Wolverines fall on last-second shot

ALBUQUERQUE - The Texico Wolverines fell in the first round of the state boys' basketball tournament here Wednesday night to Cliff on a last-second desperation 15-foot shot, 57-56.

The Wolverines, who overcame an early 14-point deficit to take a 3-point lead in the final period, ended

the season at 21-6. Cliff is 23-5. The game at Albuquerque High, with about 300 Texico

fans in attendance, began with Cliff hitting their first two shots to take a 5-0 lead. Texico finally scored two minutes into the game when Warren Martin put home a rebound.

Cliff shot ahead 9-2 when Pete Fuentes canned a 3pointer. Cliff's hot shooting continued - the Cowboys hit 54 percent of their shots in the first half - and moved up 13-5 before the Wolverines struck back.

Martin hit a bucket, was fouled and made the extra point at the 3 minute mark. Baskets by Martin, Mark Holmes and two free throws by Fuentes put Texico behind by 1, 15-14. But Cliff hit two shots, including a 3 pointer by Josh Tye, to go up 20-14 at the end of the first period.


The second period was divided into two parts. The first part belonged to Cliff as they took a 30-16 lead. Only a layup by Fuentes, off a nifty feed from Holmes, prevented Texico from being blanked in the first four minutes.

In the last four minutes, Texico outscored Cliff, 13-2. The Wolverine comeback started with back to back 3pointers by Benji McDaniel. A bucket by Martin - whose strong rebounding kept Texico in the game throughout cut the deficit to 8, 32-24. Then free throws by Kenny Shaw, Dwayne Hamilton and McDaniel made it 34-29 at the half.

Texico hit 38 percent of their shots in the first half and was outrebounded 18-9.

The tenacious Texico defense asserted itself in the third period. Fuentes scored, was fouled, hit the free throw and cut the margin to 2. At 5:30, Shaw scored

Wolverine teamwork

It was about this time last year when I wrote a column honoring the Farwell Steers, who were in the midst of their campaign for a berth in the state tournament, no mean feat in a state as large as

About midway through the column, I noted that it was a down year for the Texico Wolverines but that folks shouldn't be surprised one bit if they earned a trip to the state tournament in Albuquerque in 1990.

I sure hit that one, didn't 1? What I saw last year was a young, inexperienced team. What I saw this year was a very cohesive team glued together by a fine young coach in Richard Luscombe. Luscombe's leadership ability has been a big plus for

Texico. When I watched Texico at the beginning of the year, I thought they would have a successful one but I worried that their lack of a "big man" inside would hinder them. Then I saw them beat a Melrose team which had

For example, last week Texico faced San Jon, which featured an All-State performer in Sergio Vasquez. Duke Kirkland, a local ref, said he believes Vasquez was probably the top player in Class A in the state of New Mexico. The 5'11 guard had a jump shot that was as smooth as silk.

In the game, Vasquez scored 38 points. But Texico won. The turning point was when Texico's quickness forced four consecutive San Jon turnovers in the third quarter, as the lead changed hands in Texico's favor - for good.

When you add Texico's quickness to team play, good coaching, and a will to win -you have got yourself a heckuva team. That's what this year's version of the Wolverines is all about.

As longtime readers of this column know, I'm a fella who appreciates good team play. And the 1990 Texico team is an excellent example of what I enjoy watching.


I'm writing this column before Texico begins play in Albquerque. Regardless of how it turns out, this is a season the Wolverines can be justly proud of.





Kirby pleased with results of school statewide tests

Preliminary results of the statewide Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills exit level test administered in October showed increases in the percentage of high school juniors and seniors passing the tests.

Seventy-seven percent of the 181,236 juniors who took the exit level test in October passed all tests taken, compared to 75 percent last year. Fifty-nine percent of the 24,359 seniors taking the test also mastered all tests taken, compared to 55 percent in 1988.

Among juniors, 80 percent passed the mathematics section of the test, up from 78 percent last year, while passing rates on the English language arts section of the examination remained at 90 percent, the same as last year.

Most seniors taking the examination were students who had failed to pass one or both sections of the examination in two previous attempts last year. Sixty-two percent of these students passed the mathematics part of the examination, compared to 57 percent last year, while 68 percent passed the English language arts section, the same as last year.

"I am pleased to see that the passing rates of our high school juniors on the mathematics portion of the TEAMS improved slightly," said Commissioner of Education W N. Kirby. "Mastering mathematics skills is critical to the future success of our students. I am also pleased that the passing rates of juniors on the English language arts section of the

examination remained high.

