## Proposal asked for trash haul

The Farwell City Council spent the better part of its Tuesday meeting dealing with the upcoming garbage question.

Homer Cluck, the owner of MISSCO, a trash hauling firm from Amarillo, attended the session. He was asked to present a proposal for a 5-year contract period. The proposal is expected within 60 days.

The MISSCO proposal concerns 3-yard containers (5 feet by 4 feet), each serving four families. There may be a transfer station, too. Trash would be hauled to Canyon, Texas. And it was indicated the cost would be "in the ballpark" of the new monthly garbage rate of \$12 per residential customer.

Mayor Chris Gikas said the EPA regulations which govern landfills, including Farwell's, are now expected out in November. They were to be announced in July. "The sooner we get out of the landfill business, the better off we will be," he said.

Gikas also said the city "is on the verge" of being allowed to use the Clovis landfill, because that landfill has used federal funds. Federal laws supercede state laws, so even if New Mexico says it won't accept garbage from another state at its landfills, if those landfills have accepted federal funds, the federal government often can force them to do so. So far, Clovis has said "no" to Farwell.

Cluck said that it would be much cheaper if he hauls Farwell trash to Clovis rather than Canyon. He also said Farwell alleys may be too narrow for his trucks.

If Farwell has its trash hauled by a private contractor, than those residences just outside the city limits would have to contract privately with the contractor or find another method of having their trash hauled.

The council also approved the garbage rate hike (\$4 a month to \$8 a month for residences), effective June 1. When this was discussed last month, the question of legality arose over having these extra funds saved for a "war chest" to buy equipment. Gikas reported it was legal to have a contingency fund.

In other business, the council:

- Heard that ESA Sorority will build a basketball court west and north of the merry-go-round in the city park.

- Heard Gikas report that a child was bitten by a dog in town this week. The dog was picked up and is being held for 10, according to state law. Gikas said dogs will not be allowed to run loose. Dogs not in tow on leashes will be picked up and taken to the pound, where it will cost owners \$50 (fine and vaccination).

- Agreed to pay the cost for the portable toilets for Border Town Days, if needed. BTDC Chairman Mike Pomper said the committee may have funds for the toilets but it's good to know backup funds are available, if necessary.

- Approved the annual contract with High Plains Pest Control for spraying trees.

- Heard a report that eight Farwell firefighters are attending EMT school.

- Gave Stuart Myers 45 more days to finish work on his work shop. If the work is not completed within that time, his building permit will be cancelled (costing him \$250).

- Discussed new tables for the Farwell Community Center. The city will check with the Community Center board first.

- Approved an ordinance for records management, according to new federal rules.

- Discussed an obscenity ordinance. Texas laws will be checked first.

- Bought used uniforms for part-time employees.

- Heard that a settlement was reached on workers' comp for former city employee Julian Jaime. The accident occurred two years ago. It was settled for \$35,000.

- Discussed revising safety regulations for city employees.

- Swore in the three coun-

cilmen who were re-elected - Fred Chandler, Martin Kube and Gloria Hutchins.

- Reviewed the questionnaires that appeared in the State Line Tribune two weeks ago regarding whether residents wanted a city marshal, and if they would pay higher taxes for it. The city received 17 "no" responses and 7 "yes" replies. The matter has been tabled.

- Approved buying more gravel for the cemetery roads and a new chlorinator.

## Parents' request rejected

The Farwell School Board Tuesday rejected a request by several parents to change the 1990-91 school calendar that was adopted last month.

Stan Austin, spokesman for several parents, said the calendar that the board adopted for 1990-91 has a spring break that is too late for most farm families.

"It doesn't allow farmers a chance to go some place with their families. The only thing we are going to do (on the spring break in March) is plant corn and water," he said.

He also said the later spring break discourages students from showing livestock at the Houston and San Antonio Livestock shows.

