close the dump. It won't be filed if the county closes the dump voluntarily.

If the suit is filed and the state wins, the county could be forced to pay more than \$36 million to the state, with continuing daily fines of \$25,000.

Roberts said the county will try to enforce illegal dumping along the roadways after the dump is closed.

He said area residents (the dump is at the corner of the county) can bring their

garbage to various city landfills and unload the trash for a small fee.

Another idea might be for the county to place a large trash container in the area and pick it up on a regular basis.

No decisions have been made, Porter emphasized.

At Monday's meeting, the county commissioners:

- Approved the election returns.

- Agreed to seek bids for a pickup truck for Pct. 2 (the legal advertisement will be in next week's Tribune).

- Heard county entomologist Mike Blanton report on the threatening Russian Aphid situation. The commissioners passed a resolution urging the state to appropriate more funds to research how to fight the aphids.

- Agreed to try to open a railroad crossing to Highway 60 just west of Caprock Industries. Some folks had asked the commissioners to do this. Approval is needed from the Santa Fe Railroad and State Highway Department. The county will pay for the lights and barricades, if they are required.

pick up seats in the House and Senate. But I felt the country was betrayed as a whole.

What happened here, in my opinion, is that Tip put politics ahead of the good of the country. Too often, it seemed, he was unwilling to compromise and put together bi-partisan programs with the GOP, as had been done in the days of Rayborn and LBJ.

As for other aspects of the election, I had predicted the day before that Bush would win by 7 percentage points and carry 45 states. I was close on the percentage (he won by 8), but way off on the state totals (he won 40).

Speaking of predictions, I was wondering if it was too late to change my guess that the Washington Redskins would repeat as Super Bowl champs.

I don't know what it is, but it's becoming harder and harder for a Super Bowl champ to have a good follow-up year.

Now it's time to pick the NBA winner. I'm going to go with last year's pick, the Detroit Pistons.

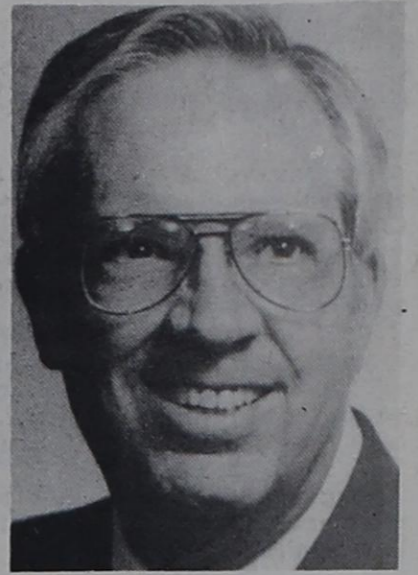
The board also approved the 1987-88 annual performance report.

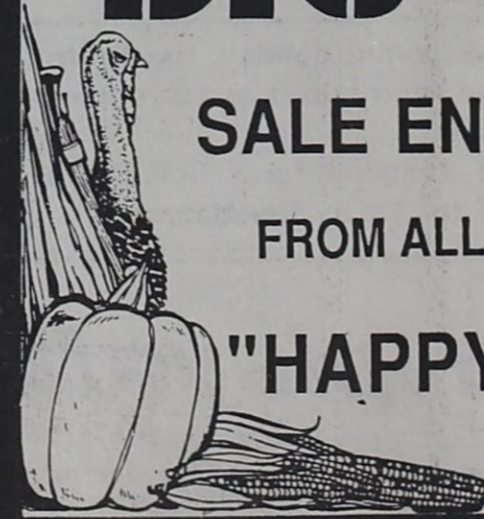

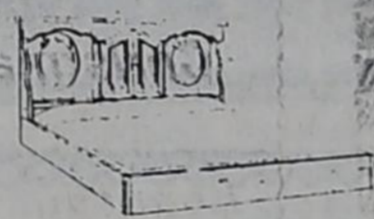

The Farwell ladies gave the Muleshoe a fight the first half which ended with the score 36-19.

