## Burning may end

An end to burning trash and garbage for all Texas residents may be down the line.

Water Dept. Supt. Dee Hammit reported at Tuesday's Farwell City Council meeting that, unless the law is changed, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has mandated all burning to cease starting in August. However, political entities have between 12 and 18 months to obey the order.

Currently, Farwell has been exempt under a statute allowing communities under 3,000 population to burn trash.

The council took no official action on the upcoming statute since it felt there was plenty of time to act. There was a discussion of county plans and what Friona and Bovina are doing toward a landfill.

The county plans to place a large container from an Amarillo firm in the Lazbuddie area since the Lazbuddie dump site has been closed by state health authorities. And they are considering placing other containers in other county areas.

Also discussed were the benefits of Farwell operating its own landfill vs. using a countywide landfill vs. having a private contractor handle the refuse.

In other business, the council:

- Agreed to start work on an ordinance where city businesses would be charged a one-time license fee of \$5. This would help differentiate between them and the peddlers and solicitors who come into town and are charged a higher fee.
- Approved 3 variance requests: for Billy Roberts to build a garage adjacent to his home on Ave. I; for Jack Kirkland to enclose a patio on 2nd Street, and for Furrow's Lumber to build a sun room at the north end of the Farwell Convalescent Center at a cost of \$17,000.

- Put off a decision on a variance request from Ted Mesman to fence in his property on 4th Street pending more information.
- Agreed to slate a variance hearing for a mobile home parking request on 6th Street near Ave. E. A legal ad must be published first.

- Approved buying a new calculator for City Hall.
- Raised salaries for part-time employees: those earning \$3.50 an hour go to \$3.75; those earning \$4 go to \$4.25.
- Decided to seek bids on a new workshop next to the water tower for the water department.

## No one wants to run?

It looks like there will be a major turnover on the Farwell City Council at the May 6 election.

Mayor Chris Gikas announced he was not seeking re-election.

Two councilmen have their 2-year terms on the ballot, also: Curtis Smith and Yselta Kittrell. Smith said he is not running again. Mrs. Kittrell said she is considering running.

And also on the ballot will be a 1-year term to fill the unexpired term of Martin Welling. He is moving to Austin, Texas, for further education and may return here in two years.

The filing period for the Farwell election has opened. The last day to file a candidacy will be at 5 p.m. March 22.

The drawing for places on the ballot will be March 27. Absentee voting starts April 17 and ends May 2.

\*\*\*

There will be two seats on Farwell School Board on the election ballot this spring. And neither veteran incumbent is seeking re-election.

Terms are for three years. Richard Haseloff, who has served three terms on the board, said he will not be seeking re-election. "It's time for some new blood there," he said.

Steve Pierson, who has served two terms on the board, will not run either.

- Heard Gikas report about an arrangement where DeBaca County and Fort Sumner share in the cost of two police officers. Farwell would like to work out such an arrangement with Parmer County. Gikas said he would talk to sheriff Rex Williams about it.

## Port of Entry to receive facelift only

Texico Mayor Steve Chancy reports that Texico officials have been told by the state that the visitors' center has not been funded, that a new Port of Entry won't be built, and that the current Port of Entry will get a facelift.

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## 'Wheels' project coming here

Farwell is expected to find itself featured on *Good Morning, America* March 2.

Monday, Farwell High School students heard a program presented by Jeff Worthington, holder of 5 world records from the Para Olympics which were held in Seoul, Korea just after the regular Olympic games were held. Worthington took 5 medals for middle distance racing competitions.

Worthington is drumming up interest for the *Wheels Across America* program which features another wheelchair athlete, Bill Duff, who is pushing his wheel chair 50 miles per day from Los Angeles to New York City.

Duff will arrive in Farwell at about 11 a.m. on March 1. He will be met at the Sesqui-centennial painting by interested Farwell residents and a group from the television show, "Good Morning America."

Farwell will be Duff's first stop in Texas, his home state. *Good Morning America* will be doing its opening segment about Duff and his trip across the nation in a wheelchair that morning.

Duff began his cross country trip on Jan. 17 in Los Angeles. He plans to reach New York City this spring.

