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## School funds to be divided

After three years of saying no, the Parmer County Commissioners voted yes Monday to divvying up the Permanent School Fund among the four county schools.

The fund currently holds \$982,000.

Although the exact way it will be divided hasn't been decided yet, it should be roughly along these lines: Friona, 51%; Farwell, 19%; Bovina, 19%, and Lazbuddie, 11%.

The money has to be used either for permanent improvements or to pay off bonded indebtedness. It cannot be used for operating expenses, such as for salaries.

The vote to disperse the funds was 3-1. In favor were Ernest Anthony, Tom Ware and Robert White. Opposed was Raymond McGehee, who said he is going to wait to see how the schools plan to use the funds before he agrees.

In the past, the commissioners had tied 2-2 on giving the funds to the schools. McGehee and Anthony had been opposed. And County Judge Porter Roberts broke the tie by voting with McGehee and Anthony. The main reason was that the majority felt the fund should only be used in an emergency situation.

But Anthony has spent several weeks polling his constituents on their position. He said the majority favored dividing up the fund, including some folks who had been opposed in the past.

Friona Schools had been in the forefront of getting the fund divided up. At Monday's meeting, representatives of all four county schools and school boards were present to support the division.

According to state law, the schools must come up with a plan to use the funds. After the plans are approved as meeting the criteria noted above, commissioners would distribute the funds on a "scholastic" basis. This would not be done until after April 1, because the fund is tied up in a depository until that date.

Due to the word "scholastic" being used in the state constitution, each county school will have to take a census to find out how many persons in their districts are eligible to attend their schools. After these numbers are gathered, the

fund will be divided up proportionately.

The school officials had suggested that the fund be divided using average daily attendance (ADA) over five years. But County Attorney Charles Aycock explained that the constitution was clear in demanding a "scholastic" count.

The "scholastic" count will help Lazbuddie Schools get more money than through the ADA count, since more than 20 students in their district attend a private school.

About 40 persons attended the meeting. Friona School Supt. Hal Ratcliff gave the main talk in favor of the division. Arguments used included:

- The state could pass a law and get the money back from the county if it stayed in a county fund, especially since no more than 5 or 6 counties in Texas still had permanent school funds (money is gained from oil and gas leases in other counties). The amount of money coming into the Parmer fund each month has dwindled sharply.

- The state has mandated more programs and more

construction is needed to meet them, such as the gifted - talented program, and to maintain a 1:22 teacher - pupil ratio.

- Friona, as well as other county schools, has been approving deficit budgets, dipping into its reserve fund.

Friona School Board President Jerry Hinkle said Friona's bonded indebtedness is at \$1.4 million. He listed three needs as: an overpass over the highway for students going to the junior high; and repairs at the athletic field, and bigger administrative offices.

Bovina School Supt. Bob Owen spoke about an asbestos problem in the heating tunnels there. Bovina has asked officials if it's okay to just seal them off and use other means instead of having to remove all the asbestos, which is expected to be costly.

Owen said some gym work is needed, too.

Lazbuddie School Supt. Joe Hall said his district is in good shape as far as construction is concerned, but some repairs and, perhaps, more classrooms may be needed in 3 or 4 years.

## Texico hog show slated

Texico's FFA and 4-H Clubs will co-sponsor their annual Spring Market Hog Show on Saturday at 9 a.m. MST.

The show will be located across the street from the elementary school if the weather is nice, or will be moved indoors if the weather is too cold, said Eddie West, FFA advisor.

Approximately 44 boys and girls will be exhibiting their pigs to compete for belt buckles and cash prizes.

In November, the exhibitors drew lots to select their pig, and each person purchased his animal at the same price. Any student currently enrolled in the Texico School system or any child who resides in the Texico School District is eligible to participate in the annual show.

No exhibitor may purchase more than two pigs. In the past, children as young as three years old have com-

peted. Chris Duncan of Floyd will judge the show. Exhibitors who show the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will receive belt buckles. The top senior and junior showmen will also receive belt buckles.

The four large belt buckles have been donated by the Duncan Hereford Farms. In addition, the exhibitor who has kept the best record book will also receive \$25.

Frontier Farm and Ranch Supply in Clovis has also donated \$50 to help defray costs of producing the show, said Richard Hadley, Texico 4-H Club leader.

"We'd like to invite all area residents to attend the show," said West and Hadley. There will be no admission charge. Texico 4-H Club will have a concession stand available for exhibitors and spectators.

