

Col. Peterson to speak at Texico Chamber banquet

Colonel Donald L. Peterson, 27th Tactical Fighter Wing, Cannon Air Force Base, will be the speaker at the annual Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet at 7 p.m. mst April 24 at the Texico school cafeteria.

Tickets for the banquet are \$8 and are available from Chamber members.

Peterson was born July 7, 1944, in Victoria, Texas. He received a bachelor's degree in finance from Texas A&M University in 1966 and earned a master's in management from Auburn University in 1982. He completed the Advanced Management Program at Carnegie Mellon University in May 1988.

The colonel completed

Squadron Officer School and Air Command and Staff College by correspondence in 1975 and 1980 respectively. In 1982 he completed Air War College in residence at Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala.

He was commissioned through the Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps program July 16, 1966, at Altus Air Force Base, Okla. Upon commissioning he was assigned to Webb Air Force Base, Texas, as a student pilot in the 356th Flying Training Wing, until October 1967.

From November 1967 to March 1968 he was a KC-135 student pilot at Castle Air Force Base, Calif.

Peterson was next assigned to the 71st and 913th Air Re-

fueling Squadrons, Barksdale Air Force Base, La., where he served as EC/KC-135 aircraft commander and assistant operations officer from March 1968 to December 1971.

He completed F-4E transition training in October 1972 at MacDill Air Force Base, Fla. From November 1972 to July 1973 he was assigned to the 8th Tactical Fighter Wing, 435th Tactical Fighter Squadron, Ubon Air Base, Thailand, as an F-4E aircraft commander and flight leader.

Upon his return to the states, Colonel Peterson attended F-4 instructor upgrade training at Luke Air Force Base, Ariz.

From September 1973 un-

til September 1977 he was assigned to Homestead Air

Force Base, Fla. While there he served as F-4E instructor pilot; chief, academic instructor pilots; chief, current operations; and assistant operations officer, 31st Tactical Fighter Wing, 307th and 309th Tactical Fighter Squadrons.

Peterson was then assigned to the Pentagon, Washington, D.C., as action officer in the Tactical Division, Directorate of Plans and Operations.

He then attended Air War College, Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala., from August 1981 to May 1982. Upon completion he was reassigned to Luke Air Force Base, Ariz., for

F-15 qualification training.

His next assignment took him to Bitburg Air Base, Germany. From September 1982 to June 1985 he held positions as F-15 operations of-

ficer, 22nd Tactical Fighter Squadron; commander, 525th Tactical Fighter Squadron; and assistant chief of maintenance, 36th Tactical Fighter Wing.

He returned to the states in June 1985 where he was assigned to Headquarters Air Force Military Personnel Center, Randolph Air Force Base, Texas, as the Chief, Operations Officer Assignments Division, until June 1987.

He then served as the vice commander of the 325th

Tactical Training Wing, United States Air Force Defense Weapons Center, Tyndall Air Force Base, Fla., from July 6, 1987 until present.

He assumed his present position July 5, 1988.

Colonel Peterson is a command pilot with 3,350 flying hours, including 597 combat hours.

His military decorations include the Distinguished Flying Cross, Meritorious Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, Air Medal with 10 oak leaf clusters, Air Force Commendation Medal and several unit citations.

He was promoted to the rank of colonel Nov. 1, 1985.

Friona woman dies in county accident

A Friona woman died Tuesday after a two-vehicle accident occurred on an unpaved road 14 miles east of Bovina approaching Texas Highway 86, reported State Trooper Craig Hunt.

Penny Stowers Seiver, 20, died about 11 p.m. at Friona's hospital.

Here's Hunt's report:

Kathy Fant, 19, and Mike Scott, 17, were riding in Scott's truck on a county road when they passed John William Seiver who was walking along the road's shoulder. Further down, Mrs. Fant and Scott saw a pickup belonging to Ashley Gee's father rolled.

Mrs. Fant and Scott were accompanied by Mrs. Fant's two daughters, Tara Williams, 3, and Britanny Fant, 2, and another passenger, Ms. Gee,

- After the key is returned, the city clerk or deputy city clerk must inspect the center. If it has been left in a clean condition and all items intact, the deposit is returned. If not, the deposit is to be used to hire someone to clean the building and/or replace missing items.

The group then took Seiver home and Mrs. Fant offered to drive the Seiver's car to the hospital. Mrs. Fant, Seiver and his wife got into the car and headed to the hospital.