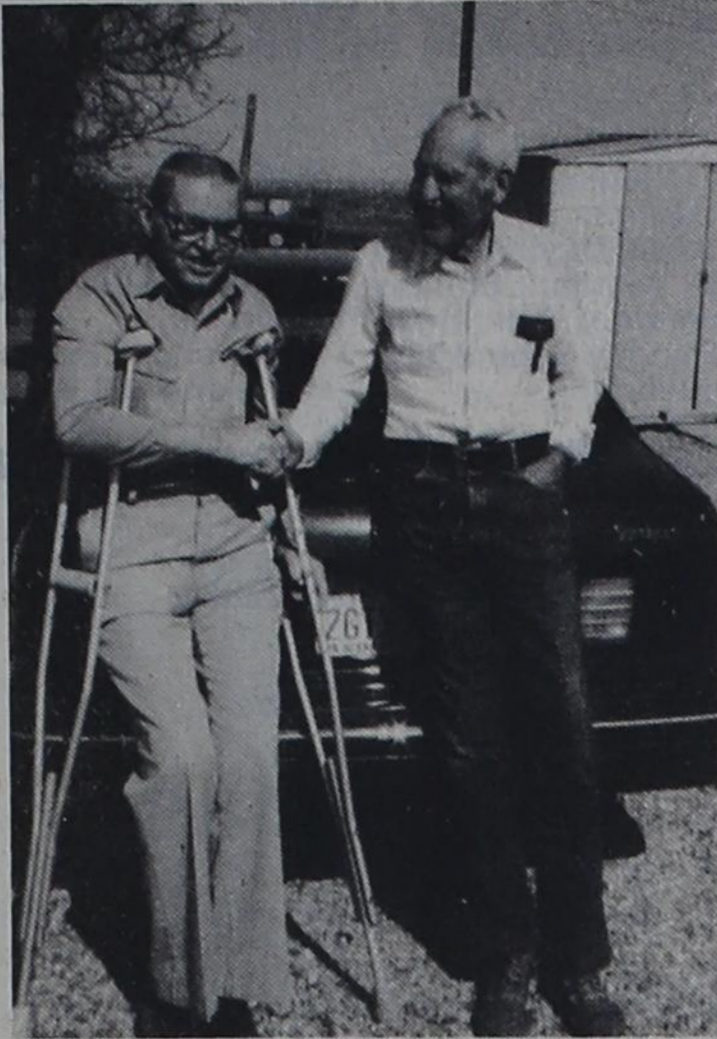
"We just couldn't break their press," said coach Fred Libby.

## Recipe of Week

### Here are some ideas on cooking the turkey

Improper thawing of a turkey, and mishandling of leftovers, are the two most common mistakes holiday cooks make during Thanksgiving and Christmas. That is the opinion of Lenwood Scholtz, Assistant Director of the Texas Department of Health's Food and Drug Division.

"A turkey should be thawed in the refrigerator, or under cold, running water (at 70 degrees or below)," said Scholtz. "Many people make the mistake of thawing the turkey at room temperature, allowing the surface to stay warm before the rest of the turkey can thaw. That creates conditions where bacteria can reproduce and cause food poisoning."

Scholtz said thawing in a microwave oven is only safe when the food will be immediately cooked. When thawed, the turkey should be thoroughly rinsed and dried, inside and out. If you plan to keep the leftovers, cut the meat off the bone and refrigerate it. A safe rule of thumb is to freeze any portions you want to keep beyond two days of refrigeration, Scholtz advised.

The following suggestions in preparing and serving holiday turkey can help ensure against salmonella poisoning, perhaps the most common form of food poisoning in the home.

\* Prepare the stuffing immediately before cooking. You may wish to mix the dry ingredients in advance, but eggs, oysters, butter, or other moist ingredients should be added at cooking time.

\* Cook the stuffing separately so that it is thoroughly cooked in the center.

\* When fully cooked, the dense portions of the meat, such as the thighs, should have reached at least 180 degrees Fahrenheit on a meat thermometer.

