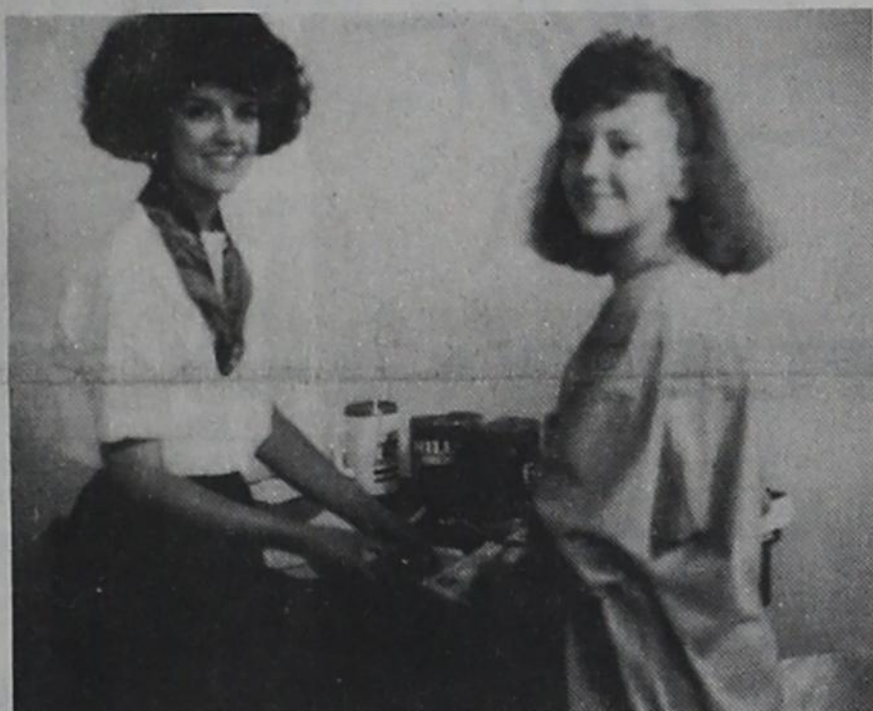

TEAMS test results given

Now that Farwell teachers are doing a consistently good job of preparing students for the state mandated TEAMS Test, the state is changing its test, was the conclusion presented to the School Board by Administrative Assistant Gwen Corn last week.

Next year students will take the new TASS Test which tests higher level thinking skills as well as mastery of basic objectives.

She stressed that Farwell's teachers and students have done an excellent job on the TEAMS Test.

On this year's test, the Farwell 7th grade showed 100 percent mastery of both math and reading objectives, and the 11th grade showed 100 percent mastery of math objectives. Many of Farwell's scores are above state and regional results.

On the chart below there is a list of the percent of students who mastered the objectives on the test for the Panhandle Region XVI, for Farwell and for the state of Texas.

The TEAMS Test results are broken down to show teachers what strengths and weaknesses our students have in some specific areas. That way teachers have a better idea of what they need to teach more effectively the next year.

Mrs. Corn showed the board charts of previous years' results. These charts show that more Farwell students had mastered the objectives tested on the 1989-90 TEAMS than they had when testing began. She noted that staff development such as sending teachers to conferences had really helped them to do a better job over the years. Teachers had worked hard to teach the objectives of the test without teaching the specific questions that would be on the test. Their work had paid off in better scores.

Lonnie McFarland at the Sherley Anderson Grain Elevator in Lariat reported Tuesday that our area had had 10 days over 90 degrees and 6 days over 100 degrees this month.

From June 1-17, the average high temperature was 96 degrees. In 1989, the average high for this period was 82 degrees.

"This is a big swing over last year," said McFarland. Normally, the average temperature does not vary so greatly.

Night-time temperatures have averaged 62 degrees this year compared to 55 degrees last year.

