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

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Kirby pleased with results of school statewide tests

Preliminary results of the statewide Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills exit level test administered in October showed increases in the percentage of high school juniors and seniors passing the tests.

Seventy-seven percent of the 181,236 juniors who took the exit level test in October passed all tests taken, compared to 75 percent last year. Fifty-nine percent of the 24,359 seniors taking the test also mastered all tests taken, compared to 55 percent in 1988.

Among juniors, 80 percent passed the mathematics section of the test, up from 78 percent last year, while passing rates on the English language arts section of the examination remained at 90 percent, the same as last year.

Most seniors taking the examination were students who had failed to pass one or both sections of the examination in two previous attempts last year. Sixty-two percent of these students passed the mathematics part of the examination, compared to 57 percent last year, while 68 percent passed the English language arts section, the same as last year.

"I am pleased to see that the passing rates of our high school juniors on the mathematics portion of the TEAMS improved slightly," said Commissioner of Education W.N. Kirby. "Mastering mathematics skills is critical to the future success of our students. I am also pleased that the passing rates of juniors on the English language arts section of the examination remained high."

"At the same time I am concerned about the number of seniors who did not pass the test and must pass it in May in order to receive their high school diploma," Kirby said. "Local school districts must ensure that these students get remediation they need to enable them to master the minimum skill level. We must improve our instructional programs so that all students meet our current standards. In the future, our students will have to be better prepared and the emphasis will be on increasing these standards."

Forty-one percent or 10,061 seniors and 41,655 or 23 percent of the juniors who took the October exit level administration failed to pass the test. Students who do not receive a high school diploma because they fail one or more sections of the exit-level TEAMS test are eligible to retake that section each time the test is administered.

The results of the October exit level administration are preliminary and may vary slightly from the final results.

The following article from the Texas Education Agency News is of special importance to people in the Farwell School District area because we are one of the property-poor school

districts that Dr. Kirby talks about in his quotation.

Nearly 74 percent of the 1988-89 and later Texas high school graduates who took the Texas Academic Skills Program (TASP) Test in September passed all sections on the examination, according to results released today by the Texas Education Agency.

More than 79 percent of the college students seeking admission to teacher education programs who took the TASP Test also passed all three sections of the examination, results showed.

Of the 6,321 high school students who took the reading, writing, and mathematics portions of the examination, 73.9 percent passed all three sections, while 79.3 percent of the 2,841 students who took all three sections of the test to gain admission to teacher education programs at Texas colleges and universities also passed all three sections.

Commissioner of Education W.N. Kirby said he is pleased that the vast majority of students taking the TASP Test continue to pass the examination.


"I am pleased to see that nearly three-quarters of our high school students and nearly 80 percent of our teacher education candidates passed the TASP Test, especially in light of earlier predictions by some that the passing standard

set of 70 percent set by the State Board of Education and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board would lead to high failure rates," Kirby said. "It is gratifying to see that students taking the TASP Test continue to pass at rates well above those originally expected."

"At the same time, I will not be pleased until all of the students in our public schools come out of high school with a diploma and skills necessary to perform advanced work at the college level," Kirby said. "We need to improve educational programs for all of our students. And when the Legislature begins addressing the school finance issue in the spring, they will have the opportunity to ensure that we have adequate funding for quality educational programs for all students."

"Property-poor school districts will need additional resources from the state to improve their instructional programs," Kirby added. "We must allocate more money to property-poor school districts for educational programs for our students today so that they will get the skills they need to be successful in the future."

State law requires that freshmen students at Texas public colleges and universities take the TASP Test in order to take upper-division courses beyond 60 semester hours or complete associate degree or certificate programs which include nine or more semester hours of general education coursework. A separate law also requires students seeking admission to an approved teacher education program to pass the TASP Test (or the Pre-Professional Skills Test, previously used for testing teacher candidates).