\* Never leave the turkey, stuffing, or gravy unrefrigerated for more than two hours.

\* If you are using a microwave oven, rotate the turkey to ensure uniform cooking.

\* Be certain to wash your hands, cooking surfaces, utensils, and all foods thoroughly.

## Price down

The Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. reports that U.S. cotton growers were paid an average of 51.8 cents per pound in September, down from the 52.6 cent average for August.

The mid-month price reported for October dropped even more sharply, to an even 50 cents. But, NASS points out that mid-month figures are highly subject to change when data for the full month become available.

September sales volume came to 825,000 bales, up from the 473,000 bales in August. The price and marketing figures through September now show nine-month total sales of 4,757,000 bales at a weighted average price of 57.28 cents. Average price calculations are important to producers, whatever the price received for their individual crops, because in January they will be eligible for price deficiency payments equal to the difference between the weighted average price and this year's 75.9-cent target price.

Almost all the estimated

2.8 million bale High Plains crop appears to be destined for the government loan at an average price not likely to top 48 cents per pound, seven or eight cents below the market value of cotton from the 1987 High Plains crop.

PCG's projections assume (1) there will be no big net changes in figures currently available, (2) that volume and sales for the remainder of the year will conform to the historical norm and (3) that the average price for the last three months will be at or below the 51.8 cents recorded in September.

**Rate decrease sought**

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) has filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) to implement a previously announced 4.3% electric-rate decrease for SPS customers outside city limits, said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research.

This step is part of a process that ultimately will result in all of SPS's residential, commercial, industrial and other retail customers in Texas receiving a decrease of 4.3%, or \$20.6 million, compared with rates in effect at the first of the year, Hunter said.

Getting the decrease approved and implemented is occurring in stages, he noted, because of the regulatory process in Texas. Cities have original jurisdiction over base rates within city limits. The PUCT regulates rates for customers outside city limits.

The electric-rate decrease primarily reflects the lower federal income tax rate for corporations, Hunter said.

"If you will recall, in March 1988 SPS implemented a 3.1% decrease for customers within city limits, following approval of the 74 Texas cities it serves," Hunter said. "On July 8, SPS, the PUCT staff, a representative of the cities' steering committee and others worked out an agreement for a 4.3% decrease for customers outside city limits. SPS announced at that time it would ask cities to approve an additional 1.2% decrease, thus making rates the same for customers inside and outside city limits."

Before these rates for customers outside city limits can be implemented, a PUCT hearing examiner must approve them, and finally the PUCT itself must rule on the agreement, Hunter said.

"That is the stage we are at now," he said. "The hearing examiner is expected to rule in about two weeks. If approved, the interim rates for customers outside city limits would be implemented a few days later."

"It is expected the PUCT will rule on this agreement and finalize rates about four weeks after the hearing examiner rules. At that time, customers outside city limits will receive a credit on their bills reflecting savings accrued since July 8 when the agreement for lower rates was reached," Hunter said.

"If the cities approve, it will be about 35 days after we file with the cities when the additional rate reduction takes effect within city limits. Then SPS's customers within city limits also will receive a credit on their bills reflecting savings accrued since July 8," he said.

"The process can be hard to follow at times," Hunter said. "But when it's all said and done, all of our retail customers will have the benefits of lower electric rates. Rates within city limits and outside city limits will be identical."

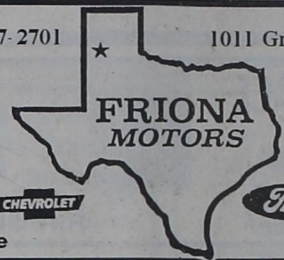

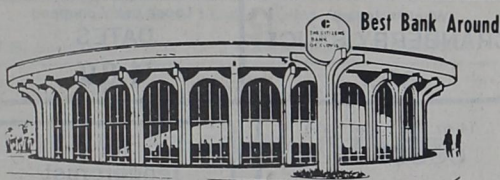
