Let's cut their salaries

A note on that pay raise that has been pushed for our Senators and Congressmen:

I wasn't going to comment on such foolhardiness because it's no fun to take a position that virtually everyone who reads this column agrees with: that the 50% raises were excessive, especially in a time of massive federal deficit problems.

What has caused me to take pen and ink er..., make that, computer pen and ink ...) to this topic are the supercillious reasons that were given by raise proponents for a big pay hike.

No. 1, they say, is because it's a way to eliminate the honorariums they get from speaking to lobbyist groups. This way, they say, politicians won't be so beholden to lobby groups.

C'mon, who do they think they're kidding. Does anyone really believe the lobby groups will hide their tails between their legs and just slink away now? Or do you think they will derive ingenious other ways of continuing to pump company funds into political campaigns? I suggest for the latter.

With politics at the national level as they are, major corporations will be sought after by politicos for their money. That's politics. And some silly rule concerning honorariums isn't about to stop it.

No. 2, they say, is that the big raises are needed so that non-millionaires will be able to run for Congress.

Again, who are they kidding? Folks don't run for Congress for the salaries! And the difference in salary of \$20,000 or \$40,000 has absolutely nothing to do with running a campaign that costs into the millions.

Think of it, folks: fellas spend into the millions of dollars for a two-year office offering \$90,000 a year. No, they are not doing it for the salary. The amount of renumeration they receive has nothing to do with the major reason most seek election: they want power.

And the fact is that, due to the cost of campaigning, most folks who aren't millionaires are being shut out of meaningfully running for Congress. Salaries don't enter into it. It's just a fact of political life in modern- day America. When you add up the cost of staff, transportation, advertising, etc., you need a bunch of funds. Period.

In my opinion, salaries of Senators and Congressmen ought to be cut. Many are independently wealthy and don't need a salary. Others do quite well, thank you, from honorariums. And this would be a good way of cutting the federal deficit.

Now you tell me: if salaries were cut in half for our Senators and Congressmen, how many do you think would announce they weren't seeking re- election because of it.

That's right.



5 Area re-elects Seales, Layman

Don Seales of Lariat and L.G. Layman of Lazbuddie were re-elected to the board of directors of the Five Area Telephone Cooperative at the annual meeting on Feb. 4.

The group heard General Manager Hubert Kidd say 1988 couldn't have been bet-

ter.
"It was our best year ever in Five Area Telephone Cooperative history," he told the group of 113 members and their guests.

In his report he told the group that a federally mandated accounting system change netted a few extra dollars to the cooperative that they had not previously been getting.

He reported that Five Area is returning capital investments to the group as fast as they can while still building a good system for the subscribers. He told the group that Five Area paid capi-tal credits of \$5,622,348 in 1988. These are the capital credits for 1980. The money is returned to subscribers in the form of decreased telephone bills.

Five Area is now 7 years behind in its capital disburse-ments. The Rural Electrification Administration (REA) recommends a 10- 20 year lag, but Five Area directors believe that they are doing well enough to stay well ahead of schedule.

The board has already approved a dispersal of the 1981 capital credits for later this year.

"We have had no borrowing since 1978," said Kidd. But Five Area has managed to install a complete digital system which they constantly upgrade.

"We also installed interface units on every home so people can test their own lines and find out if the problem is in the phone or the system before they call the com-pany,"said Kidd. This saves people the cost of a service call if the problem is in the discount store telephone or in the wires that subscribers installed by themselves.

Five Area has also maintained and upgraded its buildings this year. They also installed a new computer and new programming software.

"We are going to have to look at replacing computers and software as an on going- deal," said Kidd. He noted that computer hardware and software are constantly changing. "We used to put in telephone poles that would last 25 years, now we must change as the industry changes," Kidd said. Kidd looked to the future.

He told the group that Five Area subscribers will soon be able to hook their home computers up to all sorts of services including home security systems, and a myriad of information services. He noted that this will go into effect as soon as the last of the copper wiring has been replaced by fiber optic cable.

He also said they have 911 emergency service on board. He noted that the cost increase of 50 cents per month was mandated by the state. He discussed some of closer together. But, Kidd exthe problems with the 911, service.

He noted that since Oct. 5, the rural telephone companies has been licensed to sell cellular telephone service, but he does not foresee many purchases of the service until the price comes down. Several phone compa-nies have filed for this license and only one of them will get it. They will work out a partnership agreement so that several small companies will be able to offer this service to its subscribers.

Kidd told the group that Five Area is studying the cellular telephone service very carefully because it will cost a million dollars for the license. "There is no room for mistakes," he noted.

Kidd noted Five Area is looking toward expansion in the future. They would like to increase their service area if an area becomes available. Currently, Five Area's 2,500 subscribers are almost 1 mile apart. It would be advantageous for the company to expand its services committee for the 1990 dito more subscribers, espe- rectors' election were chosen





> Also, 15 regulatory agencies in Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico have to okay the merger. If all goes well, the merger still cannot take place before Jan. 1, 1990.

> Among the provisions in the conditions of merger is a written statement from each co-op's power suppliers that the merger will not affect or impair the respective power supply contracts.

The proposed pact calls for 12 trustees, 5 from the territory now served by SWEC and 7 from FEC areas. In the second year of merger, though, the board will be reduced to 7 trustee districts from the combined co-op - 2 will be designated to serve the current SWEC area.

SWEC members will automatically become members of FEC upon merger. FEC
