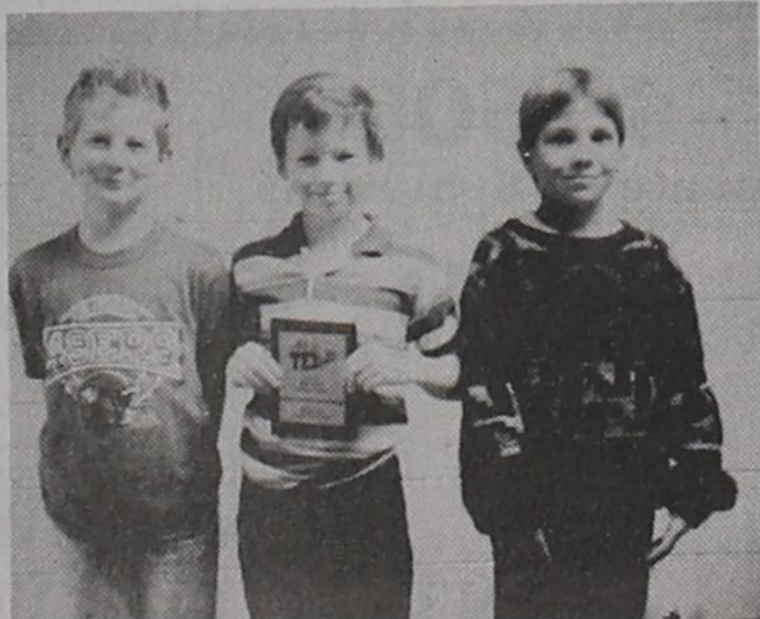
Texico top spellers listed

Texico residents go to the polls Tuesday for a rather unusual city election.

Voters go to the Texico Community Center between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

The election is different because of the number of write-in candidates.

There are four posts on the ballot:

1) A City Council post currently held by Butch Tharp, who is seeking re-election unopposed.

2) A City Council post currently held by Oran Jay Autrey, who is unopposed for election.

3) A City Council post that has been held by Doyal LaRue. Seeking this post are two write-in candidates: Karen Kosier and Ronnie War-muth.

4) The mayor post that has been held by Steve Chancy. Seeking this post are two write-in candidates: Kathy Dionne and Doyal LaRue.

There will be spaces on the ballot for write-in votes, although the candidates' names will not be listed. The names will be listed on a bulletin board in the polling place.

No other write-in candi-

dates will be accepted. The four listed above signed up as official write-in candidates before the Jan. 23 deadline. Thus, Autrey and Tharp are automatically re-elected.

City Clerk Marie Christian has said that even if a name is misspelled as a write-in, it still will be counted because the law says the "intent" should be used as the decision on whether to count a vote.

Election officials will be Mae Stone, Theodora Rojas and Bernice Thigpen. Steve Chancy is the alternate.

Filing period opens for four elections

The filing period for the May 5 local elections has opened and here's an early look at the races. The filing period ends March 21.

For the first time, three elections will be held at the same place - Farwell Community Center. Those elections are for Farwell Hospital District Board, Farwell School Board and Farwell City Council.

Lazbuddie School Board

There are two seats open in the Lazbuddie School board election. They are currently held by Melvin Morris and Jerry Engelking.

Candidates wishing to run for election must register at the Lazbuddie school office.

No one had signed up for the election by last Friday.

The election will take place on May 5 at the Lazbuddie School auditorium.

Farwell Hospital District Board

There are four posts open on the Farwell Hospital District Board. They are currently held by Bert Williams, Troy Christian, Tom Nichols, and Frances Kube.

As of last Friday, only Bert Williams had filed for the election.

Those wishing to file may do so at the District Clerk's office in the Parmer County Clerk's office in the courthouse.

Farwell School Board

There are two seats on the Farwell School Board up for election this year. They are held by Roberta Johnson and Joe Schilling.

Both Schilling and Mrs. Johnson have said they will not seek re-election.

As of last Friday, no one had filed for either position.

Those wishing to file may do so at the Farwell School Administration Building.

Farwell City Council

As of last Friday, only one candidate had filed for election so far. Incumbent Martin Kube has filed to run again for alderman.

There are two other alder-

manic positions on the ballot. These seats currently are held by Fred Chandler and Gloria Hutchins.