### A local success story

There's been a recent success story in the Twin Cities that ought to be mentioned. It involves Floyd Coates, who's been around these parts quite a few years.

I met Floyd when I first came to the Twin Cities 4 1/2 years back. At the time he was running Oklahoma Lane Farm Supply. I suppose we hit it off pretty well since we both originated from Illinois - he started up in Peoria and I called Chicago my home town.

Anyway, Floyd opened Farwell Farm Supply a couple of years ago. And, with the help of his sons and other hands, he worked at it. And worked at it. And worked at it. And he, with wife Wynona's loyal support, has achieved success.

Often when a man works hard, due to circumstances, he still sometimes can't accomplish his goal. This is often true when there's not enough of a market for the man's services.

But in this case, there was a market. And Floyd, with his years of experience, took advantage of it.

It was hard when he opened his business across the highway from Sherley - Anderson - Pitman. He put in the inventory of parts he could afford, and horse traded for the big pieces of equipment he needed. And he made himself available to fix equipment at nearby farms when called.

He won't talk about it much, but when he opened Farwell Farm Supply there were those who wouldn't have bet a thin dime that he would make out okay. And since he had to pour his first earnings back into the business, it was a time of personal belt tightening.

## Hamlin works to be displayed

Beginning Saturday, the Panhandle - Plains Historical Museum in Canyon, Texas, will feature the collection of the late Judge James D. Hamlin given to the museum in the late 1940's.

Born in Kentucky in 1871, Hamlin came to Amarillo in 1897 while traveling to the Klondike to pan for gold. He was taken by the plains and remained in Amarillo. A Latin and Greek scholar, he gave instruction in the classical languages at the first Amarillo College and was elected its president.

In 1899, Hamlin began the study of law and was admitted to the bar in 1900. Later, he formed a partnership with William Boyce, attorney for the Capitol Freehold Land and Investment Company, which had purchased the three million acre XIT Ranch. The funds raised from the sale of the lands by the State of Texas financed construction of the Texas State Capitol Building in Austin in 1888.

Hamlin was elected County Attorney of Potter County in 1901, and in 1905 moved to

Texico. When Farwell was established in 1906, he began working for the Capitol Syndicate Company where he remained until a few years before his death on Jan. 10, 1950. He also served as Parmer County Judge from 1912 to 1924.

Hamlin began collecting seriously during the late 1920's. "He was probably the first collector with focus in the Panhandle," said Michael Grauer, curator of art.

His interests included Oriental porcelains, bronzes, textiles and ivories, antique furniture (primarily English), European paintings and sculpture, and American art. The significance and quality of his collection indicates the breadth of his cultural interest.

Hamlin traveled a great deal in New Mexico and consequently amassed an impressive collection of art produced there. He acquired works from nearly all of the Taos Founders as well as from Santa Fe artists.

Hamlin served as president

Andria was escorted during half time festivities by the Homecoming King, Byron Martin, who played wing during the boys' game.