"You required every incoming freshman to take a vocational course; it looks like you shot yourself in the foot," he said. "Stock Shows catch that 'kink' - that interest in agriculture. They teach our youth how agriculture and life really are."

Austin said the San Antonio and Houston Livestock shows offer \$1 million per year in scholarship money. This year, he said, Farwell students won 3 \$1,000 scholarships, 1 \$4,000 scholarship and one full scholarship. In the past several years, he told the board, more than \$134,000 has come back to Parmer County in scholarships because of livestock shows.

County Agricultural Extension Agent Gary Patterson asked the board to do what is best for the kids.

After much discussion, the board defeated a motion by Ronald Byrd to move the spring back to February 4-3. Voting for the motion were Roberta Johnson, Steven Kaltwasser, and Byrd.

Voting against were Tom Nichols, Katherine White, Joe Schilling, and Doyle Johnson.

Johnson said they were following a committee recommendation on the calendar, and the teachers had recommended the later spring break repeatedly, but had been outvoted for several

In other election results:

- In the Farwell city election, all three councilmen were re-elected without opposition: Fred Chandler, 92 votes; Gloria Hutchins, 88 votes; and Martin Kube, 93 votes.

- In the Lazbuddie School Board election, Robert Gallman and Lloyd Bradshaw were elected with 136 and 93 votes, respectively.

Melvin Morris had 83 votes.

## Texico cleanup plans progress

This fall's scheduled major cleanup in Texico was the prime topic at Tuesday's City Council meeting.

Councilman Ronnie Warmuth is spearheading the project. Last week, he sent 16 letters to local churches and organizations, both adult and youth, asking for their support.

A "brainstorming" session will be held in June, with the cleanup tentatively set for September. This will allow students to participate.

Student participation is vital since one of the plans calls for fliers to be delivered to each home, letting residents know of what the plans call for. The fliers will be in English and Spanish. Also, if planting is part of the project, then students' participation is vital.

Early plans call for a massive cleanup, ranging from trash on lawns to large pieces of rusted, to planting new flowers and shrubs.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said some folks would like it to be held before Border Town Days. But Warmuth explained that, due to the need for youth participation, the summertime wouldn't work well.

It was suggested that elderly residents who need some "paint trimming" on their houses could use assistance.

Warmuth said all the councilmen - and, indeed, anyone who would like to participate in the cleanup - are invited to the June meeting. The exact date and time will be announced later this month.

Warmuth said poster contests will be held in the elementary school. And High School Principal Ken Shaw has expressed his strong support.

The State Line Tribune pledged \$100 for the cleanup effort. And Mayor Doyal LaRue said he also will make a financial contribution.

In discussing the current situation in the city, Warmuth said there were several abandoned homes that needed to be torn down.

At the last meeting, it was reported that a mobile home had been moved into Texico without getting a needed variance. This home has been moved.

Also at the last meeting, it was noted that a home had been moved here without the aesthetic review permit it needed. The permit has not been gotten.

Also, a shed has been torn down.

LaRue said he hoped this cleanup would be an annual event.

In other business, the council:

- Discussed possibly buying 4 acres on the south side of the railroad tracks from the Santa Fe for the future. It could be used, for example, for a park, or a water well, or another fire station.

- Heard a request from City Marshal Walt Causey to move the school speed zone signs so they cover a wider area. The state will be asked if this is allowable.

- Agreed to take bids on new tables for the community center.

- Received 3 bids for the annual audit. The council accepted the "best bid" from De'Aun Willoughby, for \$2,200.

- Approved starting work

on the Bill Christian Memorial Fountain at KKR Park.

- Discussed the new proposal budget (which must be okayed by the state). It includes 4.6 percent pay raises for city employees, and setting aside \$5,000 toward a

new city barn.

- Received \$567 in state beautification funds for dredging and cleaning the pond.

- Approved staying in the Ute Reservoir Water Commission. The annual fee is \$468.