Those interested in running for one of the three City Council posts may file at City Hall.

Bivins touches base in Farwell

State Sen. Teel Bivins visited Farwell Feb. 22 to touch base with his constituents before this winter's special session of the legislature convened.

The special session will deal with two important issues: school financing, and the election of state district judges.

Both of these issues have been dumped back into the laps of legislators because the courts ruled that in each case the legislators had written statutes that were not enforceable.

Bivins met with the Farwell School Board and the school administrators first on Thursday afternoon to hear their views on school financing.

Then he met with members of the community at the Farwell Community Center. Below is a summary of the public meeting.

According to Bivins, no clear plan has come forward to solve the school financing problem.

"All of the plans are 'guaranteed yield' plans," said Bivins.

In each case, the legislators will have to establish: 1. What is a substantial tax effort? and 2. How much money does it take to give a child in Texas a quality education?

In each case, the state would make up the difference for school systems where the spread is large.

"My job is to go down and speak for the small school districts. Farwell wouldn't benefit at all from a plan like the Bullock plan," said Bivins.

"Urban areas are talking about consolidating any school district under 1,600 students," he said.

Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas suggested that tuition be charged to raise funds for schools.

"I am not sure it is consti-

tutional," replied Bivins.

Bivins then suggested that counties try to equalize the school funding to all districts within their own county first, and then compare counties in the state.

Phil Garrett then brought up the point that his school district overlaps into two counties. "What would we do then?" he asked.

Bivins replied that there are some districts in Texas that cross five county lines.

He noted that "members of the State Legislature will look for creative ways to raise money instead of passing a tax," he said.

Parmer County Treasurer Anne Norton brought up the point that "everyone who attends school is not a property owner. We need a more equitable taxing system in the schools."

Bivins offered the opinion that the economy is bouncing back in Texas, and in a short time the state budget crunch will lessen.

The other half of the session will be concerned with the election of state district judges. Federal Judge Buntion had ruled that the current method of selection was in-

Students form joint stock venture

Students at Texico Elementary have formed a joint stock venture to operate a school store for the building. They are selling, pencils, pens, erasers, notebooks and other small items that students need.

Each class sent two representatives to a meeting where five students were elected to the board of directors of the new corporation. The board ordered stock for the school store, figured a mark up for the corporation, and "hired" managers and clerks from the elementary school population.

They are selling shares of stock in their corporation for \$5.

The corporation was loaned a cash register by a restaurant in Clovis. The students running the store are learning to make change by counting back the difference between the price on the cash register and amount of money they have been given.

The board of directors meets at lunch time to make plans for the store.

During math class, book store sponsor Mr. Dale Swartz helps the students work on

the balance sheet and inventory.

School secretary Mrs. Rosa Loera is the "banker." The board deposits money in Mrs. Loera's bank (the school account) each week.

"You should have been here the other day when three teachers were chatting away while they were buying items at the school store. They told the student running the store that the price for the items they wanted was \$6.80. He got out his paper and pencil and showed them that the price was \$7.20," said Mr. Swartz proudly.

Registration scheduled

March 8 is the day to register children for next year's Farwell kindergarten and pre-kindergarten classes. Registration will be in the elementary library from 1 to 4 p.m.

All children who will be four and five years of age by Sept. 1 and live in the Farwell School District need to register for next year's classes.

To register, a child must have immunization records and a birth certificate. Only official copies of birth certificates are accepted and must have been obtained from state offices.

Sarah Owen, school nurse, will be available to review immunization records during registration.

If 15 or more pre-kindergarten students are identified, pre-kindergarten must be offered. Requirements are:

Four years old prior to Sept. 1, unable to speak or comprehend English, or is from a family whose income, according to state standards, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced-price lunches) and is a Farwell School District resident.

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday approved insurance contracts with Ethridge Spring and Town & Country insurance agencies.