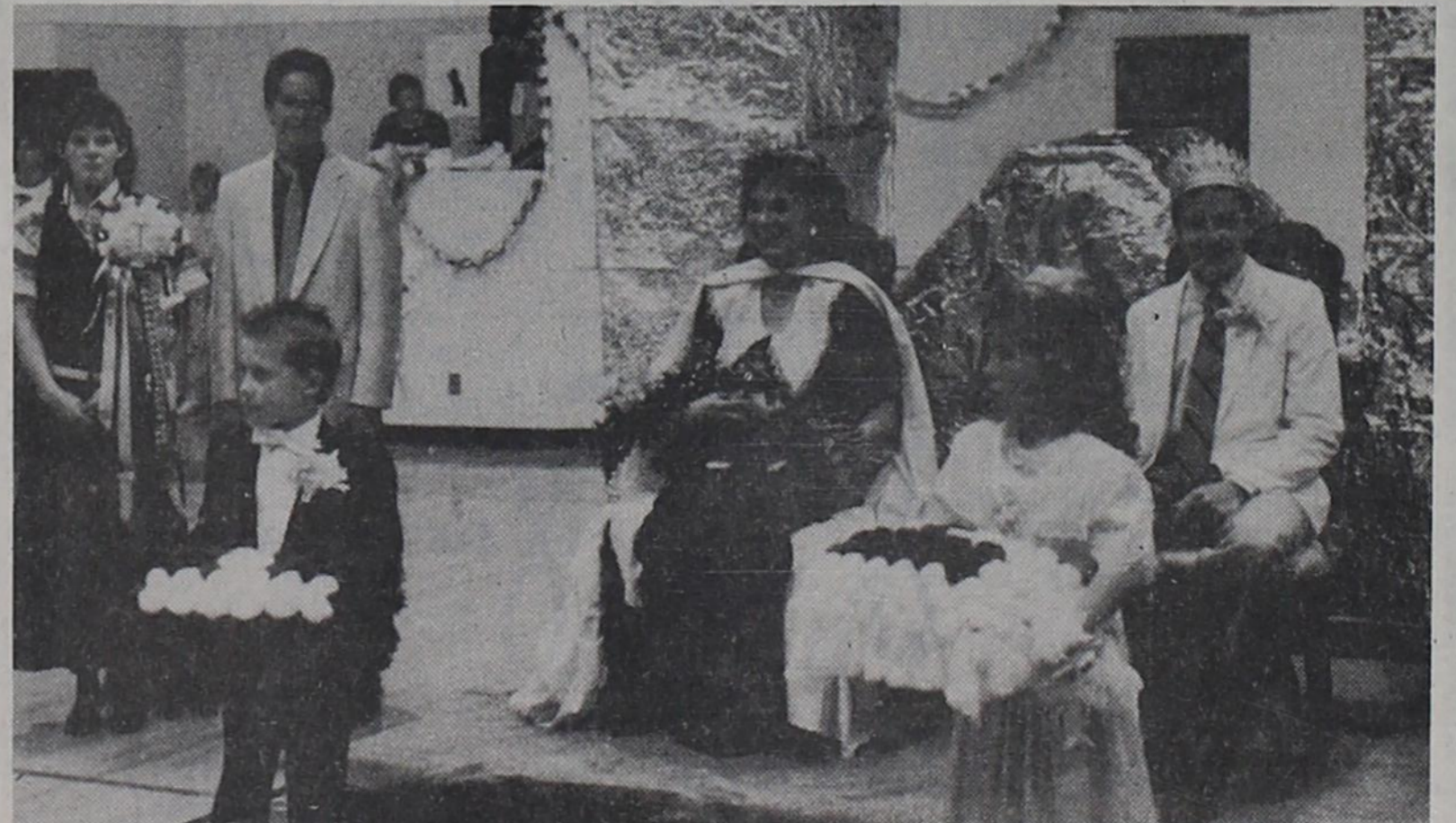

of the Panhandle - Plains Historical Society from 1939 to 1945. During this term, Hamlin announced his intention of giving his collection to the museum. Today, this collec-

tion makes up a large part of the museum's permanent art collection.

The exhibition, entitled *The Eye of the Connoisseur*, will feature the finest pieces of Hamlin's collection and will be exhibited in all three art galleries.

Seventeenth and 18th century decorative furniture, including pieces from the Chippendale and Hepplewhite styles, will be shown in the center gallery.

Paintings and sculpture will be exhibited in the east gallery, including *Portrait of Mrs. Richard (Anne) Hogarth (1735)* by William Hogarth (1697-1764).

The west gallery will feature decorative arts, including 18th Century English silver and Oriental textiles.

The exhibition will continue through August.

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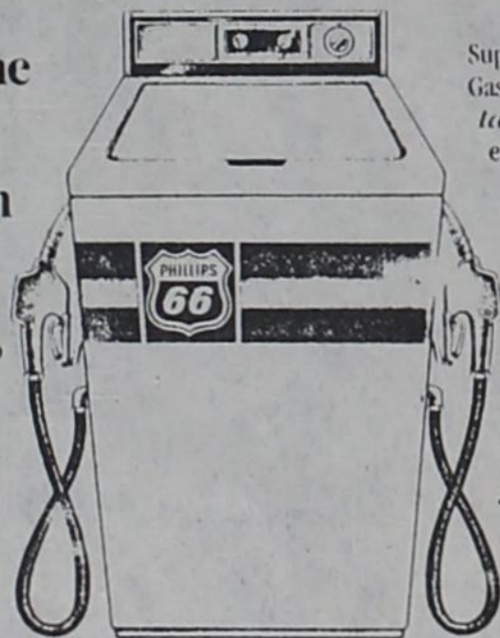