Duff became a paraplegic due to an auto accident in April 1982 while attending Texas Tech. After undergoing rehabilitation at the Institute of Rehabilitation and Research in Houston, Duff went on to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering from the University of Texas in 1987.

"My interest in *Wheels* is three-fold. First, it presents a great personal physical challenge - much as a mountain to a mountain climber. Second, in addition to the personal challenge that *Wheels* offer, it gives me the opportunity to become involved

with the Miami Project to Cure Paralysis, which I believe is a worth while team. Last of all, I will be able to demonstrate that although some doors may close for disabled persons, there are many doors that remain to be opened. I want people to realize that living with a disability does not limit one's ability to live life to the fullest," said Duff.

Duff will be making the cross country trip in a regular wheelchair that is not motorized. He will wheel an average of 50 miles per day. He will travel between 8-9 miles per hour. His downhill speed will reach 25 miles per hour. His customized racing wheelchair is equipped with brakes and steering to ensure maximum safety and control.

His push rims will change according to the type of terrain that he travels on - in some way that a bicycle changes gears. (Push rims are the round bars on the side of the wheels that Bill uses to do the actual pushing.)

Duff will be working to raise money for the Miami Project to Cure Paralysis is the world's largest, most comprehensive commitment to finding a cure for paralysis. The project is affiliated with the University of Miami's Jackson Memorial Medical Center.

Worthington is a quadraplegic who competes in

wheelchair athletic events. He has been paralyzed from the waist down, and he has had weakness in his arms due to a traffic accident. He was injured when the car he was a passenger in struck a utility pole. He was not wearing

a seat belt at the time. He delivered the dual message: "always wear a seat belt," and "never get in a car with any person who has been drinking" while he told about the *Wheels* program.

Students at Farwell were interested in Worthington's descriptions of wheelchair athletic competitions. Wheelchair athletes can do some events better than regular athletes. Wheelchair athletes can complete a 26 mile marathon course that takes world class athletes 2 hours and 10 minutes to complete in 1 hour 47 minutes.

Worthington told the assembly that: "About a half million Americans are paralyzed. Each year 15,000 more are paralyzed; and 80% of them are young males." He told the youths that traffic accidents account for most of the cases of paralysis; motorcycles and three wheelers are the cause of several others. Most of the rest of the cases come from athletic accidents- diving, football, and wrestling injuries were among the more frequent causes.

### Postal service issues warning

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service has warned the public about the increasing number of "boiler room" scams that use the telephone to pitch a variety of products, usually attached to a "free gift" gimmick.

Chief Inspector Charles Clauson said bogus companies flood post offices with computerized mailings notifying people "they've won a prize," usually after offering for sale everything from vitamins to office supplies.

"The operators then follow up with high pressure telemarketing," Clauson said. "They usually ask for money or a credit card number to cover shipping charges."

He says the best way to defend against the scams is to check out the company and call them back, without giving out your credit card number or any money.