Scott followed in his pickup, accompanied by Mrs. Fant's daughters and Ms. Gee.

The two vehicles later were involved in the accident, with Scott's pickup hitting the Seiver vehicle, said Hunt.

Seiver was listed in stable condition late Tuesday at the Friona hospital. Mrs. Fant and her two children, Scott and Ms. Gee were treated and released.

Snider, Barnes seek election

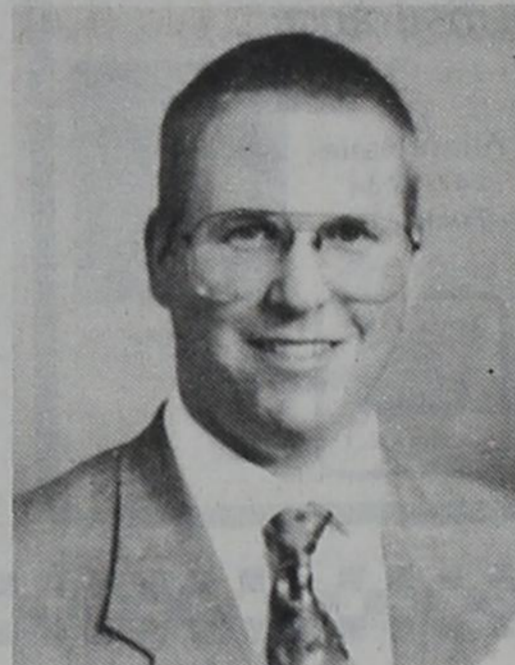
Joel "David" Snider, 31, of Texico, has filed to run for the position of County Commissioner of District 2 in Curry County.