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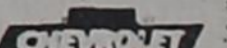
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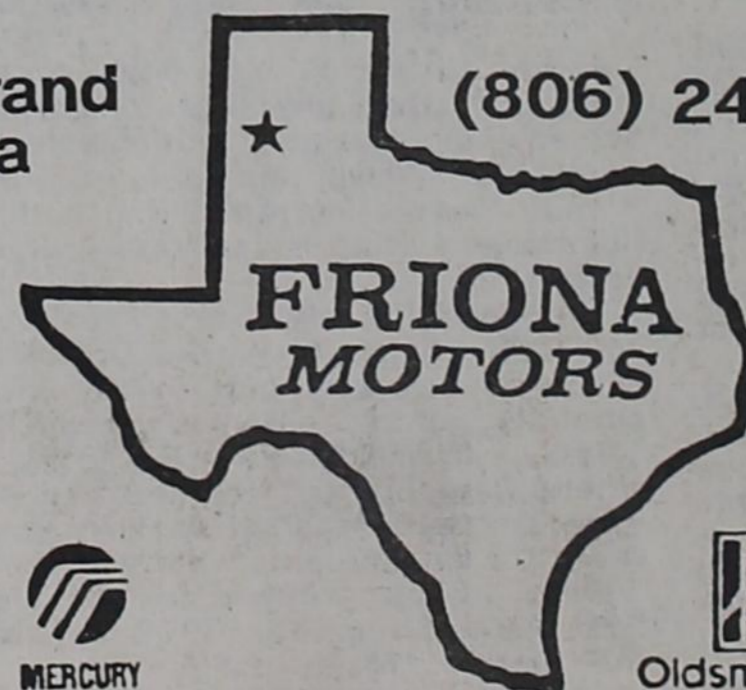

But, to reiterate, he worked at it. If seven days a week were needed, then that's what he gave.

And, today, he has a prosperous business. The best part is that it's a family business, where he is busy training and teaching his sons, Waverly and Kendall.

I guess what put the idea into my head to write this column, and let our local folks know about a success story right here in the Twin Cities, was a comment made by a friend, another local businessman, as we were driving by Floyd's place last Friday night on the way to the Farwell - Hart basketball game.

The friend glanced over at Floyd's place, shook his head and muttered, "O! Floyd's got a real gold mine there."

Did you notice what seemed to be a big grass fire on the west side of Texico, along the highway, last Thursday?

It was burned off on purpose by the Texico Fire Department as a fire safety measure.

Folks here in Texico - Farwell often are asked to buy tickets for various giveaways. Some come from the Texico - Farwell Lions Club. Too often we don't see the "results" of the fund-raisers but just note that we're out one or two dollars in buying the chances.

Well, we ought to remember that those dollars add up - and do a great deal of good when accumulated. Here's a fine example:

The following information came from the chairman of the New Mexico Lions Eye Bank Raffle:

"While New Mexico eye donors increased 23% in 1988, we are still importing in excess of 75% of our transplanted corneas from other states. 192 sight-restoring corneal transplants were performed through the efforts of our Eye Bank last year. The waiting list continues to average 70 patients."

So folks who bought tickets, even if they didn't win anything, should know that they are winners. Every one of them. Because they helped in efforts to restore the sight of our fellow citizens.

And this is just one example. But it's good to keep in mind when a group such as Rotary (which is in the midst of a worldwide fund-raiser to help eradicate polio) or ESA (which just had a fund-raiser to help El Rancho de los Ninos) or other local organizations stop by and ask you to take a chance on a giveaway. They are all important.

If you are able, please help. We'd like to comment on some of the fine basketball shown in our area this year. Roy King obviously has

done a great job as his Lady Wolverines have a 17-game winning streak as they head into the state playoffs.

And Curt Cook has been no slouch with his Wolverines. The team improved a 0-10 district mark last year to 5-5 this year. That's excellent.

Larry Gregory has guided the Farwell Steers to a playoff berth in Class 2-A although the Steers are the smallest of 239 Class 2-A schools in Texas. What is even more remarkable is that the Steers are listed No. 10 in the state. We were told this is the first time in quite awhile, if ever, that Farwell was ranked statewide in the top 10 in boys' basketball.

And our Bovina boys' team won district and start playoff action Feb. 24 at Amarillo High against Lakeview. Let's win state, fellas!

Who says prayer doesn't work?

