Norma Sanders to be inducted into Cowgirl 'Hall'

"I don't mind hanging my hat next to some of them," said Texico's Norma Sanders of the company she will be keeping in the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center.

Her playful smile betrays the joy she feels because of the honor of being recognized along with such famous Western heroines as Annie Oakley, Patsy Montana, Laura Ingalls Wilder and Henrietta Chamberlain King.

Miss Sanders will be one of this year's inductees in the Hall of Fame on June 17 in Hereford. The induction follows two years of study and consideration by the nominating committee.

She will be a Western Heritage nominee for her contribution as the first cowgirl auctioneer in the 1950's. It was a profession that she was born to follow.

Col. John Sanders, Norma's father, was the first resident auctioneer in the Oklahoma Panhandle. He came west at the turn of the century, and by 1923 he had his own public livestock auction. He and his wife, Grace, who still lives in Texico, operated the auction and a number of farms and ranches in Oklahoma. In 1923, he received a certificate from the Reppert School of Auctioneering at Decatur, Ind.

Norma was born on June 14, 1932 at a time when Oklahoma was racked by the great Dustbowl and depression. Col. and Mrs. Sanders pulled up stakes and moved first to Phoenix, Ariz., where Sanders was a deputy sheriff, then to Texas, and then eventually to Texico.

Norma attended Texico High School where she excelled in music. From there she went to Eastern New Mexico University where she majored in applied music. Her life goal at the time was to become a concert violinist.

While in high school, Norma occasionally helped local auctioneer, Harvey "Red" Foster, write sales tickets. It was he who later suggested that she become an auctioneer. Some of the top auctioneering schools in the country turned her down before she was accepted at the Missouri Auction School in Kansas City.

Her musical ability helped her to develop a unique auctioneering style which was catchy but not too musical.

"If you get too sing-song, you put the crowd right to sleep," she says. Sleeping was the last thing she wanted the crowd to do. "You've got to keep them on their toes," she said.

She explained that an auctioneer has to know the value of an object, and how badly the owner needs to sell it. The auctioneer must know how to coax or tease the crowd into bidding higher, and when to refuse a bid that is too low. She knew how to put on a successful show.

"The auctioneer makes all the difference in the world," Norma explained. A good auctioneer does his homework; he starts by looking at the items for sale and listening to the owner about their value. The auctioneer needs to know which items are valuable to collectors, and then the auctioneer must let the right collectors know that the items are on the market.

"You have to hang on to get the last crying nicker out of everybody," she said. "I never could eat before a sale, so more than once I had dinner at 6 a.m." If the bidders kept bidding, she kept up her antics to coax the bidding along.

Norma specialized in livestock sales rather than antiques or collectibles. She criss-crossed the nation from New Mexico to the Pacific Northwest to Florida conducting sales during the 1950's.

Her sales always drew big crowds - partly because of the novelty of a cowgirl auctioneer, and partly because she knew

Parade participants, Chris Roach; arts and crafts fair, Lynne Mahaney; merchants' giveaway, Debra Looper; concessions at the park, Cynthia Thigpen.

Also, Fred Chandler has agreed to again serve as master of ceremonies, and the Hardages will entertain with music as usual. The Texico - Farwell Senior Citizens will staff the registration table.

There's a possibility that Friona Motors will sponsor a golf tourney in Farwell in conjunction with BTD, perhaps on Sunday, July 30. BTD committee member Jack Allen Kirkland will check into this.

Pomper said the entertainment schedule for BTD is shaping up well. In addition to the Hardages' fine music, a bluegrass band featuring Joe Hughes will perform. Also, Rev. Rick Sullivan of the First Baptist Church of Farwell said they are considering having a gospel sing, and the committee supported this idea.

Peggy Haseloff, who has had Past Fashion Shows the past two years at night, will have her show during BTD's Saturday afternoon activities this year.

Also present at the meeting was Roy Norman of KCLV-FM Radio, a country music station. Pomper asked if they could do a live broadcast from the park or, perhaps, set up a stand with radio equipment, which is always a favorite with youths. Another possibility is for the station to enter a float in the parade. Norman will check into the ideas.

The main discussion at the meeting involved raising funds to offset the usual expenses, and also to cut down on expenses:

- Instead of selling shave permits this year, the committee is considering having buttons made with "1989 Border Town Days" on them and selling them to everyone. The button idea was broached by Rev. Sullivan. Mrs. Roach and Mrs. Cooper will check into details and report back.

- Pomper reported that

- The number of barbecue tickets given out will be

watched more carefully. - The committee will attempt to get a group to pay for the portable toilets, which cost \$148 last year.

Part of Lazbuddie may vote on hospital district

Lazbuddie voters will have the opportunity to vote on a proposed new hospital district which would encompass parts of Bailey County and Parmer Counties.