The hot, dry weather has made wheat harvesting easier than it is in rainy weather, and it has helped some crops such as cotton. As always, the weather that helps one crop hurts another. The temperatures have kept down wheat rust this year, but they allow corn spider mites to flourish.

"This may be a bad year for corn spider mites," said McFarland.

The weather also means that area producers are relying more and more on irrigation to keep their crops prospering. The irrigation pump costs will cut into the profit.

"If it hadn't been for rain in January through April, we wouldn't have had any harvest," said McFarland. On the other hand, he also added that "if we had gotten any rain in May, this would have been an exceptional harvest."

Wheat harvest is in full swing, and the local grain elevators are busy stashing away the wheat.

"We are about three-fourths over," said Fred Chandler at Sherley Anderson Pitman in Farwell.

He reported that irrigated land had yields of 40-60 bushels per acre, and dryland yields averaged 15-20 bushels per acre.

"There's not much profit when the market is at \$2.95 per bushel," said Chandler. As a result, most area farmers are taking a wait-and-see attitude and storing their grain at area elevators until they see how the market changes.

"We've got plenty of room," said Chandler.

Chandler reported that the quality of this year's harvest is good. "Protein is above average." He noted on the other hand that the list weight is below average because hot winds have dried the kernels.

"Grade-wise, this is a No. 2 crop. It's as good as we can expect considering that wheat has so many adversities this year," said Chandler.

He noted that Russian aphids, wheat mosaic virus, green bugs, and hot dry weather have taken their toll this year. But, the harvest is pretty fair considering all of the adversities.

Lonnie McFarland reported that yields brought to the Sherley Anderson elevator in Lariat are up from the last two years.

"Most of the wheat in our area is irrigated," he said, although there is some dryland wheat here.

McFarland reported that quality is up a little bit, "Bushel weight is still light over the past 2 years, but quality is up over last year."

He noted a little increase in the protein content of the wheat this year.

McFarland said most farmers are storing their harvest and taking a wait-and-see attitude about the sale of their crops.

"They seldom sell as it crosses the scales," he noted. He said that the USDA has projected a big harvest for this year which may drive prices down. On the other hand, there is talk of sales to Russia and other eastern block countries which may cause more demand than usual.

In Lazbuddie, Scott Brown of Sherley Anderson Grain Elevator reports that the harvest is over halfway completed.

"The weather has been open and hasn't caused any problems. We've been moving right along," he said. That means that the elevator staff

has been working overtime. Lazbuddie area farmers have had a good harvest. "Irrigated wheat yields have been above average; they've been getting 50-80 bushels per acre." According to Brown there is little dryland wheat in Lazbuddie.

He indicated that the crop has been weighing in well, and the price remained stable from June 8-19.

Some farmers in Lazbuddie had problems with Russian wheat aphids and wheat mosaic, but they sprayed for it earlier in the season.

"Of course that puts more expense in the crop," said Brown.

All in all, Brown calls this the "best crop we've had in 2 to 3 years."

He also said that the farmers have a good chance to make a good crop with their corn and milo if they keep it wet enough this year.

Marshal comes under criticism

The Texico City Council Tuesday received a petition signed by more than 70 persons asking it to reconsider the employment of Walt Causey as city marshal.

Causey was hired as marshal earlier this year.

The petition and a letter were presented to the council by LaDonna Cross. Also present in support were about 12 other residents.

The letter said that Causey was not responsive to the city's needs. It said he was "often unavailable" and "disrespectful and uncooperative."

However, the letter commended deputy marshal "Fry" Urioste.

Mayor Doyal LaRue said specifics are needed. He turned the letter and petition over to City Attorney Duane Hamar.

Hamar set up a time to meet with the group on the complaints.

In other business, the council:

- Received the resignation of councilman Bryan Kube who has sold his home in Texico and moved to Lubbock.

- Approved updating the city's traffic ordinance so it doesn't conflict with new state regulations.

- Told Ricky Hendrix it was okay to remove some curb at his home for a new driveway.