## Texico sponsors Lift-a-Thon

## Ex-Bovina resident charged with murder

Editor's note: The following information was given the Tribune by a Houston Chronicle reporter who arrived in Parmer County Wednesday to get background information on the case.

Five children of a Kansas woman, now charged with killing her sixth child, died in Bovina several years ago.

Diana Lumberra, 31, now of Garden City, Kan., was charged Monday in Finney County District Court with

first degree murder in last week's death of her 4 year old son, Jose. She was being held in lieu of \$100,000 bond.

She apparently moved to the Garden City area about five years ago.

Between the late 1970s and early 1980s, Lumberra's 5 other children - ages 4, 2 1/2, 5 months, 3 months and 1 1/2 months, died in and near Bovina. Their deaths were ruled due to natural causes.

- Heard Athletic Director Rex Cumpton report that Farwell would host an AAU Tournament, football and basketball camps, and summer league basketball as they have in the past.

- Heard Supt. John Grigsby report on the financial situ-

ation of the school. He said that 93% of this year's taxes have been collected. "(The balance we have) should carry us through July and maybe part of August," he said.

- The board tabled the salary schedule and the career ladder funding until they find out how much money they will get from the state in light of the state school financing problems.

Contracts will be issued to teachers, but they will be subject to change if the state changes the career ladder or funding.

- Appointed new Supt. Richard Boothby to be the Textbook Custodian and Regional Council Representative.

- Expressed appreciation to Joe Schilling for 5 years and to Roberta Johnson for 3 years of service on the school board.

## FmHA extends guaranteed loans

The Farmers Home Administration is extending its guaranteed loans to community program projects, thereby expanding its lending ability, FmHA State Director Neal Johnson says.

Until now, all of FmHA's loans for water and sewer systems, fire stations, health

clinics and other community facilities have been direct loans from the agency to the borrower.

"With the addition of guaranteed loans, we can now assist communities that are able to qualify for commercial loans with the support of an FmHA guarantee," Johnson said.

Under this program, FmHA guarantees a loan made by a bank, savings and loan, insurance company, Federal Land Bank or other qualified lender against a certain percentage of loss. Since the mid-1980's, guarantees have become the major component of FmHA's farm loan program, accounting for more than 50

percent of all farm loans.

The 1990 fiscal year appropriations bill authorizes \$74.5 million in guaranteed loans for water and waste disposal loans and \$23.9 million for other community facilities on a national basis.

Prospective borrowers and lenders interested in the program should contact the FmHA State Office in Temple, Texas.

