## It takes the No. 1-ranked team to stop Lazbuddie

It was a darned good year for the Lazbuddie Longhorns football team: it took the No. 1 ranked team in the state of Texas to knock them out of the state playoffs.

The Longhorns played an excellent game but fell to mighty Christoval last Friday at Lamesa, 42-26. Lazbuddie ended its year with a 11-2 mark.

Just as in its previous playoff game, the Longhorns started off slowly. This time they were unable to overcome the deficit.

In the first period, Scott Miller recovered a fumble in the end zone for the first Lazbuddie score. The kick failed and the quarter ended 6-6.

The Longhorns couldn't score in the second quarter and Christoval went into the half ahead 20-6.

The third quarter was like the first, with both teams scoring a solo TD. Michael Williams threw a 6-yard TD pass to Wes Jarman for the Lazbuddie score.

The final two Lazbuddie scores in the last period were on a 1-yard run by Eddie Zamora and an 8-yard run by Williams. Brian Glover kicked the PAT.

Overall, the Longhorns outgained Christoval 342 to 338 but had 3 drives die within the 10 yard line.

Williams hit 20 of 34 passes for 191 yards. Scott Miller caught 5 for 58 yards; Glover 4 for 32; Jarman 3 for 59; Zamora 4 for 14; Kevin McGehee 3 for 10, and Williams, 2 for 8.

On the ground, Williams ran 14 times for 105 yards; Miller 1 for 34; Zamora 7 for 11.

Christoval stayed mostly on the ground, rushing 47 times for 330 yards and completing only 1 of 4 passes.

## Kittrell wins for 3rd time

It was a clean sweep for T.J. Kittrell of Farwell: not only did he tie for first in the weekly contest, but won enough games to win the overall contest to boot.

This means that Kittrell is the first three-time winner in the history of the 30-year Area Merchants Football Contest. The last time he won it all was in 1982.

First, let's discuss the 12th weekly contest:

Only two entrants had 11 right: Kittrell and Liz Phillips. They were both off the same amount from the tie breaker so each received \$10.

Highland, Cleburn over Hereford, Southern Cal over Notre Dame, Tennessee over Vanderbilt, Miami (Fla.) over Arkansas, Georgia over Georgia Tech, Pittsburgh over Kansas City, Cincinnati over Buffalo, Cleveland over Washington, Philadelphia over Phoenix, and N.Y. Jets over Miami.

The tie breaker was: Arlington Lamar 41, Palo Duro 0.

And now a look at the overall race, with the Dallas trip as the prize:

This year's contest saw 692 participants, virtually even with last year's 691.

A big difference this was that more entrants participated each week, partially due to the fact that a \$25 bonus prize was added. A drawing was held for the \$25 among just the entrants who cast ballots all 12 weeks.

The winner was Peggy Goettsch of Farwell.

Cheryl Scott, who attends ENMU in Portales, was first going into the final week but only netted 8 right on her last ballot to fall out of first.

That left the door open for Kittrell and Jenoyce Ford, who were tied for second and one point behind.

Interestingly, Kittrell and Ford picked the exact same teams on the final ballot with one exception - Kittrell favored Philadelphia while Ford picked Phoenix. That game made the difference in the victor.

Kittrell's 104 total is the highest the contest has seen in quite some years. Last year, Linda Gerles' 97 points won it all (Kittrell had 88 points in 1987).

