Here's a reminder for Texico residents about this year's election.

The election will be March 6 but to file your candidacy you must file Jan. 9 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

On the ballot will be the mayoral post held by Steve Chancy, who will not be allowed to seek re-election due to new laws passed by the Clovis City Council governing its employees (Chancy is a Clovis firefighter).

Also on the ballot will be council posts held by Oran Jay Autrey (since he was appointed), Butch Tharp and Doyal LaRue.

Only the post held by councilman Bryan Kube won't be on the ballot.

Jimmie Mace enters county judge's race

The race for Parmer County judge now has four official entrants.

Jimmie Mace of Farwell announced Wednesday he was seeking the post.

Others who have announced in the Democrat primary are B.K. Buske, Eva Ancira and Leland Gustin. And Bonnie Clayton, of Bovina, is seriously considering running, too. The deadline for filing is Jan. 2.

County Judge Porter Roberts is not seeking re-election.

Mace said: "I have a master's degree in business administration and accounting, a bachelor's degree in business administration and computer science, and a real estate license. My experience is in banking, farming, business management, construction, and accounting. My previous employment was at Berry and Kirkland, Inc., and I am presently employed by De'Aun Willoughby CPA in Farwell."

"I am an active member of the Farwell Hospital

Board, Texico-Farwell Rotary for many years, president of Farwell Development Board, and a member of the First Baptist Church of Farwell, along with my wife Angelia and twin daughters, Veronica and Valerie, 9.

"I was born and raised in Parmer County, and you won't find a better place to live; the people here are so outstanding and caring for each other. If elected county judge I will handle the position in an honest, business-like manner with the people for the betterment of the county."

Hancock picked JP

The Parmer County Commissioners voted Friday to appoint Louise Hancock as Pct. 1 Justice of the Peace (Farwell).

The post becomes vacant Jan. 1 due to the retirement of Albert Smith. The term will be for one year since the post is on the March 1990 primary ballot.

Mrs. Hancock won a 3-1 vote over Irene Woods.

Commissioners Ray McGeehee, Tom Ware and Ernest Anthony supported Mrs. Hancock, who has been working

in the county tax assessor's office. Robert White voted for Mrs. Woods.

Both Mrs. Hancock and Mrs. Woods have announced they will seek the JP post in the Democrat primary in March.

In other business, the commissioners held a public hearing on whether to tax tangible personal property, including vehicles. No one from the public attended.

The commissioners probably won't decide until next summer whether to institute the tax.

Here is a look in review of 1989 in the Twin Cities area: January

A district judge ordered Parmer County cattleman Jim Kassahn to pay a Deaf Smith County feedlot company about \$5 million. The feedlot inherited claims of a bank against Kassahn in a settlement with the bank. Later in the month, Kassahn was sentenced in U.S. District Court to 5 years in prison and ordered to pay \$375,000 in restitution after pleading guilty to fraud.

The Farwell Steers, 19-2, won their district basketball opener over Hart.

The Lady Wolverines beat the state No. 1 ranked team, Floyd, by 15 points in basketball.

Texico Schools hired Dewey Pierce as a counselor, replacing James Harding, who retired.

The Texico Chamber of Commerce asked the City Council to join it in renovating the community center.

The Farwell School Board decided to seek its share of the county permanent school funds.

Lyndi Austin showed the Grand Champion Barrow and Klay Camp showed the Grand Champion Lamb at the Farwell Stock Show.

Lynne Mahaney was appointed Farwell postmaster. Lady Wolverines won the EPAC Tournament.

February

Raymond Hadley and Larry Powell were named to the New Mexico Amateur Softball Association Hall of Fame.

A merger was proposed for the Farmers' Electric Cooperative and Southwestern Electric Cooperative. It was approved in April.

Rev. Rich Stephens was named the new pastor at Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church.

Herman Geries and Janice Hamilton were the winners in the Texico School Board election. Also running were Terry Winkles, James Harding and Richard Kelley.

Support was voiced by persons at the Farwell School Board meeting for adding volleyball and baseball to the curriculum, but funding was a deterrent.

Lady Wolverines won district with a 10-0 record.

Steers won a playoff against Abernathy to qualify for the state playoffs after finishing tied for second in district.

Byron Martin and Andria Chadwick were named Texico King and Queen at Homecoming.

The Panhandle - Plains Historical Museum in Canyon, Texas, displayed the collection of the late Judge James D. Hamlin, given to the museum in the 1940's.

The Lady Wolverines 17-game win streak was broken by Floyd in the district title game, but the Texico ladies still moved on to the regional.

Dwayne Hamilton and Marsha Hamilton won top honors at the Texico science fair.

Fire ripped through the Lunsford Auto Parts store in Farwell.

Greg Akers showed the Grand Champion gilt at the Texico Hog Show.

It was announced at the Farwell City Council meeting that open burning may end due to federal guidelines.

The "Wheels Across America" project came through the Twin Cities.

March

The Flying J Wranglers, featuring Farwell native James Hobbs, performed at the Farwell Chamber of Commerce banquet. Honored were Troy Christian, Farmer of the Year; Dorris White, Teacher of the Year; Dora Verner, Woman of the Year, and Ed Corn, Man of the Year.

The Steers beat Quanah to win the area title, then beat Haskell to win regional. The Steers lost to eventual state titlist Edgewood in overtime in the state semi-finals. It was Farwell's first trip in history to state for either basketball or football.

The Lady Wolverines beat Cloudcroft in the opening state tourney match by 26 points, but lost to Floyd by a point in the state finale.

The Wolverines beat Grady in the regional to earn a state tourney berth but lost to Cloudcroft in the opening state match.

The Parmer County Commissioners agreed to divvy up the permanent school improvement fund, totalling nearly \$1 million, after receiving special requests.

Albert Galvan died in a traffic accident in Texico. Virgil Fiske announced he was leaving the Farwell Church of Christ to take a post in Alaska.

It was announced that cancer specialist Dr. James Neidhart would speak at the Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet.

April

Jeannie and Carl Goettsch opened Twin City Cafe in Farwell.

It was announced that Norma Sanders of Texico would be inducted into the Cowgirl Hall of Fame in Hereford.

Farwell boys won the Texico and Olton track meets.

The Farwell City Council raised city utility rates.

The Texas Legislature approved a bill to allow creation of the Muleshoe area hospital district.

Texico boys and girls won the EPAC track meets.

Texico closed its landfill due to stricter federal guidelines.

The Texico Chamber of Commerce honored Ed and Juanita Hardage as its Man and Woman of the Year; Lance Akers as Outstanding Senior at Texico High, and John R. Hadley for a special "Workhorse" award for his contributions.

May

The Lady Wolverines were runner-up at the state track meet.

Lynn Roberts announced her retirement as a Farwell teacher.

Bobby Redwine was elected Lazbuddie School Board president.

Texico City Council began discussing whether to hire a deputy marshal to assist Brent Byrum.

The new Muleshoe Hospital District set an election for June to become officially established; it will include part of Lazbuddie.

Ronald Byrd and Vick Chris-

tian were elected to the Farwell School Board. Also running were Virginia Loera - Rojas and Pat Halverson. In the city election, unopposed were Chris Gikas for mayor and Prentice Mills and Ysleta Kittrell for councilman.

Top scholars were: Farwell - Brian Haseloff, valedictorian; Kristi Stephens, salutatorian, and Amy Johnson, historian; Texico - Brett Patrick, valedictorian; Schree Thigpen, salutatorian, and Shannon Smith, historian; Lazbuddie - Adrienne Willingham, valedictorian; Jonessa Jennings, salutatorian, and Connie Gonzales, historian.

Texico City Council agreed to move on collecting delinquent water bills.

Francisco Pena of Friona was sentenced to 15 years in prison after being found guilty in the shooting death of Mike Diaz Jr. of Friona in October.

The state said it might penalize Parmer County for having operated the former Lazbuddie dump site illegally despite knowing it was illegal, according to the state.

June

Texico didn't receive any of the \$194,000 in state CDBG funds it sought for civic improvements.

The World of Poetry, based in Washington, D.C., honored Joyce Coffman of Farwell with its Golden Poet Award for 1989.

Named Outstanding Athletes at Lazbuddie were Brian Glover and Mia Jennings.

A memorial scholarship in honor of Howard Carlyle was established at Lazbuddie Schools.

A tornado touched down in Oklahoma Lane.

Farwell basketball coach Larry Gregory was named honorary parade marshal for Border Town Days.

A reception honored retiring Farwell teachers Lynn Roberts and Liz Williams.

Texico City Council agreed to hire a deputy marshal.

Parmer County Commissioners decided to fight paying a penalty to the state over the old Lazbuddie dump site.

Voters approved the new Muleshoe Hospital District, including those in part of Lazbuddie.

Farwell Schools will face financial cutbacks, Supt. John Grigsby said.

July

A tornado may have struck Texico.

The First Baptist Church of Texico was burglarized.

Charlie "Sugartime" Phillips performed in Farwell for a fund-raiser for the Farwell Convalescent Center.

The Texico School Board received the resignations of Vicky Lynn, David Lynn and Jerry Sadberry.

The Border Town Days Committee picked Johnnie and Beulah Williams as Pioneers of the Year.

Bovina Police Chief Gary Coleman was shot in the face by a man whose vehicle he stopped.

Diane Cooper and Nita Dunn resigned as Farwell teachers.

The Texico Chamber of Commerce slated an auction to raise funds to help community center renovations.