The Texas State Legislature passed the proposal in the House of Representatives last week, and it is due for consideration in the Senate this week.

Senator Teel Bivins' office reports that the bill is on the local and uncontested bill calendar, and it will probably be voted upon on April 6. The bill in the Senate has been amended so that Lazbuddie voters would have a separate election from Bailey County residents to decide whether they want to be in the hospital district.

"County Commissioner Raymond McGeehee and Judge Porter Roberts wanted to have the Lazbuddie people vote separate from the Bailey County people," said Darrell Jennings of Lazbuddie.

The proposed hospital district would encompass an area from the county line on the east side of Parmer County one mile north of FM145 straight across to the Farwell Hospital District on the west, and into Bailey County on the south, according to Jennings, who represents Lazbuddie on the West Plains Hospital Board.

Jennings noted that most of the people he has spoken to in the affected area use the West Plains Hospital in Muleshoe more frequently than any other hospital. Lazbuddie residents a few miles north of FM145 usually find it more convenient to use the Parmer County Hospital in Friona, he said.

Jennings explained that rural hospitals like the West Plains Hospital are facing a crisis these days. "Everybody should know that if rural hospitals do not have a hospital district for a tax base, they will cease to exist."

The current Medicare payback schedule favors urban hospitals. In rural hospitals, where a large percentage of the patients are Medicare patients, the lower Medicare paybacks cause critical problems. The rural hospitals need the stability of funding from taxes.

"Eventually everyone will be in a hospital district; it is all just a matter of time," said Jennings.

Roberts pointed out a different side of this situation. He said that currently counties are liable for up to 10% of the county's budget for the care of indigent patients. After that, hospitals must try to get back the cost of indigent care from the state of Texas. There is currently no cap on the amount of liability a hospital district might bear for indigent care. Roberts noted that those with a large tax base might think twice about joining a hospital district.

Nobody argues the need for hospitals in rural areas. Jennings noted that "Rural hospitals are real good for emergencies. If we hadn't had a hospital, I don't know what we would have done in some situations in this community. It might have been tragic."

Jennings said most small rural hospital provide important emergency room facilities to stabilize patients who are severely injured. "If you get something major, they refer you to a bigger hospital," he added.

Drunk driving victims to be remembered

Mothers Against Drunk Driving will plant a spruce tree at the Curry County Courthouse at 10 a.m. MDT on April 15 in memory of the victims of drunk drivers.

"We want to encourage people to attend this ceremony, and to join MADD," said Bobbie Pierson of Farwell. "It's a really good organization that is doing some important work."

Mrs. Pierson became actively involved in MADD for two very personal reasons. "First of all, I have a 17 year old who will be out there on the road, and I worry about him and his friends. I don't want our teens to say 'nobody told me the dangers of drinking and driving.'"

Mrs. Pierson's second reason for joining MADD is a little girl named Patty Mennallee who died in a bus accident in Tennessee last May that claimed the lives of 27 young people who were riding on a church bus that was struck by a drunk driver.

Patty's parents were neighbors of the Pierson's when Mr. Mennallee was stationed at Cannon Air Force Base. "We met them about one month after our own little girl died. Patty was just about the same age our daughter would have been. She and her sister became very close to us," said Mrs. Pierson.

The accident that claimed Patty Mennallee's life was

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Test can be avoided

Farwell High School Counselor Carol Sullivan reports that starting in the fall of 1989 college bound students will have to take the Texas

Academic Skills Program Test to assess their ability to perform effectively in college-level coursework.

This year's incoming college freshmen can avoid the test by taking 3 hours of academic college coursework before the fall semester begins.

"I've been told that academic courses like English or history taken at ENMU-Clovis will be accepted in lieu of the test," said Mrs. Sullivan. She adds that it would be wise for college bound students to check with the admissions office of the college of their choice before they sign up for courses.

The TASP Test does not guarantee acceptance in any college. It is simply required of incoming college freshmen. The cost of the test will be \$24, and it will be required for all students entering degree programs of more than 9 hours at Texas colleges this fall. Students must pass this exam before they will be allowed to sign up for upper division courses.

especially tragic because the children burned to death. "They didn't die of broken bones, they burned to death because the fire spread so quickly," said Mrs. Pierson.

Patty's parents spoke to Farwell School Board members last year, and encouraged them to upgrade our school buses for the safety of our children. She noted that many school buses do not have adequate exits and the gas tanks easily rupture in accidents. The board acted upon Mrs. Mennalle's suggestions, and improved the buses.

Mrs. Pierson joined the Clovis chapter of MADD because she hopes the work it does will save lives. She has been impressed by their meetings.