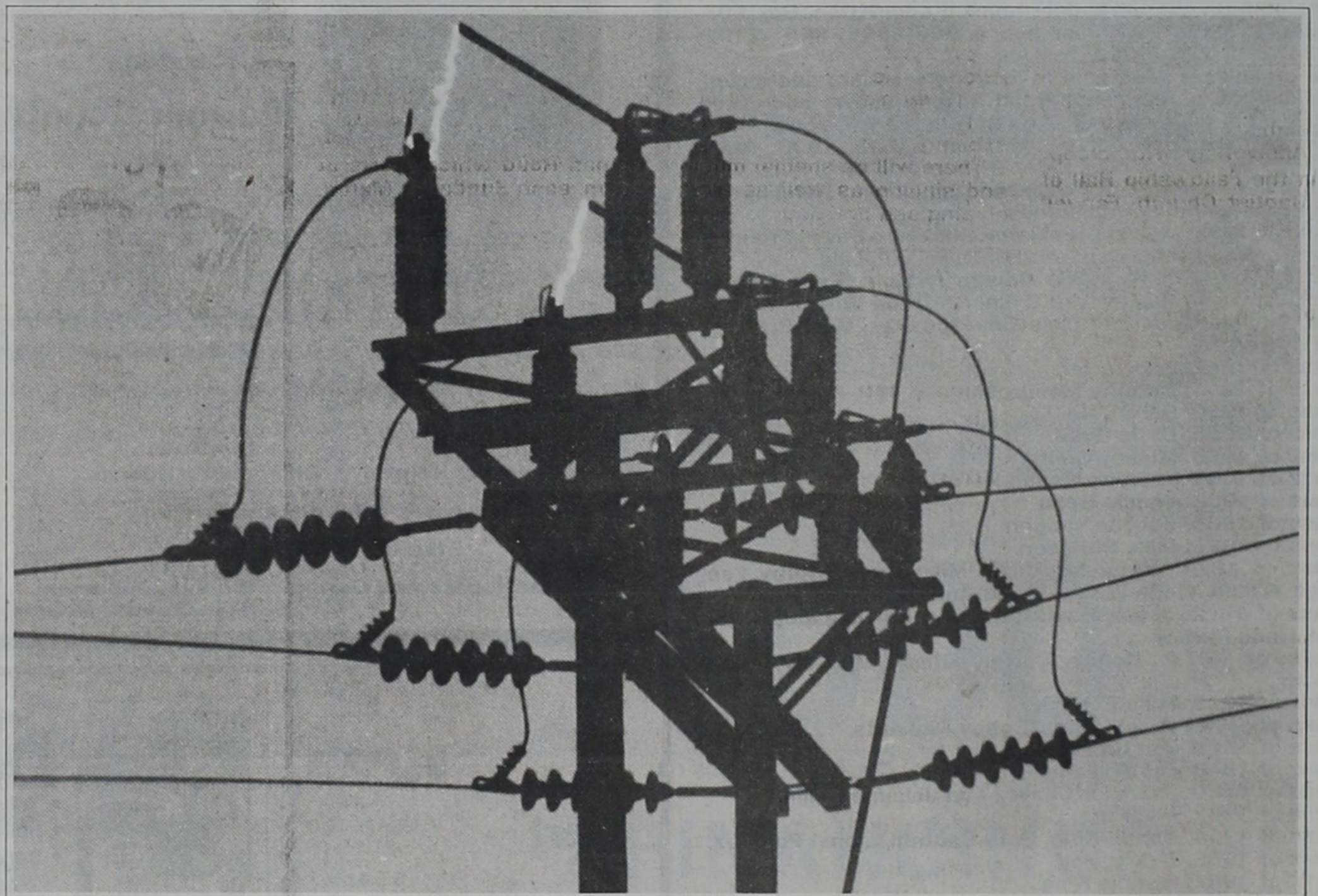

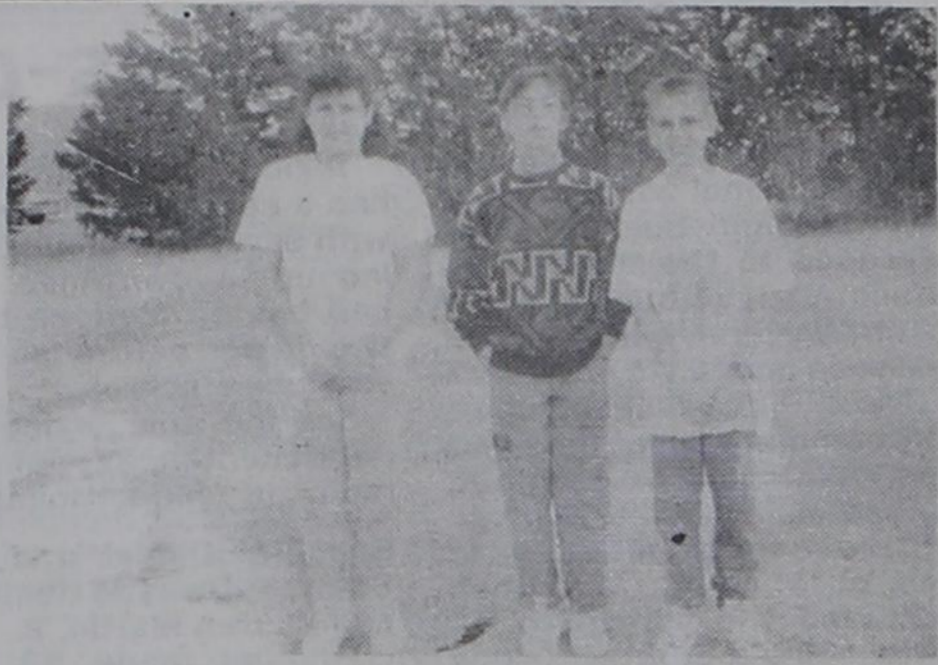

'Crop-protection chemicals are essential tools'

"Crop - protection chemicals are essential tools for today's producer and their safe and careful use is a frontline defense of our groundwater quality and environment," says Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., representing some 15,000 cotton farmers from 25 counties across the High Plains of Texas.

Most producers agree they would prefer not to use chemicals if there were another dependable, economical way to do the job. However, public demand for inexpensive, safe, nutritional food and high quality, low cost fiber mandates judicious use of these technological tools.

This nation, and much of the world, is fed and clothed by the American farmer. Today's farmer is ten times more productive than his grandfather. Accordingly, he has to be considerably more sophisticated when it comes to protecting the nation's environment. He is the original steward of the land. As caretaker of the land, the American farmer

considers a clean rural environment a key to his present and future success. Farmers and ranchers are concerned about protecting water quality. Ninety percent of them drink and use water drawn from wells on their own farms.

Farmers have adopted programs and technologies known as "best management practices" which protect our land and water. These programs, developed for environmental protection, make good common sense and good business sense. They include the most environmentally - responsible

actions to safely transport, store, mix, use and dispose of crop protection chemicals.

It is doubtful that there is anyone involved in agriculture who does not favor protecting the environment. It is from the environment that the farmer derives his living; in it that he lives, works and raises his family. Producing a crop both safely and profitably means using crop protection chemicals with care and consideration.

Today's prudent farmer knows that practicing integrated pest management helps him produce that crop safely and profitably. Programs that include cultivation to reduce soil erosion, crop rotation, and surveys of insect and weed population mean that he needs only to apply chemicals when he has a problem that will significantly interfere with getting a crop to harvest. His responsible approach means a more economical operation for the farmer and the higher quality and lower product cost that his public demands.

Studies show that the alternatives to a responsible approach to the use of chemicals in agriculture would result in much higher costs to the consumer and no appreciable change in protection. More than 150,000 Americans die each year from diseases associated with smoking; 100,000 die from alcohol - related diseases; 50,000 from motor vehicle accidents and over 1,000 a year from bicycle accidents. Someone dies from drugs every 26 minutes, yet there is no evidence that anyone has ever died as a result of pesticide residues in food or water.