- Discussed buying a portion of the 45 acres owned by the Santa Fe Railroad in Texico for future development.

- Approved buying a new chlorinator system for the swimming pool. Also, the council asked water Supt. Billy Hammit to help with the backwash there. The chlorinator system recently had gone out and pool operators were using tablets. Since June 1, more than 1,000 persons have used the pool.

- Okayed the annual EPCOG membership and re-appointed LaRue as the council's representative on it.

- Still is negotiating to buy more land for the cemetery.

- Heard Councilman Butch

Tharp report that the state plans to put funds in its budget for traffic signals at the intersection where the Amarillo and Lubbock highways meet.

- Noted a request from Councilman Ronnie Warmuth to Hamar to have the ordinances pertaining to junk, debris, abandoned cars and houses that should be condemned presented to the council.

- Discussed problems with the Blazer police vehicle. The alignment will be checked at A-1 Alignment in Clovis.

- Received a letter from a Clovis CPA asking for information on why his bid wasn't accepted for the city audit. A letter will be sent him saying that it wasn't chosen because of past performance. The bid was awarded De'Aun Willoughby of Melrose.

Water usage to cost

Farwell Water Department Supt. Dee Hammit reminds Farwell residents that increased water usage will increase their water bills dramatically.

The rates call for a 45 cent per 1,000 gallon charge on the first 50,000 gallons used. After that, the rate is \$1 per 1,000 gallons used.

That means that the average customer who uses 50,000 gallons will receive a water bill of \$42 for the month. But, if the same customer uses 100,000 gallons, his bill will be \$92 per month.

"We've had some customers using 200,000 gallons or more this month. They are going to be really surprised when they get their water bills," he said.

The hot, dry weather has increased the need for watering lawns, but residents will have to decide which is more economical - paying the water bill or re-seeding the lawn.

## Pumps cranked up early

While much of East Texas continues drying out from spring floods, record high temperatures on the Texas High Plains have irrigated cotton farmers cranking up their pumps 3 weeks ahead of schedule.

Meanwhile, dryland producers are hoping for much-needed rain to save the area's 3.25 million acres of young plants.

In the High Plains, planting of some 3.25 million acres of cotton in the 25-county area surrounding Lubbock began in mid-May and is more than 95 percent complete, reported Dr. James Supak, cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock. This area annually produces about half the state's cotton.

Several successive days in early June with temperatures above 100 degrees is stressing the young plants, especially in areas that haven't received enough rain and aren't irrigated.

"Most of the dryland crop is hurting for moisture," Su-

pak said. Water is being applied to irrigated fields. "Normally, we don't recommend early irrigation," Supak said, but the excessive heat and strong winds have dried the soil to a critical point.

A gentle, general rain is needed all across the region, Supak said, "both for moisture and to get us into more seasonal temperatures." Dryland fields barely had enough moisture for the plants to

emerge. "If they don't get rain soon, a lot of growers will be looking for alternate crops to plant."

Planted acres are up from last year's 2.77 million, largely because of a reduction in the acreage conservation reserve requirement. The 1989 set-aside requirement was 25 percent of base acres; this year it is 12.5 percent.

**Gwen Corn presents improvement plan**

Farwell Administrative Assistant Gwen Corn presented a Chapter I Improvement Plan to the School Board last week which outlined the areas that the school system will need to change.

Chapter I is a federally funded reading improvement program to help students who score below average on national tests. In the past, only a few students who were slightly below average were given help through the Chapter I program in Farwell. This year, more students were served by more staff. The results of this year's assessment at the end of the school year were not as good as the school administrators had hoped.

The Improvement Plan was required because the Chapter I annual performance report summary showed areas that needed improvement.

The first step in the improvement plan was setting up an improvement team consisting of: Jerry Dee Owen, Gwen Corn, Carol Sullivan, Verona Traynor Vaughn, Kay Stanton, Patsy Camp, Flo Davis, Leslie Lunsford, Jo Ellen Cahill, Merlene Hill, April Gober, Kay Fowler, and Jo Moore.