"When I went to my first meeting, they asked us to look to our left and to our right. They said that one of the people sitting next to us would be a victim of a drunk driver. I was sitting next to a lady who couldn't use her vocal cords because of an accident involving a drunk driver. That made a real impression on me."

Each meeting the group plans events that will draw attention to the problem of drunk driving. In addition to the tree planting, the Clovis chapter will have a booth at the mall in Clovis one weekend.

how to put the right sellers and buyers together. The Sanders name was well established in the auctioneering field, and that also helped her to find success.

She dressed for work in tailored Western suits, fancy boots, and wide brimmed Western hats when she worked. The garb made her appear taller than her 5'6 1/2".

When she started in auctioneering, Norma worked for Harvey "Red" Foster along with other auctioneers. "Some of the men were jealous of my successes, and threatened to quit. There was no love lost among some of us," she says. Later she started putting together sales of her own.

During the mid 1950's, temperatures soared, and rain clouds failed to appear over the Southwest. When the grass turned brown, and grains withered in the field, many herds were liquidated because of the scarcity of feed.

"People were burning the stickers off cactus and feeding it to cattle in some places," she recalled. "It wasn't like today." There wasn't much irrigation in those days, and it was difficult to ship grain and feed to the livestock.

Norma used her contacts in parts of the nation where the grass was still green to bring buyers for the herds of Texas and New Mexico.

She was at the height of her career when tragedy struck. On June 14, 1957 - her 25th birthday - Norma was the victim on a near fatal traffic accident in Idaho.

Even today she is not exactly sure how the accident happened. She was found by a passing motorist about 125 ft. from the auto she was driving; it had been totally destroyed. She was first taken back to Weiser, Idaho, for stabilization, and then to a hospital in Boise for treatment. She was unconscious for 10 days, and she lost her memory for 18 days.

She was recuperating from her accident when a friend offered her an auctioneering job in California. She gave it a try, but returned to Texico in October for further recuperation. She picked up some auction sales and managed some commission sales after that, but she never returned to the frantic pace of the 1950's.

Today Norma manages rental property and cares for her mother.

grated Parmesan cheese

Goettsches open restaurant here

Carl and Jeannie Goettsch have remodeled a rental property they have owned since 1972, and turned it into the Twin City Cafe because Jeannie "likes to cook."

The business got off to a good start in spite of the fact that it was open for three weeks without a sign in front to tell people that it was a cafe.

"People here in Farwell and Texico have been really great," said Mrs. Goettsch.

The Goettsches decided to remodel the property in January, and the job turned out to be a much bigger job than they had planned. Carl and several members of his family tore out walls, sanded and refinished floors, refinished walls and ceilings, painted, and repaired the property. It took the family 2 months to get the place looking the way they wanted it to look. And, they opened before they were really finished.

"We still need to do a lot of things," said Goettsch. He mentioned that they hope to add a salad bar, and to repair the parking lot. But, they will have to take one thing at a time.

Goettsch came to Farwell in 1956 to work for Kirkland Pump. He later opened a custom combine service. He and his family cut grains for farmers who did not have combines.

Goettsch and his late wife had 4 children: Mike, Carl Dean, Colleen Stover, and Barbara Marion. When his wife died, he married Jeannie who is the mother of Cathy King, Kelli King, Jimmy King, Connie Lide, Jessie Lovvorn, and Johnny King.

Jeannie had worked as a cook and waitress in several places. She had also cooked for custom combining crews. She had always dreamed of owning her own restaurant. "I've cooked all my life, but I've never owned a restaurant before," said Mrs. Goettsch.

Carl and Jeannie's children and their spouses have

helped to get the business going. They've helped with everything from painting to washing dishes. The girls have been waitressing after school. It has been quite a family project.

"Getting started, I really didn't know how much help there would be. I think I hired and fired Carl at least three times that first day," said Mrs. Goettsch.

"Carl is really great with food, too," she added quickly. The Twin City Cafe is decorated with plants and flowers and oilcloth table coverings. "It kind of reminds me of the old time boarding houses from years ago," said Goettsch.

Eastern New Mexico Rural Telephone Cooperative held its annual meeting Saturday before a packed house at the Clovis High School lecture room.

Attendance has grown rapidly in recent years at the annual event. This year there were around 300 persons present. Needed for a quorum are 166 members.

There was no opposition to the four co-op board members seeking re-election and all four were elected by acclamation: Gilbert Gutierrez and Gilbert Ortiz, Districts 9, 10 and 11; Shafie Hindi, District 12, and Bill Freeman, Districts 6, 7 and 8.

Board President Hoyt Pattison, whose district includes Farwell and Pleasant Hill, gave the main speech.

