A special note to golfing buffs:

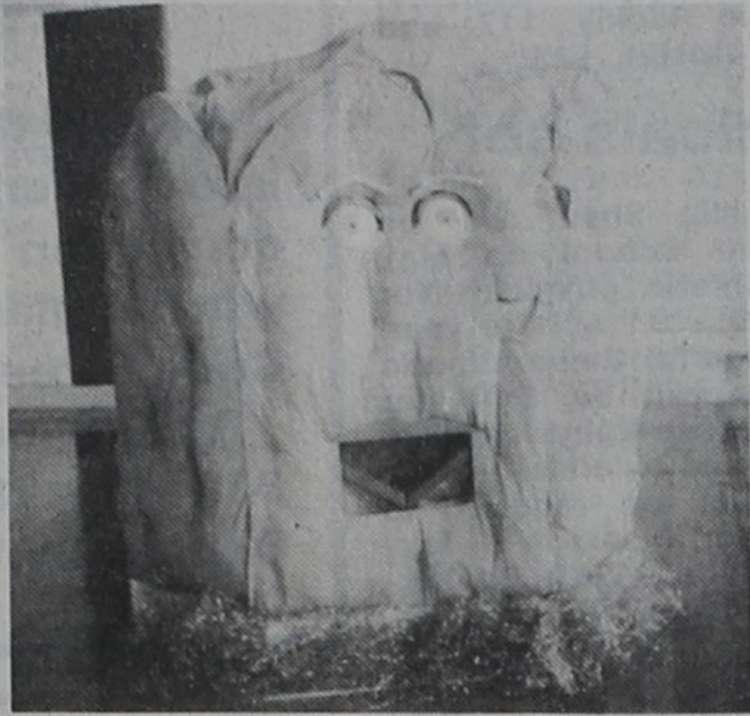
I hit one of those never-to-be-forgotten shots at one of the Ruidoso golf courses Saturday.

Texico to compete at world tourney

Five Texico students - Warren Martin, Tina Smith, Lorissa Pate, Leslie Servatius and Dwayne Hamilton - will compete in the world championship of the Odyssey of the Mind competition in Ames, Iowa, with the project that won them a first place at the New Mexico State Finals in Albuquerque on April 21.

Odyssey of the Mind is a program to promote divergent and creative thinking in students kindergarten through college.

Each year OM Association, Inc. develops five new problems for competition in 5 basic areas. The areas include construction of a balsa wood structure designed to bear weight; a study of the classics through literature and art; a problem involving the construction of a vehicle, and a problem requiring mechanical, technical and electronic skills and communication.

This year Texico sent three projects to the state competition. In all, there were 68 teams from across the state of New Mexico that competed. None of the Texico teams competed against each other.

The project which will go to the national competition looks a little bit like a four foot tall "Mr. Potato Head." It won the High School Omitronic Humor competition.

For this competition, team members had to devise a project which would express at least 6 different emotions; it had to use some kind of remote control device for at least part of its mechanism. All of the members of the group had to work as a team to get the potato to express its various emotions.

Other teams in the state of New Mexico also tried to win this competition. Some had projects shaped like flowers or the sun, but Texico's project met the qualifications best.

The Omitronic Humor team is coached by Farwell Elementary School principal Joel Pate.

They will head for the finals in Iowa in May. The trip will cost the team about \$3,000 or more. The team will stay in college dormitories in Ames, but transportation to the competition is the problem.

"Ames is one of those places you can't get to very easily," said Pate. There are no regularly scheduled flights to the city which is about the size of Clovis. There are no train connections there, either.

