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Garbage

What should Farwell do about it?

Editor's note: Since trying to understand the trash problems facing Farwell may have been confusing over the past several months, the State Line Tribune thought this would be a good time to present a chronology of events.

The following statements are taken from Tribune reports of the Farwell City Council meetings in the months stated.

February 1989

Water Dept. Supt. Dee Hammitt reported that unless the law is changed, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has mandated all burning to cease, starting in August 1989. However, political entities have between 12 and 18 months to obey the order.

Currently, Farwell has been exempt under a statute allowing communities under 3,000 population to burn trash.

The council took no official action on the upcoming statute since it felt there was plenty of time to act. There was a discussion of what Friona and Bovina are doing toward a landfill.

The county plans to place a large container from an Amarillo firm in the Lazbuddie area since the Lazbuddie dump site was closed by the state. And they are considering placing other containers in other county areas.

Also discussed were the benefits of Farwell operating its own landfill vs. using a countywide landfill vs. having a private contractor handle the refuse.

April 1989

Farwell proposed an ordinance that would raise garbage rates from \$4.50 a month to \$8 a month for residential users, and from \$5.50 to \$9 a month for commercial users.

The action was taken after it was shown that the water and sanitation budget was running over \$12,000 in the red for the year.

The council had a spirited discussion on an upcoming issue: trash.

The latest word Farwell has received is that after Aug. 30, 1989, open burning will no longer be allowed. There may be another utility rate increase at that time.

And due to tighter federal standards, by 1992 cities such as Farwell likely will be out of the landfill business.

It was noted that burning of fields already is outlawed, but the law hasn't been enforced yet.

The council discussed Parmer County's recent action (placing a container near Friona with the trash hauled away by a private firm). It appears the cost for Farwell may be prohibitive.

Mayor Chris Gikas is going to an area mayor's meeting next week and will talk with area government officials about landfills and trash collections.

May 1989

Farwell discussed buying a used bulldozer. Bids will be asked. After Aug. 30, open burning will be prohibited and the landfill must be kept covered - thus necessitating a bulldozer.

June 1989

Farwell faced what it would do when open burning in the city ends Aug. 30.

Hammitt presented some equipment estimates: a new compactor to pick up trash, at \$62,000; a 1981 rebuilt compactor, at \$23,000; dumpsters to be placed in alleys, at \$69,000; Or \$93,000 for a 5-year lease purchase agreement including a compactor and dumpsters.

If the city handles collection, one contractor would be needed and one person would operate it.

Various options were stated:
- Contract the pickups to a private firm. Haul the refuse to Amarillo.

- Have residents buy their own individual small compactors.

- Dump items such as tree limbs at the Clovis landfill.

It was noted that once the city landfill fills up, it is unlikely that Farwell could finance a new landfill since new federal rules virtually prohibit new small landfills.

Hammitt was asked to check into the options and report back.

July 1989

Gikas reported the end to open burning in the city may extend past the Aug. 30 deadline that had been given earlier.

He said he talked with officials of the state Air Pollution Control Board and "we have a little added time, but we must prove we are doing something."

Farwell has contacted waste disposal firms, bought a bulldozer for the city landfill, and gotten cost estimates for dumpsters and other equipment that will be needed when burning ends.

August 1989

"We have to stop burning at the landfill by Aug. 30," said Hammitt.

He indicated there may be a lapse of a few months before state officials begin levying fines on individuals who burn trash behind their homes, but the city will definitely have to stop burning at the landfill by Aug. 30.

Gikas said he had talked to the mayor of Hereford at a meeting. "We are all faced with the same problems," he said.

Hereford will have to spend more than \$50,000 to upgrade its incinerator to meet new federal guidelines. Gikas suggested that Hereford and Farwell might work out an agreement so that Farwell could use Hereford's incinerator for burning tree limbs and grass for a fee.

September 1989

Gikas reported on a 3-day solid waste management conference he had attended.

