Proposal asked for trash haul

spent the better part of Fred Chandler, Martin Kube its Tuesday meeting dealing with the upcoming garbage question.

of MISSCO, a trash hauling firm from Amarillo, attended the session. He was asked to present a proposal for a 5-year contract period. The proposal is expected within and 7 "yes" replies. The mat-60 days.

The MISSCO proposal concerns 3-yard containers (5 feet by 4 feet), each serving four families. There may be a transfer station, too. Trash would be hauled to Canyon, Texas. And it was indicated the cost would be "in the ballpark" of the new monthly garbage rate of \$12 per residential customer.

Mayor Chris Gikas said the EPA regulations which govern landfills, including Farwell's, are now expected out in November. They were to be announced in July. "The sooner we get out of the landfill business, the better off we will be," he said.

Gikas also said the city "is on the verge" of being allowed to use the Clovis landfill, because that landfill has used federal funds. Federal laws supercede state laws, so even if New Mexico says it won't accept garbage from another state at its landfills, if those landfills have accepted federal funds, the federal government often can force them to do so. So far, Clovis has said "no" to Far-

Cluck said that it would be much cheaper if he hauls Farwell trash to Clovis rather than Canyon. He also said Farwell alleys may be too narrow for his trucks.

If Farwell has its trash hauled by a private contractor, than those residences just outside the city limits would have to contract privately with the contractor or find another method of having their trash hauled.

The council also approved the garbage rate hike (\$4 a month to \$8 a month for residences), effective June 1. When this was discussed last month, the question of legality arose over having these extra funds saved for a "war chest" to buy equipment. Gikas reported it was legal to have a contingency

Parents' request rejected

The Farwell School Board Tuesday rejected a request by several parents to change the 1990-91 school calendar that was adopted last month.

Stan Austin, spokesman for several parents, said the calendar that the board adopted for 1990-91 has a spring break that is too late for most farm families.

"It doesn't allow farmers a chance to go some place with their families. The only thing we are going to do (on the spring break in March) is plant corn and water," he said.

He also said the later spring break discourages students from showing livestock at the Houston and San Antonio Livestock shows.

"You required every incoming freshman to take a vocational course; it looks like you shot yourself in the foot," he said. "Stock Shows catch that "kink"- that interest in agriculture. They teach our youth how agriculture and life really are."

Austin said the San Antonio and Houston Livestock shows offer \$1 million per year in scholarship money. This year, he said, Farwell students won 3 \$ 1,000 scholarships, 1 \$4,000 scholarship and one full scholarship. In the past several years, he told the board, more than \$134,000 has come back to Parmer County in scholarships because of livestock shows.

County Agricultural Extension Agent Gary Patterson asked the board to do what is best for the kids.

After much discussion, the board defeated a motion by Ronald Byrd to move the spring back to February 4-3. Voting for the motion were Roberta Johnson, Steven Kaltwasser, and Byrd.

Voting against were Tom Nichols, Katherine White, Joe Schilling, and Doyle Johnson. Johnson said they were following a committee recommendation on the calendar, and the teachers had recommended the later spring break repeatedly, but had been outvoted for several

Texico cleanup plans progress

This fall's scheduled major cleanup in Texico was the prime topic at Tuesday's City Council meeting.

Councilman Ronnie Warmuth is spearheading the project. Last week, he sent 16 letters to local churches and organizations, both adult and youth, asking for their support.

A "brainstorming" session will be held in June, with the cleanup tentatively set for September. This will allow students to participate.

Student participation is vital since one of the plans calls for fliers to be delivered to each home, letting residents know of what the plans call for. The fliers will be in English and Spanish. Also, if planting is part of the project, then students' participation is vital.

Early plans call for a massive cleanup, ranging from trash on lawns to large pieces of rusted, to planting new flowers and shrubs.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said some folks would like it to be held before Border Town Days. But Warmuth explained that, due to the need for youth participation, the summertime wouldn't work well.

It was suggested that elderly residents who need some "paint trimming" on their houses could use assistance.

Warmuth said all the councilmen - and, indeed, anyone who would like to participate in the cleanup - are invited to the June meeting. The exact date and time will be announced later this month.

Warmuth said poster contests will be held in the elementary school. And High School Principal Ken Shaw has expressed his strong support.

The State Line Tribune pledged \$100 for the cleanup effort. And Mayor Doyal LaRue said he also will make a financial contribution.

Ex-Bovina resident charged with murder

Editor's note: The following information was given the Tribune by a Houston Chronicle reporter who arrived in Parmer County Wednesday to get background information on the case.

Five children of a Kansas woman, now charged with killing her sixth child, died in Bovina several years ago.

Diana Lumbrera, 31, now of Garden City, Kan., was charged Monday in Finney County District Court with

first degree murder in last week's death of her 4 year old son, Jose. She was being held in lieu of \$100,000 bond.

She apparently moved to the Garden City area about five years ago.

Between the late 1970s and early 1980s, Lumbrera's 5 other children - ages 4, 2 1/2, 5 months, 3 months and 1 1/2 months, died in and near Bovina. Their deaths were ruled due to natural


"Several factors made these savings for customers possible," Diller said. "For example, expenses related to the purchase of power from other electric companies were reduced. Also, we were able to negotiate for lower fuel contracts at our power plants. Additionally, this credit includes customers' share of proceeds made from offsystem sales to other electric utilities. The net result is lowered costs for our customers."

Of the \$20.7 million requested credit, about \$11.2 million accumulated since the beginning of the year. This primarily was due to the delay in getting approval from the Texas commission to implement a new lower "fuel -cost recovery

factor." SPS's original request, filed in November 1989, was to implement the lower "fuel -cost recovery factor" by Jan. 1. The factor was ultimately implemented on April bills, Diller said, resulting in an overall 9.6 percent rate decrease.

Doyle Moore, SPS's Panhandle Division manager, said continued savings in fuel expenses will help the area economy.

"SPS expends significant effort to keep its fuel expenses down. And since the cost of fuel makes up about half of an electric bill, that's very important to the customer," he said. "By continuing to be a low - cost producer of power, SPS is sending the message that this part of the country is a great place for relocating and expanding businesses."
