Getting what they ask for

My better half, Judy, a former junior high school teacher, was in a feisty mood this week. Here are her comments:

There is nothing wrong with the American public schools. Parents are getting exactly what they have requested.

It seems that every day there is an indictment of the American public education system on radio or television or in print. Taking pot shots at the schools is a national pastime. But, the fact is that we are getting just what we have asked for.

Critics hold aloft the speed with which Japanese students calculate math problems, and the fluency with which German children conjugate verbs in a half dozen languages. They point at our children as lazy failures.

But would we want the suicide rate Japan faces with its college bound students? Do we want to raise a nation of parrots who can repeat memorized answers in rapid succession? Or do we want something else?

The only question is, "Do we really want what we've asked for, or do we want

something else?" The first thing American parents seem to have requested is national day care. Children are now sent to school at earlier and earlier ages, and they are expected to stay in the institutionalized setting longer and longer. Generations ago students went to school only long enough to learn the basics of decoding basic reading and math; after that, they were on their own to learn from books. Today we feel that students can only learn from teachers.

Since it takes at least two salaries to provide the homes, cars, color television sets, and other necessities of modern American life, we must turn our children over to institutions. Some children are greatly improved by this system; some aren't.

The second thing that American parents seem to want from the schools is entertainment. Each school is expected to put on a weekly athletic contest for public viewing. There are periodic band concerts and plays to excite the public, too.

A third thing requested by parents is proof of mastered facts. Today, the schools are under pressure from the general public to prove that each student has mastered each point that the teachers have attempted to teach. Unfortunately, kids are like the rest of us. They forget what they don't practice daily. And they especially forget what they don't think they will use.

The scariest thing we ask of the schools is that they keep our children from making the same mistakes we have made. We want our children perfect when we ourselves are not. The children are instructed in health, safety, driver's education, sex education, drug and alcohol problems to name only a few. The message is strong in our schools: "Don't do what we do kids, do what we say."


National statistics show that after years of scuh education, some categories of health and safety statistics are improved by such instruction. But, if the instruction at school is not backed up by the behavior the children see at home, the time spent on such instruction is wasted.

All in all, we'd better beware of what we ask of the schools. It might be just what we get.





Farwell High School is in

the process of setting up a program for its gifted and talented students. The proposal will soon be brought to the school board for acceptance.

The proposed program will be called the DISCOVERY program. It will attempt to offer more opportunity to the most highly gifted students than they are currently getting in the regular classroom.

There will be three types of activities used in the program. First, new experiences will be offered to large groups. Second, there will be in-depth investigation of topics that students have experienced. Third, there will be individual investigations in an area beyond what the group has accomplished.

The new DISCOVERY program will aim at meeting state guidelines for gifted and talented programs. The state law requires that identified students spend 150 minutes per week (an average of 30 minutes per day) on study that is not part of the regular classroom activity. This study may be accomplished as part of a regular class, in classrooms devoted to the DISCOVERY program during 5A/5B, or on locally or regionally sponsored field trips or seminars.

'Discovery' being organized

In the regular classroom, the documented activity may be an alternate activity, an enrichment activity, or an individual investigation that has been coordinated by the DISCOVERY staff.

In the DISCOVERY classrooms, activities will be varied. Some process skills will be explored. Research techniques, critical thinking, and creative thinking are examples of process skills that might be done.

Some exploratory activities will be presented to the majority of the students. Groups may form voluntarily to pursue a topic of mutual interest. Then individual projects may grow from ideas generated from the group discus-

When and if no group activity is scheduled, and sufficient time has been documented on DISCOVERY then students may work on their regular homework.

Four times this year, some students in the DISCOVERY program will participate in seminars sponsored by the Region XVI G/T Coop.

In summary, students will be guided in pursuit of their own interests. Regular classes will be individualized for DIS-COVERY students. Students in the program will have to make a commitment of time and energy to this opportunity for their development.

children 10 and under.

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
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



Pumpkin crop termed 'good'

For the second straight year, the bulk of the demand for pumpkins, gourds and ornamental squash is being met by farmers on the Texas High Plains, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This year as last, the High Plains is one of the few production areas in the nation with a good pumpkin crop, says Dr. Roland E. Roberts, vegetable specialist with the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Producers in Parmer, Bailey, Floyd, Hale and Lubbock

counties have some 1,500 acres of pumpkins of pumpkins and ornamental squash this eyar. For days, trucks loaded with these products have been scurrying to markets as far away as Connecticut, Vermont, and the Carolinas, and to all parts of Texas and the Southwest.

"There was too much rain in the nation's northeast, too little rain in the southwest, and too much heat in central and south Texas," for a good crop this year, Roberts said.