The grand prize of the 12-week contest will be two



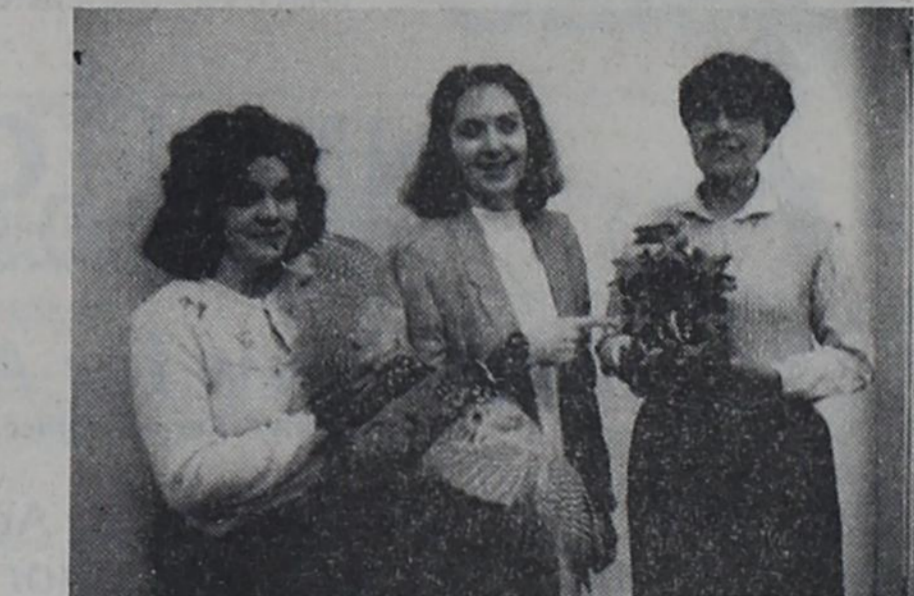

## Farwell JH recognized

The State Board of Education has recognized 629 Texas schools whose students made exceptional scores or high gains on the TEAMS tests.

Farwell Junior High received a High Score Winner recognition from the State Board of Education.

Nearly twice as many campuses are receiving awards from the State Board for 1987-1988 TEAMS performance than received awards for 1986-87 results.

The increase in the number of schools recognized is attributed to more campuses working harder on preparing their students to take the TEAMS tests, Texas Education Agency officials said.

The board recognized those schools where 90 percent or more of students mastered all sections of the TEAMS tests taken during the 1987-88 school year and those which recorded gains of 30 percent or more from 1986-87 to 1987-88.

