

d. The Queen must attend a college, university, trade or vocational school to gain the scholarship.

e. The scholarship check will be made payable to the school of choice of the Queen.

f. The Queen will forfeit the scholarship if she does not complete her term as Queen or does not further her education upon completion of high school.

g. Interest built up in this account will be used for future scholarships.



Mrs. Jennings died on June 6 in the Farwell Convalescent Center.



ministrative proposal to borrow money for it. The work will cost \$37,594. The high school also needs a compressor replaced on an air conditioner and several other maintenance jobs done.

Supt. John Grigsby had proposed that the money for this project be borrowed until the school knows how much money it will get from the state.

Member Tom Nichols spoke against borrowing. "Save it for an emergency," he said. He proposed paying the bills out of the school's maintenance budget rather than spending 11 percent per year on interest.

So the board decided to start paying for the project from funds on hand but will need to make budgetary changes later.

Heard Athletic director Rex Cumpton give a tentative schedule of athletic events for the next year and reported on summer activities.

Heard Cafeteria Director Linda Moss give a report on the increase funding the school cafeteria has received from the severe need supplemental funds. This has made a significant difference in cafeteria revenues.

- Maintenance and Transportation Director Joe Stanton reported that the school

needs to remove an underground gas tank and replace a compressor on the air conditioner in the auditorium. He also noted that the school needs to replace one school bus.

 Elementary School principal James Craig gave his final report after 30 years in the school system. He noted that there are two elementary school classes with enrollments of 44 students each. If those classes increase in size, they may need 3 teachers for each grade level instead of 2.

- Heard Grigsby report that tax collections were going well.

- Heard Johnson compliment the efforts made by staff and administration to cut expenses this year. Operating costs of the schools have declined dramatically this year.

 Heard a report on the library from Marion Hudson.

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

Southwestern Stuffed Whole Beef Tenderloin

1- 4 1/2 - 5 lb. trimmed beef tenderloin 2 shallots, finely minced 2 serrano peppers, seeded and finely chopped 1 poblano pepper, seeded and julienne cut 1/2 c. sliced fresh mushrooms 1/4 c. chopped parsley 1/4 c. butter 1 c. bread crumbs 2 fresh rosemary sprigs 7 thick slices peppered bacon toothpicks 1 onion, sliced 1 each yellow and red bell peppers, sliced

1/2 c. burgundy wine Lightly saute shallots, seranos, poblano, mushrooms, and parsley in butter. Toss with bread crumbs. Cut horizontal slit down the middle of tenderloin, creating a pocket for stuffing. Stuff meat with sauteed mixture. Place rosemary sprigs on tenderloin and wrap tenderloin with bacon. Secure with toothpicks. Place meat in open roasting pan on bed of sliced onion, yellow and red peppers. Insert meat thermometer in thickest part of tenderloin. Roast at 425 degrees until thermometer reaches 135 degrees (for rare, approximately

Cotton plantings to be up

High Plains cotton producers at sign-up time indicated the intent to plant 3.149 million acres of cotton in 1990, up 378,000 and 13.64 percent from 2.771 million planted in 1989.

Those are the figures compiled by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., based on preliminary ASCS figures.

The expected hike stems from a reduction in the acreage conservation reserve (ACR) requirement, from 25 percent of base acres in 1989 to this year's 12.5 percent.

Here's how Parmer County looks:

1990 total effective base - 77,200; 1990 enrolled effective base - 71,672; 1989 planted acres - 47,892; 1990 intended plantings - 53,842.

And Bailey County:

1990 total effective base - 117,294; 1990 enrolled effective base - 114,384; 1989 planted acres - 78,852; 1990 intended plantings - 93,462.

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






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Here's what new Texas school finance law may mean here

Local school officials are waiting for details concerning the impact of the new Texas school financing legislation on their schools.

If the new legislation is not overturned by the federal court which found the financing sections of school laws unconstitutional, then administrators will find out the specific impact of the new legislation on their school systems when they attend workshops in July. Until then, they will have to try to plan budgets without knowing exactly how much money the school systems will get. They do have some pretty good guesses, though.

From information that he has received from TSTA, Farwell Supt. John Grigsby is projecting that Farwell Schools may get about \$180,000 more this year than last year. It is also possible that Farwell will get more the following year - possibly as much at \$300,000.