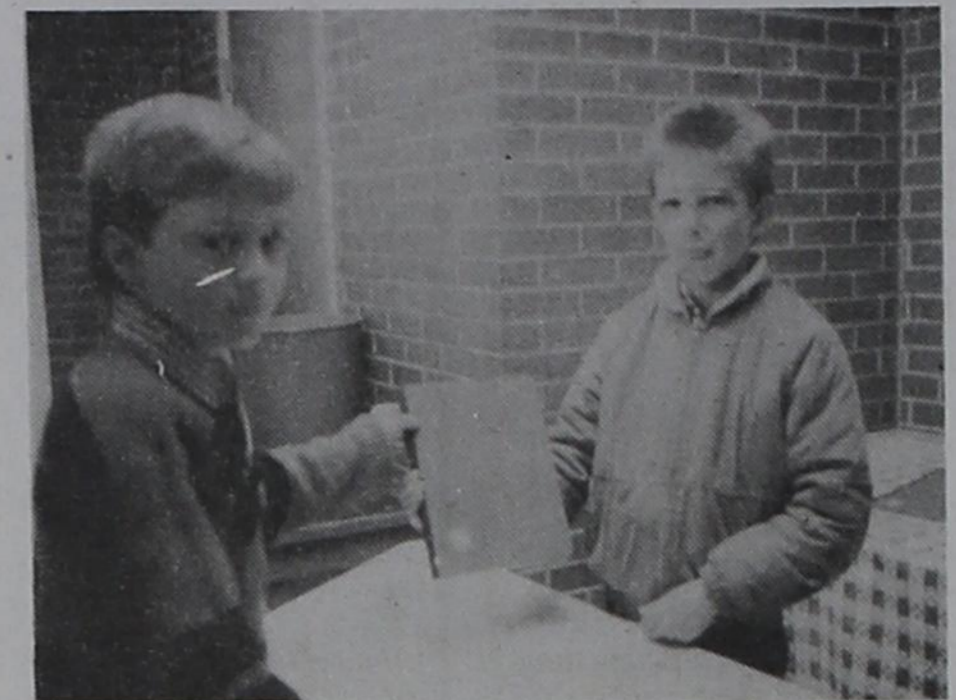

equitable.

"We are all fed up with federal judges writing our laws for us," said Bivins.

This comes up just one year before Texas will be redistricted, using 1990 census data.

"I feel my constituents want to see elected judges," he said.

Bivins noted that in large urban areas, voters are asked to choose from as many as 60 candidates for judge, but that is not the case in his district. "People know who is running for judge here in Parmer County," said Bivins. "It is critical to have the best people on the bench."

Garrett asked if House Bill 72 was constitutional since it mandated changes in school financing without funding the changes.

"I will attach a floor bill to all bills that there shall be no state mandates without funding," said Bivins. "I represent 29 counties, and 75% of the school districts in them are poor districts."

Gikas raised the question of landfills. "Where are we going to go with our trash?"

Gikas asked Bivins to find out whether it would be possible to have a reciprocal agreement between adjoining states so that solid waste could cross state borders.

Bivins wondered if there isn't already a law of that nature, and he said he would have to look into the matter.

A bit of rain


The Twin Cities got about 1/2" of rain on Feb. 27, and awoke to a light dusting of snow on the 28th.

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Williams seeks re-election to corn producers board

Bert Williams of Farwell is one of the people seeking re-election to the Texas Corn Producers Board when it holds its board of director's election in April. Also running are Carl King of Dimmitt and Weldon Davis of Hart.

Others currently serving on the board include Jerry Don Glover, Lazbuddie; Harold Bob Bennett, Hart; Doug Higgins, Kress; Raymond Schlabs, Hereford; Ronnie Sherrod, Hale Center; and Joe Reed, Kress.

The TCPB serves a 7 county area including Parmer, Castro, Deaf Smith, Bailey, Lamb, Hale, and Swisher counties.

Also on the April 4 ballot is a referendum to expand the 1/2 cent per bushel checkoff to every Texas corn producing region. If the referendum is passed, the TCPB board of directors would be expanded from 9 to 15 members.

According to the Texas Corn News, the referendum is being conducted because TCPB has received many requests to help bring additional corn processing plants to Texas, to help fund aflatoxin problems in Central and South Texas, and to fund insect and disease problems statewide.

Money from the checkoff has been used to strongly support research efforts by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Experiment Station. A statewide checkoff is the only way TCPB can work on problems of producers outside the checkoff area.

A two-thirds majority is needed for passage. Ballots will be mailed to producers soon. Any producer not receiving a ballot may obtain one from the local county extension agent offices, or from the Texas Corn Producers Board Office, 218 E. Bedford, Dimmitt, Texas 79027.

Order may be terminated

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced its intention to terminate the federal marketing order for potatoes grown in the High Plains area of Texas and New Mexico, effective May 31.

