After living in the Washington, D.C., suburbs, I learned a fact most people don't know or are unwilling to accept: that is, the folks we send to Washington don't give a hoot nor a holler about us.

Life inside the Washington Beltway is far different from West Texas or Eastern Illinois. D.C. is a nation unto itself. Only when a topic becomes a cause celebre, like the proposed massive pay raises, does Congress listen. And that's a rarity.

Enough of that old stuff. On with the new. And I want everyone to read these opinions closely so they don't have to bring up the forbidden topic again.

- As for my opinion of the Bush administration, it's far too early to tell. It's great to hear that his lips haven't changed (i.e., no new taxes), but I'm withholding comment until I see where the revenue is coming from to finance government, while adhering to Gramm-Rudman.

- The S & L crisis gradually will be brought under control through massive infusions of federal money. I'm not saying that is the right way to handle the problem, but that's what normally occurs when politicians attack a crisis.

- The Democrats named a good man to head its national party in Ron Brown. Tagging him as a "Jackson - Kennedy man" is unfair. He may surprise a lot of folks with his attempts to re-forge the Democrats into a party that can win the executive branch.

- The military industrial establishment will continue to dominate our government, although by now it's obvious that the USSR is truly cutting back in an attempt to keep its economy from going down the tubes.

Steers enter regional

The Farwell Steers, boasting one of their finest boys' basketball teams ever, move into the Class 2-A Regional Tournament by virtue of beating a tall Quanah team Tuesday night, 79-69, at Plainview before another huge crowd of hometown fans.

Area Champion Farwell, 28-6, plays tonight (Friday) at 8 p.m. at Garrett Coliseum in Big Springs, Texas, against Bangs, 22-11, defeated Ozona, 55-43, to earn its regional berth.

It will be the second game on the card. Haskell and Canadian square off at 6:30 p.m. Canadian beat Hale Center, 64-61, Tuesday. Haskell beat El Dorado, 66-58.

Haskell has been rated in the top 10 teams in Texas consistently. Farwell has been ranked 10th.

If the schedule goes according to how the girls' tournament was done, then if Farwell wins tonight they will play at 1 p.m. Saturday at Big Springs against the winner of the Haskell - Canadian match.

The regional winner goes to Austin for the state tourney.

The Quanah Indians, who finished at 16-4 (they got a late start due to being involved in the football play-offs), started a tall team: 5-10, 6-0, 6-3, 6-3 and 6-6.

But the Steers displayed excellent teamwork in moving the ball and blocking out.

Farwell started off strong as Monty Delgado hit 2 jumpers, one for 3 points. A lay-up by Greg Atkinson made the score 7-0.

Quanah began scoring but Farwell maintained a lead of 6 to 8 points during the middle of the first quarter. Then Farwell went cold and Quanah scored on some short jumper to know the score at 16-all with 1:20 left.

Free throws by Michael Day and Shawn Stewart moved Farwell up by 3 before the Indians tied it against. Day hit a jumper at the close of the

The Texico Wolverines lost the District 6-A championship game Saturday night to Tatum 78-58, but it will not keep the boys out of the Regionals.

"It was disappointing to lose by 20 points to Tatum," said coach Curt Cook. "We played hard. We played one night, and the officials called everything we did. The next night they didn't call anything. It was really frustrating," said Cook.

Tatum led by 11 points at the end of the first quarter, and the Wolverines were unable to catch up in spite of good free throws and some excellent defensive moves.

Scoring were: Keith Harrison, 20; Brett Patrick, 11; Darrell Krivanek, 9; Pete Fuentes and Jaime Estrada, 7 each; Gerald Krivanek and Kenny Shaw, 2 each.

Texico plays Grady March 2 in the Regional Semifinals at 8 p.m. at Grady High School. The winner will go on to the New Mexico State championship playoffs in Albuquerque.

The Wolverines squeezed past Dora 56-54 to win the semi-final District 6 A game last week.

"This was an exciting game. We took command in the second quarter. We were ahead by as much as 18 points in that period," said coach Curt Cook.

Dora fought back to within 11 points at the half.

The Wolverines came back in the second half hoping to pull ahead of Dora, but their aggressiveness was met by the officials' whistles. The Wolverines found themselves in a position where the one and one shots cut their lead

quarter to put Farwell up 21-19. Quannah edged ahead and took its only lead of the game at 28-25 with 2 minutes gone in the second quarter. Day then hit a crucial 3-pointer to tie it up at 5:00 and put a

Then after Greg Actkinson hit a jumper, Day scored a 3-pointer as Farwell opened up an 8-point lead, 53-45, at 2:15 left.