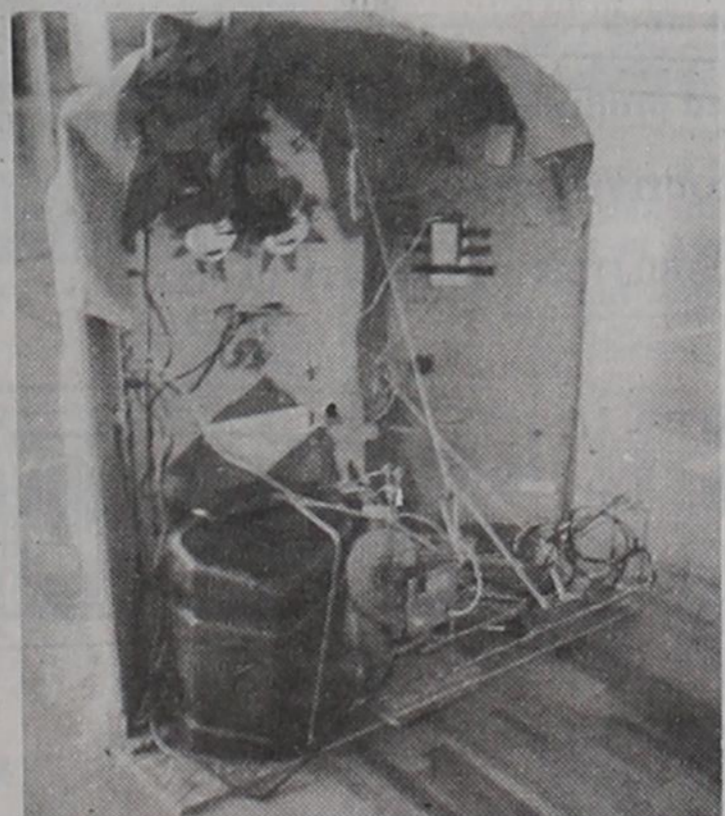
Donations are being collected by Pate and other school officials, and they will be managed through the Texico Elementary School Activity Fund.

Texico sent two other projects to the state tournament. The Texico High School Geographic Odyssey team won third place in the state competition. They had to devise a project that included a vehicle which would go on an imaginary trip around the world.

Competing in this category where Todd Cash, Virginia Burnett, Scott McCreery, Lisa Harrison, and Jesse Barba. Their team was coached by Paula Leighton.

Texico Junior High also sent a Geographic Odyssey team to the state competition which won a fourth place prize in Albuquerque. The team members were: Clay Lewis, John Swopes, Brandon Rodarte, Adam Burford, Donnanne Reed, and Jarod Servatius. The team was coached by Chris Pate and Kim Peterson.

In addition to building a project, each team received points in creative problem solving events. They were given a problem and one minute to think about it. Then they had to come up with a solution.

It was a standing room only crowd at the Texico School cafeteria Tuesday night for the annual Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Top awards went to: Margie Crooks, Woman of the Year; Steve Meeks, Man of the Year and Workhorse Award; and Byron Martin, Young Citizen of the Year.

Guest speaker was Col. Donald Peterson, who heads the Tactical Fighter Wing at Cannon Air Force Base. He spoke about the upcoming base expansion. The number of personnel will climb within two years from 4,000 to 6,000 as a new wing is added. The expansion will cost more than \$70 million.

Folks who worked on the Community Center renovation were honored: Steve Meeks, Mae Stone, Max Winkles, Greg Martin, Oran J. Autrey, Elroy Kersey and Brian Kube.

The annual progress report noted the new businesses in the community: Mr. Marcos' Picture Frame Outlet, Al's Discount Firearms, DeJay's Hair Fashion, Martin Motor Co., Cortez Trucking and Tomahawk Trading Post.

School enrollment has increased from 437 in 1987 to 463 in 1988 to 478 this year. And the community has several active organizations, such as the Lions and Rotary clubs, Texico Teachers Association, fire department, Chamber of Commerce and City Council.

Man of the Year

Steven Leon Meeks was born to Delores Goldsmith Meeks and Leon Meeks on June 2, 1959 at Clovis Hospital. He came into this world with a "real bang" - being born during a severe thunderstorm. He has two older brothers, Wade and Tim, and two younger brothers, Matt and Mark.

Steve attended all 12 years of school at Farwell. He was in band and played football and basketball. He also was active in ag. and shop.

Steve's parents started farming in the mid-1960s so Steve grew up doing all the things farm children learn to do.

As a teen, he raised pigs and even bought 100 baby chicks with the idea of eventually selling eggs and making "big bucks." He got to selling eggs all right and did pretty well until some dogs from town got into his hens and killed all but about a dozen, thereby ending his egg business.

Steve has always enjoyed working with beautiful wood. One of his first projects was a hand carved foot stool in which no nails were used. Then he made a beautiful jewelry box from cedar that was shaped like a cedar chest. His last year in high school he made a humungous gun cabinet and chest from cedar; they were so big they barely went through the door.