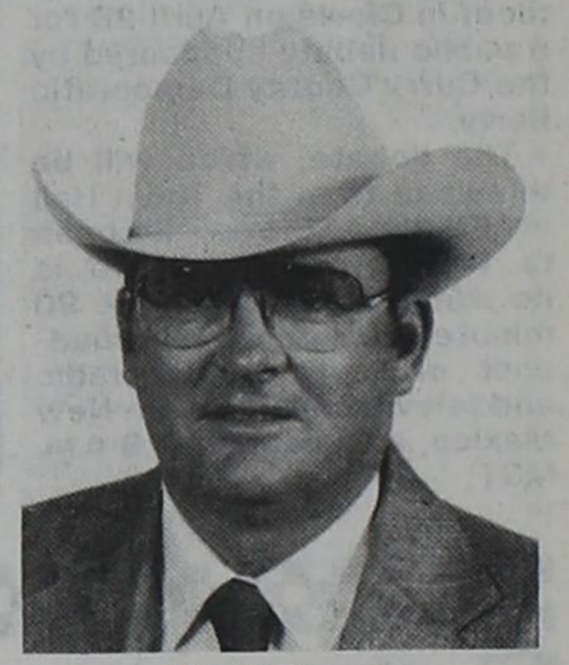

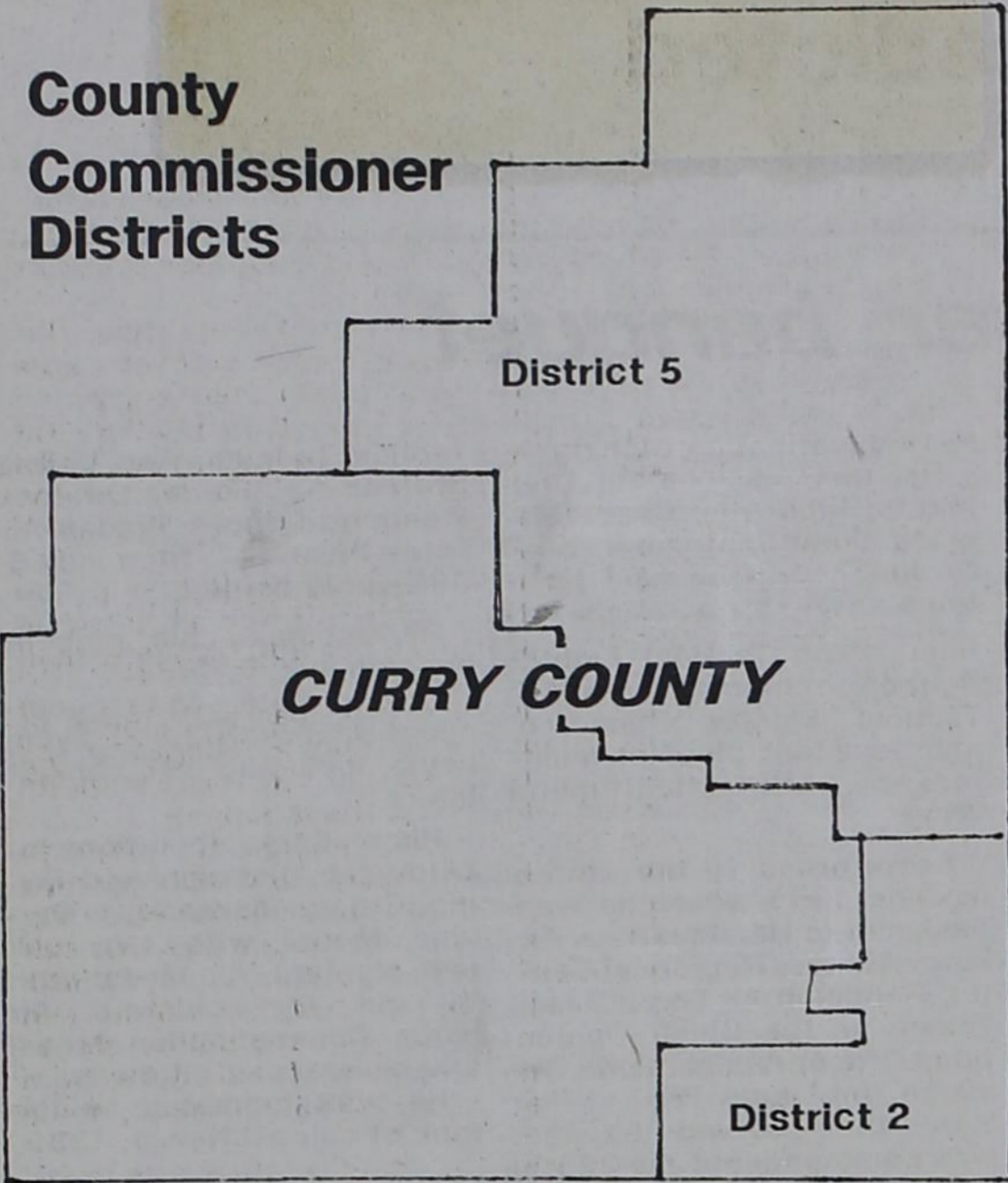

where Barnes is engaged in farming and ranching. Barnes is currently the vice chairman of the Texico School Board. He has served on the school board for the past 5 years. Barnes' civic experience includes:

- Member of the Curry County Farm and Livestock Bureau.
- Member and organizer of the Pleasant Hill Volunteer Fire Department.
- Chairman of the Curry County Men's 42 League.
- Member of the Farmers' Cooperative Elevator Board.
- Served on the Farmers' Electric Cooperative Scholarship Board.
- Served on the Pleasant Hill Alumni Reunion Board.
- Member Advent Christian Church in Clovis.

"I feel my past working experience with K. Barnett and Sons in road construction gives me an enlightened view of road construction and maintenance," said Barnes. "My self employment and service on various boards gives me the business sense needed to be a competent and educated commissioner."

Barnes' only opponent so far in the Democrat primary is Bill Hart. The unopposed Republican candidate is George Patterson.