When the Texico Wolverines landed in a 3-way tie for second place in district, it fell upon coach Curt Cook's shoulders to drive to Portales and draw for the team's position.

If he drew second place, his team would have to face one opponent before moving up to regional play. If he drew third or fourth place, his team would have to defeat three opponents if they were to get into regional play.

Coach Cook really felt the weight of responsibility on his shoulders as he drove to Portales. "I prayed all the way," he said.

When he got there, he reached in and drew the No. 2, and let out a sigh of relief. After the Melrose and Floyd coaches drew numbers 3 and 4, Cook felt like celebrating.

In the Farwell game Tuesday against Abernathy, Jeff Actkinson didn't have one of his better games. But with less than a minute go in the game, he made a crucial play of tipping away a layup by the Abernathy center that would have brought them back to

The point here is that even when you don't have a great game, and miss shots, etc., it's so important to keep your head in the game. You never know when you can make the big play your team needs. But you have to hang in there.

The dinner is being donated by Rhone Poulenc Ag. Chemical Co.

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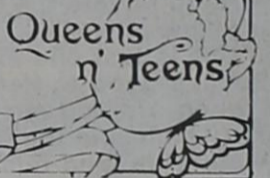


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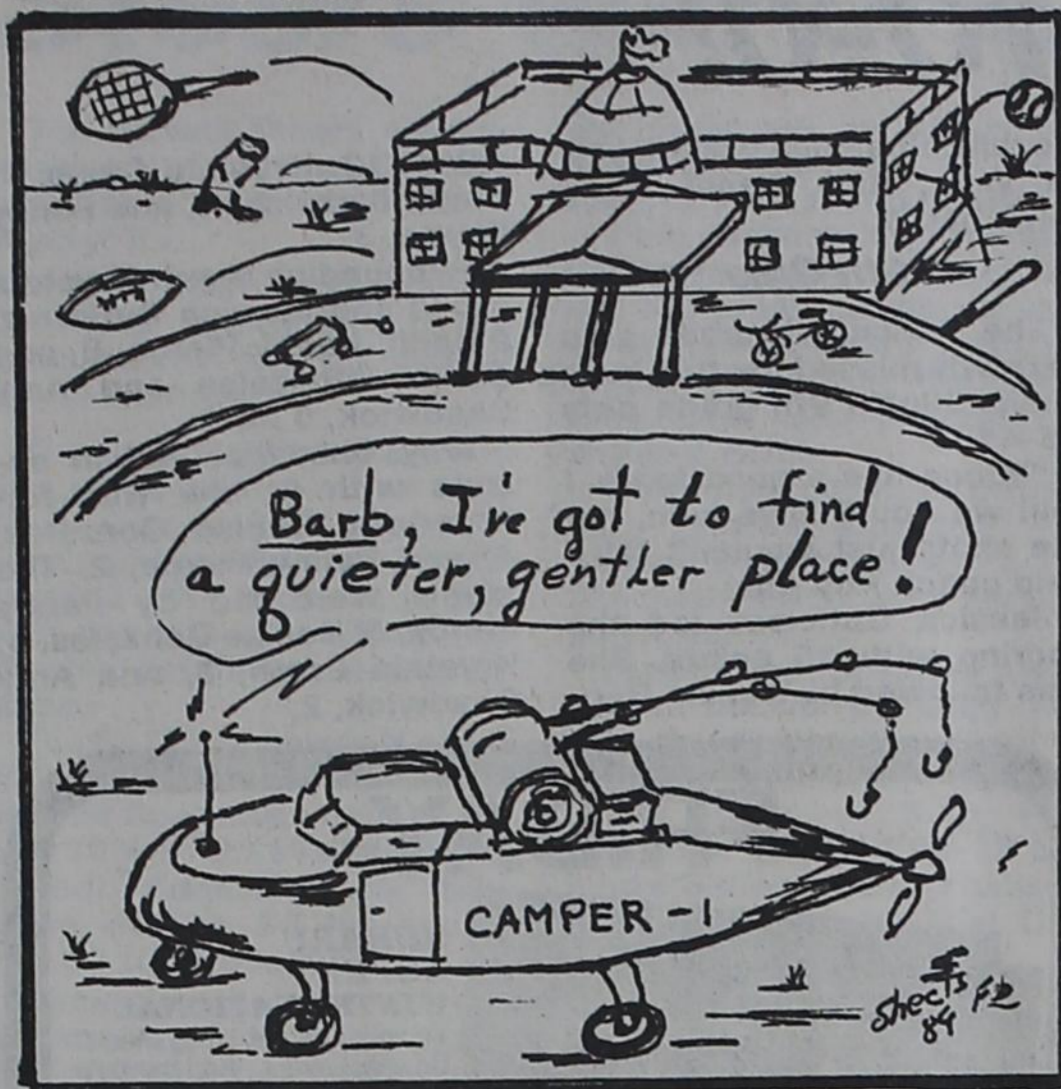

