funds raised from the sale of the lands by the State of Texas financed construction of the Texas State Capitol
Building in Austin in 1888 . Hamlin was elected Count Attorney of Potter County in
1901, and in 1905 moved to mained until a few years before his death on Jan. 10,
1950 . He also served as Parmer County Judge from 1912 to 1924. Hamlin began collecting se-
riously during the late 1920's riously during the late 1920's.
"He was probably the first "He was probably the first
collector with focus in the Panhandle," said Michael Grauer, curator of art.
His interests inct His interests included Ori-
ental porcelains ental porcelains, bronzes, tex-
tiles and ivories, antique furniture (primarily, English), European paintings and sculp-
ture, and American art. The significance and quality of significance and quality of
his collection indicates the breadth of his cultural interest. in New Mexico and consequently amassed an impres-

## School funds to be divided

After three years of saying fund will be divided up pro-

School Fund among the four county schools. The fund

Friona, $51 \%$; Farwell, 19\%;
Bovina, 19\%, Bovina, 19\%, and Lazbuddie,
11\%. The money has to be used either for permanent improve-
ments or to pay off bonded ments or to pay off bonded
indebtedness. It cannot be used for operating expenses, such as for salaries. The vote to disperse the funds was 3-1. In favor were
Ernest Anthony, Tom Ware and Robert White. Opposed was Raymond McGehee, who
said he is going to wait to said he is going to wait to see
how the schools plan to how the schools plan to us
the funds before he agrees. In the past, the commissioners had tied 2-2 on giv-
ing the funds to the schools. ing the funds to the schools.
McGehee and Anthony had been opposed. And County Judge Porter Roberts broke the tie by voting with McGehee and Anthony. The mai felt the fund should only be
used in an emergency situa-
tion. Anthony has spent several weeks polling his con-
stituents on their position. He said the majority favored dividing up the fund, including posed in the past.
Friona Schools had been in the forefront of getting the

meeting, representatives of meeting, representatives of
all four county schools and school boards were present to support the division.
According to state law, the According to state law, the
schools must come up with a plan to use the funds. After the plans are approved as meeting the criteria noted
above, commissioners would distribute the funds on a "scholastic" basis. This on a not be done until after April 1,
because the fund is tied up in because the fund is tied up in a depository until that date.
Due to the word "scholastic" being used in the state constitution, each county schoo will have to take a census to find out how
many persons in their districts are eligible to attend their schools. After these

und will be divided up proThe school officials had divided using average daily attendance (ADA) over five years. But County Attorney Charles Aycock explained tha in demanding a "scholastic" count. " The "scholastic" count will more money than through the ADA count, since more than 20 students in their district attend a private school.