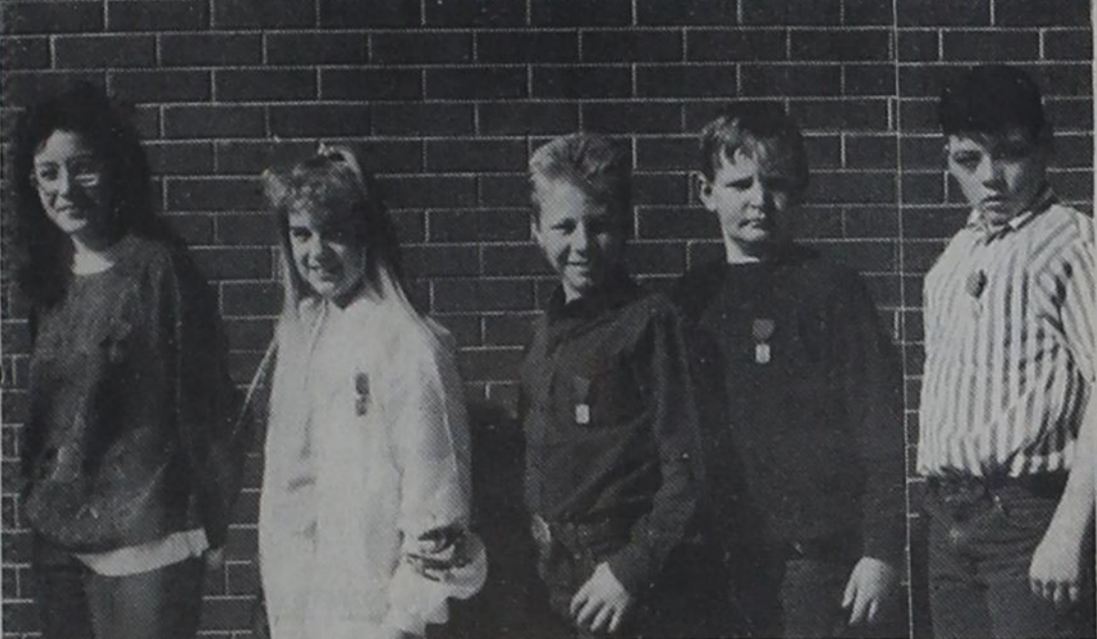

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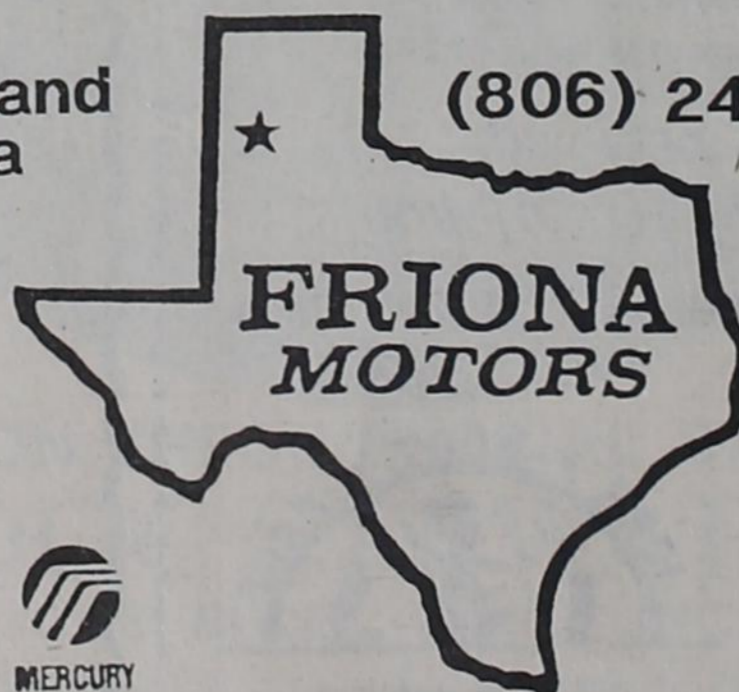

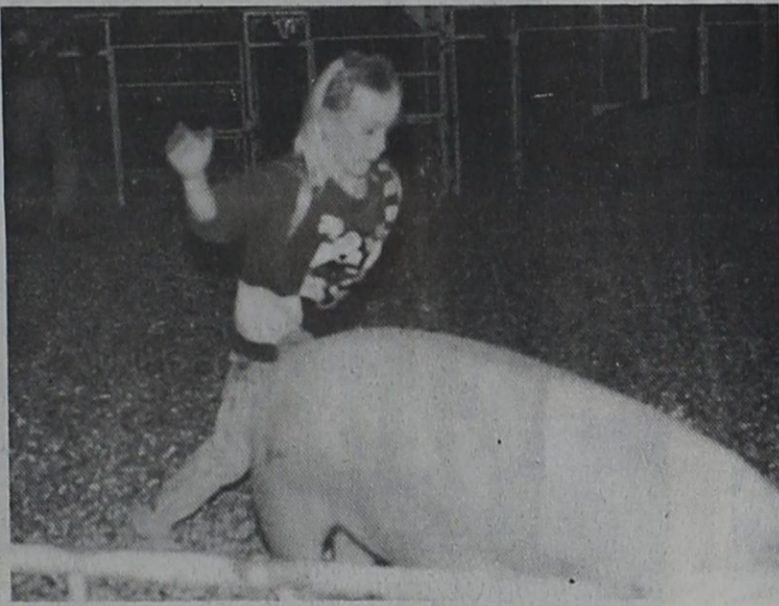

## Patterson says it's time to test your soil

Soil testing should be one of the first steps in planning your 1989 crop production and now is the time to collect soil samples from fields to be planted to spring crops, said Gary Patterson, Parmer County Extension Agent.