"At the same time I am concerned about the number of seniors who did not pass the test and must pass it in May in order to receive their high school diploma," Kirby said. "Local school districts must ensure that these students get remediation they need to enable them to master the minimum skill level. We must improve our instructional programs so that all students meet our current standards. In the future, our students will have to be better prepared and the emphasis will be on increasing these standards."

Forty-one percent or 10,061 seniors and 41,655 or 23 percent of the juniors who took the October exit level administration failed to pass the test. Students who do not receive a high school diploma because they fail one or more sections of the exit-level TEAMS test are eligible to retake that section each time the test is administered.

The results of the October exit level administration are preliminary and may vary slightly from the final results.

Nearly 74 percent of the 1988-89 and later Texas high school graduates who took the Texas Academic Skills Program (TASP) Test in September passed all sections on the examination, according to results released today by the Texas Education Agency.

More than 79 percent of the college students seeking admission to teacher education programs who took the TASP Test also passed all three sections of the examination.

Of the 6,321 high school students who took the reading, writing, and mathematics portions of the examination, 73.9 percent passed all three sections, while 79.3 percent of the 2,841 students who took all three sections of the test to gain admission to teacher education programs at Texas colleges and universities also passed all three sections.

Commissioner of Education W.N. Kirby said he is pleased that the vast majority of students taking the TASP Test

continue to pass the examination.


"I am pleased to see that nearly three- quarters of our high school students and nearly 80 percent of our teacher education candidates passed the TASP Test, especially in light of earlier predictions by some that the passing standard

set of 70 percent set by the State Board of Education and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board would lead to high failure rates," Kirby said. "It is gratifying to see that students taking the TASP Test continue to pass at rates well above those originally expected.

"At the same time, I will not be pleased until all of the students in our public schools come out of high school with a diploma and skills necessary to perform advanced work at the college level," Kirby said. "We need to improve educational programs for all of our students. And when the Legislature begins addressing the school finance issue in the spring, they will have the opportunity to ensure that we have adequate funding for quality educational programs for

all students. "Property-poor school districts will need additional resources from the state to improve their instructional programs," Kirby added. "We must allocate more money to property - poor school districts for educational programs for our students today so that they will get the skills they need

to be successful in the future." State law requires that freshmen students at Texas public colleges and universities take the TASP Test in order to take upper - division courses beyond 60 semester hours or complete associate degree or certificate programs which include nine or more semester hours of general education coursework. A separate law also requires students seeking admission to an approved teacher education program to pass the TASP Test (or the Pre-Professional Skills Test, previously used for testing teacher candidates).







Fuentes made 13 of his points at the free throw line. Holmes led rebounding with 9. Shaw and Fuentes each made 3 point shots.



"Crop - protection chemicals are essential tools for today's producer and their safe and careful use is a frontline defense of our groundwater quality and environment," says Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers. Inc., representing some 15,000 cotton farmers from 25 counties across the High Plains of Texas.

#### Recipe of Week

A flavorful, nutritionally balanced beef soup that highlights Texan and Mexican influences was crowned champion of the 1990 Texas Beef Cook-Off Feb. 17 at Houston.

This recipe was adapted from the Mexican beef soup, caldo. It was entered in the Beef Cook-Off by Robin Bonifay. Chunky Mexican Beef Soup

2 lbs. chuck pot roast, trimmed of fat and cut into 1" chunks

2 large onions cut into 8 pieces each

1 tsp. garlic powder, divided in half 2 tsp. ground cumin, divided in half

6 tsp. olive oil, divided in half 2 large onions, cut in 8 pieces each

4 cups good strong beef stock (if using store bought, increase stock to 6 cups and decrease water to 2 cups)

4 large garlic cloves, minced

9 red potatoes, scrubbed and halved

4 ears corn, cut in fourths

3 carrots, peeled and cut in 1 inch chunks 2 medium zucchini, cut in 1 inch pieces

1 bunch cilantro, washed well and coarsely chopped (2 cups, loosely packed)

1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp pepper flour tortillas

butter

Heat 3 tsp. oil in a wok or large skillet. Stir-fry half of meat, garlic powder and cumin, Remove with slotted spoon to a 6-8 quart stock pot. Repeat with remaining meat, garlic powder and cumin. Add onion to wok with remaining 3 tsp. oil and saute until soft. Remove to stock pot. Add all remaining ingredients except tortillas and butter to stock pot. Bring to a boil. Cover, reduce heat and simmer 1 hour or longer. Ladle into large, shallow soup bowls and serve with steamed flour tortillas and butter.