"On the Texas High Plains, we have some good quality, but not as high a yield as usual. A week of wet weather, the second week in September, was detrimental to finishing our pumpkin crop," he said. The rains also prolonged the harvest of the mature pumpkins and some some fields had to be

Even with the short supply nationally, most producers here are seeing only a sight increase in their price, Roberts said. When supplies are plentiful, growers may get four to four - an - a half cents a pound," he said.

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

1 1/2 c. sugar

1 can (1 lb.) pumpkin (2 cups)

3 eggs

1/2 c. salad oil 1 c. water

1 1/2 c. all purpose flour 1 1/2 c. whole wheat flour

1 1/2 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. salt

1 c. coarsely chopped nuts Conventional oven directions

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Low interest loans provided in Texas

Texas voters will have the opportunity to vote Nov. 7 to continue the agricultural water conservation equipment loan program, by approval of Proposition 18, which provides low interest loans to irrigators to upgrade irrigation equipment to reduce water losses during irrigation delivery and application.

Under the program, groundwater conservation districts and soil and water conservation districts throughout the state can borrow money from the Texas Water Development Board and then lend the funds at the same interest rate to qualified borrowers within their service areas.

gram. During the past three years, approximately 150 irrigators have benefited from the pilot agricultural loan program. They have used the funds to purchase equipment which upgraded their irrigation application efficiencies. This improved efficiency has resulted in groundwater savings of more than 25,000 acre-feet – enough water to support a city of 150,000 for about one year.

Deep percolation, evaporation and tailwater runoff have historically resulted in high water losses for irrigators. A typical borrower under the pilot loan program has used proceeds from the loan to upgrade from furrow irrigation to a more efficient LEPA center pivot irrigation system, saving annual water losses of more than 150 acre-feet - enough water to serve the needs of a town of 800 people for a year.

Center pivot sprinkler systems, surge valves, low pressure drip irrigation equipment, soil moisture monitoring equipment, furrow dikers, laser land leveling equipment and underground pipelines are among the water conservation equipment eligible for purchase under the loan program.

The loans are secured by a first lien on the equipment purchased, plus a lien on the property where the equipment is installed. After three and a half years with more than \$4 million loaned, there have been no late payments or defaults.

In addition to the groundwater savings, District officials credit the pilot agricultural loan program with three major benefits. First, interest in more efficient irrigation has been stimulated by the availability of low-interest funds. Second,

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
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low-interest rates have encouraged qualified irrigators to purchase more efficient irrigation equipment; and third, those irrigators that have upgraded their irrigation systems have demonstrated to their neighbors that increased water use efficiency is possible, along with a reduction in energy and labor costs which occurs as a part of the improved water use efficiency.

A Constitutional Amendment approved by Tayas voters in

A Constitutional Amendment approved by Texas voters in November 1985 provided for the sale of up to \$200 million in bonds to fund the agricultural water conservation equipment loan program. Voter approval of Proposition 18 on this year's Nov. 7 ballot will remove the expiration date on the program by repealing subsection (e) of Article III, Section 50-d of the Texas Constitution.

Texas legislators originally set a two-year evaluation period (1985-1987) for the pilot agricultural water conservation equipment loan program. However, the evaluation period was extended until August 31, 1989. During the 71st Texas Legislative Session, satisfied with the results of the pilot program, Senate Joint Resolution 44 was passed to remove the time limitations on the agricultural water conservation loan program upon voter approval of the proposed Texas Constitutional Amendment.

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



Connie Moyers of SPS presented her annual Festive Foods cooking demonstration in conjunction with Rochelle White of the County Extension Agency at the Farwell Community Center on Oct. 26.

Mrs. Moyers demonstrated several quick and tasty recipes that are great for holiday hospitality. All of the recipes were prepared with electrical appliances of some kind. Here are some of the recipes she presented.

Yellow Squash - Zucchini Dip

2 medium yellow squash

2 medium zucchini

1 large onion

2 Tbs margarine 1 roll garlic cheese (6 oz.)

1 roll jalapeno cheese (6 oz.) 1 can Cheddar Cheese soup (11 oz.)

Coarsely chop squash and onion. Melt margarine in a large saucepan. Add chopped vegetables and saute until tender

crisp, cube cheese and add along with soup stirring until blended and thoroughly heated. Serve warm with tortilla chips. Microwave preparation: In a large casserole, melt mar-

garine for 30 seconds on high. Add chopped vegetables and saute 2 - 3 minutes on high until vegetables are tender crisp. Cube cheese and add soup. Microwave 3 - 5 minutes on high, stirring once, or until well blended and thoroughly heated.