Cost of a soil test is a minor investment to make for the peace of mind it brings when faced with making fertilizer decisions, said Patterson.

Limited rainfall in many areas of Texas last year resulted in crop yields below the yield goals for which crops were fertilized, he said. Thus, some soils have fertilizer nutrient carry-over that could reduce 1988 fertilizer

requirements. But only soil testing can determine that carry-over, he said.

Following soil test recommendations can effectively reduce the per unit cost of producing a commodity and increase the chance of making a profit, said Patterson.

"Of course, a good fertility program can only insure optimum yields when other conditions affecting crop yields are favorable," said Patterson. "A good plant stand, adequate moisture, good physical condition of the soil and insect, disease and weed control are all important in obtaining profitable returns from money invested in ferti-

lizers." Crop producers who have not yet made a final decision about which crop to plant on which field should submit soil samples now and request fer-

tizer recommendations for several cropping alternatives per soil sample, he said. This information can help make final cropping decisions.

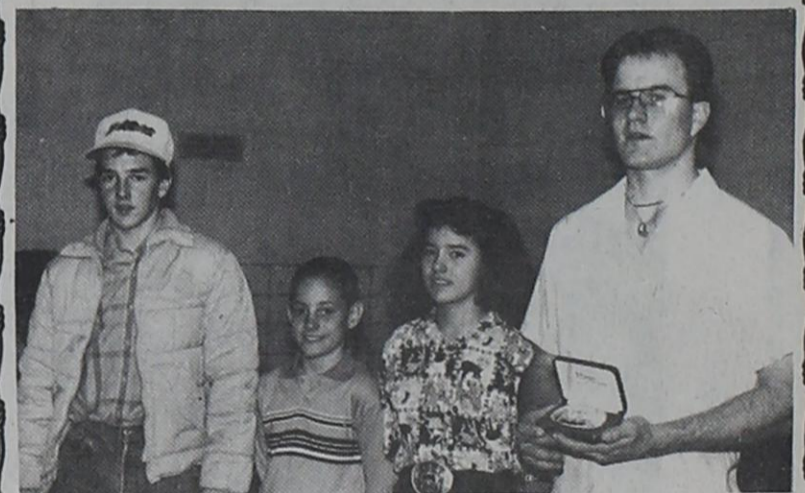

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## Economy boosted

Cotton producers in the 1988 farm program will receive a final 13 cents per pound deficiency payment on top of the 6.4-cent advance payment almost all received at sign-up last winter and spring, it was reported.

For the 25 High Plains counties in its area, Plains Cotton Growers figures money coming into the area economy will total about \$168 million.

They use the calculation of 3,206 million planted acres reported and an average estimated yield, weighted by county acreage figures, of 404.2 pounds per acre.

Also boosting the area economy in early 1989, PCG says, will be advance payments to producers as they sign up into the 1989 cotton program. USDA has estimated the total deficiency rate for this year at 21.4 cents per pound and is offering 30 percent, of 6.4 cents, in advance. That's the same advance as in 1988, but last year's rate was the result of an estimated 16-cent total, of which 40 percent was made at sign-up.

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# Farwell releases annual performance report

The Farwell Schools have issued their annual performance report. Here are some of the highlights:

## Trends in Student Performance

The district analyzed the district and campus goals for improving achievement to narrow the gap between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged students.

The following classes were offered at the secondary level to bridge the gap: correlated language arts, fundamentals of math, consumer math, introduction to biology, introduction to computer programming, math improvement, reading improvement, pre-Algebra and language extension. An English teacher with compensatory background was added for TEAMS remediation in junior and senior high.

A program stressing career education was provided to encourage school graduation and planning ahead for post high school education.