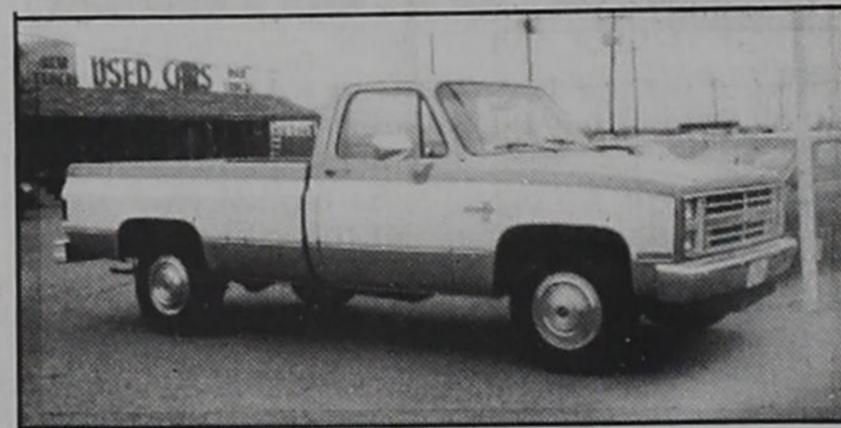

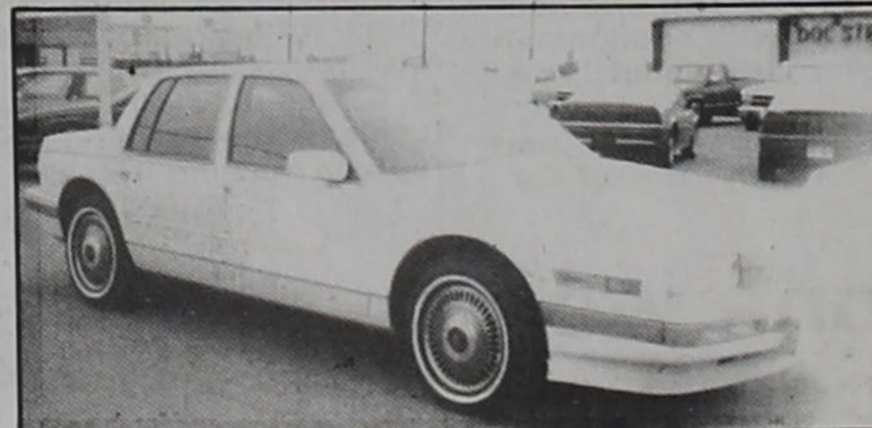

Beef cattle prices predicted

Beef cattle prices to the producer during the next 2 years are predicted to continue near current levels, the highest in about a decade.
 Dr. Ernest E. Davis, economist in livestock marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said producer prices generally will remain at today's levels, although some seasonal fluctuations will occur.
 "We have fewer cattle available this year, and this has tended to keep prices up," Davis said. He expects it to take about 2 years to build the numbers high enough to send prices back down.

Meanwhile, consumer prices for beef are expected to hold steady through the spring and summer.
 Davis said a variety of factors are influencing the price situation, including the drought in Texas and other cattle producing states, the relatively lower amount of beef held in cold storage in U.S. warehouses and the slaughter schedule of feedlot animals across the country.
 Davis said drought in Texas wheat producing areas this season restricted wheat grazing and forced stocker cattle into feedlot animals across the country.

Davis said a variety of factors are influencing the price situation, including the drought in Texas and other cattle producing states, the relatively lower amount of beef held in cold storage in U.S. warehouses and the slaughter schedule of feedlot animals across the country.

Davis said drought in Texas wheat producing areas this season restricted wheat grazing and forced stocker cattle into feedlots earlier than usual, even earlier than last year.
 "As a result, more animals were placed in feedlots for fattening and were slaughtered and placed in the food chain earlier than normal," Davis said. "this has decreased the number of animals available for spring marketings as well as the total number of Texas beef cattle."

Davis said the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Cattle Report shows the current 1990 inventory for all cattle in Texas totals 13.4 million head, but about 200,000 less than last year and the year before.

Current producer prices are about on par with those of 1979. Depending on the auction market location and the class and quality of cattle, producer prices in Texas markets for the past several weeks fall within these ranges:

Lightweight steer calves, 300-400 pounds, 95 cents to \$1.10 a pound; lightweight heifer calves, 300-400 pounds, 82-86 cents; yearling steers, 500 - 600 pounds, 92-96 cents; yearling heifers, 77-79 cents; good- to- medium cow and calf pairs with calves weighing about 200 pounds, around \$800.

Davis said Texas feedlots placed 290,000 cattle and calves on feed during February, 16 percent below placements in February 1989. Marketings of feed cattle from Texas feedlots during February totaled 345,000 head, down 5 percent from a year ago.

"This represents fewer animals going on feed and fewer being slaughtered during that month," Davis said.

He said cattle and calves on feed March 1 in seven major cattle production states - Nebraska, Iowa, California, Colorado, Kansas, Arizona, and Texas- totaled 8.32 million head, 5 percent more than in the two previous years and the largest number on feed since 1974.

But cattle feeders, facing large numbers of feed cattle marketings this summer, reduced the number of cattle and calves placed on feed from January to February by 26 percent.