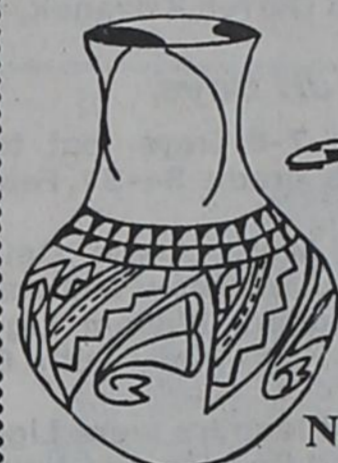

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# Steers win playoff to earn state berth

The Farwell Steers accomplished a major goal Tuesday night: they made the Class 2-A playoffs.

Farwell downed Abernathy, 54-50, at Sudan, in a battle between the teams that tied for second place.

The Steers will play a practice game at 6 p.m. on Feb. 18 in Denver City. They will play against Midland Greenwood, a 3A school. It is the only practice game they are allowed before the bi-district game.

The Bi-District playoff game will see the Steers pitted against Seagraves on Feb. 24 at 7:30 p.m. at Levelland High School. Admission for this game will be \$3 for adults and \$2 for students.

Farwell now has a 26-5 season mark, is listed 3rd in the Lubbock newspaper poll of area teams, and 10th in the state of Texas.

A huge crowd of Texico - Farwell folks turned out for the game, which pitted Farwell, the smallest Class 2-A school in Texas, against Abernathy, one of the biggest. The two teams had split their games during district play.

It didn't look good for the Steers as the Antelopes, who finished their season at 18-9, jumped off to a 15-8 lead at the end of the first quarter. Farwell stayed in

the doldrums as Abernathy increased its lead to 20-8 early in the second quarter.

Then came a key decision by Coach Larry Gregory. He put the press on, and it was effective. In about a minute's time, Farwell stole the ball 3 times and Farwell closed to within a point.

Then missed free throws hurt Farwell and the Antelopes went back up 25-19. The half ended with Farwell down, 25-21.

Farwell kept plugging away and a bucket by Greg Actkinson knotted the score at 6:52 of the third quarter, 25-all. Then, at 5:10, Farwell took the lead 29-27 behind a Shawn Stewart basket. A 3-pointer by Michael Day moved Farwell up by 5.

Abernathy used its strong perimeter shooting to notch 4 3-pointers, including one at the buzzer, and took the lead back 41-38 as the third quarter ended.

The 4th quarter started with a crucial 3-pointer by Monty Delgado, tying the game. The game stayed nip and tuck until, with only 1:27 left, a Greg Actkinson basket put Farwell up, 51-59.

With a minute left, Greg Actkinson rebounded a missed Steer free throw, turned and scored, upping the lead to 53-49. A free throw by Jeff Actkinson ended the scoring.

Coach Gregory emphasized

that the winning season was a team effort and even though some players didn't play against Abernathy, they contribute at team practices, etc. Scoring were: Stewart, 16 points; Dustin Hardage, 4; Greg Actkinson, 14; J. Actkinson, 1; Day, 9, and Delgado, 10.

Farwell defeated Hart 68-59 last Friday night to earn a tie in district for second place and set up the playoff game against Abernathy (story above).

"This was a big win," said coach Larry Gregory. The victory brought the Steers to a 7-3 district record and a 25-5 season record.

Scoring were: Michael Day, Shawn Stewart, and Monte Delgado, 15 each; Greg Actkinson, 14; Jeff Actkinson, 6; Dustin Hardage, 2; Curtis Chisom, 2.

Farwell jumped out to a hefty 16-point lead in the first half before the Longhorns fought back.

After continually chipping away at the Steer lead, Hart was only down by two points when Monty Delgado sank a crucial 3-pointer midway through the final period. That basket seemed to change the momentum back into Farwell's favor.

Moments later, Delgado followed up with another key basket as Farwell expanded its lead.