"But, that's just a guess," he quickly added.

Lazbuddie Supt. Joe Hall also believes that the new legislation will be good for their school system. "It looks pretty good for us so far," he summed up.

The new legislation is tied to the maximum tax effort made by the school system. Those schools which have shown that they have tried to tax their constituents are favored over those systems which have made a small tax effort.

"If you do not have above a certain level of tax rate, you do not get as much back from the state. We should get the maximum amount we are allowed by the state," said Grigsby.

According to Hall, the new legislation is tied to a tax rate of 91 cents or higher to get the maximum amount of state support for the schools.

He noted that Lazbuddie has a tax rate of 98 cents, and Bovina has a tax rate of 93 cents. They will, therefore, benefit. He also indicated that Friona may lose money from the state because it has a tax rate of 70 cents.

There is one category of funds which Lazbuddie may not receive under the new regulations - compensatory funds. These funds have been changed to supplementary funds.

Compensatory funds made up for problems a school system had. Now these funds are available only to schools which do not qualify for federal funding in certain areas.

If a school system is receiving a large amount of money in certain programs from the federal government, the state funds will be decreased. Lazbuddie may lose \$55,000 from



the maximum amount that a school system of that size with a tax rate of 98 cents could possibly get because of the amount of federal funds it receives.

But, it appears that they will still get more money over all than they had in the past.

"We were at the point of strain," said Hall. He indicated that Lazbuddie still had carryover funds and its facilities are in good shape, but they were doing everything they possibly could to carry out their programs as cheaply as possible.

"We couldn't have made it this year," said Hall. He noted that his staff and students already do all of the school system's maintenance without hired help except a bus mechanic.

The new legislation is designed to reapportion state school funds so that there is equity between school districts. Some school systems have more tax base than others to finance their schools. Also, some school systems have a higher portion of students who have special needs (such as migrant children who need intensive language instruction). Those school systems cost more to operate than others do, and they get a large portion of their funding from the federal government.

state on the basis of value of taxable items, but it is not one of the poorest. Bovina and Lazbuddie are listed as poorer school districts than Farwell is. They receive more federal funding than Farwell does. They also have much lower tax rates than Farwell does.

federal court. "We have to find out if the new bill passes constitutional muster," Grigsby summed up. "I don't know if this bill dealt with the equity problem at all."

according to Grigsby, is that the new bill does not tell school systems what they must spend money on. Under the previous




legislation (House Bill 72), school systems were required to spend more than they received to support the new programs mandated by the state. Many of the new programs under House Bill 72 were tied to categorical funding.

With categorical funds, a school system gets a certain amount of money for a specific purpose. They have to show that they have expended this amount of money for the specific purpose for which it was intended and for nothing else. School systems had to show that they had spent the categorical funds, or they would lose those funds. The new legislation does not require categorical funding.

Grigsby stressed that Texas is not the only state having problems concerning school financing.

Last summer Kentucky voided its entire educational system - certification, accreditation, financing, everything. Oklahoma has also had major school finance problems this year.

"There are probably about 18 equity suits around the country right now. Some of them have been in the courts 10 - 15 years," said Grigsby.





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

Farwell receives garbage pickup bid

Tuesday received a bid from **MISSCO Waste Management** Control, Amarillo, to handle the city's garbage pickups.

It was taken under advisement and city officials will seek other bids.

MISSCO said it would provide a minimum of 200 containers at a cost of \$64 per container per month - a minimum of \$12,800 a month or \$16 per household.

Since current Farwell taxes raise about \$7,800 for garbage pickup, this could mean a 50 percent hike in the trash rates if the MISSCO bid were accepted.

"We need to talk with other companies," said Mayor Chris Gikas. "This is a starting point." He also noted that 200 containers might not be enough.

The Farwell City Council would be picked up one time per week. Trash would be hauled to the Canyon, Texas, landfill.

The price "is good only at current federal, state and local regulation rates. This quote is based on current landfill regulations, dump fees and fuel prices. The terms of this contract shall be fore a period of not less than five years."

The City of Farwell would be responsible for:





The Texico City Council Tuesday postponed its meeting to next Tuesday due to a lack of quorum.






