More applications to be sought for police post

The Farwell City Council decided Tuesday to continue searching for applicants for the city police post that will be created.

After discovering that only three applications had been received, councilmen Prentice Mills and Fred Chandler urged that the post be advertised farther afield.

So ads will be placed in the Lubbock and Amarillo newspapers and the Texas Municipal League monthly newsletter. And it was decided that whoever gets the post must then move to Farwell.

Discussing the three candidates - John Armstrong and Walt Causey, both of Farwell, and Shelly Shaver, of Muleshoe.

Mayor Chris Gikas said he had done a background check on Causey, who currently is a deputy sheriff, and had heard "glowing reports" of his work.

The council heard both positive and negative news on its landfill problems:

The negative: Water Dept. Supt. Dee Hammitt reported that Clovis officials have put on hold whether to allow Farwell to dump its refuse at the Clovis landfill until next spring, to see if the state legislature takes any action involving landfills.

If the Clovis landfill is unavailable, Gikas said the city may need to hire BFI Industries to haul Farwell trash to Amarillo or an intermediate site. He said the opportunity for a regional landfill in West

Texas is still years away.

The positive: Hammitt said state officials have told him that the Farwell landfill won't have to close in February, as had been thought. Hammitt was told the city (and other cities throughout Texas) have 18 months past that February deadline to close their landfills.

Hammitt stressed that the state officials refuse to put anything in writing but simply tell him that it's "our understanding" of how the federal Environmental Protection Agency is enforcing the law.

The council also:

- Gave water department employee Royce Menning a \$50 a month raise based on his recent completion of upgrading his water and waste water certifications.

- Gave Christmas bonuses to employees: \$100 to full-time workers and \$25 for part-timers.

- Agreed to seek insurance bids.

- Changed the January meeting to the 16th.

- Okayed a building permit for Lee Hutchins to put in a carport.

- Agreed to require medical exams for city employees; the city will pay for them.

- Heard Katherine White, a Farwell School Board member, ask that the new police officer, when hired, as part of his duty enforce folks living in Farwell to get Texas license tags. Mills supported the idea.

Fire destroys old weight room

The replacement of the school weight lifting room was the main topic on the agenda when the Lazbuddie School Board met Tuesday.

A fire on Nov. 29 destroyed the old weight room.

The board voted to use a metal building on an emergency basis to replace the weight room. They also decided to draw up specifications for bids for the project. They also approved the re-

port by principal Anne Faris on the TEAMS test. They were pleased that 100% of the juniors taking the exam passed both the math and language arts sections of the test which is required for graduation.

The board also approved a new school board evaluation form for the 1989-90 school term.

Kathy Foster was added to the approved substitute teacher list.

Sherry Christian resigns

The Texico School Board conducted their regular evaluation of Supt. James Pierce Tuesday.

They also voted to take the following actions:

- Replace the double wide doors on Gym 2 with 36" wide single doors.
- Plan an in-service meeting on the subject of break-

ing the cycle of child abuse, and also one on Aids. The details of this will be announced later.

- Accepted the resignation of Sherry Christian who was a Chapter I aide.

- Rejected all bids that they had received on a 20 passenger school bus.

County Judge's race heats up

The race for Parmer County judge is heating up.

B.K. Buske, a former Friona alderman and mayor, announced this week for the post in the Democratic primary.

He joins Leland Gustin, of Friona, and Eva Ancira, of Farwell, in the race.

Current Judge Porter Roberts has announced he is retiring after 10 years in the job.

Also, Bonnie Clayton, justice of the peace in Bovina reportedly is seriously considering her candidacy for judge.

If she announces, it won't be until Jan. 2, the deadline for filing. This is because of a state regulation that a Justice of the Peace cannot announce for public office with more than a year left on her current term of service without forfeiting her office.

The Parmer County Commissioners have discussed revising the Justice of the Peace boundaries and eliminating one of the three cur-

rent positions, presumably the one in Bovina.

Meanwhile, Jimmie Mace, of Farwell, also is expected to toss his hat into the ring for the county judge's post next week.

All five potential candidates would be entered in the Democratic primary.

Buske owns Property Associates, Realtors and is a grad-

uate of the Realtors Institute. He has a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Texas and attended law school for a year. He and his wife, Janet, have two children - Lindsay, 8, and Garland, 7.