Daniel D. Haley, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, said that in a referendum conducted last November only 42 percent of growers voting, who represented 30 percent of the volume of potatoes grown by those voting, favored continuing the order. The order provides that USDA may terminate the order when it is not favored by producers.

"Given the outcome of the referendum, it's clear that the order no longer has the grower support it had a year ago, when USDA recommended it," Haley said.

The order authorizes grade, size and maturity regulations for potatoes grown in the High Plains area of Texas and New Mexico as well as specifications for containers and their markings.

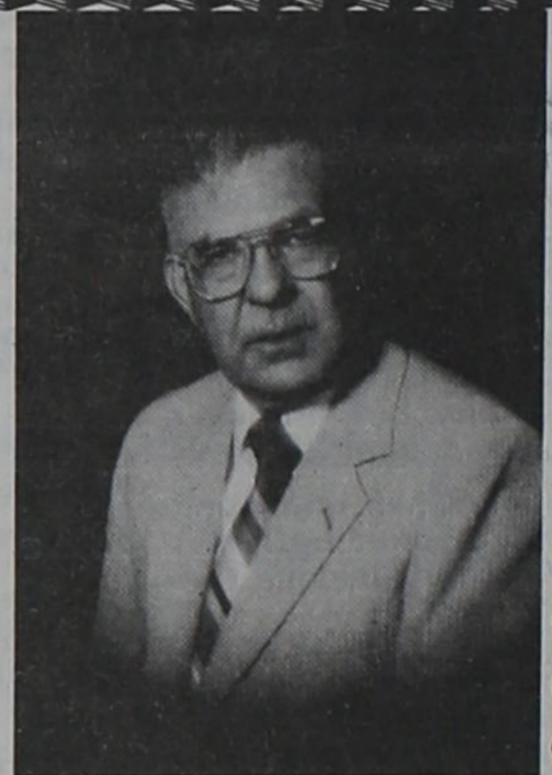

Texico topic: how city looks

The physical condition of Texico was the prime topic at Tuesday's Texico City Council session.

Mayor Steve Chancy said he has received complaints regarding Milton Autrey's lots (trucks and stock piles).

Chancy said he had talked with Autrey a few months ago and believed Autrey was planning to buy some property in the county and move the items there.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said he would talk with Milton Autrey and a couple of others about cleanup problems.

The rest of the discussion involved the community as a whole.

Councilman Bryan Kube suggested that this spring Texico have a "cleanup day or week." He also asked if the city marshal could remind residents of the laws regarding their property's appearance.

Councilman Autrey said "you can stop at almost anyone's house and find something wrong if you want to get technical about it."

City Attorney Duane Hamar said actions can be taken by the city against property owners if the problem "affects the health, welfare or safety" of the citizens.

Chancy noted that the community's appearance has had big improvements the past five years but "there's a way to go ... until citizens take pride in their community and get it cleaned up."

In other business, the council:

- Heard Lewis Cooper report that the Chamber of Commerce has received three bids for tiling the community center. The low bidder is McDaniels, at \$1,700.

- Approved the aesthetic

review agreement with Cara Costillo, who is moving a mobile home into Texico.

- Appointed Kube as the city's representative to the county waste committee.

- Will check into state matching funds for the street chip and seal program this spring.

- Met in executive session to discuss possible real estate purchases, presumably concerning the city cemetery.

- Discussed the method whereby persons seeking variances need approval from adjacent property owners. It was decided that the city clerk will accept any responses, regardless of whether they arrive verbally, in the mail, or by hand.