In the past, the Chapter I program limited itself to a few students who had a good potential for improvement. "We pulled in more of the students who had problems this year than we have in the past," said administrative assistant Gwen Corn. She indicated that the program was a success even though there is a need for improvement in it. "We served more kids even though the scores went down," she said.

The next steps in the improvement plan will include: staff development for improved program coordination, parental involvement, instruction improvement, and improving testing procedures.

The federally funded Chapter I program uses the California Achievement Test nationally as its measurement of success. Students are tested with the CAT to show progress on its objectives.

In Farwell, teachers have spent more time preparing for the state mandated TEAMS test than for the CAT. The books and materials used in the classrooms are geared to match the items the state of Texas requires that teachers teach. The objectives of these two tests do not match.

The school system needs to develop strategies to teach the skills that students need to succeed on both the state and the national tests.

It is also possible that test taking procedures and documentation may be part of the problem. If students do not know how to take and achievement test, or if they do not take it seriously, the results may be skewed. If the results of the test are improperly reported, they will also cause problems.

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# Parmer County has 56,243 CRP acres

The 10-year conservation reserve program since 1986 has idled 1.84 million highly erodible acres, 20.2 percent of the 9.1 million cropland acres in the 25 High Plains counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

Those figures from USDA's Soil Conservation Service (SCS) were evaluated recently by PCG along with CRP reductions in program crop bases supplied by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Farmers who signed land into the reserve program have agreed to devote the idled acreage to conservation uses such as permanent grasses for a period of 10 years. In return USDA pays a share of the cost of establishing grasses or other cover crops and will pay yearly rental of up to \$40 per acre.

CRP crop base reductions reported by ASCS totals only about 1.5 million acres. Although land bid into the program had to be used for program crop production from 1981 to 1985, SCS figures reflect total cropland area while ASCS numbers represent only crop base acres assigned to the same area. Thus a 100-acre cotton farm planted two-in, one-out would appear as 100 acres in SCS records but only 66.6 acres at the ASCS office.

The CRP has reduced base cotton acreage in PCG territory by 774,720 acres, 16.7 percent of the area's 4.64 million acre total base. The remaining 724,634 acres of base reductions cover corn, grain sorghum, wheat, barley and oats. Bases are not lost, however. They will be returned to individual farms at the conclusion of their respective CRP contracts, beginning in 1995.

Most High Plains cotton acreage in the CRP is found on whole-farm CRP entries, PCG notes, citing ASCS figures showing less than 122,000 CRP acres on farms participating in the 1990 farm program.

With certain exceptions, the farm law limits acreage accepted into the CRP in any county to 25 percent of the county's total cropland. Eleven PCG counties have reached or slightly exceeded the limit, including Bailey, Briscoe, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Gaines, Martin, Motley, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum Counties.

Nationwide about 34 million acres have gone the CRP route through the nine sign-up periods from 1986 through 1989, and USDA has no plans to accept additional acreage unless the program is extended in the pending 1990 farm bill.

In Parmer County, 56,243 acres are in CRP. Only 7,921 base cotton acres are in the CRP Program.

1 carton (4 oz.) frozen whipped topping, softened.