"Across the seven states, even with feeder cattle supplies down for the eighth consecutive year because of the downslope of the cattle cycle, it looks like we may still feed more cattle than a year ago," Davis said.

Davis said cold storage beef supplies in U.S. warehouses at the beginning of February totaled 265.2 million pounds, down 16 percent from a year ago and 16 percent less than in 1988.

Recipe of Week

Fajita Twist

- 1 1/2 lbs. skirt steak, cut across the grain in 1/2 inch cubes
- 4 tbs. lemon juice
- 4 tbs. cooking oil, divided
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. black pepper
- 2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1 finely chopped jalapeno pepper
- 6 stalks cilantro
- 1 tsp. cumin
- 1 medium onion, sliced, divided
- 1 bell pepper, sliced, divided
- 1 medium chopped tomato
- 1/2 c. picante sauce
- 2 c. buttermilk baking mix
- 1/2 c. cold water
- 1 egg yolk

1 tbs. water
Garnish with: lettuce, tomatoes, grated cheese, sour cream, avocados

This recipe is one of the finalists in the Texas Beef Cook-Off sponsored by the Texas Cattle Women.

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Combine first 9 ingredients in a large dish. Cover and marinate in refrigerator 6 - hours or overnight. Broil about half of the meat until it begins to lose redness, (about 30 seconds). Add 2 tbs. oil and half of green pepper and onion and continue cooking 1-2 minutes or until crisp - tender. Remove from the pan. Repeat with remaining meat, pepper and onion in additional 2 tbs. oil if needed. Return all meat, pepper and onion to pan. Add tomato and picante sauce. Simmer, tossing meat and vegetables 1 minute long and remove from heat. In a medium - sized bowl, combine baking mix and 1/2 c. cold water until soft dough forms; beat vigorously. Gently smooth dough into a ball on surface dusted with baking mix. Knead 5 times. Roll dough into rectangle 11" x 14". Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Spoon fajita mixture lengthwise down center of rectangle. Make cuts 2 1/2" long at 1 inch intervals on 14- inch sides of rectangle. Fold strips over filling. Mix egg yolk and 1 tbs. water; brush over dough. Bake until light brown, 15 to 20 minutes. Serve lettuce, tomatoes, avocados, sour cream and grated cheese around the twist.