In a nutshell, the Farwell dump where trash, tree limbs, etc., are currently taken, must be closed by February 1990. Farwell can keep it open beyond that time but due to strict federal rules, it would be cost prohibitive. This is the same situation Texico found itself in last spring when it had to hurriedly close its landfill.

So Gikas listed several options: a countywide landfill, a regional landfill, building an incinerator, paying a service to haul trash to Amarillo, paying a fee to Clovis and

trucking trash there, or using Waste Control of New Mexico, the service now handling Texico's trash.

Waste Control places Poly Karts at each home and business. Gikas said they would be placed in Farwell alleys if this course is chosen.

Gikas said that the only landfills that will feasibly meet new federal rules are those which service a minimum of 30,000 population.

The council asked Gikas to check further into costs before a decision is made.

October 1989

Waste Management, which handles Texico's trash, informed Farwell that Farwell needs to enter into its own contract with the Clovis landfill. Hammitt said Clovis sanitation officials see no problem with this but it must be acted upon by the City Commission on Nov. 2.

Councilmen Fred Chandler and Gloria Hutchins said Farwell residents oppose the use of Poly Karts.

Farwell will look into buying its own truck and containers. Also, it will check with an Amarillo firm on hauling trash to Clovis.

November 1989

Farwell discussed with Hammitt buying a garbage truck and containers. The mayor and council appeared favorable to buying Poly Karts, such as used in Texico, which would be placed in alleys in Farwell.

The city is still waiting word from Clovis on whether it can haul trash to the Clovis landfill. There's a good chance the Farwell landfill will officially be closed on Feb. 1, 1990. Gikas and Hammitt will see the Clovis city manager about this shortly.

December 1989

Hammitt reported that Clovis officials have put on hold whether to allow Farwell to dump its refuse at the Clovis landfill until next spring, to see if the state legislature takes any action involving landfills.

If the Clovis landfill is unavailable, Gikas said the city may need to hire a private Amarillo firm to haul Farwell trash to Amarillo or an intermediate site. He said the opportunity for a regional landfill in West Texas is still years away.

Hammitt said state officials have told him the Farwell landfill won't have to close in February 1990 as had been thought. Hammitt was told the city (and others) could have 18 months past that February deadline to close their landfills.

Hammitt stressed that the state officials refuse to put anything in writing but simply tell him that "it's our understanding" of how the EPA is enforcing the law.

April 1990

Farwell raised its trash pickup rates 50 percent, effective June 1, contingent on its legality.

The legality involves the question of raising extra funds that will be held in abeyance for future needs.

The monthly residential cost will increase from \$8 to \$12; the hike for businesses is

Texico cleanup plans begin

Texico City Councilman Ronnie Warmuth is spearheading a major cleanup drive for the community, tentatively scheduled to start in September.

Toward this end, he is sending out letters this week to Texico organizations (both youth and adult), churches and combined Texico-Farwell groups, seeking their support.

"For us to have a successful campaign to clean up the debris - both small and large - we need the support of the community," said Warmuth. Four candidates are seeking two positions - Mike Woods, David Norton, Royce Bethel and Charles Christian.