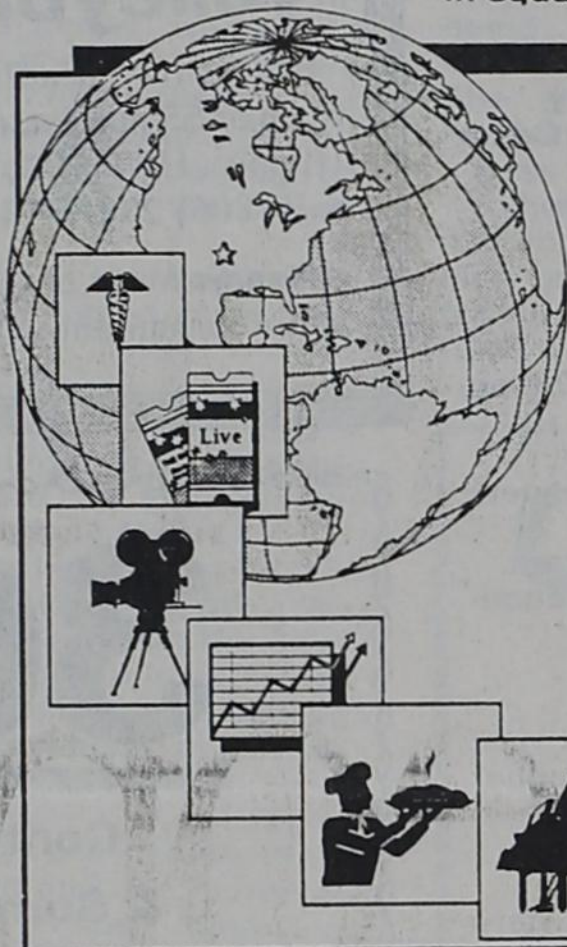
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine muffin mix, pecans and butter in mixing bowl; crumble 1/2 c. mixture in square baking pan.

## Christensen supports 'no-till approach'

Neal B. Christensen, superintendent of New Mexico State University's Agricultural Science Center at Clovis, urges farmers to do as little plowing as possible.

The "no-till" approach can improve the soil, conserve moisture and prevent erosion, he says.

Christensen has been studying no-till farming since he finished his doctoral program in soils at Kansas State University in 1987. He believes no-till farming works well in New Mexico's semi-arid climate.

New Mexico farmers have been reluctant to adopt a complete no-till approach, but a large number of them are using a "minimum-tillage" method, says Christensen. This minimum-till approach leaves enough crop residue on the surface to help prevent erosion.

"We are trying to show the producers they can maintain a maximum economical yield with a no-till system," Christensen says.