But Farwell was in foul trouble. Stewart had picked up his fourth foul at 5:46, and Day got his fourth at 2:07 of the 3rd quarter. Farwell's sixth man, Dustin Hardage, played very little due to the flu.

Then the Actkinson brothers took control, scoring 6 points, to end the quarter with a 59-51 lead.

At the start of the final stanza, Stewart and Day returned to the lineup (Stewart fouled out with 1:37 left in the game).

Quannah moved to within 5 until Delgado canned a 3-pointer. The lead bounced back from 6 to 8 points until the 3:51 mark when two Stewart charity shots upped the lead to 71-61.

Meanwhile, Quannah, which had relied on its inside game, began shooting ineffectively from the outside due to the tough Farwell zone defense. The Indians could get no closer than 8 behind in the final minutes.

Scoring were: Jeff Actkinson, 7; Greg Actkinson, 17; Stewart, 17; Day, 26; Delgado, 12.

Farwell was 14 of 23 from the foul line.

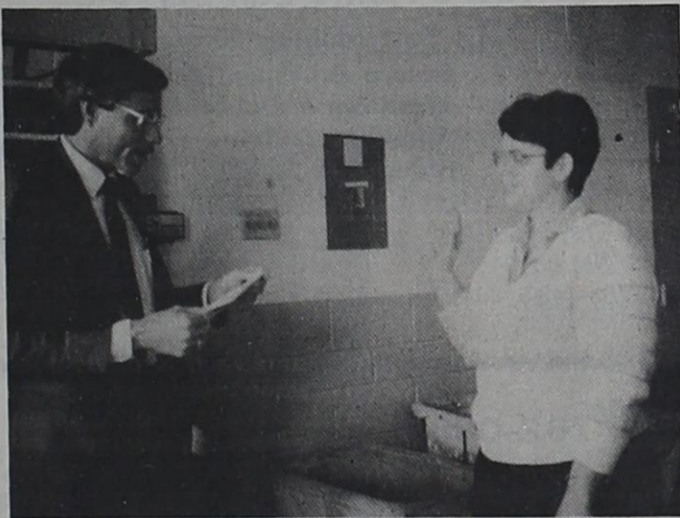

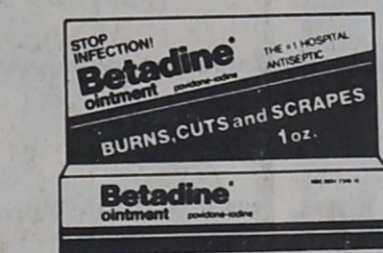

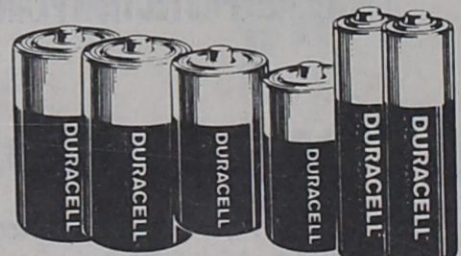

Water depletion allowance information given

Rising water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer throughout most of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area have eliminated cost-in-water income tax depletion allowance claims for many irrigation farm landowners in tax year 1988.

According to tax rules, persons owning land from which groundwater is used in the business of irrigated farming may claim the deduction only if water depletion

usually occurred. Since the aquifer water levels increased, no depletion occurred, since the aquifer water levels increased, no depletion occurred and therefore, no claim can be made.

Irrigators in Armstrong, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock and Lynn Counties will not be able to file cost-in-water income tax depletion allowance claims due to substantial water rises in these counties during 1986 and 1987.

"Only small areas in the remaining 11 counties served by the Water District had water level declines during the past year," says Water District manager A. Wayne Wyatt. "Taxpayers who land in those isolated areas will still have basis for their claim," he says.

In some areas where substantial rises in water levels must decline below the last water level where a claim was allowed before the landowner will again be eligible to claim the water depletion allowance," says Wyatt.

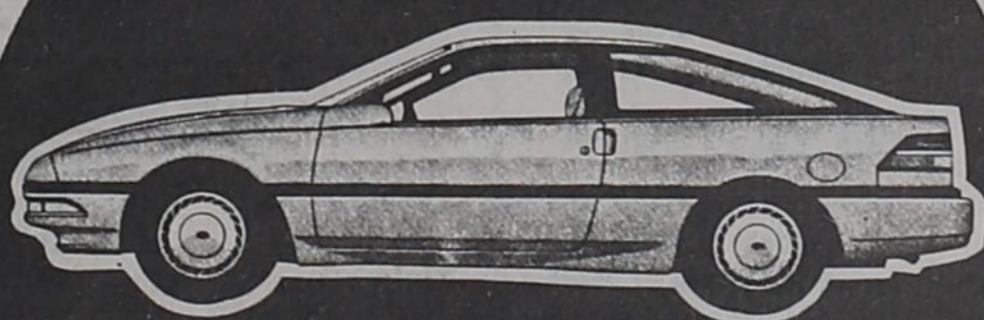

Several different places were discussed that the club would like to visit.

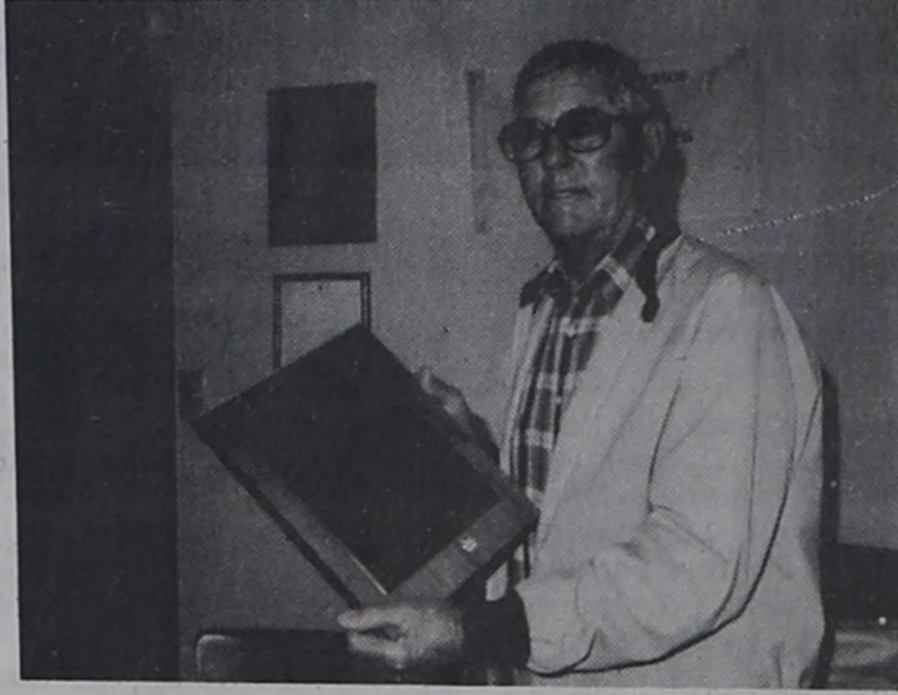
There were two demonstrations given at the meeting. Mandy Helmer did one on painting a water color picture, and Jarrod Barfield did one on how to clean a mouse cage.