Buske has served as a marketing consultant for Friona Industries, campaign chairman for the United Way, secretary-treasurer of Friona's Chamber of Commerce, and board chairman for Parmer County Industrial Development Corp.

He has been president of his Lions Club and deputy district governor. He has been a director of the Friona First Baptist Church Sunday School and is chairman of the church's finance committee.

"Parmer County, in my estimation, has always represented a high quality of life. It is my sincere desire to maintain and hopefully improve on this way of life in the decade ahead. If elected county judge, I will devote my energies to that purpose," said Buske.

Steers may stay in Class 2A

There was some interesting scuttlebutt at Tuesday's Farwell School Board meeting.

Whether Farwell would move back down to Class 1A next year was the topic.

Farwell now has 133 high school students; two years ago, the cutoff was 142 (at the time Farwell had 143 high school students, thus moving up in class).

But it is rumored that the cutoff between Classes 1A and 2A will be 129 - meaning Farwell would stay in Class 2A. If this were to happen, it was said, the cutoff between Classes 2A and 3A also would be lowered; thus, schools the size of Stinnett West Texas and Abernethy would move up to Class 3A.

Also, it was rumored that UIL officials may increase the number of teams in some districts, such as Farwell's, to 8.

At an otherwise rather uneventful meeting, the board: - Heard board member Tom Nichols report that the budget committee will meet with the principals this week.

The budget problem continues to worsen, especially with fewer students and mandated state salary raises for teachers. Seventy percent of the Farwell budget goes for personnel wages.

- Agreed to meet Jan. 9 to discuss the annual audit.

- Received a report from high school principal David Reynolds on whether student aides should receive scholastic credit for their work. He said 80 percent of the aides are gaining from their work but he recommended no credit be given at this time; he will evaluate the program some more.

- Tentatively ratified the contract with Hank Wheeler, who is the superintendent search consultant, pending some clarification. They put aside \$9,000 for the search (taking it from an account of \$17,000 that had been set aside for an additional 3rd grade teacher).

- Heard board member Roberta Johnson report on the School Board's 1988-89 goals

and how they have been implemented. She seemed rather happy about it. And she complimented Grigsby and administrative assistant Gwen Corn.

- Received a report on TEAMS tests (Texas Educational Assessment of Mini-

mum Skills) given high school juniors. Farwell students did extremely well (a full report will be carried in a later issue of the Tribune). It showed 100 percent mastery in math and 96 percent (one student barely missed) in language arts.

Beautification ideas wanted

City Clerk Treasurer Marie Christian told the Texico City Council Tuesday that she is seeking ideas for beautification projects.

The deadline for getting the annual grant for such projects from New Mexico is Feb. 1. She said the state usually approved projects dealing with the highway or parks.

Councilman Butch Tharp said he would like to see more trees at KKR Park and a watering system there.

In other business, Mrs. Chris-

tian reported that several entries are expected in the city logo design contest. The deadline is Dec. 15. The council will judge the entries.

The council received a bid for \$2,232 from Chris Chavez for renovating the north and west walls of the City Hall building. It was tabled, since work couldn't be done until warmer weather, anyway.

The next meeting will be Dec. 28; it was moved due to the Christmas holiday.

Hancock, Woods apply for JP post

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday received two applications to fill the post of Justice of the Peace Albert Smith, who has resigned effective Jan. 1.

The applicants are Louise Hancock and Irene Woods. Mrs. Hancock also has announced she will seek election to the post in the March Democratic primary.

Whoever is chosen by the commissioners would hold the post for one year. The commissioners are expected to decide at their Jan. 22 meeting.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Agreed to seek bids for a new car for the sheriff's department.

- Paid one-third of the engineer's fee on the courthouse elevator project.

Two fires reported

The Carl Parks residence in Texico caught fire on the morning of Dec. 12 as the family tried to thaw out frozen pipes.

There were no injuries although smoke damage was done to the Anderson Street home. Texico firefighters responded.

There was a small fire in a mobile home on the property of Carl Goettsch early on Dec. 12. There was little interior damage, and there were no injuries.

The coaches quickly regrouped and picked up a game against Anton at Sudan for the varsity boys.