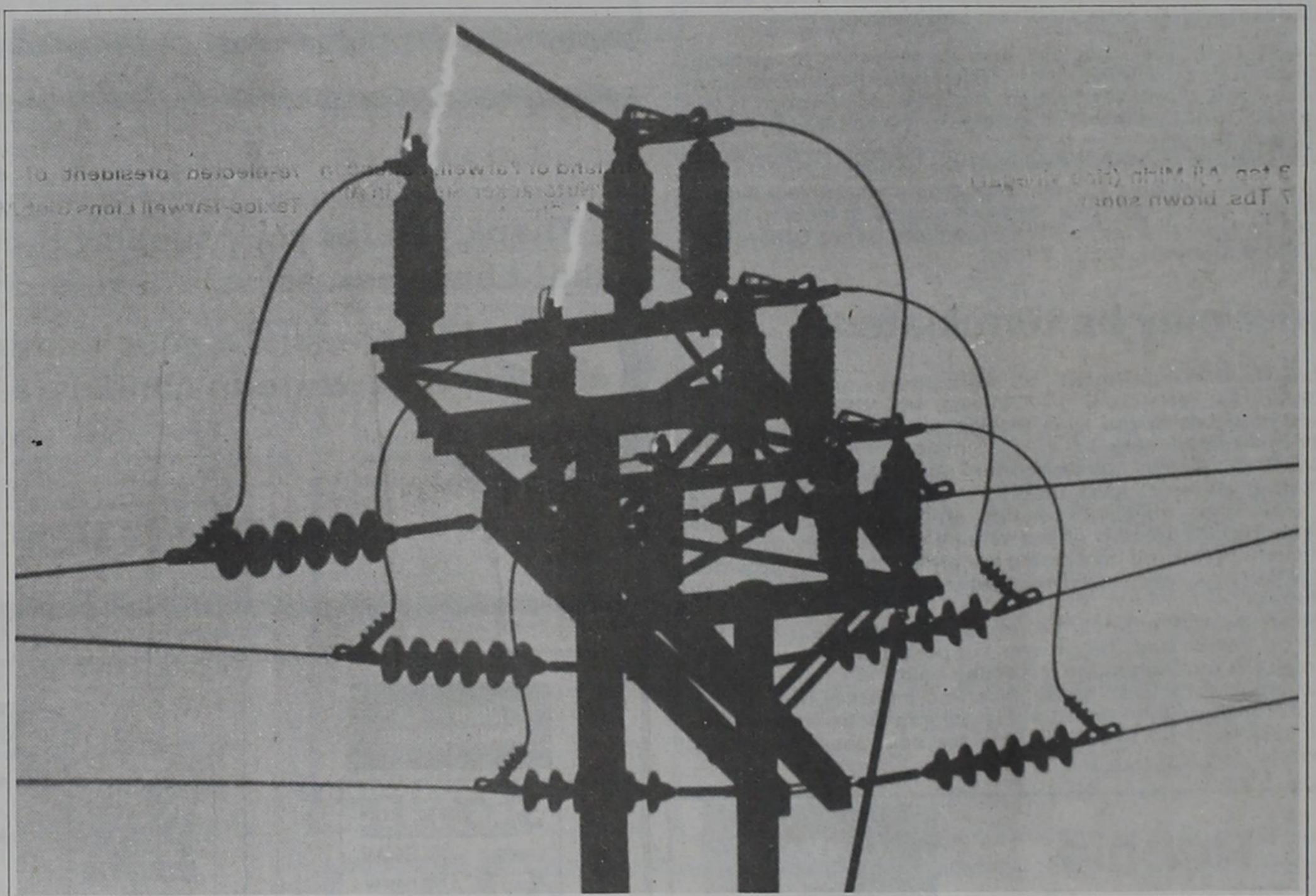

Recipe of Week

Peking Beef and Broccoli

- 1 1/2 lbs. top sirloin, sliced
- 1/8 lb. fresh ginger
- 4 garlic cloves, chopped very fine
- 1/2 c. soy sauce
- 1/4 c. water
- 1 1/2 tsp. sherry
- 3 tsp. Aji Mirin (rice vinegar)
- 7 Tbs. brown sugar
- 1 lb. fresh broccoli florets
- 4 tsp. peanut oil for cooking
- 1 tsp. sesame oil
- 1/2 tsp. ground white pepper
- 1/4 tsp. ground red pepper
- 1 tsp. cornstarch
- 1 - 2 tbs. water

Peel ginger and press through a garlic press until 2 1/2 tbs. of juice is extracted. Combine ginger with the next 6 ingredients in a small sauce pan. Simmer on stove until sugar is dissolved. Steam broccoli for 1 minute, then run under cold water. Using a wok, add peanut oil and sesame oil and heat. Add broccoli and over high heat, cook 1-3 minutes until tender. Add sliced beef and cook until beef is slightly pink. Add white and red pepper and stir. Dissolve cornstarch in 1-2 tbs. water, add to liquid, then making a well add liquid to wok and heat until very hot. Remove from heat. Serve with rice.