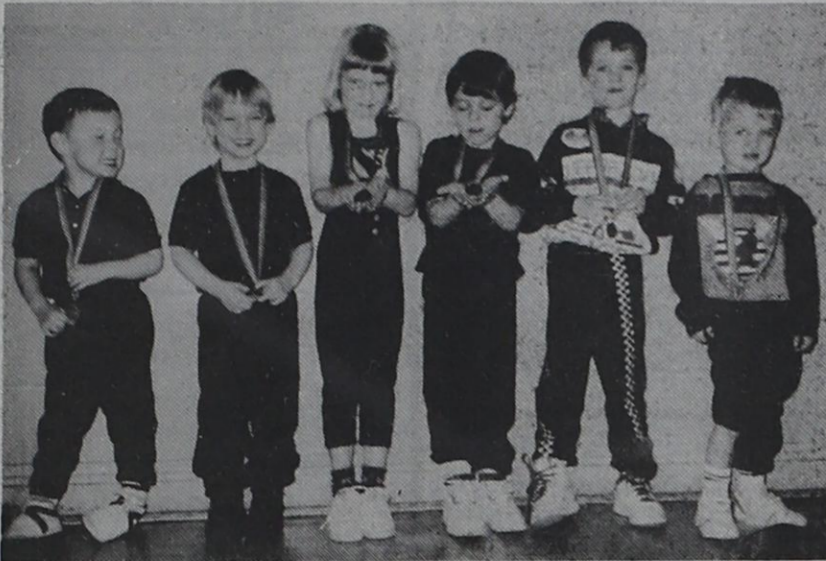

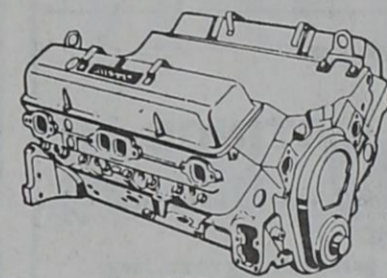

Texico hires water dept. trainee

The Texico City Council Tuesday hired Ronald Rowe to fill the trainee position in the city water and maintenance department.

Mayor Steve Chancy said Rowe was his selection out of 50 applicants for the job; the council concurred. The council also voted to send Rowe to a specialized school.

The council also voted to purchase a pickup truck for the water and sewer department. They voted to purchase a "plain Jane" vehicle with-

out any fancy options.

They also discussed purchasing another vehicle for the city marshal. The city's 1986 police vehicle has only 26,000 miles on it, but it needed a new transmission after Monday's high speed chase.

The old vehicle is being repaired. It has had several service problems in a very short time. Council members noted that a new vehicle could be purchased with Law Enforcement grant money.

The costs may be spread over two years.

City Marshal Brent Byrum said a 4 wheel drive vehicle would be very useful because it could be used under some conditions that the current police vehicle could not handle. Byrum and Councilman Bryan Kube will study the matter.

The council also voted to apply for an Energy Conservation grant program and a low interest loan program. If the city received monies from either, it would be money that the city did not otherwise have. They discussed some ways that money could be effectively used by the city. Chancy asked that members bring suggestions back to the next meeting.

Councilman Butch Tharp noted that two railroad crossings in Texico need repair. The council directed the city attorney to draft a letter to the Santa Fe railroad ask-

ing that they maintain their tracks.

Chancy suggested Texico let bids for their insurance. He said that he had discussed insurance coverage with the business manager of another city, and he thought that Texico could do better.

Frona bank gets award

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday received two bids from banks wanting to be the county's bank depository for the next years - from Frona State Bank and First Bank of Bovina. Frona State Bank was awarded the bid.

In other business, the commissioners received a letter telling about Senate Bill 375 which seeks to tax past and present county employees 50 cents each to help the retirement system.

The Parmer commissioners plan to pass a motion against the bill, reported County Judge Porter Roberts.

now," he said.

The council voted to seek bids for 132 square yards of new commercial grade carpeting for the City Hall. The council specified that all bids be accompanied by samples of the carpeting and copies of all the guarantees to go with them.

City Clerk Marie Christian noted that one door should be replaced before new carpeting is installed. The council voted to do so.

Texico has hearing on civic projects

Texico held a hearing Tuesday night to discuss application for a Community Development Block Grant.

Three suggestions had been made for possible projects that CDBG applications which could be written. They were: construction of curbs and repair of streets, repair of city hall, and the construction of a new city swimming pool.

The swimming pool project was quickly rejected because no CDBG money had ever been used to build one.

"If we do get a grant, we must come up with matching funds. The project we decide on must be one that can stand alone even if they only come up with half or a part of the money we request," said Mayor Steve Chancy. "If we decided to build a city hall, for instance, we couldn't build just half a building."

The street project seemed the most viable project to receive CDBG funding.

"Even if we only do one block with curbs and gutters, it is one block we didn't have before," said Chancy. He noted that Fort Sumner recently received such a grant.

The application for a grant for this year must be in Santa Fe by March 17. The city council must hold one more hearing on this matter before its next regular city council meeting when an application can be approved before it is sent to Santa Fe.

The council will hold a special hearing for the application for a CDBG grant Monday at 6:30 p.m. MST at City Hall. Councilman Bryan Kube suggested Lamar Street as one that really needs work.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey noted that it is best to do a whole section of a city at once with curbs and gutters

so that the streets all stay on the same level. "If you don't watch it, you'll build a 'swimming pool' in the middle of the street."

City Clerk Marie Christian asked that the streets be picked so that plans could be made for the application. There are several steps that must be taken once the streets are designated before an application can be made.

She also asked that photographs be taken to accompany the application so that officials with CDBG officials could see their need.