He discussed areas in New Mexico where ENMR has expanded service where tele-

phones had not been available before; the expanding use of fiber optics and the pioneer role ENMR is playing in it; the use of phone lines to bring public TV into small schools; cellular telephone technology; ETSC services; additional warehouses at the ENMR complex; and upcoming state legislation on the emergency 911 number.

Mike Tetter, board secretary treasurer, presented the financial report. Total income for 1988 was \$15,396,052, up from \$13,828,989 in 1987.

The number of ENMR members receiving service at the end of 1988 was 9,267, up from 8,977 at the end of 1987.

ENMR has 7,286 route miles of line and cable and has .79 subscribers per route mile (up from .77 in 1987).

General Manager Robert Harris introduced top staff members and noted that ENMR has 134 employees. Harris discussed upcoming topics, such as expanding use of cellular phones, the 911 number, and financial problems connected with both.

Getting plaques were board members for years of service: Pattison, 30 years; Ortiz, 10 years; Tetter, Gutierrez and Freeman, 5 years.

City of Texico Ordinance No. 243

An ordinance pertaining to public utilities; prescribing the water rates to be charged to volunteer firemen for the city of Texico; and amending prior ordinances in conflict herewith.

Be it ordained by the governing body of the municipality of Texico, New Mexico:

Section 1: **Recitals.** It is hereby determined by the governing body of the municipality of Texico, New Mexico, that the rates presently being charged for the furnishing of water services to those principal residential homes of volunteer firemen should be amended to offer an additional compensation for those firemen.

Section 2: Volunteer Fireman

Rates Established. A volunteer fireman for the city of Texico, New Mexico, shall pay only the required charge monthly for a minimum usage for the fireman's principal residence.

Section 3: **Non-Transferrable.** This rate is not transferrable by the fireman.

Section 4: **Retired Fireman.** (a) A volunteer fireman will be deemed retired for the purposes of this ordinance if he or she qualifies as "retired" under the guidelines, rules and regulations of the Public Employees Retirement Association of the state of New Mexico as amended from time to time. (b) A retired volunteer fireman for the city of Texico is entitled for as long as he or she may live to the minimum usage rate for water services for his or her principal residence maintained in the city of Texico, New Mexico.

Section 5: **Effective Date.** This ordinance is effective five (5) days after publishing same.

Passed and adopted by the Council of the city of Texico, New Mexico, unanimously, this 28th day of March 1989.

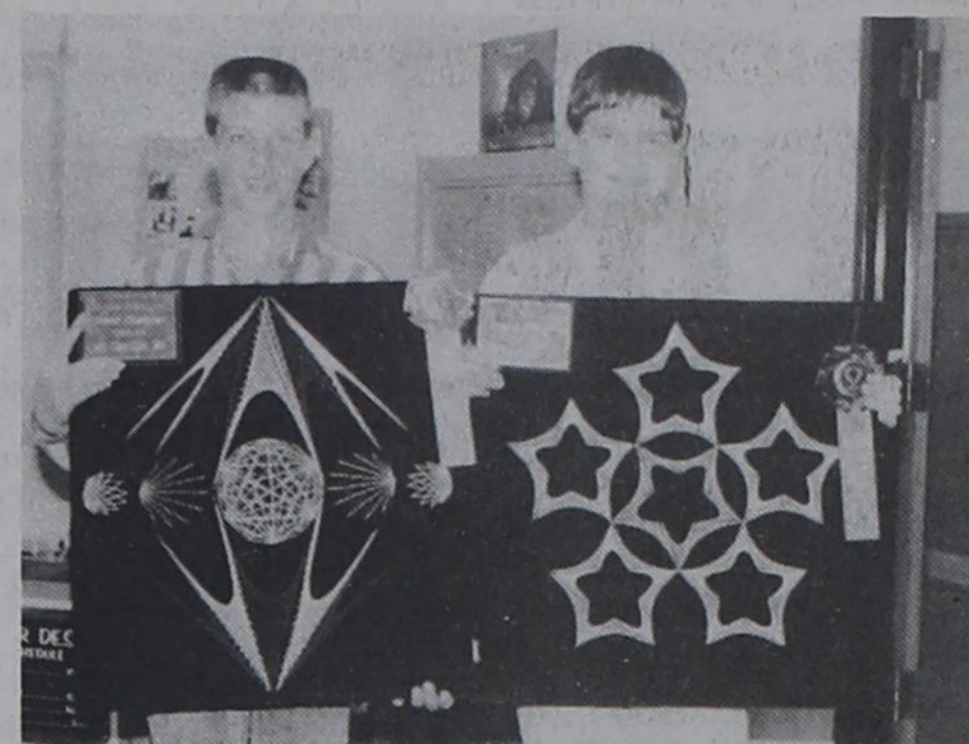