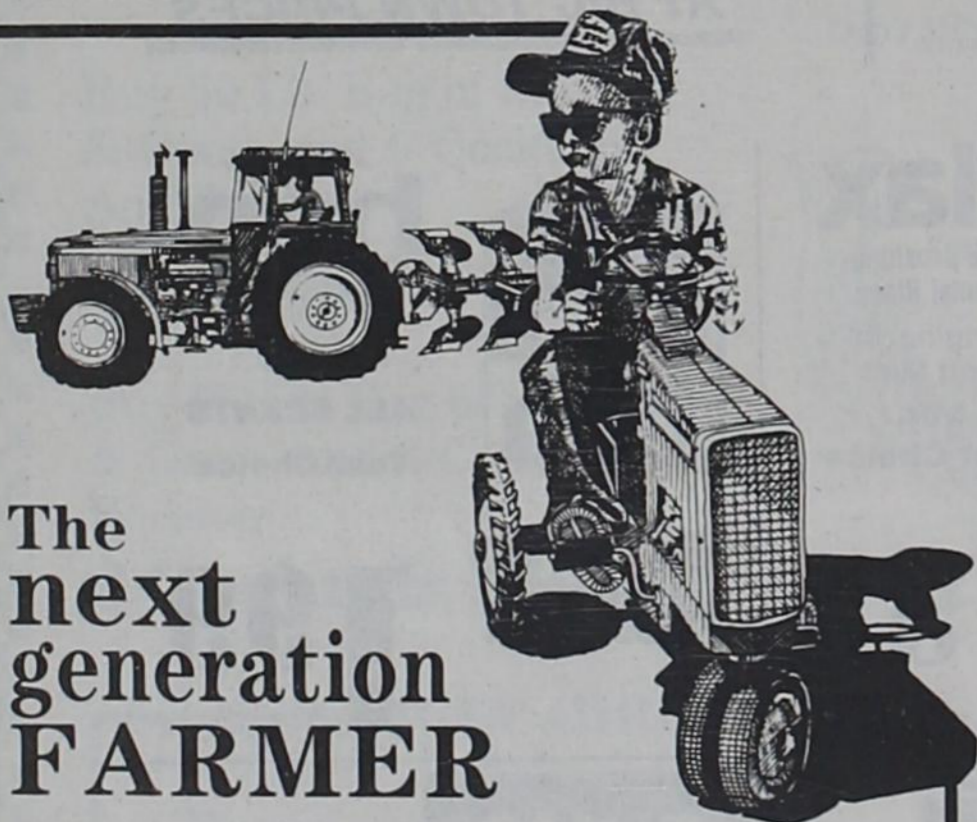
SWCD distributes materials

Parents drew to determine the sex of the newborns. Some parents were disappointed in which sex their babies turned out to be, but as the days went by, they said their disappointment faded. Some parents dressed their babies in appropriate clothes and provided "blankies." Several of the babies were given cloth, balloon, and doll heads. One parent, who wanted a girl was proud of the baseball cap that she found for her baby boy.

During the four days of experiment, "parents" met in Mrs. Lust's class and discussed problems. Lack of reliable babysitters was the number one complaint. According to the rules, no baby was to be left unattended at any time. The parents often had to find babysitters among their peers in other classes each day. "You never know who you can trust," commented one parent.

"Some babysitters tried to poke holes in the babies," stated another indignant parent.

When a similar experiment was tried earlier this year at Farwell High School, the students had a problem with classmates (and coaches) holding the babies for ransom. It usually cost one candy bar to free the "baby" from the kidnapper.

Mrs. Lust reminded students that they had the final responsibility for the babies 24 hours a day, which included careful selection of babysitters, sleeping arrangements, feeding, etc. In addition to caring for their babies, students had to figure the cost of formula and diapers for the four days.

On daily examining of each "baby," Mrs. Lust began to notice an increasing number of bandages. Although she did allow bandages, Mrs. Lust penalized each "parent" two points each day for "bad abuse."

In class, students related several interesting events, as well as things that they learned as the days went by. One student left for school one morning, forgetting her baby. She had to return home for it. Several remarks made by the students showed a new awareness of the responsibilities of parenthood. One student said that he began to dislike his baby because it took away his free time. Another said that here were many things she didn't do for her baby because she didn't know how to do them.

Other comments on the experiment were: "It's hard to go to school," "It's embarrassing," "It's a pain," "Kidnapping is easy," "We don't always get what we want," "There are a lot of dangers and demands in having a kid."

Most of the students agreed that they did "get attached" to their flour sack babies and they learned a lot through this project. Mrs. Lust looked forward to the discussion each day and was pleased with the learning that took place with this enjoyable project.