Although the Steers missed several free throws in the fi-

nal minutes, Hart was unable to close the gap.

"We really appreciated the fans that made the trip to Hart for this game. It made a difference," said Gregory. "Our team has had their backs against the wall the whole season, and the fans have helped to make the difference."

There were almost as many Farwell fans as there were Hart fans.

Farwell's JV lost to Hart 67-43.

"The team played well the first 1 1/4 quarters, then we went out of control. We went from being down by 3 points to being down 11 points at the end of the first half," said coach Rex Cumpton.

Cumpton praised his leading scorers: Adrian Smith, Darren Haseloff, and Shannon Pool.

"I hope they keep improving over the next 9 months, because we will be seeing some of these JV boys moving up to the varsity next year," he said.

## Varsity Girls

The Farwell Steerettes ended their season with a 66-39 loss to Hart.

The first half was very difficult for the Steerettes. Hart took a decisive lead in the first half, and even though the Steerettes outscored Hart 21-12 in the third quarter and played even with them in the fourth, the Hart ladies still

# Volleyball, baseball supported, but . . .

It doesn't look promising for the Farwell Schools to add volleyball and baseball to its athletic program.

At the School Board meeting Feb. 9, Supt. John Grigsby reported that although students showed a lot of interest in both programs, the problem is in the lack of nearby schools having those programs. Thus, if Farwell went ahead with the programs they wouldn't be UIL-sanctioned. Farwell would have to play an independent schedule and be unable to qualify for state playoffs. Farwell would have to seek pickup games with other schools.

It's too late to have either program this year and Grigsby was pessimistic on the future, although Farwell

officials will continue to talk to other schools.

School districts which have volleyball and baseball would be unlikely to add Farwell to their conferences because of the great distance between them and Farwell. To be blunt, they wouldn't want to send their athletes that far.

The suggestion of adding the two athletic programs was made at a School Board late last year by Chacho Arce. So school officials have checked into it.

In other business, a report on enrollment projects was submitted by Information Management Systems of Lansing, Mich.

Grigsby displayed a graph showing a 5-year projection: overall, the district enroll-

ment will be stable. The elementary population will decrease, the high school enrollment will decline, then increase, and there will be a big hike in the junior high.

It appears more classrooms will be needed to handle the junior high increase.

The projection that Grigsby discussed had a 1/2% room for error, according to the report.

Thus, the School Board may consider a building program. Toward this end, they picked a financial advisor, Bob Davis, of Southwest Securities.

Meanwhile, the board is considering major roof and window repairs. A Kress, Texas, man will write specifications for the window repairs; he recently did the same job for Bovina Schools. And a Lubbock man will write specifications for roof repairs. Then bids will be sought.

There's a possibility the board may seek a bond issue for building new classrooms and some of these repairs.

Farwell has \$60,000 on hand for repairs and this money will be used first.

Last Monday, the board asked for funds from the Per-

manent School Fund, controlled by the Parmer County Commissioners (see story elsewhere in today's issue).

The board also:

- Okayed the senior class trip to Houston.
- Tabled a discussion with the Farwell Country Club over the club's request for a waiver on taxes owed.
- Entered into a purchasing agreement with a group of other Texas Schools to allow bulk purchases of paper products. Farwell used to buy a lot of material from Clovis Schools, but Clovis ended its program.
- Approved the annual performance report.
- Agreed to increase the district's participation in employee's insurance, from \$25 to \$50, for those employees in its new group insurance carrier, American Underwriters. The board also

contracted with Susan Morrison to represent Farwell in its lawsuit (along with several other Texas schools) against its former insurance carrier.

- Approved having an open house March 13 during Public School Week.

- Scheduled the School Board election. The posts currently held by Steve Pierson and Richard Haseloff will be on the ballot. They are for 3-year terms.

- Noted that the failure rate has dramatically increased at Farwell High and school officials are checking into it.

- Noted that board members Joe Schilling, Doyle John-

son, Roberta Johnson, Steve Kaltwasser, Katherine White, and Grigsby, will attend a workshop in Lubbock this month on finance, legislative concerns, state board actions, etc. Two or three board members also may attend a workshop on effective schools in March.

- Renewed the contracts of the three principals: Jerry Owen, David Reynolds and James Craig.

- Renewed the contract of athletic director Rex Cumpston and increased it from 11 to 12 months to recognize the fact that he has been working at it year-round.