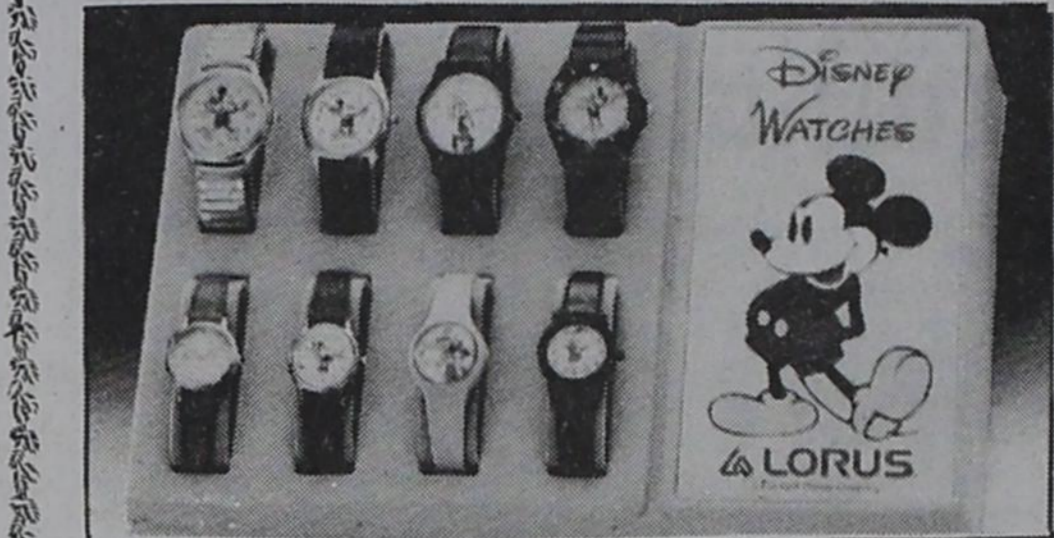

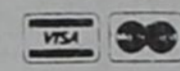



Steers slide past Anton to go 7-0

The charging Farwell Steers increased their unblemished record to 7-0 Tuesday night with a 69-55 romp over Anton.

Scoring were: Monty Delgado, 18; Shawn Stewart, 17; Greg Actkinson, 12; Shannon Pool, 6; Darren Haseloff and Adrian Smith, 4 each; Michael Lovett and Chad Byrd, 3 each.

Despite the score coach Larry Gregory said, "We played very poorly - not much intensity. We played good enough to win, but that's all."

Gregory indicated that the Steers have developed a habit of getting ahead of their opponents, and then playing just well enough to win. He would like to see more intensity.

The Farwell Steers upped their record to 6-0 by winning all three games to capture their own Invitational Basketball Tournament championship.

The Steers opened with a 72-57 win over Grady, then stopped Texico 78-69. In the title game, Farwell defeated Friona, 87-64.

In all three games, the veteran trio of Shawn Stewart, Greg Actkinson and Monty Delgado paced the Steers - the trio was named to the All-Tournament Team.

However, as the games progressed, the "newcomers" began contributing more and more, both on defense and offense. Coach Larry Gregory has been shuttling players in continually to be used effectively in his full court press.

Top scorers against Grady were Delgado, 24; Actkinson, 15, and Stewart, 12.

Farwell grabbed a 15-12 lead at the end of the first quarter and increased it to 34-27 at the half. The Steers outscored Grady by 6 in the third period and 2 in the final stanza.

In the championship tilt, Delgado was hotter than a firecracker by canning 11 of his 19 points in the first quarter. Farwell was up 25-16 at the end of the first quarter.

The Steers kept gunning accurately as they moved out to a 46-28 lead at the half. The lead was 68-41 going into the last quarter.

Against Friona, scoring were: Monty Delgado, 19; Darren Haseloff, 15; Greg Actkinson and Shawn Stewart, 13 each; Chad Byrd, 10; Shannon Pool, 7; Michael Lovett, 6; Adrian Smith, 4.

Coach Larry Gregory commented: "We looked very good during the course of each game, and in some places we looked just as bad as we did good. We played very well at the start of each game, and then we had a lapse of intensity. But the first quarter of each game was good."