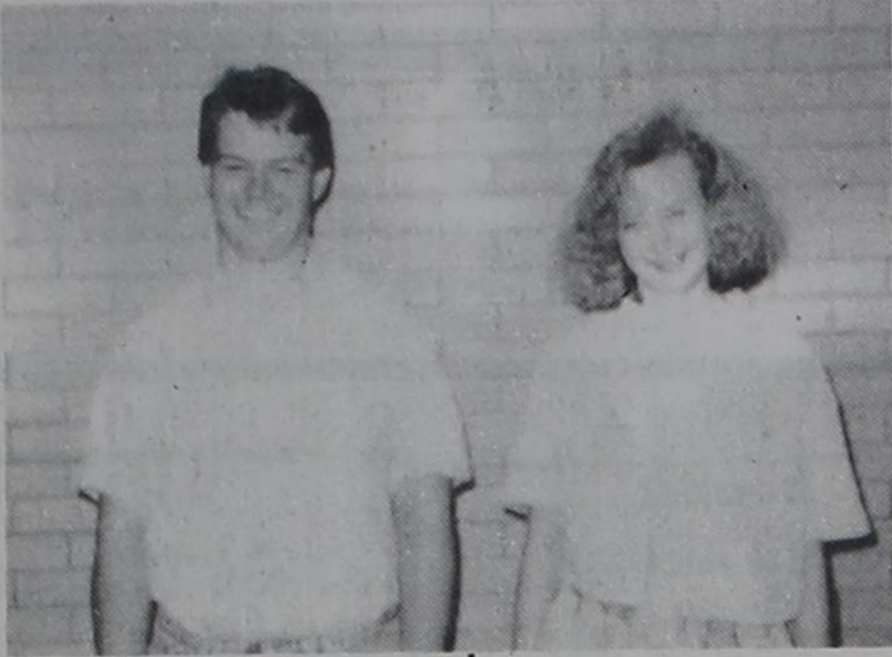

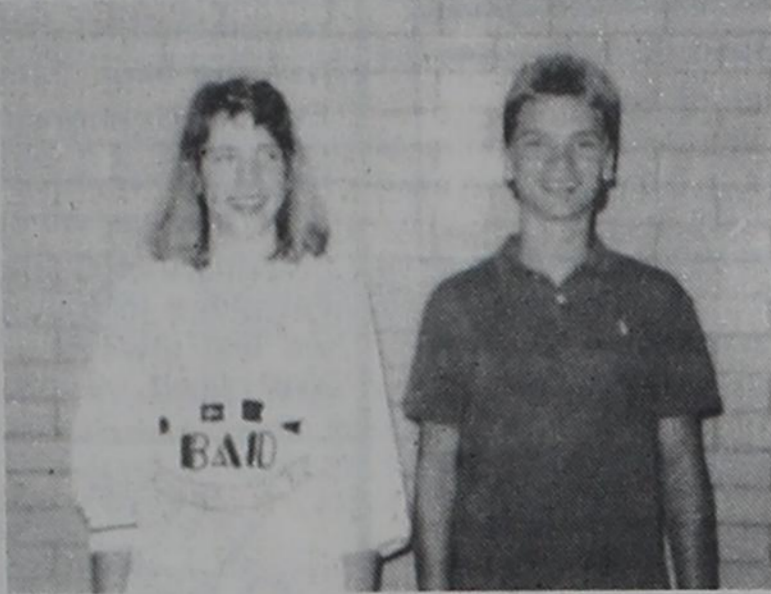

Texas corn producers have approved a statewide referendum to establish a half-cent per bushel checkoff to fund corn research and market development.

The referendum was conducted under guidelines of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law. The measure passed with 68 percent of those voting casting a "for" vote.

The checkoff has been in effect in a seven-county area of the Panhandle - South Plains area for 10 years. The Texas Corn Producers Board, made up of growers from the seven-county area, requested the statewide referendum after receiving numerous requests for research and other assistance from growers in other producing areas of Texas.

With the passage of the referendum, the board was expanded from 9 to 15 members. Three previous board positions were up for election at the same time as the referendum. These posts, along with six other at-large positions, were also voted upon by producers casting ballots in the referendum.

Texico School will sponsor a free Health Fair in conjunction with kindergarten registration April 25 from 9 - 11 a.m. MST in the Educational Complex.

Supt. James Pierce said, "We would like the parents of all students eligible for kindergarten to bring birth certificates and immunization records with them. Health Fair activities include screenings for pre-schoolers, those children birth to four years of age, and kindergartners. Screenings include pre-readiness, physical development, speech and language development and vision and hearing testing. There will also be a review of health and immunization records as well as check-

ing height and weight. Pierce continued, "We encourage all parents, not just those with kindergartners, to bring their pre-schoolers to visit our Health Fair."