Chancy volunteered to look over the streets and draw up a list of those that need the most work. He suggested that the new water and sewer maintenance trainee, Ronald Rowe, accompany him in this work.

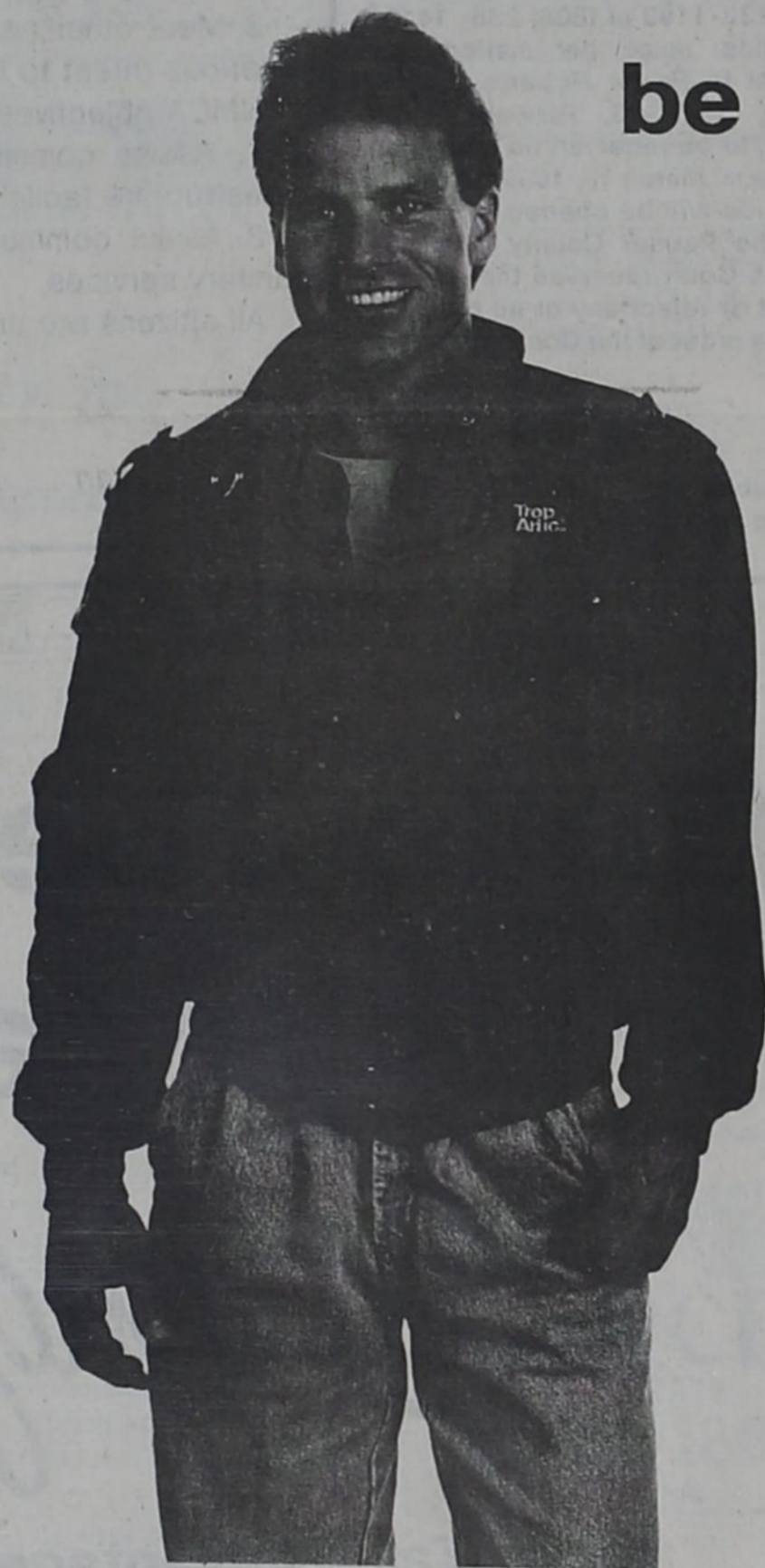

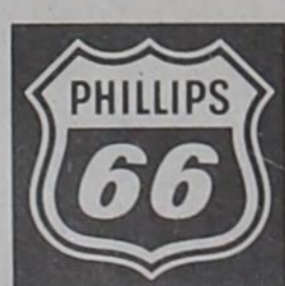