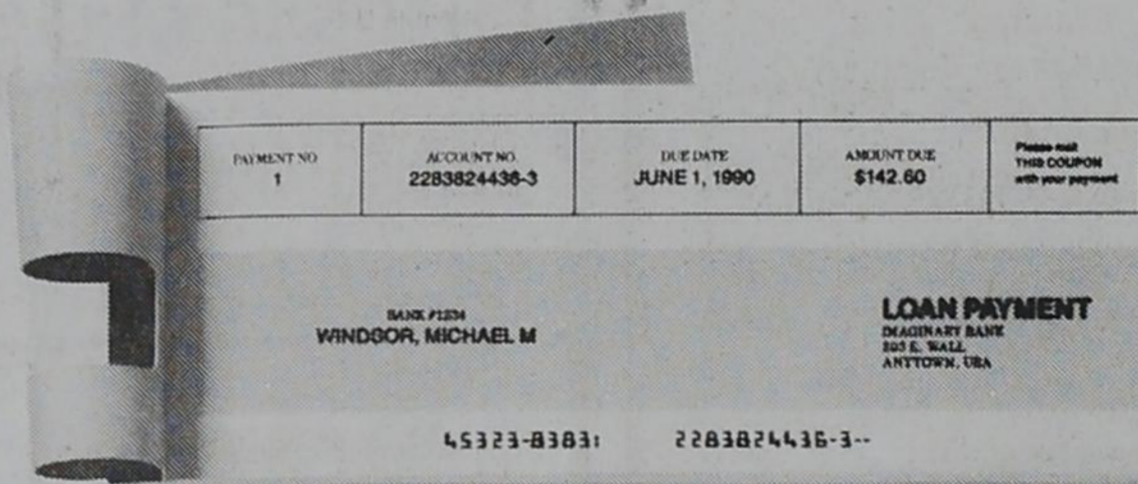

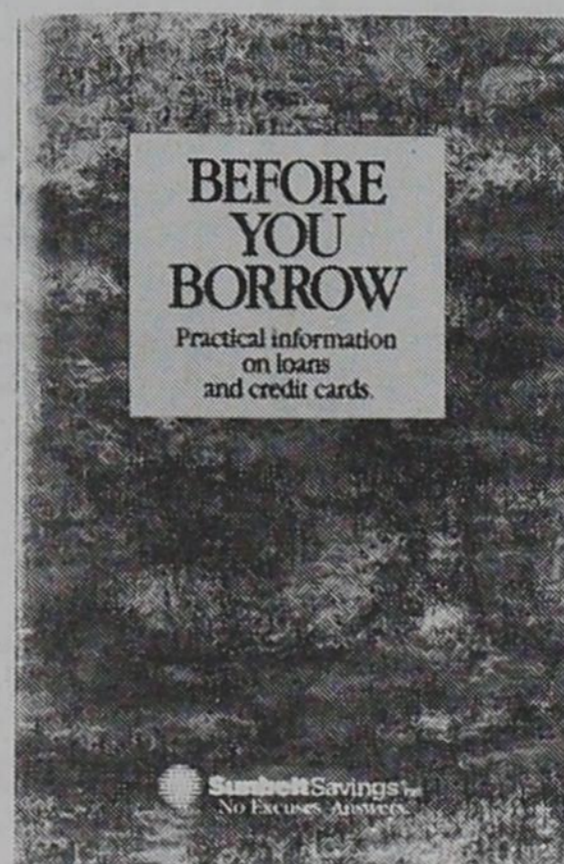

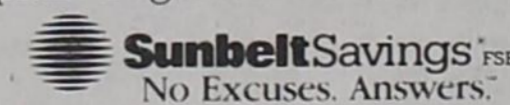

## SPS files with PUC to credit Texas customers

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to credit \$20.7 million to its Texas retail customers for savings in fuel costs.

Retail customers include residential, commercial and industrial users.

A residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity a month would receive a one-time credit of \$22.51. The proposed credit includes interest at an annual rate of 11.7 percent.

SPS expects to get swift approval of this filing, said Gerald Diller, SPS's group manager of rates and regulation.

"We hope to be able to apply the credit to our customers' July bills," he said. The credit would cover fuel expenses

from April 1989 - March 1990.

"Several factors made these savings for customers possible," Diller said. "For example, expenses related to the purchase of power from other electric companies were reduced. Also, we were able to negotiate for lower fuel contracts at our power plants. Additionally, this credit includes customers' share of proceeds made from off-system sales to other electric utilities. The net result is lowered costs for our customers."

Of the \$20.7 million requested credit, about \$11.2 million accumulated since the beginning of the year. This primarily was due to the delay in getting approval from the Texas commission to implement a new lower "fuel-cost recovery

factor." SPS's original request, filed in November 1989, was to implement the lower "fuel-cost recovery factor" by Jan. 1. The factor was ultimately implemented on April bills, Diller said, resulting in an overall 9.6 percent rate decrease.

Doyle Moore, SPS's Panhandle Division manager, said continued savings in fuel expenses will help the area economy.

"SPS expends significant effort to keep its fuel expenses down. And since the cost of fuel makes up about half of an electric bill, that's very important to the customer," he said. "By continuing to be a low-cost producer of power, SPS is sending the message that this part of the country is a great place for relocating and expanding businesses."