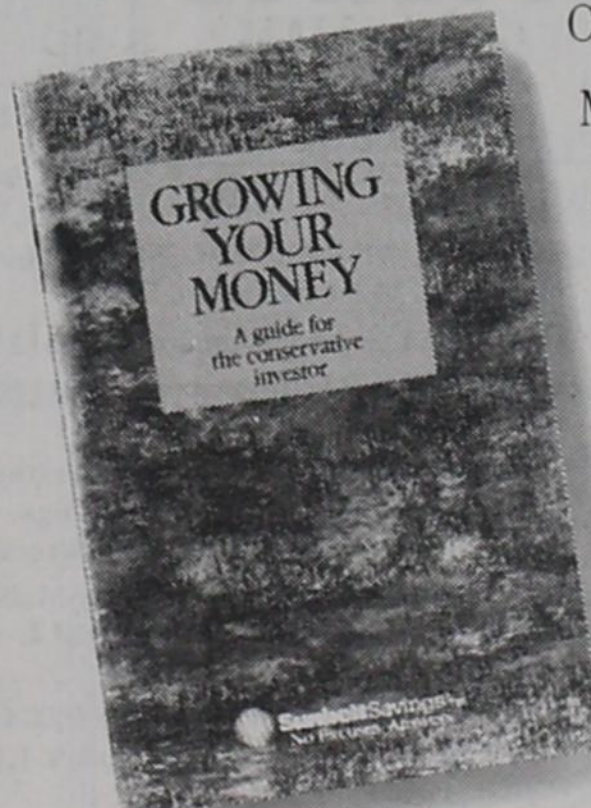

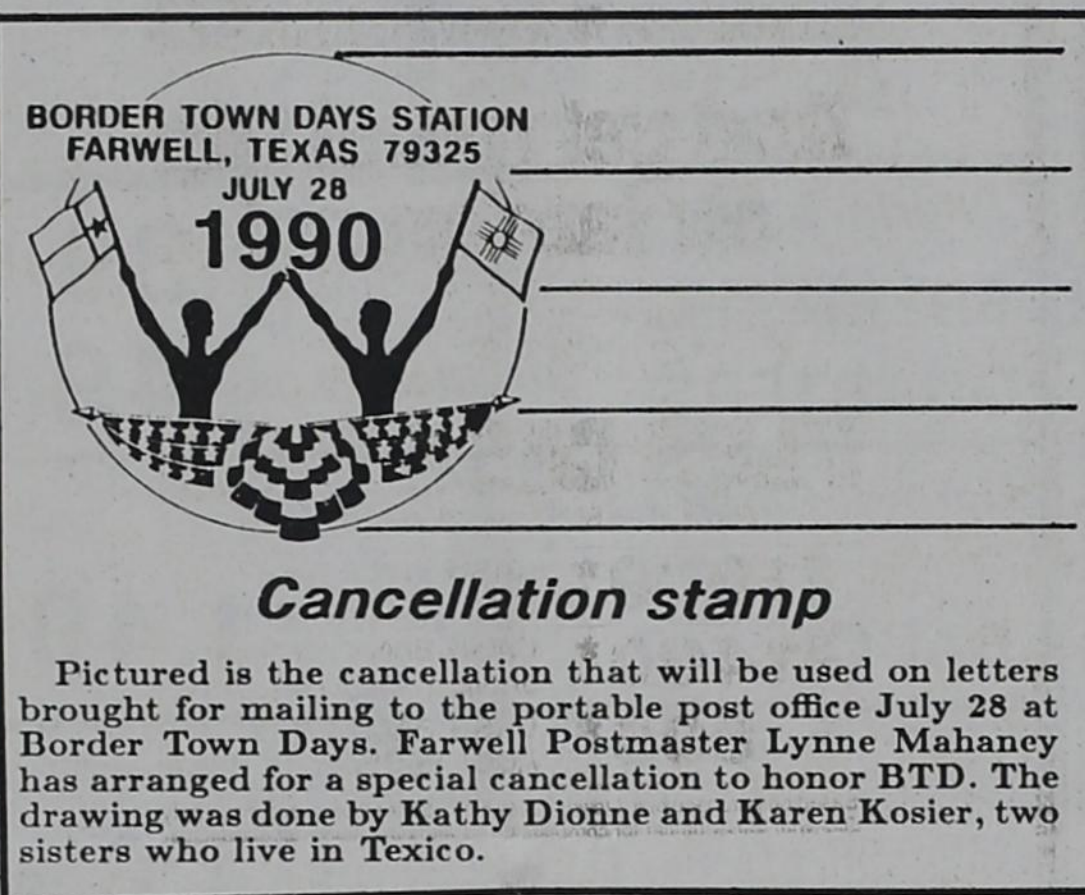

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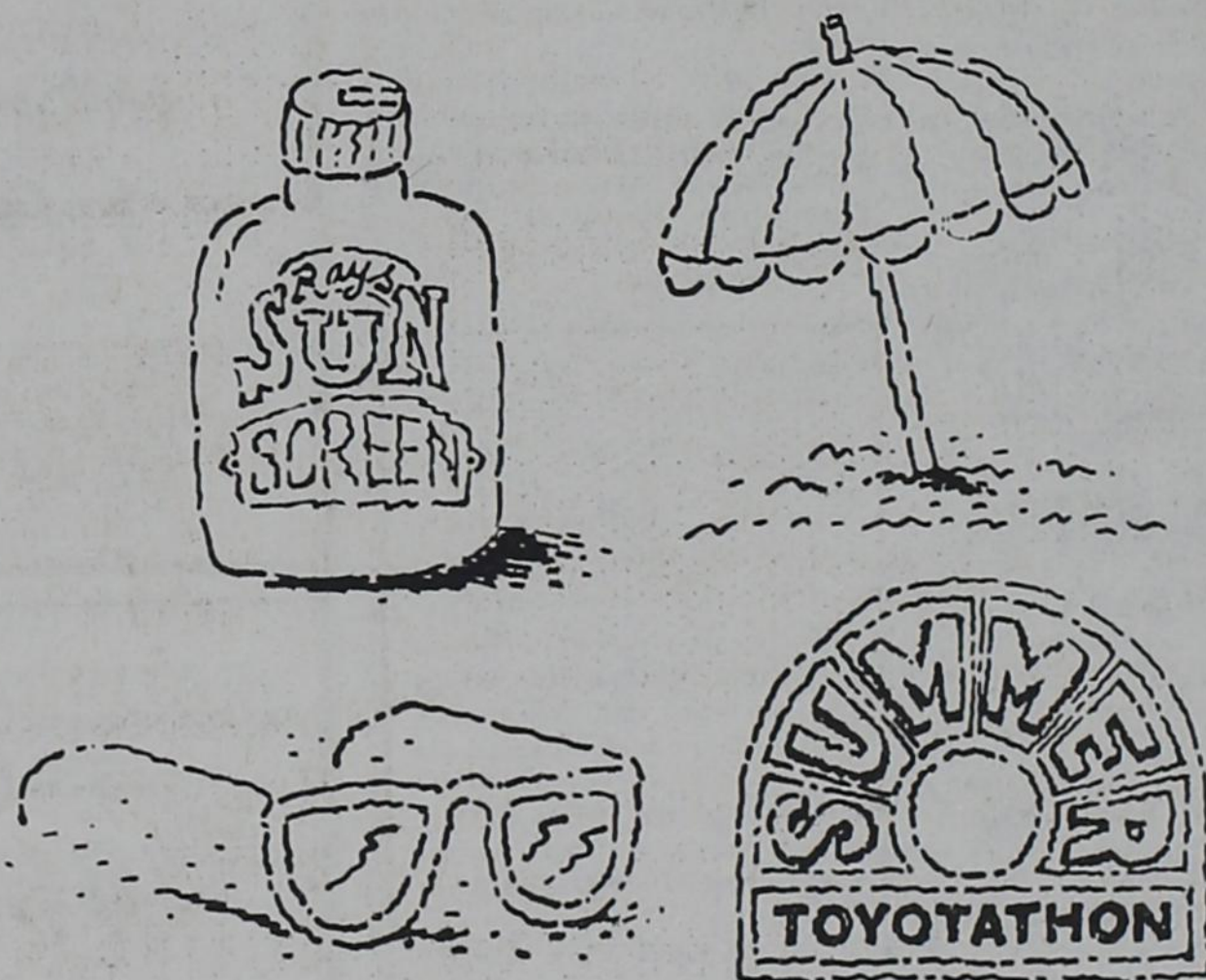

## New coach starts work

## Lumbrera to stand trial

Former Bovina resident Diana Lumbrera will stand trial on charges of murdering her 4-year old son, Jose in Garden City, Kan.

Magistrate Judge Claude Heath heard 2 1/2 days of conflicting testimony before ruling that there was sufficient cause to try Mrs. Lumbrera on the murder charge.


Kansas does not use the grand jury system that Texas does. In Kansas a magistrate rules whether there is sufficient evidence to hold a trial. During the hearing, Judge Heath heard Dr. Eva Vachel of Garden City give evidence that Jose Lumbrera died of "asphyxia due to smothering," while Dr. William Eckert testified that the child died of a chronic viral infection that showed up in his liver, lungs, heart, and other organs.

While she lived in Texas, five of Mrs. Lumbrera's children and one child in her care died suddenly.

No formal charges have been filed against Lumbrera in Texas. The case may come to trial here soon.

"I suspect it will come up on the next Grand Jury," said District Attorney Johnny Actkinson.




Actkinson said Lumbrera is now out of jail on bail while she awaits her trial in Kansas.