Mulled Apple Juice

6 inches stick cinnamon, broken

1 tsp. allspice 1 tsp. whole cloves

10 c. (2 1/2 quarts) apple juice

1/3 c. honey or packed brown sugar cinnamon stick decorations (optional)

Tie broken cinnamon, allspice and cloves in a cheesecloth. In a 31/2 to six quart crockery cooker, combine spice bag, apple juice and sweetening. Cover; cook on low heat for 5-6 hours or on high for 2 1/2 - 3 hours. Remove spice bag and discard. Serve punch in mugs with cinnamon - stick stirers, if desired. Makes 10 (8 oz.) servings.

Use the crockery slow cooker as a punch bowl and keep this spicy drink warm all party long.

Santa Fe Chicken and Rice 6 boneless chicken breast halves, skin removed

1 tsp. salt

1 large onion, coarsely chopped 3 garlic cloves, minced

1 Tbs. vegetable oil 1 1/4 c. chicken broth

1 c. milk red salsa or picante sauce 1 c. Uncle Ben's converted Rice

1 ripe avocado, peeled and sliced (optional) 1 medium tomato

3/4 c. (3 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese Sprinkle chicken breasts with salt; set aside. Cook onion and garlic in oil in electric skillet for 2 minutes. Add chicken broth and salsa. Bring to a boil. Stir in rice. Arrange chicken breasts over rice. Cover tightly and simmer 20 minutes. Remove from heat. Let stand covered until all liquid is absorbed about 5 minutes. Garnish with avocado, tomato, and cheese. Makes six servings.

Broccoli with Pimiento - Cheese Sauce

2 pkg. frozen broccoli spears (10 oz. each)

1 can (10 3/4 oz.) cream of mushroom soup, undiluted

1/2 c. butter, softened 1 Tbs. lemon juice

1/2 c. (2 oz.) shredded sharp Cheddar Cheese

1 c. crushed cheese - flavored crackers

1/4 c. slivered almonds or chopped pecans

1 jar (2 oz.) chopped pimento

Cook broccoli according to package directions; arrange in buttered, shallow 1 1/2 quart casserole. Combine soup, butter, lemon juice, and cheese; spoon over broccoli. Top with cheese cracker crumbs, almonds, and pimento. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Makes 6 -8 servings.

Microwave directions: Cook broccoli in microwave according to package directions; arrange in greased 1 1/2 quart casserole. Soften butter in microwave on high for 45- 60 seconds. Combine butter, lemon juice, and cheese; spoon over broccoli. Microwave on high for 4 -5 minutes. Top with cheese crackers, almonds, and pimiento. Microwave on high 1 - 2 minutes or until hot and bubbly.

Note: Use food processor to crumble cheese crackers, shred cheese and chop nuts. Asparagus or other cooked

vegetables may be substituted for broccoli.

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Environmentalists busy

Here's the latest from Plains Cotton Growers:

Agricultural interests, to a degree, were caught napping in 1985 when environmental activitists inserted "sodbuster" and "swampbuster" provisions into that year's Food Security Act.

Other than care requirements on set-aside acreage.

that was the first time in the history of farm programs that soil conservation measures were mandated in farm law as a condition of eligibility for program benefits.

As development of the 1990 farm bill gains momentum, the environmentalists are out in force. Their major objective, it appears, may be to tighten the sodbuster and swampbuster sections of the 1985 law while adding a "chemical buster" section to the 1990 act. If left to write the law on their own, many believe the use of agricultural chemicals in production agriculture will be on the way out.

Frank Jones, of Lamesa, a long-time PCG director serves as chairman of the National Cotton Council's Environmental Task Force. Jones said the NCC group is closely monitoring various environmental legislative initiatives and, the political climate being what it is, has agreed that simply being against the proposals will not be enough.

Instead, Jones said agriculture "has got to be FOR something." As an example of proposals threatening agriculture, he used a food safety bill introduced by Henry Waxman (D-Calif.) and another offered by George Brown (D-Calif.). Both are efforts to impose on producers substantially more restrictive procedures for regulating chemical use without due regard for the adverse effect on maintaining the production of an abundant, healthy, reasonably priced food supply. Yet both have the support of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Environmental Protection Agency.

As an alternative, Jones said, his task force and the NCC will support legislation introduced by House Agriculture Committee Chairman Kika de la Garza (D-Texas) and Ranking Minority Member Ed Madigan (R-III.). The bill, by amending two current laws, would establish

a new and less cumbersome process for pesticide rule-making. It would also add a consistent and uniform method of evaluating pesticides and removing from the market those proven hazardous.

Thirty-nine members of the Agriculture Committee are original co-sponsors of de la Garza's bill which, in his own words, is aimed at the Committee's top priority "restoring public confidence in the safety of our food supply."

To that, Jones would add, "...without denying producers the use of perfectly safe chemicals we need to stay in business."