- 2 Tbs. Parmesan cheese

Separate roll dough into triangles. Arrange on a 12 - inch pizza pan to form crust; seal edges. Brown sausage in skillet. Stirring until crumbly; drain. Combine eggs, milk, salt and pepper in bowl; beat until smooth. Layer sausage, potatoes and Cheddar cheese in prepared pan. Pour egg mixture over layers. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake at 375 degrees for 25- 30 minutes or until set.

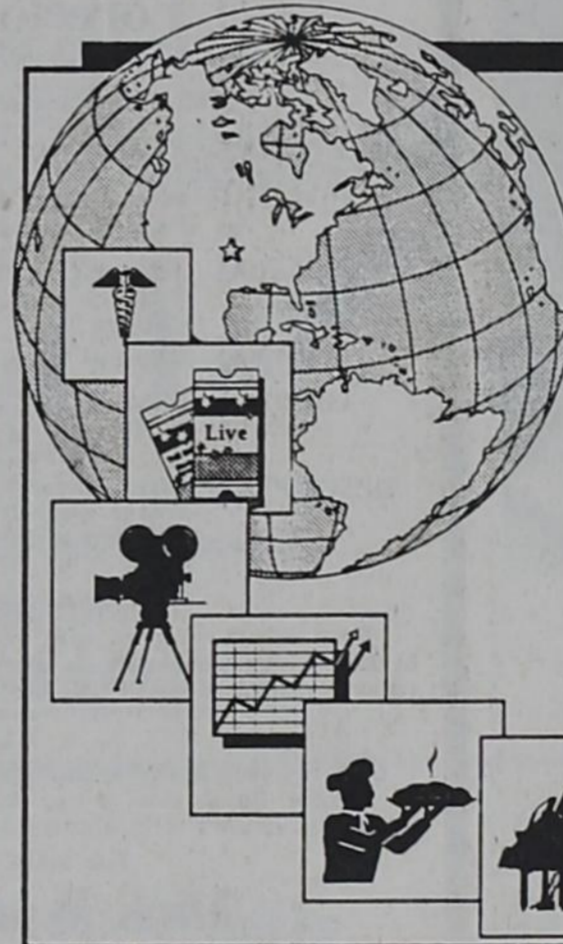
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Texico captures district tournament championship

"It will probably be real crowded," said coach Texico Richard Luscombe. "If you want a seat, you probably ought to get here early."