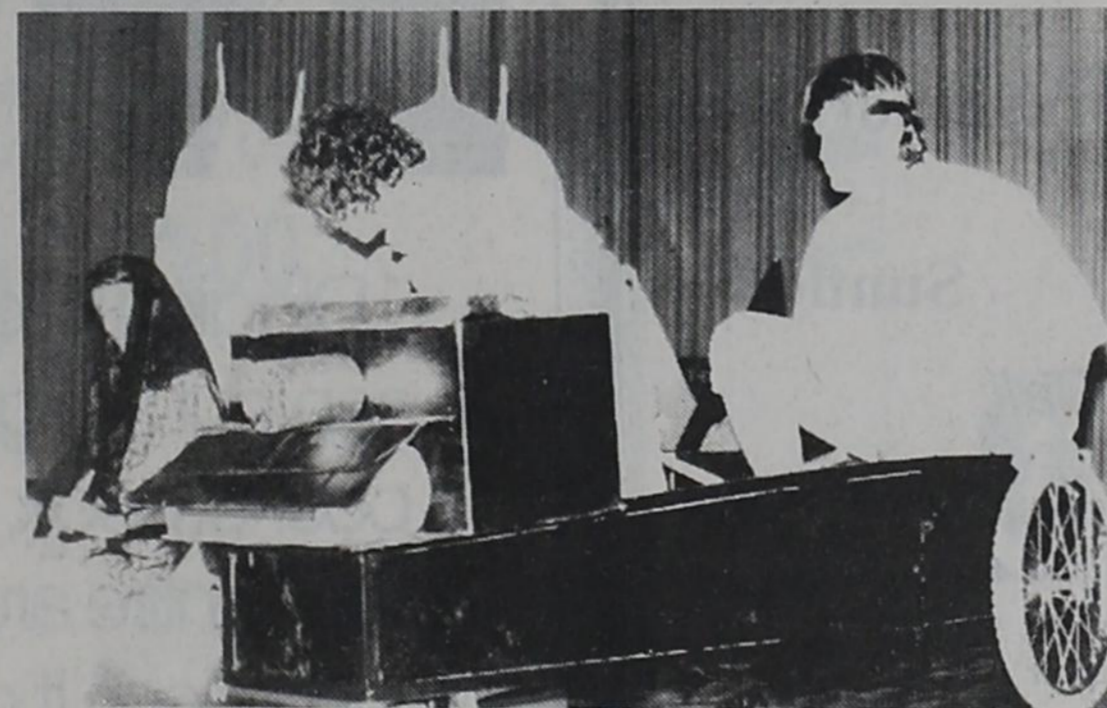
Farwell City Council

special low-interest loan program available from the Texas Veterans Land Board.

The free seminar will be held at VFW Post 1475, 1401 W. 8th St., Amarillo, at 6 p.m. May 9. It's hosted by Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro and Potter County Judge Elisha Demerson.

The Texas Veterans Land Board offers a \$57,500 total low-interest loan package that enables Texas veterans to buy land, purchase a home, or make home improvements to an existing home. It was started in 1984.

Veterans can borrow up to \$17,500 at a fixed rate of 10 1/2 percent interest (plus FHA Title 1 insurance) for up to 15 years. The minimum loan is \$4,000. If the loan is for less than \$7,500 the maximum term of the loan is 10 years. The loans require no down payment and all loans are FHA insured.

from \$9 to \$13.50.

The tax hike was made after councilman Prentice Mills pointed out the upcoming problem with trash collection saying a "war chest" is needed and planning should start for when the Farwell landfill is closed.

It was reported that Curry County officials have told Farwell that they will not allow trash placed in their landfill from out of their own county.

Noting the possible need for Farwell to buy vehicles and containers, Mills said the 50 percent hike probably won't be enough to cover the expected expenses, but it's a start.