Steve graduated in 1977 and was an above average student. After graduation, he went into farming and in February 1978 he married Cindy Cooper of Farwell. They have two boys and one girl - Justin, 11; Jason, 9, and Lacey, 6.

The home they are living in is their old farm house which they had moved into town and completely remodeled themselves.

Steve enjoys a challenge and is always busy. He is involved with his wife and children in 4-H, school activities (especially at fair time), community projects, farming, carpentry and taking courses at ENMU Clovis once a week.

He is devoted to his family and gives special attention to his 87 year old grandmother, checking on her on a daily basis.

Woman of the Year

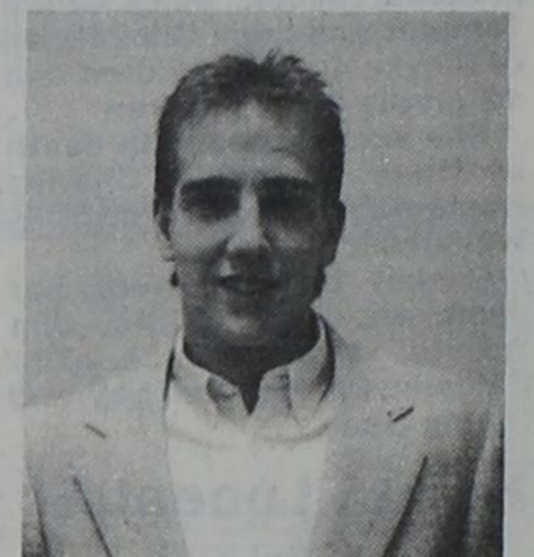

Texico tackles zoning

The Texico City Council Monday took action on a trio of zoning problems.

It was told by City Clerk Marie Christian that a mobile home had been moved to 210 Lamar St. from out of the city without getting approval. City Attorney Duane Hamar will contact the owner and instruct its removal.

The council also was told that a building was being constructed at 519 State St., without the proper permit. Again, Hamar will contact the owner and order its removal.

And the council was told about a mobile home being moved near the church. However, the property is zoned for mobile homes. The owner will be instructed that an aesthetic review permit is needed, though.

The council agreed to open bids May 3 for annual street repairs. The list (which can be changed depending on how much cost is involved) now includes:

In other business, the council:

- Discussed guidelines for the community center. An objection was raised for discriminatory reasons the suggestion from the Chamber of Commerce that rentals be \$25 except for a wedding shower for a local person, which would be \$15. Other small cities will be checked with to find out their guidelines.

- Received a survey of the city cemetery from Lydick & Associates; it was tabled so the city attorney can study it. The city has discovered that some of the burials there have been on private property so the city plans to trade some of its property for that

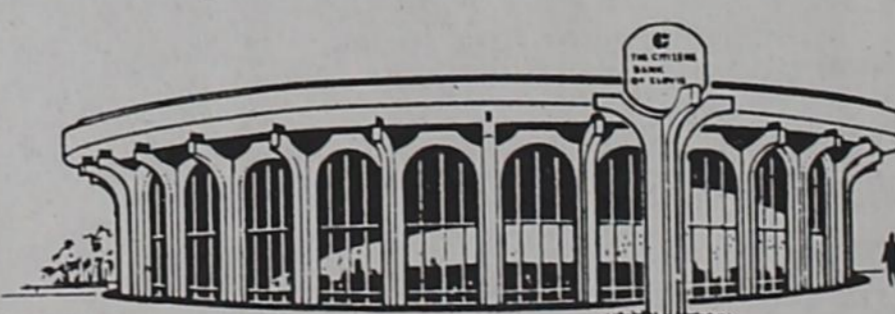

The Texico girls' track team put in a good showing in spite of tough competition at the Clovis track meet, according to coach Roy King.

"You wouldn't believe the competition level," said King. "Penny Pierce had her career best in hurdles. She qualified for state in both hurdles." Amy Chadwick placed third in hurdles. Krystala Cross placed second in shot put; she had her best throw of the year.

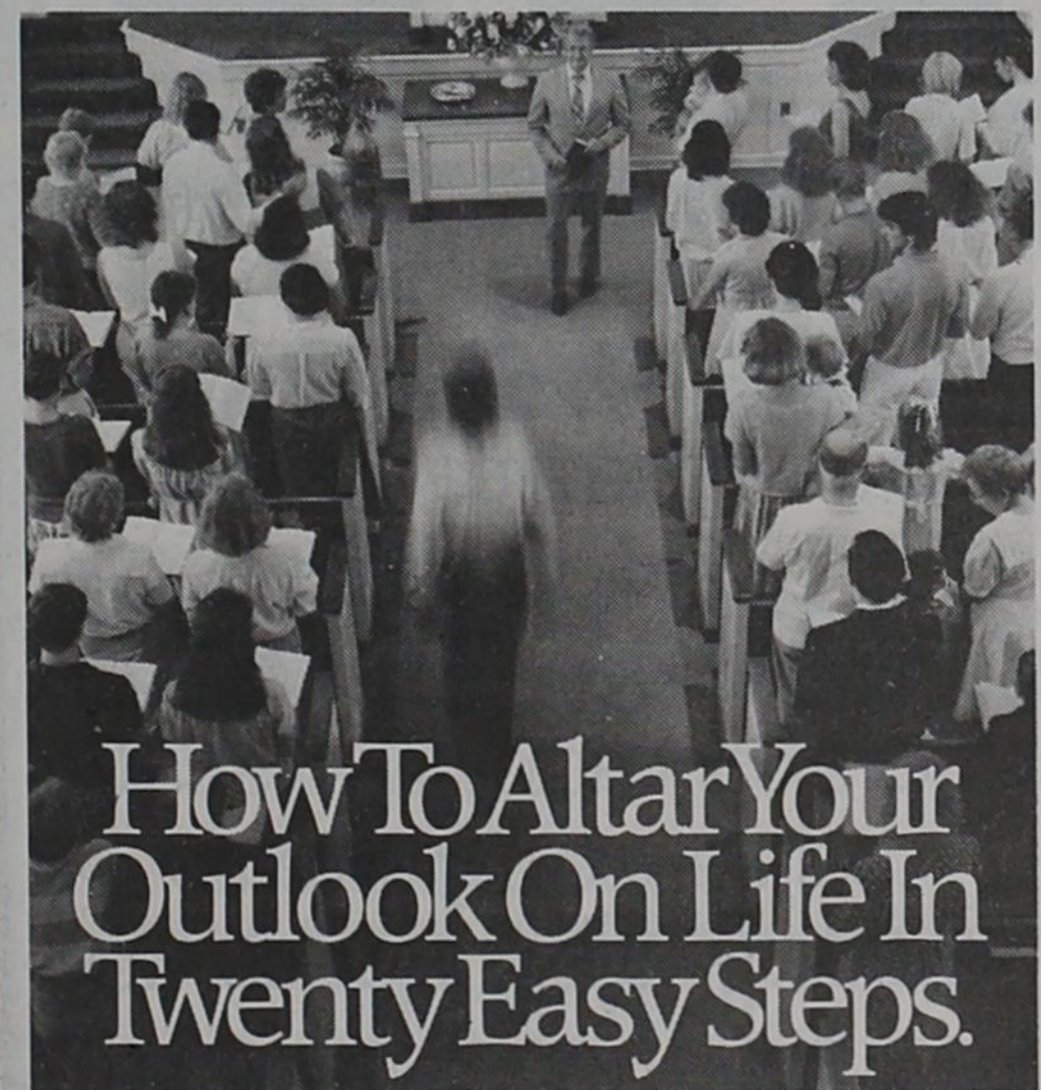

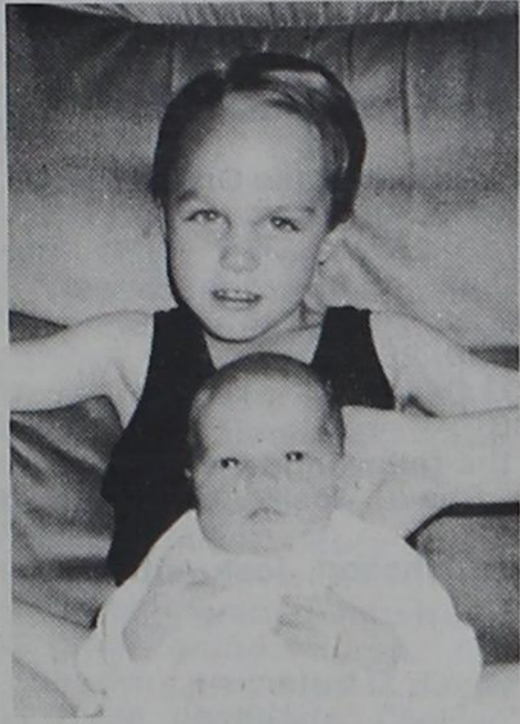
Troy and Beth Coleman of Starkville, Miss., are the parents of a baby girl, Victoria Elizabeth.

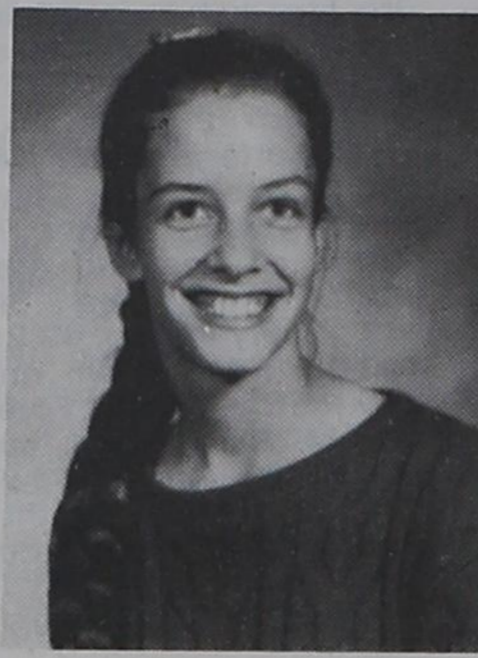

As 6th place winner, Rachelle was presented a medal, a dictionary, and a thesaurus.

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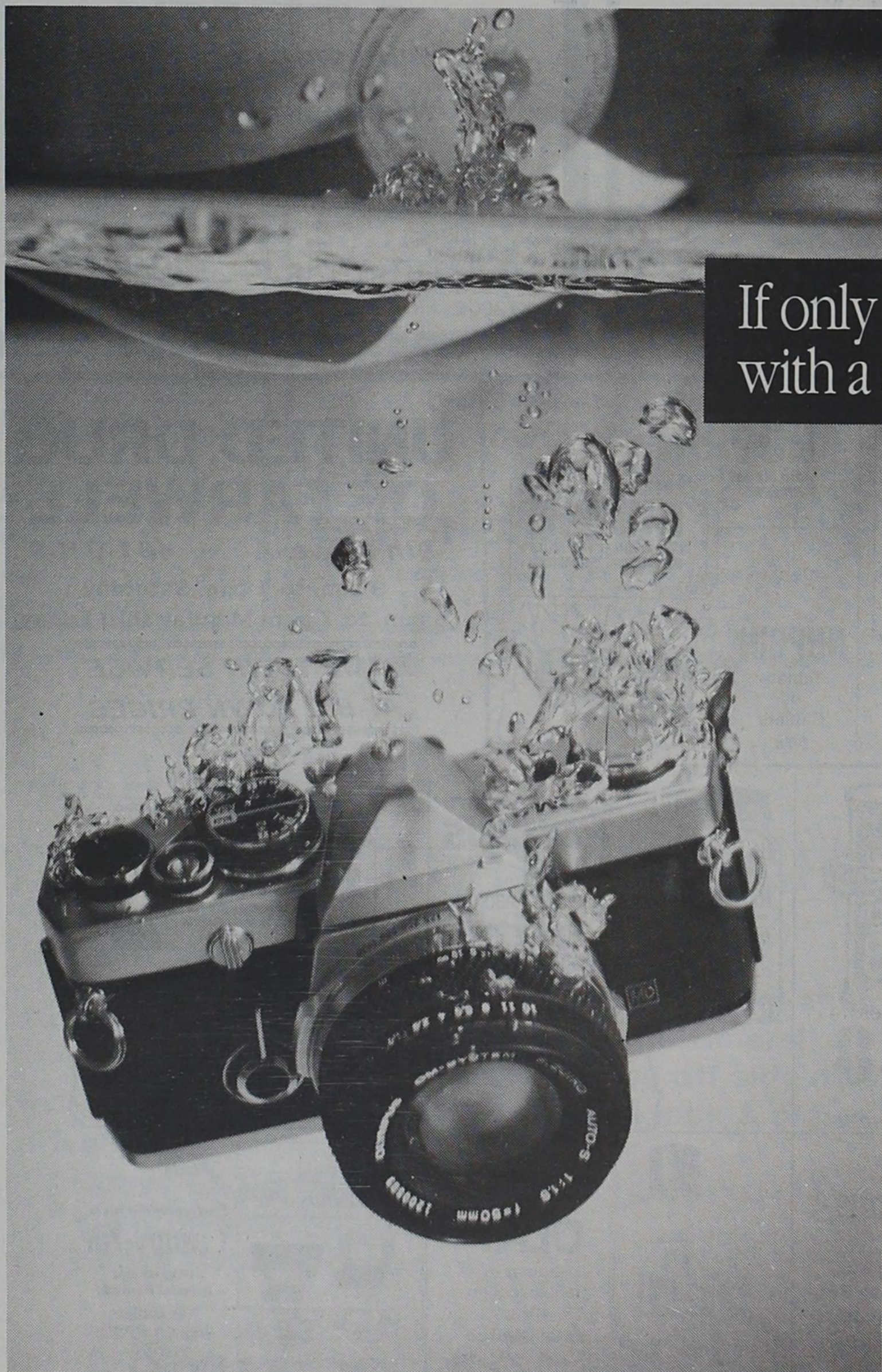
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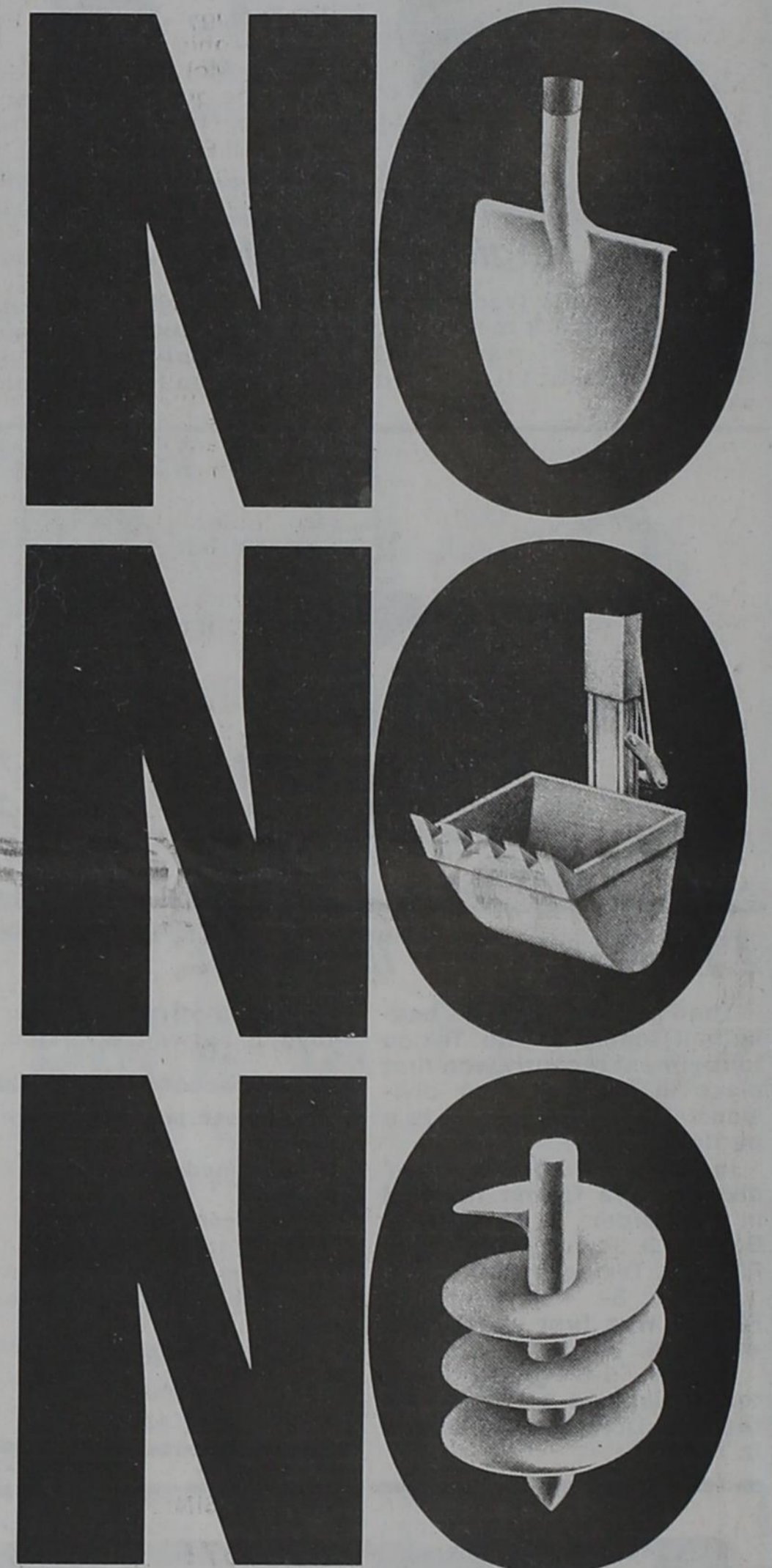
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Marshal's Report

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
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

Didyongs open Tomahawk Trading Post

Walt and Karen Didyong of Farwell have opened the Tomahawk Trading Post just east of the New Mexico Port of Entry on Highway 60-70-84.

They will sell Indian jewelry, Acoma pottery, rugs, sand paintings, hand woven Indian blankets and Kachina dolls that they buy from Indians on reservations.

"We have some very nice things, and some things that the ordinary person can afford," said Mrs. Didyong of her jewelry.

The Didyongs are not new to the trading post business. They had a store in Colorado before they moved here. Also, both Didyongs worked in a store owned by Mrs. Didyong's father.

Mrs. Didyong's dad taught her to do things that ordinary clerks may not know how to do. She can file a rough spot on a broken bracelet, and

she can remove links from a bracelet.

She also knows how the jewelry is made. She often watched Native Americans work near Gallup, N.M. and other places where she lived.

At one point Mrs. Didyong's father mined turquoise. She has seen the mining procedures and has samples of turquoise available to show customers.

"When you mine turquoise, you may get a tiny bit or a big rock." The tiny bits are polished for use in small jewelry designs as they are. Rocks are cut into many thin slices which may then be cut to fit a bezel on a ring or necklace. Then they are shaped and polished and mounted.

Silversmiths buy the stones and mount them in bezels on pieces of jewelry.

To make a belt buckle, for instance, Native American artisans cover the jewelry base with sheets of silver cut to fit the item. They use half round silver to cover the edges. They carefully solder silver wire in place to decorate the piece of jewelry. They also mount the bezels which will hold the stones in place. Then the item is buffed and polished.

Mrs. Didyong will be running the store most days because her husband is employed by Brown Cattle Co.

They have two children, Shawn and Kyla.

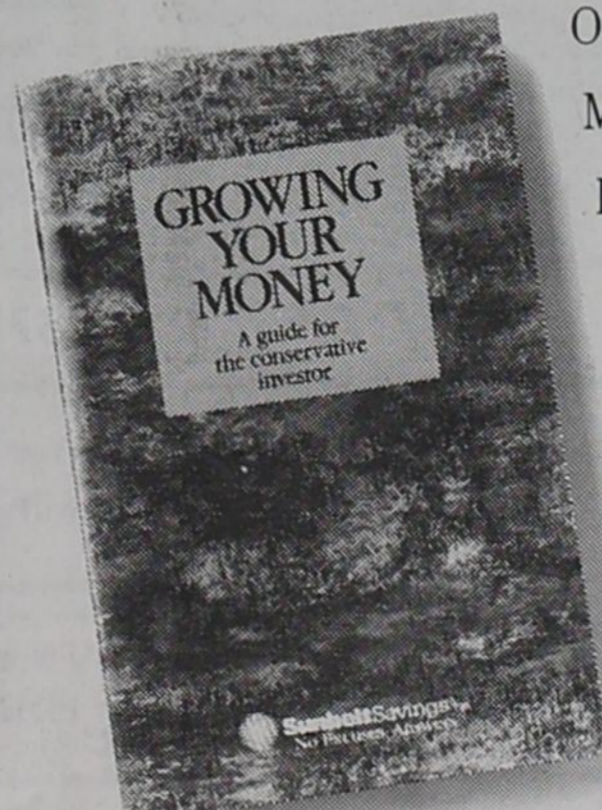