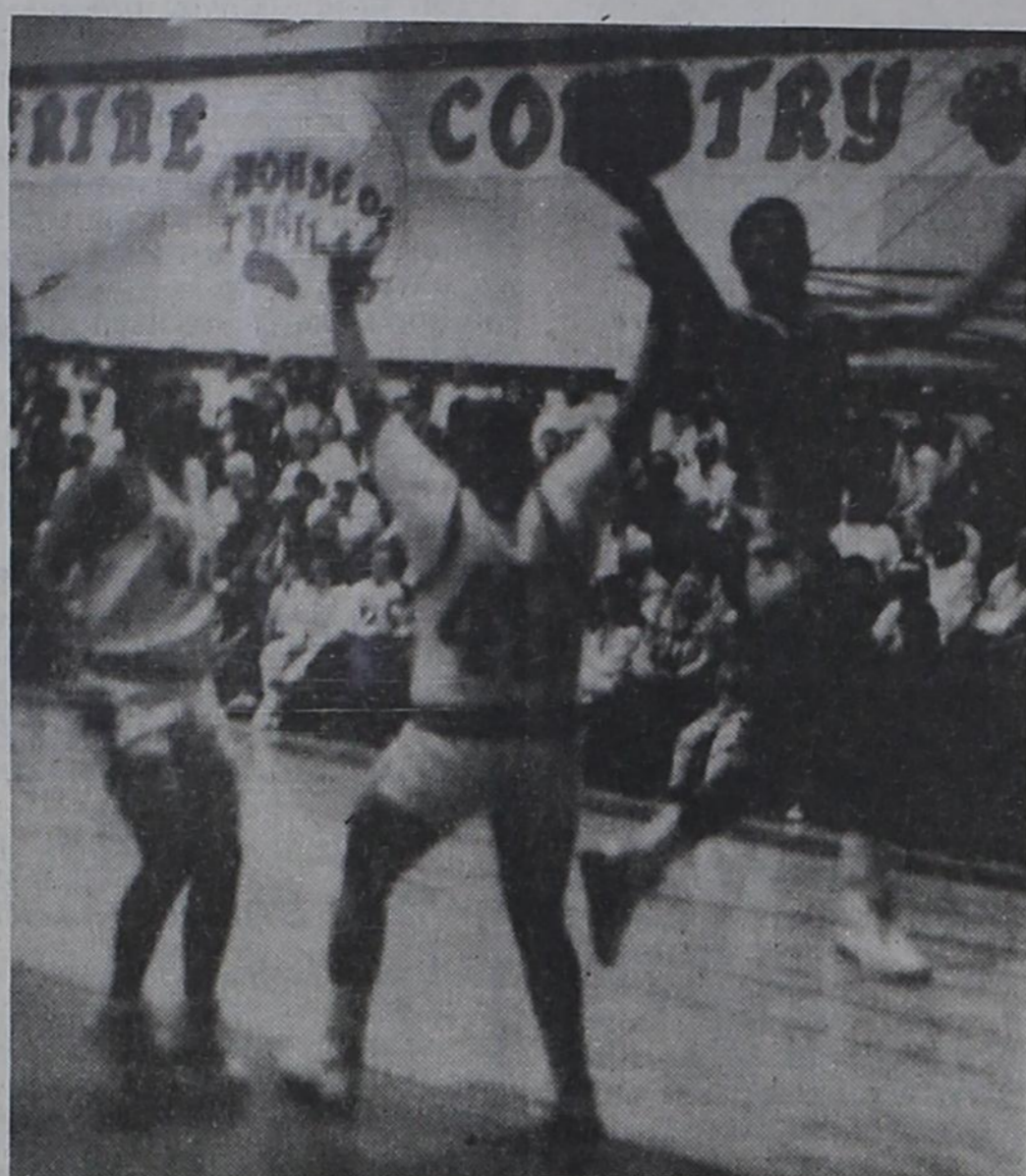
Tickets cost \$3 for adults and \$2 for students.

Another factor in Texico's performance was the use of Warren Martin. Martin averages about 7 points per game, but Saturday he scored 23 points.

Melrose keyed its defenses in on Texico's usual top scorers, Pete Fuentes, Jaime Estrada, and Kenny Shaw. By feeding the ball to Martin, the Wolverines confused Melrose's plan of action.

"Our kids just won't quit," said Luscombe fondly. "That's why we've won as many games as we have. We could have gone out the second half and been satisfied that we had made it to the tournament, but we went out there to win."

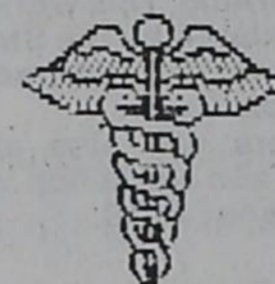

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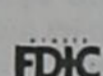

Soil samples can be analyzed

Lack of adequate rainfall for the past 2 years coupled with lower than normal yields for the last year's cotton crop, may mean South Plains cotton farmers already have enough of some nutrients stored in their soil for this year's crop, says a soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Considering the drought we have experienced over the last 2 years, particularly last year with the reduced yields that we have over the entire area, residual soil nutrients must be considered," Dr. Michael Hickey, head of the Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratory here, cautioned cotton farmers.

"The low-yielding cotton we grew last year was unable to utilize the fertilizer materials that were applied," Hickey said. "And from harvest until present, we haven't had moisture that would leach any appreciable nutrients, in particular nitrogen, deep into the (soil) profile."

Much of the fertilizer applied last year will still be in the soil and can be used by this year's crop, which is yet to be planted, the soil chemist explained.

"If we don't consider those materials, the possibility exists for the over-application of fertilizer," which could have harmful effects, Hickey said.

Especially late in the growing season, high soil nitrogen levels coupled with excessive rainfall could cause regrowth problems, with the plant devoting energy to producing new foliage instead of maturing existing bolls.

Hickey recommended that farmers collect soil samples which are representative of their field and have them analyzed by the Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock or some other laboratory of their choice.

He said local county extension agents have instructions on how to properly collect samples and could suggest laboratories. In addition to the sample, the farmer should enclose a realistic yield expectation for the crop he plans to grow in the field, Hickey said.
