For the first time in my life I've lost a friend due to death, Bob Stovall.

I was reading the Lubbock paper Monday when I saw the obituary. It saddened me.

Bob was one of the finest persons I've met in my life. To call him a good, Christian person would be very appropriate.

He's the fella who helped set up our printing operation in the back of the newspaper office. Without his generous aid, there was no way I could have done it.

I remember the day I met him, at the auction of Curtis Smith's office supply business in Farwell 3 1/2 years ago.

I was interested in buying an antiquated press at the auction. Since I didn't know anything about the printing business I called a fella I knew in Clovis who agreed to meet me before the auction to look at the press and say if it could be made into running shape.

That fella didn't show up. Instead, I met Bob at the auction. He plugged in the machine and it started. He eyeballed it and said he thought it could be made operable. I asked him if he would help me get it going and he said yes.

He kept his word. And he wouldn't take a penny for his help. It just made him feel good to help another individual.

It took six months to get our 35-year-old press operational. Bob made several trips from Muleshoe here to help repair it. And I'll always remember that Sunday in the middle of December when he fixed the last two components on the press to make it run decently.

That was an apprehensive time for me. I had plowed several thousands of dollars into setting up the printing shop despite not knowing whether the press would ever function! If it hadn't, I would have had some expensive egg on my face - to say the least.

But, as the song goes, ya gotta have faith. And Bob used his years of experience into getting that ol' press to run right. And he helped me keep it in running shape ever since.

During the past three years, Judy and I had gotten to know Bob and Eva Nell well. They worked hard, not only at their business, but also in civic endeavors. The City of Muleshoe has lost a lot in Bob's death.

Bob Stovall was the kind of man many of us should aspire to be like.

I'll miss him.

Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas and the City Council have proclaimed Kellie Anderson as Farwell's 1990 official Sweetheart.

They presented Kellie with a proclamation which reads in part:
