# Landfill closed

The Texico City Council Monday emphatically closed its landfill to all traffic from city residents.

The council, announcing it was an emergency situation, authorized Mayor Steve Chancy to have the landfill closed according to state EID regulations immediately.

The landfill has been closed (except for residents dropping off tree limbs, etc., for burning) since Waste Control of New Mexico began servicing the city three years ago.

But at Monday's meeting, the council learned that although they had closed the landfill, they hadn't gotten state approval for it. And they also learned that if such approval is not gained before May 15, the landfill will be subject to new - and much more costly - regulations from the state.

City Attorney Duane Hamar, who had a representative attend an EID meeting in Roswell last week, urged the council to adopt the emergency situation and have the landfill closed correctly before the May 15 deadline. Otherwise, he said, the city could be looking at \$100,000 annual costs for closing it correctly for the next 25 years. And the cost of violating the rules will jump from \$3,000 a day to \$25,000 a day.

The new state rules which go into effect May 15 will involve all landfills that haven't been officially closed by the state. The new rules involve monitoring ground water and seepage, methane gas and erosion for 25 years after landfills are closed.

Thus, Texico's council decided, regardless of cost, to have the landfill closed according to state standards before May 15. Chancy plans to contact Curry County officials immediately for aid. If that isn't forthcoming, he planned to hire a private contractor.

EID official Brown Edwards told the council that not a whole lot of work needs to be done for state approval to be gained. The main problem is in the northeast corner of the landfill. The solid waste needs to be compacted, a 2-foot minimum of top soil to cover it, and the top soil to be graded from 2.

Once that work is done correctly, Edwards will check it immediately and get the pa-

perwork done to allow Texico to beat the May 15 deadline. The council also got approval from Edwards to burn whatever can be burned there now.

Edwards was asked about the dead animal pit. He will check with the state to see if Texico can get a variance to allow it to stay available. Edwards said a lot of illegal dumping is going on outside the landfill gates. He has picked up a lot of envelopes in that garbage and plans to contact the residents and ask them to volunteer to help clean up the mess.

Councilman Butch Tharp suggested that the Waste Control transfer station be moved from the landfill site to cut down on illegal dumping. No action was taken on this. Edwards said the city will be allowed to continue controlled burning of tree limbs, etc.

In other business, the council:

- Agreed to have Lester Sears demonstrate to city employees methods of fixing street cracks.

- Heard Chancy say that the surveys asked by the state have been mailed off. They are needed as part of the city's application for state funds for street repairs. Also, the state highway department has endorsed Texico's request.

- Heard that the state and Santa Fe plan to repair the street around the railroad tracks leading to the south part of town in May.

- Heard Hamar report that there's a movement afoot to have Portales and Clovis be on the same local exchange. If Texico were part of this, it could cost each resident an extra \$2 a month and business \$5 a month.

- Decided not to seek bids on city insurance this year but will keep the same agency.

- Plans to use city employees to sandblast the bottom of the city swimming pool.

- Rejected all bids for a used tractor - loader.

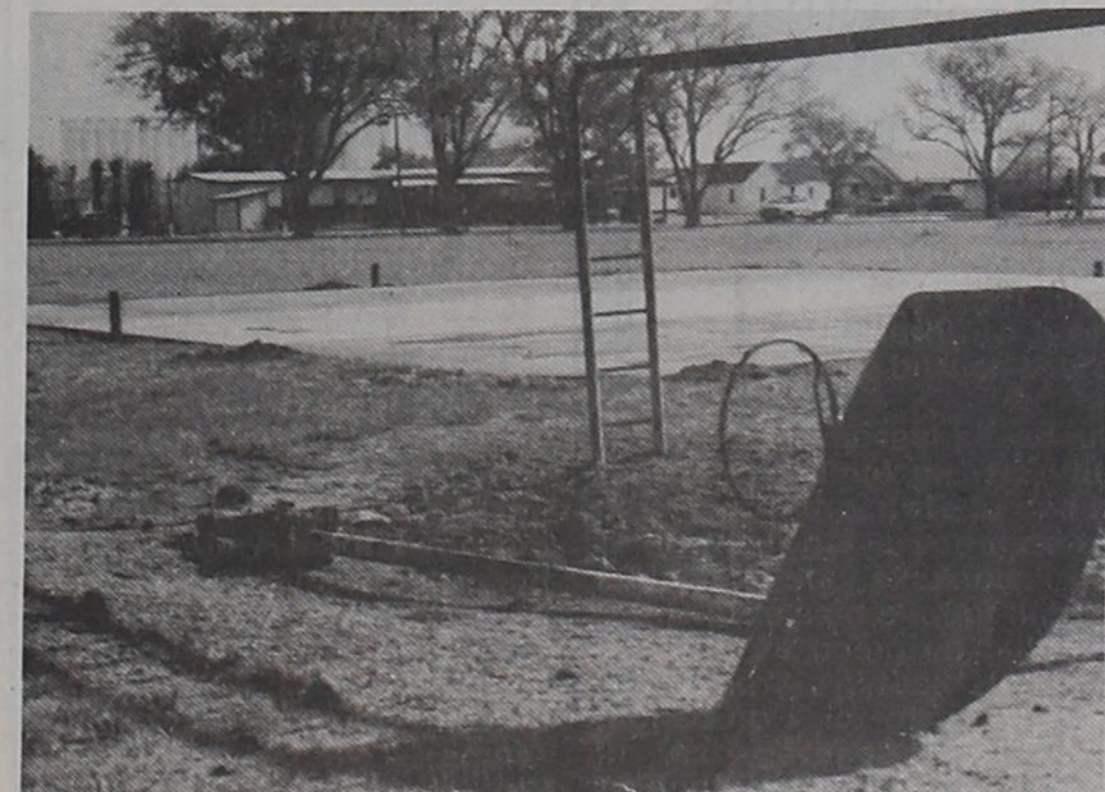

# Texico Chamber honors Hardages

Ed and Juanita Hardage were named Man and Woman of the Year at the annual Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet Tuesday.

It was the second year in a row that a husband and wife team has been honored. Last year, Jeri and George Herrington were named.

Also this year, two new awards were added. The first "Workhorse" award went to John R. Hadley for his past contributions to the community. And the first "Outstanding Young Citizen" award, with a \$100 scholarship, went to Lance Akers, a graduating senior.

Akers also has been named Outstanding Senior for 1989 by his teachers. He plans to attend McMurry College.

Hadley's work in aiding the Chamber over the years was noted during his introduction.

The school cafeteria was packed for the banquet, which featured a slide presentation by Dr. Tim Neidhart, director of the University of New Mexico Cancer Center.

New Chamber officers were announced: Richard Hadley, president; Lewis Cooper, vice president; Ann Cooper, secretary - treasurer. Directors are Cliff Blakely, Fern Tharp, Jim Pierce and Charlotte Pierce.

The annual progress report was given by Mayor Steve Chancy. It included:

Two new businesses - McGimpsey Trucking and Auto Shine Shop Unlimited; 7 new homes; expansion of Little Mexico; an upcoming beauty salon, operated by Debbie Autrey; new railroad tracks; the city seeking state funds for curbs and gutters; upgrading City Hall and the Community Center; the high number of students on the honor roll; top marks the school band has gained, and the number of championship athletic teams from Texico.

Rev. L.L. Harris gave the invocation and benediction.

Here are the speeches honoring the Man and Woman of the Year:

**Juanita Hardage**

I have always wondered just how the committee goes about selecting their candidates. Some are highly educated and others have been benevolent in their community service work. This time however, we have a unique person for woman of the year. After much dedication and practice, she finally mastered the art of shoving her sister Agnes into the slop bucket. This tells me she is fun loving and has a wicked sense of humor.

Born Feb. 19, of the 20th century in Shallowater, Texas she was the second of seven children. Her formal education began in Mayfield and ended in Hale Center, Texas.

She started working at an early age. She could cook by the time she was 6 years old. Of course, she had to stand on an old orange crate to reach the stove, and by looking at her today, my guess is she still has to stand on one. She wanted to cook because after walking to school 1 mile a day (with the proverbial cardboard insole in her shoes,) it was quite a disappointment to open that lunch pail and find a cold biscuit and a slice of onion.

When she worked in the fields, she had 2 jobs, one

picking cotton and the other dragging a brother and a sister atop her cotton sack. Baby sitting is less complicated these days.

This lady has a lot of musical talent. When she started taking piano lessons, her instructor wouldn't let her hear a song before she played it because it was easier for her to play it by memory than to read the music. She started playing for her church when she was still in grade school. Later, she, her father, a brother and an aunt formed a gospel quartet and shared star billing with the Stamp Brothers Quartet on the radio in Lubbock, Texas.

After high school graduation, she worked at Wilyes drugstore in Lubbock and soon after became a telephone operator.

She married in the early 40's and continued to be an operator until the birth of her two children.

In 1965 she moved with children to Texico where she operated the Crossroads Motel and later the gift shop.

In 1966 she learned the hard way, that she would never be a member of the Hells Angels. She took her son's motorcycle for a very short ride without knowing the gas and brakes rule. Still fascinated with two wheels, she took it upon herself and is responsible for the bicycle competition in our local Border Town Day Parade. She simply put an ad in the paper, the children came to her motel, they decorated their bikes and the rest is history. It has been a big part of the celebration ever since.

Before the churches in our communities started the policy of helping down and out transients, she had already started her own salvation army. She took it upon herself to feed, clothe and provide a place for them to sleep. Not only did she have a kind spirit in her heart for people, she also raised tea cup pool-les for 10 years.

She remarried in 1972. Combined, she and her husband have three children, five grandchildren and three

great-grandchildren. Her husband was a custom harvester, so she inherited the job of parts chaser and much to the delight of the harvest crew, the cooking. Now I don't mean to be hateful, but we've all heard about Ed's "warm bologna sandwiches." The marriage between this man and woman has truly been sweet music. They formed their own band and have entertained all of our local towns from here to Dallas and back on just about any occasion you can imagine.

Lovingly, they have given many many hours to the Senior Citizens in our area. Sometimes when they weren't really feeling up to it they just kept on playing, and you know the hours those Senior Citizens keep.

She and her husband are the backbone of our Border Town celebration. If you have ever attended them, you know she can play a mean tune on that old calliope.

Our woman of the year is a private person, but when she is around you, she has a way of making you feel special.

It gives me pleasure to introduce the Texico Chamber of Commerce Woman of the Year for 1989, Juanita Hardage.

Our man of the year for 1989 was born June 28, 1916 in Seymour, Texas. His family moved to the Oklahoma Lane community when he was nine years of age. They came in a wagon drawn by mules.

After high school, he worked in the oil fields for about 10 years. During this time, he continued playing guitar and "Old Slap Bass."

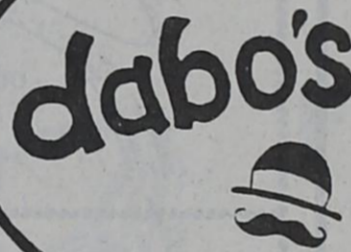

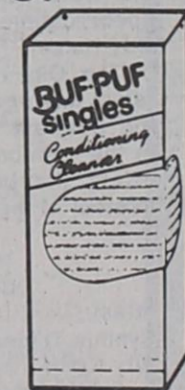

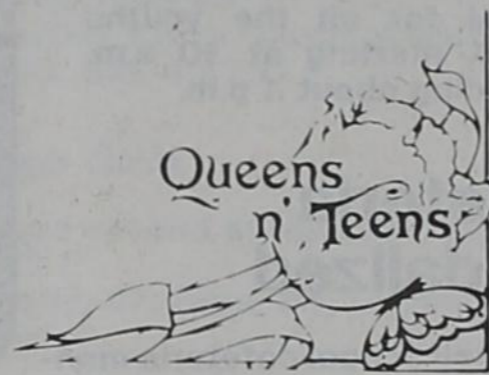

8- 10 slices bacon, diced  
1/2 c. vinegar

1 Tbs. sugar - if desired

# Texico boys grab EPAC top honors

On Saturday, the Texico boys' track team won the EPAC Track meet at Tatum.

"This was probably the first track meet we have won in about 6 years," said Cook.

Texico, with 92 points, was followed by: Melrose, 73; San Jon, 48; Tatum, 35; Logan, 27; Dora, 24; Floyd, 13; House, 7; Elida, 2; and Grady, 0.

Jaime Estrada was first in the 3200 m. run with a time of 11:42.94.

Harrison was first in the 110 and 300 hurdles with times of 15.5 and 43.91 respectively.

The 440 relay team was first with a time of 49.59. Members included Paul Brown, Byron Martin, Dwayne Hamilton, and Joe Pierce.

Brett Patrick was second in the 440 yard dash with a time of 55.12.

Mark Holmes was second in the 1 mile with a time of 5:13.09.

The 880 Relay Team also qualified for state with a time of 1:38.58. Members included Harrison, Patrick, Pierce, and Martin.

The Medley Relay team of Martin, Pierce, Darrell Krivanek and Holmes was second with a time of 4:07.20.

The Mile Relay team finished 2nd with a time of 3:40.59 to qualify for state. On the team were: Pierce, Patrick, Gerald Krivanek, and Harrison.

"Some of the guys ran their regular events, but we tried a lot of the guys at different events for this meet," said Cook.

Patrick was 3rd in high jump with a jump of 5'6". Darrell Krivanek threw the javelin 133'.

Hamilton ran the 440 in 59.81.

Warren Martin ran the 880 in 2:21.50 and the 110 hurdles in 18.04 and the 300 hurdles in 46.04.

Estrada ran the 1 mile in 5:13.45. Estrada normally runs the 2 mile.

Gerald Krivanek was 4th in the javelin with a throw of 118' 11 1/2".

Lance Akers ran the 300 hurdles in 46.33, and he ran the 110 hurdles in 19.14.

Keith Harrison took 5th place in the long jump with a jump of 18'7". This was Harrison's first attempt at this event this year.

Hector Orozco ran the 880 run in 2:25.74.

The reshuffling of events may enable some more of the team members to qualify for state. They can qualify two ways: 1. by taking first or second at the district track meet at Tatum at 3:30 on Saturday, or 2. by matching the state qualifying time.

Those who have qualified will compete in the Class A and AA track meet in Albuquerque May 5 and 6 at the UNM track next to the football field.

On Friday, the varsity boys participated in a meet in Clovis that included 4A schools. Several Texico runners turned in their best results.

Coach Curt Cook noted that "Mark Holmes had as good a performance as he has had this year. The best he had had this year in the 880 was 2:15. He dropped it to a 2:08 at this meet."

The Mile Medley Relay team of Byron Martin, Joe Pierce, Brett Patrick, and Holmes qualified for state with a time of 3:51.50. "I was a little worried about the Medley Relay, but they really pulled it out," said Cook.

## Texico senior class to visit Lubbock sites

The Texico School Board held a special meeting on April 20 to approve a pencil copy of the Texico School budget.

School Supt. James Pierce will take a copy of it to Santa Fe for approval by state officials. Then he will return to the Texico school board for their approval of the final document.

This is a different method of budget approval than has been used in the past. The school system used to have to hold budget hearings before the budget could be approved. This year no state

department budget hearings will be held.

The board also approved the Texico senior class trip to Lubbock. They plan to visit the planetarium and the Science Spectrum April 24.

The board also approved some policies for their Chapter I program.

Keith Harrison was second in both the 110 and the 300 hurdles. In the 300 he was first in the prelims, but he lost to a runner from Lubbock Christian at the wire. He ran the 300 in 40.6. Harrison had already qualified for state in these events at earlier track meets.

"Harrison broke 15 seconds on the 110 in both the prelims and the finals. This was an important personal goal for him," said coach Cook of Harrison's 14.08 performance.

## Junior High Boys

Seven school records were set by Texico Junior High boys at the EPAC Track Meet at Tatum on April 22.

"I was very pleased with the effort of the young men," said coach Michael Littlejohn. "We ran as fast or faster in every race but one. We set school records in 7 events. We had 3 firsts in individuals and won 3 relays. An example of how well we ran was in the mile relay. We ran a 4:12 two weeks ago at Melrose and we dropped that to a 4:00 at Tatum. Twelve seconds is a lot of time off. We did that in most of the events all day."

"I am proud of these young men for the work they did all season. We were 2nd at all 3 meets we ran."

Tatum finished first with 103 points; Texico was second with 90. Third went to Dora with 43, and fourth went to Melrose, 35.

William Liggins set a 7th grade record in the long jump with a jump of 17' 4" which got him a 3rd place.

Mauricio Posada set an 8th grade record by running the 440 yard dash in 58.80. He took first place in the event.

Mike Litzelman finished 1st in the 100 m. intermediate hurdles with a time of 18.75; he set a new 8th grade record.

The 440 Relay team of Liggins, Charles Williams, Richard Stephens and Kelvin Gooden set a new 8th grade record by finishing first with a time of 52.33.

The 880 Relay team of Mauricio Posada, Litzelman, Charles Williams, and Louie Delgado set a new 8th grade record by finishing first with a time of 1:46.11.

The Mile Relay set a new 8th grade record by finishing first with a time of 4:00.02. Team members included: Posada, Charles Williams, Litzelman, and Delgado.

Gonzales finished second in Discus with a throw of 99'7"; Greg Akers was 4th in that event with a throw of 95'5".

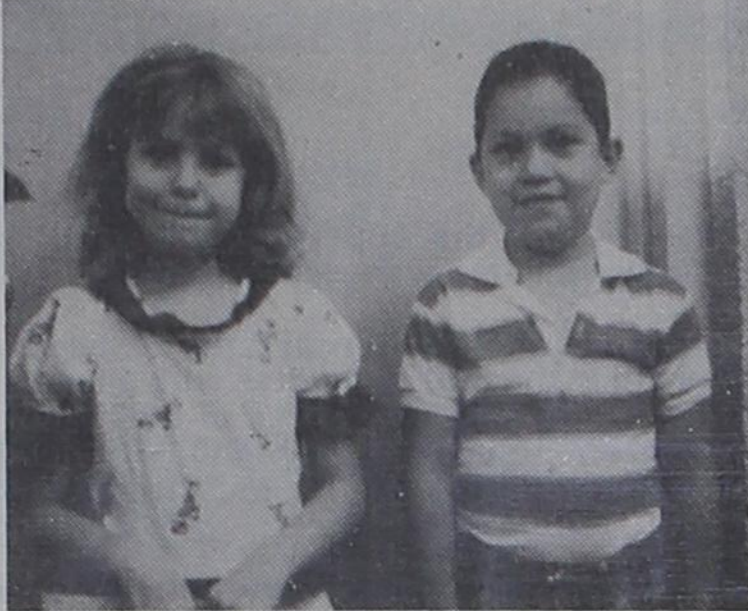