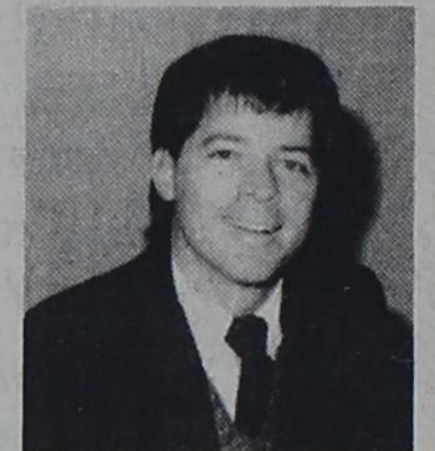

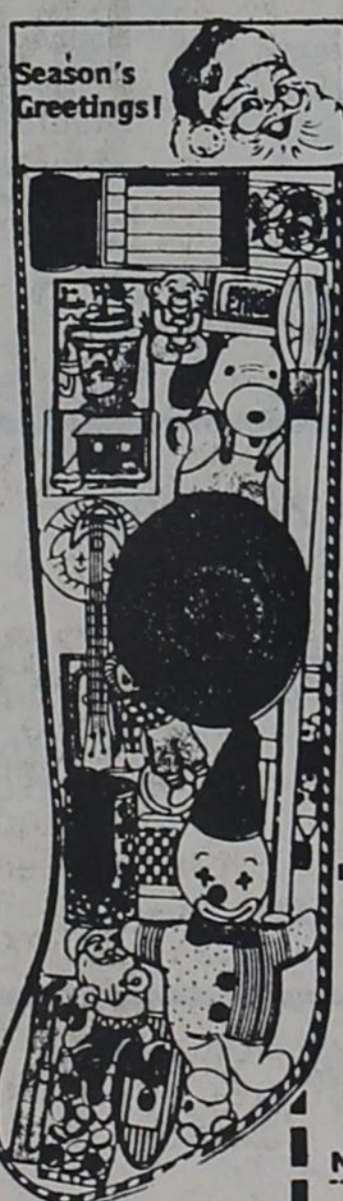

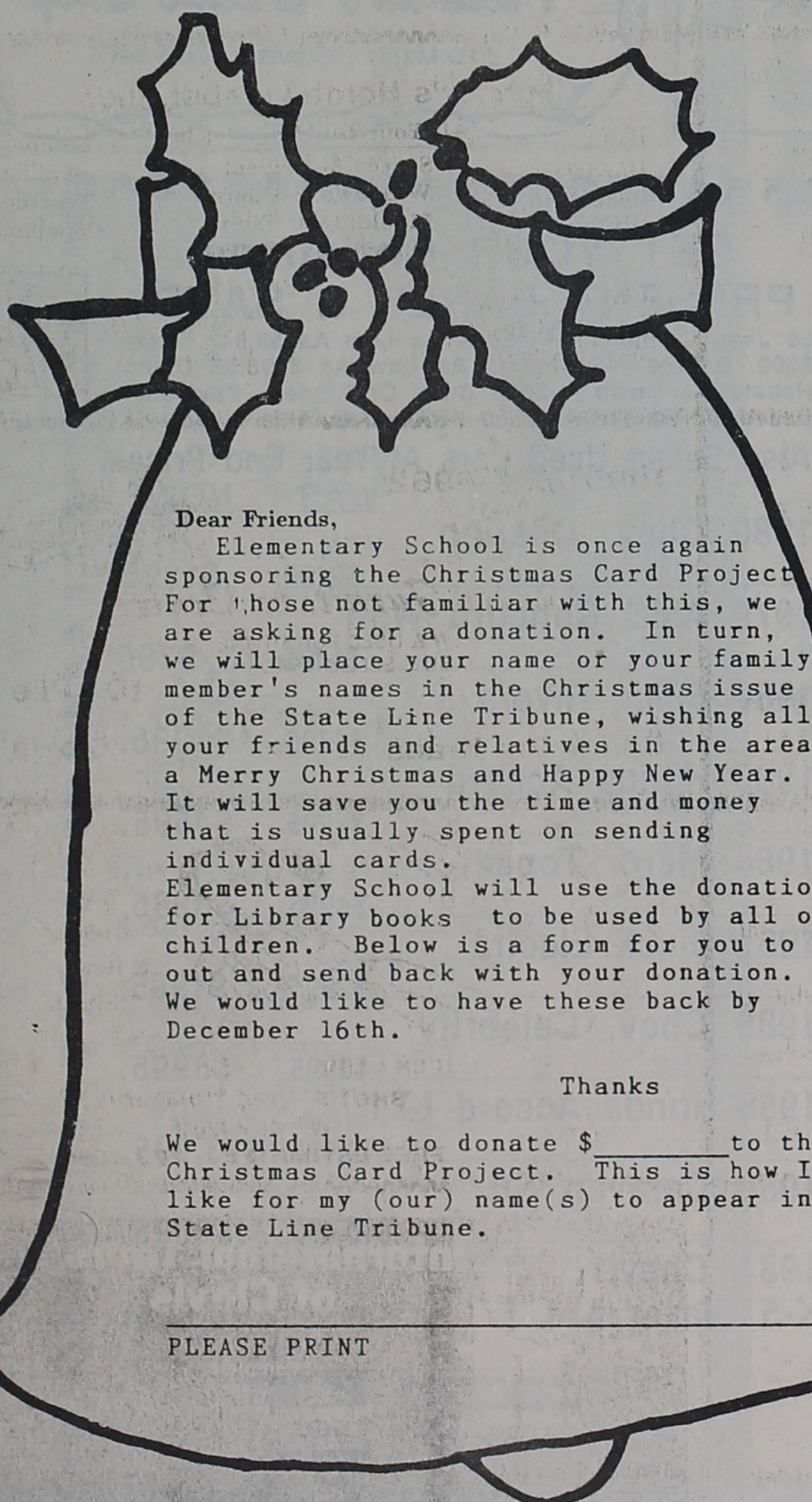

## Annexation voted down

At a special Nov. 17 meeting, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 Board of Directors decided against the annexation of Swisher County, Terry County, Yoakum County, the portion of Briscoe County above the escarpment, and the portion of Hale County not already a part of the Water District.

The board received petitions from each of these areas requesting annexation into the District earlier in the year. Hearings were then held in each county. Testimony from these hearings was considered in the deliberations to determine if the annexation would be of benefit to both the territory requesting annexation and to the existing Water District.

The board also considered whether the existing Water District facilities could support the proposed territorial

additions without jeopardizing the quality of service being provided to landowners currently within the District.

Board members cited low attendance and lack of strong support at four of the five public hearings in their decision not to continue with the annexation process.

They noted that the areas seeking annexation would require considerable expense to start Water District programs and bring them to the operating level of the existing Water District. Cost projections indicate that a 25 to 40

percent increase in the Water District's operating budget would be needed to offer full service to the annexed territories without a lessening in the quality of service in the District as a whole. Under the tax code, no tax revenue could be received from the annexed territories until October, 1990, which would have put the Water District into a debt position.

"We appreciate the support given us by the residents of the Water District during the

past 35 years," said board president James P. Mitchell of Wolfforth. "We did not feel that increasing their Water District taxes in order to take on an additional 2.5 million acres in territory would be fair to them."