The district began a study for restructuring the vocational agriculture program to maximize all students' participation.

## Program Offerings

As part of the regular instructional schedule, tutorials were structured for all students as needed. Assurance was made that all students participated in a well-balanced curriculum in addition to the tutorial sessions. Chapter I and II programs were offered at the elementary and secondary campuses.

Resource classrooms for remediation were offered on all campuses. A staffer was added as a tutorial personnel at the high school to work with students needing remediation in language arts and math.

## Staff Quality

The working conditions for teachers have been improved by ensuring orderly learning environments, adequate time for planning and preparation, and a reduction in paperwork.

The instructional process has been improved by increased implementation of technology:

Increased usage of computers in classes; the elementary campus has 1 computer per classroom; computers were bought to establish computer labs at both secondary schools; electric typewriters were bought for the typing classes, and word processors added to the business department; laser disc equipment was added to both secondary science departments; laminating machines were added at each campus; increased use of VCR equipment in classes; computers incorporated into the vocational agriculture, vocational home economics and counseling programs at the high school.

The gifted and talented program was extended to include grades kindergarten through six.

## Finances

The district carries a reserve fund equal to about 2 1/2 months of operating expenses.

District residents demonstrate support for school programs through participation in one of the highest tax rate schedules in the state: 1.214.

The district put its income from the county permanent school fund into its capital projects fund, about \$65,000.

The district spent \$4,297 per student in 1987-88.

## Community Involvement

Performance reports were sent home to parents every three weeks describing how their child was doing. Each parent received at least 2 parent conferences with their child's teacher during the year. Parent training was offered to all parents.

School volunteer programs were expanded:

- The elementary campus involved parent volunteers mainly in seasonal festivities of the school's curriculum.

- The secondary campus used volunteers to participate as booster club individuals, assisting the band, athletic, agriculture and home economics programs.

- The secondary campuses used individuals as assistants

to the librarian.

- Father-son activities at the junior high included a magic show, information on flying instruction, and radio-controlled airplanes.

- Volunteers helped organize the Junior High mother-daughter Spring Fling.

- Parent volunteers assisted classes with field trips, book fair, parties and 8th grade graduation.

- Parents and community members were involved in developing programs such as AIDS and drug education committees, and school insurance committees.

## Innovations

They included (besides the technological advances listed under Staff Quality):

- Computer graphic programs added at the junior high.

- Stetson Spelling - individualized student program implemented at the junior high.

- Tutorials built into a special class during the day at elementary and junior high.

## Enrollment

Total enrollment was 521 students: 18 pre-kindergarten; 43 kindergarten; 232 grades 1 - 6; 87 grades 7 - 8; and 141 grades 9 - 12. The ethnic distribution was: 321 white, 189 Hispanic; 10 Black and 1 other.

Of 18 high school graduates, 13 planned to attend college. The attendance rate was 97.1 percent, compared to the state average of 96.1 percent.

## TEAMS Test

All seniors passed the May 1988 exam.

The percentages of Farwell students passing all the tests taken were: grade 3, 83.3%; grade 5, 69.2%; grade 7, 92.5%; grade 9, 68.8%; and grade 11, 66.7%.

Here are the percentages for mastery by grade and subject:

- Grade 3 - math, 97.2%; reading, 94.4%, and writing, 88.6%.

- Grade 5 - math, 79.5%; reading, 87.2%; and writing, 84.6%.

- Grade 7 - math, 97.1%; reading, 95%, and writing, 97.2%.

- Grade 9 - math, 87.5%; reading, 84.4%, and writing, 84.4%.

- Grade 11 - math, 65% and reading, 92.9%.

## Personnel Information

The professional staff of 47.4 included: 38.2 teachers; 5.1 professional support; 3 campus administration, and 1 central administration. Also: 7.4 educational aides and 20 auxiliary staff.

Of the teachers, 25.4 have bachelor's degrees and 12.8 have master's degrees. Their average salary is \$22,364, compared to the group average of \$21,913 and the state average of \$24,180. Experience by years: 14.7, 1 to 5 years: 5.9, 6 to 10 years: 15.5, 11 to 20 years, and 1.9, over 20 years.