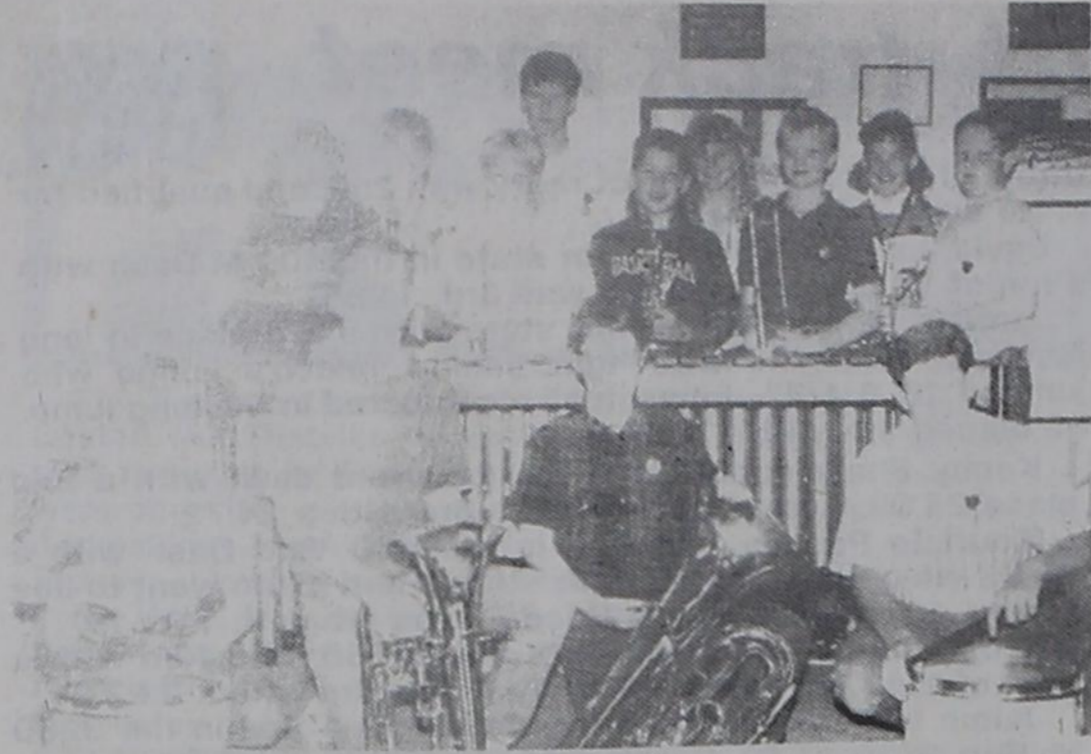

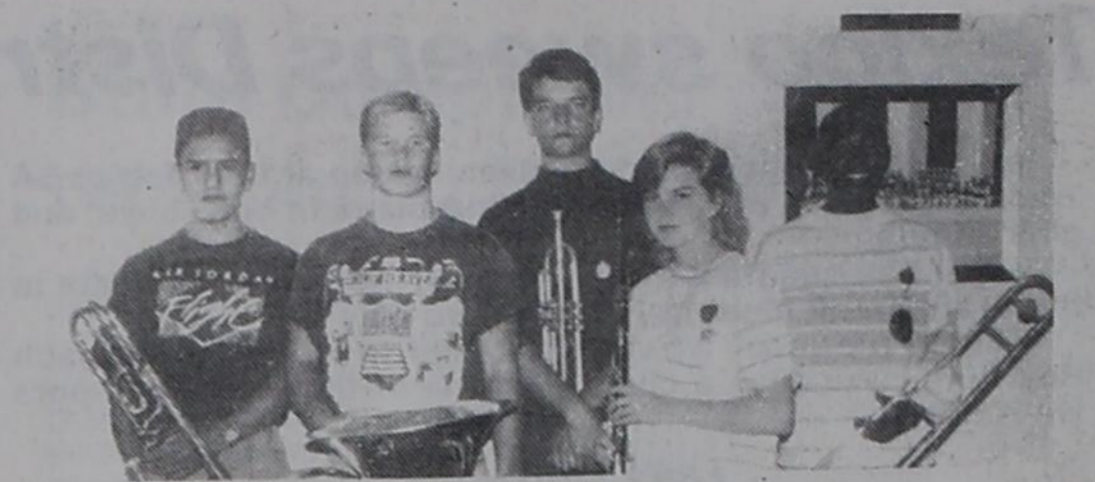

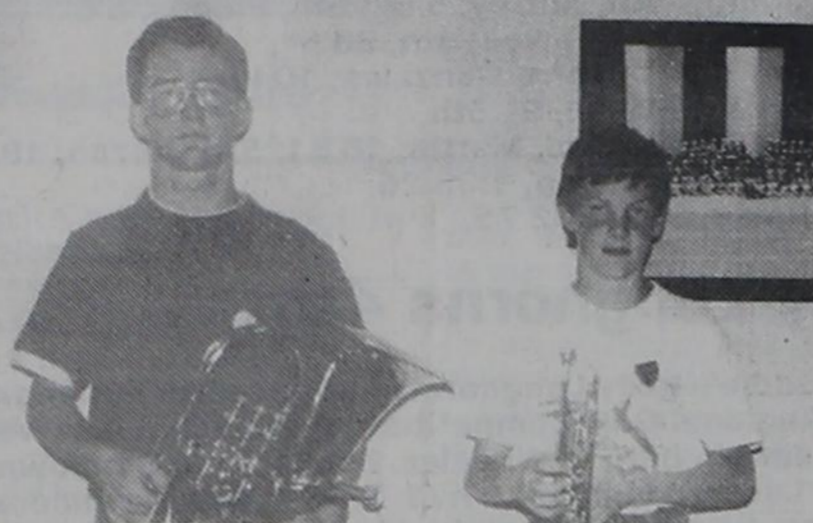

Recipe of Week

Dijon Lamb Chops

- 8 3/4" loin lamb chops
- 1 c. olive oil
- 1 c. brandy
- 2 T. fresh rosemary
- 2 tsp. seasoned pepper
- 4 minced garlic cloves
- 4 T. Italian bread crumbs
- 2 T. melted butter
- 1 c. Dijon mustard, divided

Place chops in shallow dish. Combine, mixing well, olive oil, brandy, rosemary, pepper and minced garlic.

Pour over chops. Cover and marinate in refrigerator six to eight hours, turning chops several times. Remove chops from marinade. Combine bread crumbs, butter, and 1/2 cup mustard; mix well and spread on top of chops.

Broil 11 inches from heat for 10 minutes. Remove and add remaining mustard. Broil 5 minutes more or to desired degree of doneness. Let stand 5 minutes before serving. Makes 4 servings.