"We had good contributions from all our kids, but I was really pleased with the way Haseloff, Pool, and Herrera came off the bench."

"I'd like to thank the Booster Club for all they did in the hospitality room, and for all the hard work they did. I'd especially like to thank Johnny and Diane Actkinson who kept the hospitality room open, and the cheerleaders and Dorris White for their help with the signs and programs."

Coach Gregory was also pleased with the size of the crowds at the tournament. There was standing room only for Saturday night's game.



Farwell residents will have two elections, both of which are held on the first Saturday in May.

The Farwell School Board election will have two posts on the ballot, currently held by Joe Schilling and Roberta Johnson.

ballot will have three council posts on the it, currently held by Martin Kube, Fred Chandler and Gloria Hutchins (who is filling an unexpired term).

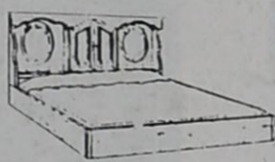

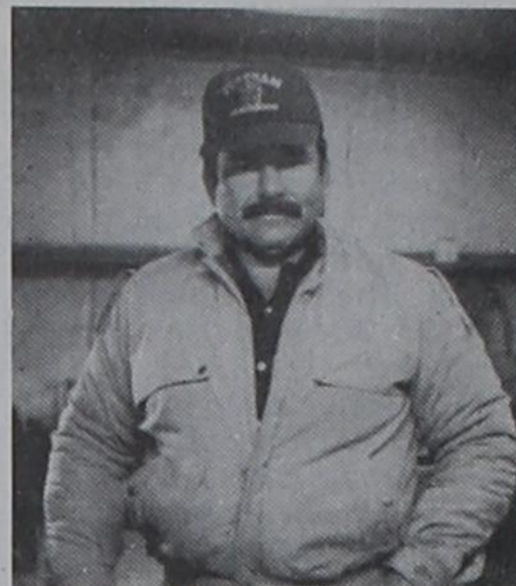

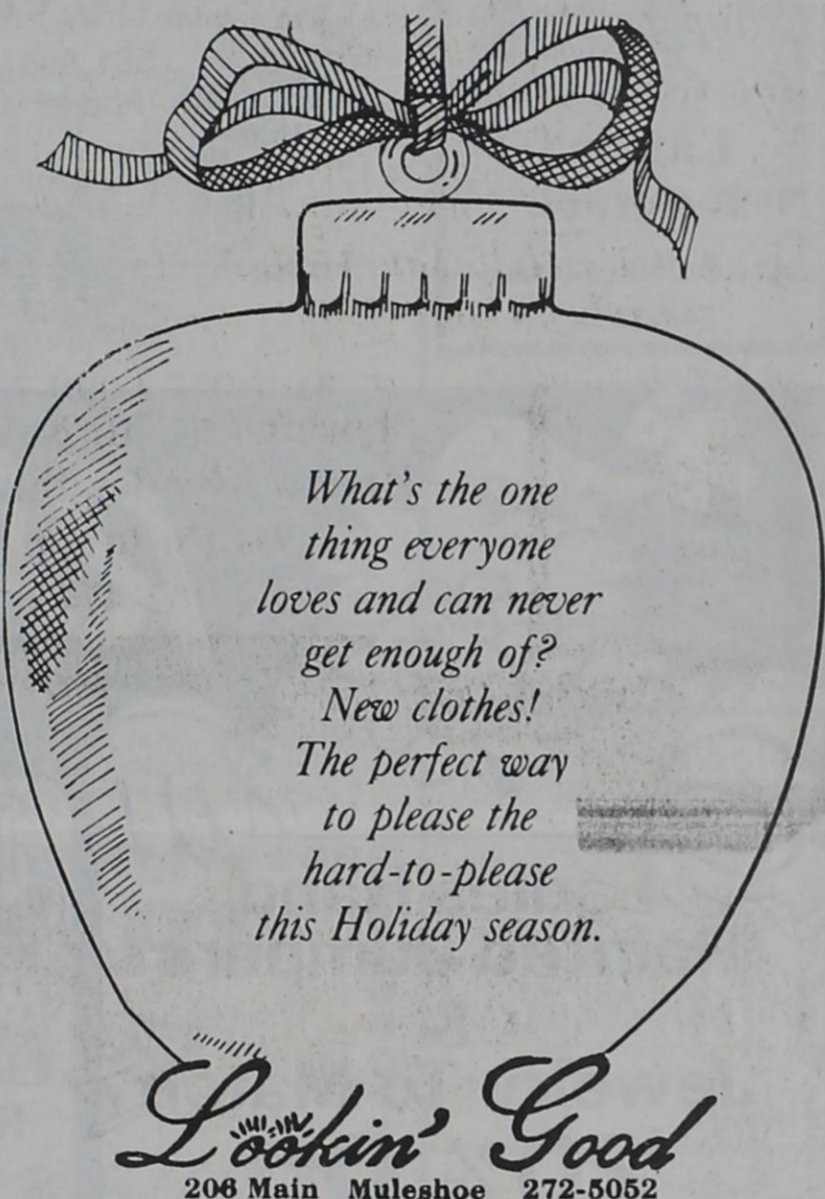

Notice Of Public Hearing On The Taxation Of Tangible Personal Property

House Bill 82, passed by the 71st Legislature, amends Section 11.14 of the Tax Code and provides that all tangible personal property, other than manufactured homes, that is not held or used is exempt from property taxes. House Bill 82 further provides that the governing body of a taxing unit, may by official action, begin the taxation of tangible personal property.

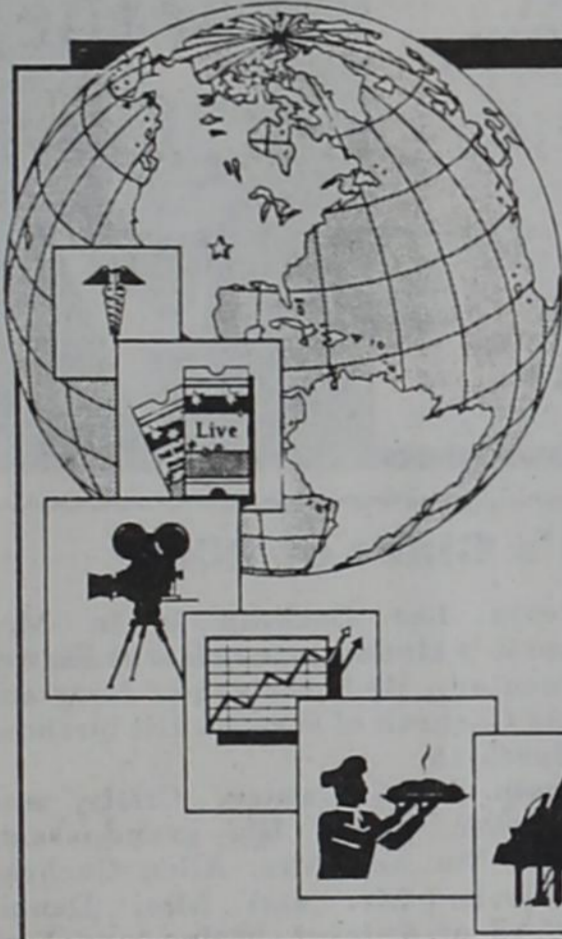

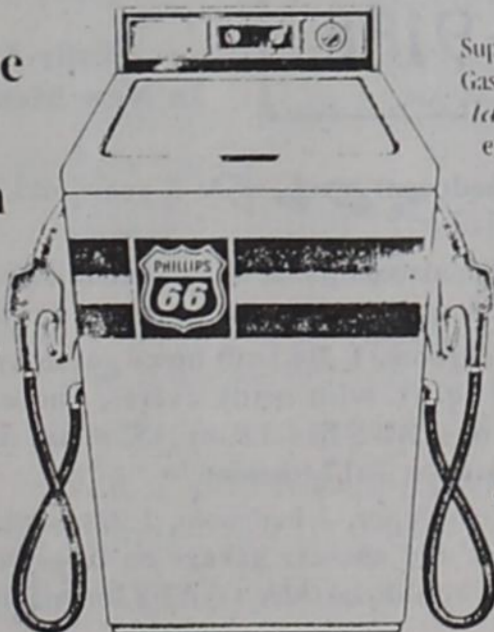