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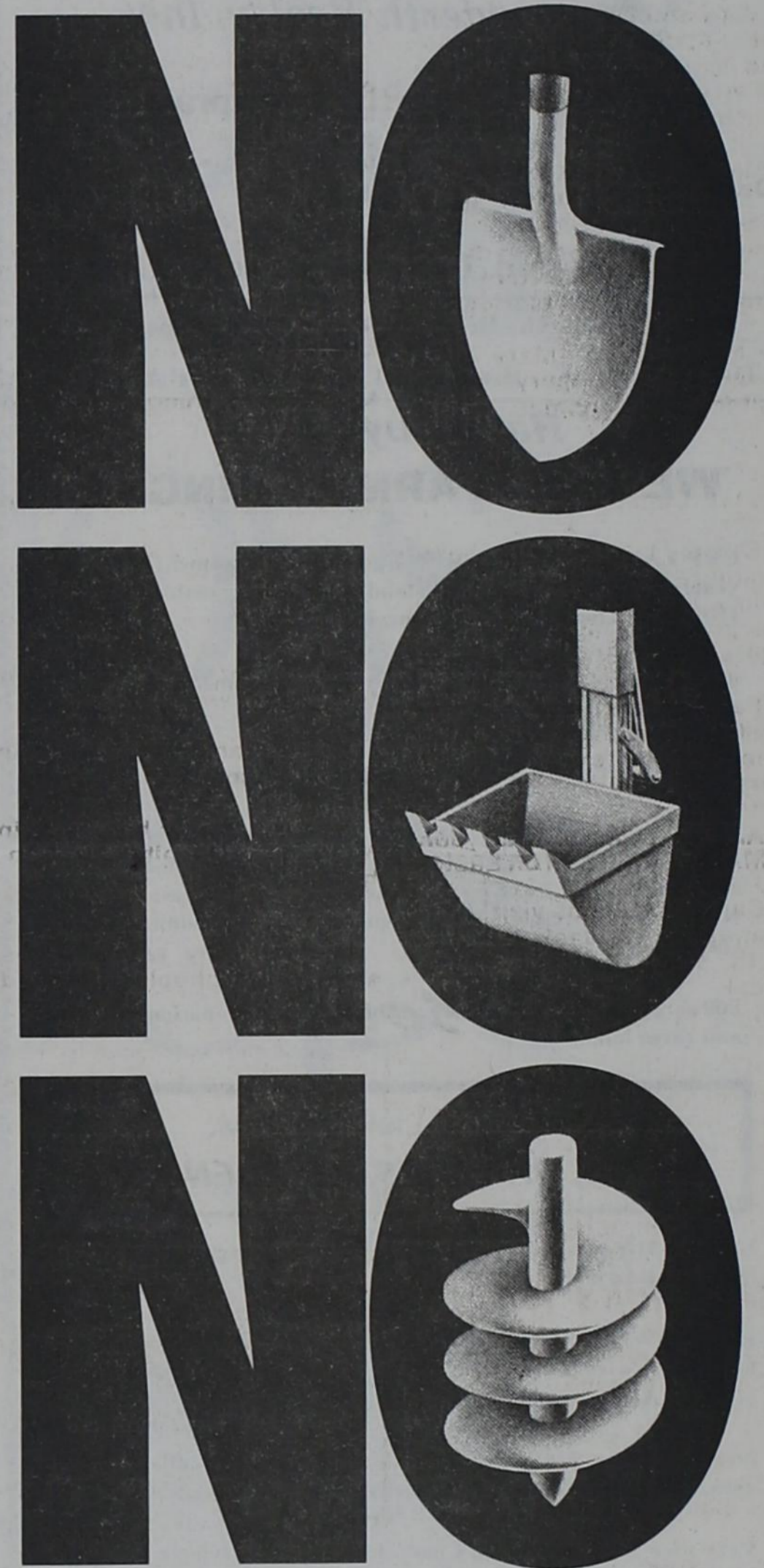
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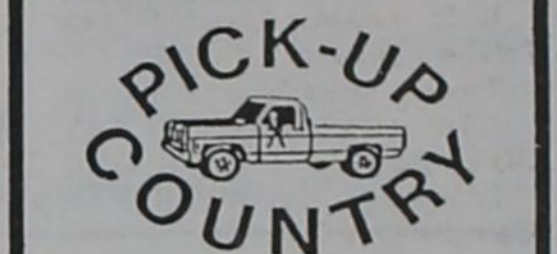

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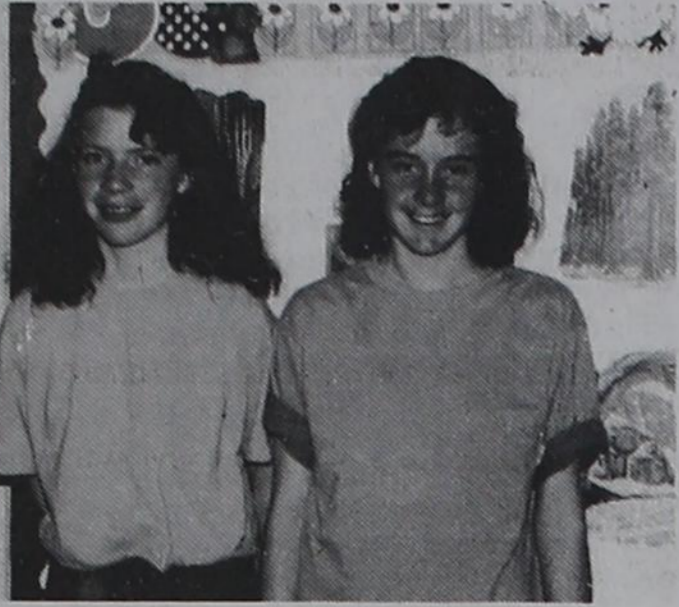