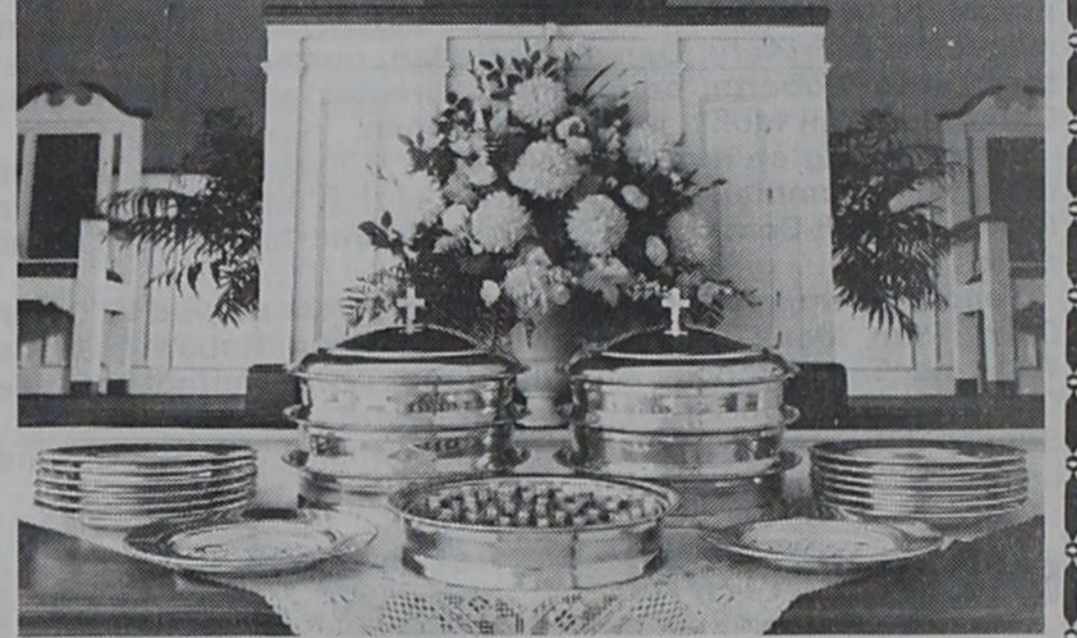

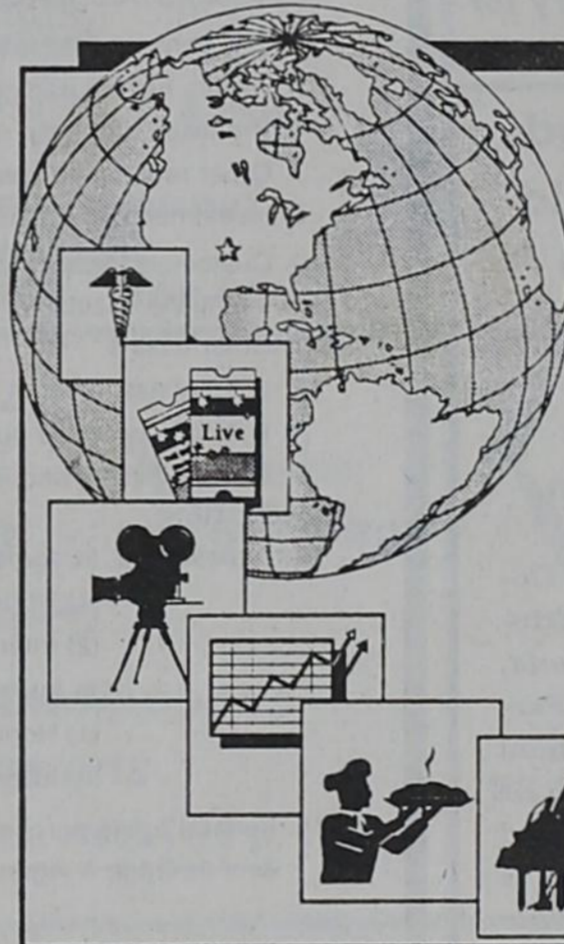

Frawell's Shawn Stewart placed first at the Regional Track Meet in Abilene in the 200 M. Dash with a time of 21.84.

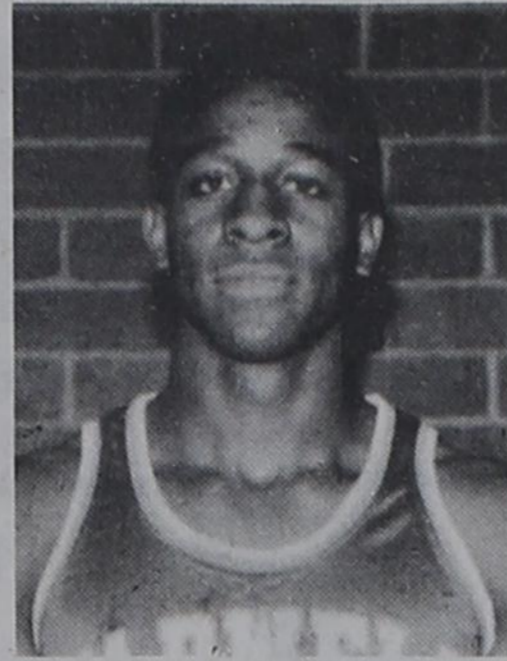
This broke a long-standing Farwell High School record held by Duke Kirkland.

