Life inside the Washington Beltway is far different from West Texas or Eastern Illinois. D.C. is a nation unto itself. Only when a topic becomes a cause celebre, like the proposed massive pay raises, does Congress listen. And that's a rarity.

Enough of that old stuff. On with the new. And I want everyone to read these opinions closely so they don't have to bring up the forbidden topic again:

- As for my opinion of the Bush administration, it's far too early to tell. It's great to hear that his lips haven't changed (i.e., no new taxes), but I'm withholding comment until I see where the revenue is coming from to finance government, while adhering to Gramm-Rudman.

- The S & L crisis gradually will be brought under control through massive infusions of federal money. I'm not saying that is the right way to handle the problem, but that's what normally occurs when politicians attack a crisis.

- The Democrats named a good man to head its national party in Ron Brown. Tagging him as a "Jackson -Kennedy man" is unfair. He may surprise a lot of folks with his attempts to re-forge the Democrats into a party that can win the executive branch.

The regional winner goes to Austin for the state tourney.

The meeting was adjourned, and refreshments were served by Mandy Helmer. Christy Ortiz provided a game of Pictionary.