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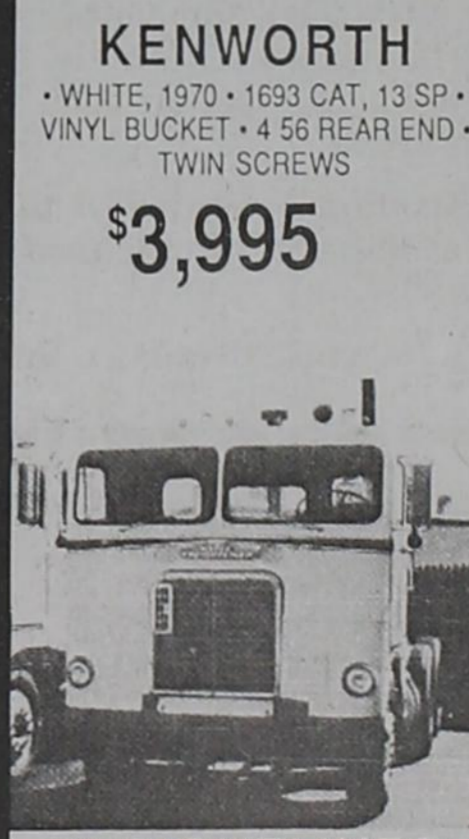
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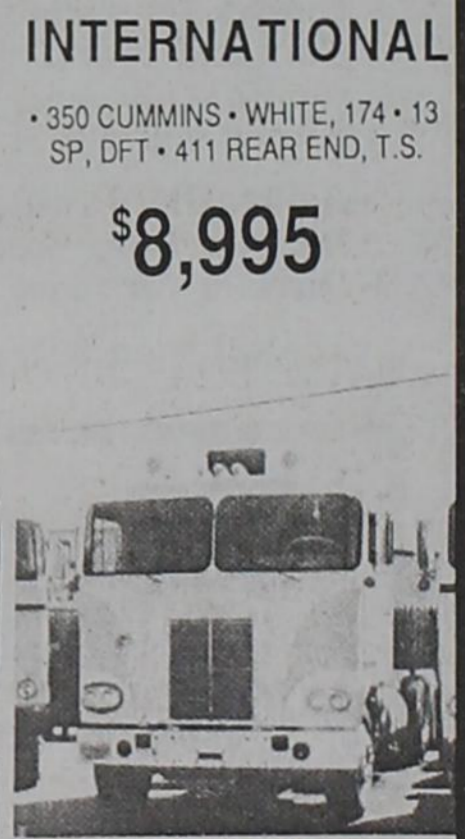
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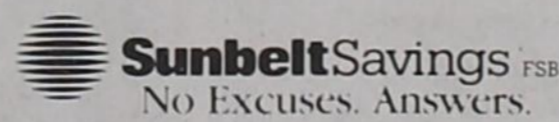
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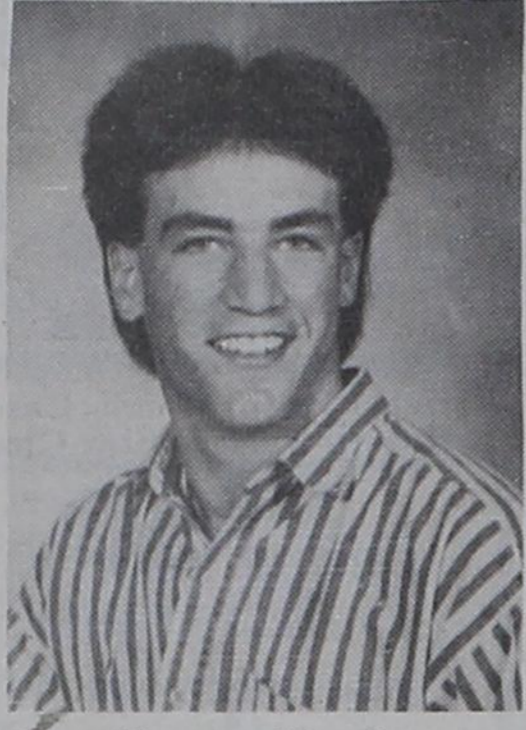
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Hamilton picked as Texico's nominee
