Concrete canoes?

It seems Patty had "volunteered" Coach Myers to be in a celebrity race at the beginning of the concrete canoe races.

Coach Myers said he first told her that he couldn't participate because he had to be in Farwell that night. Little did he know he was talking to a Farwell gal. She told him "no problem," that he would make it here in plenty of time. So he agreed to help out.

So what happens? Right after he hops into the Tech canoe, it tips over and he's thrown into the water. "Then I learned how to sit correctly in it," he added.

So the deadline for signups has been extended until July 5. At least three girls must sign up for a contest to be held.

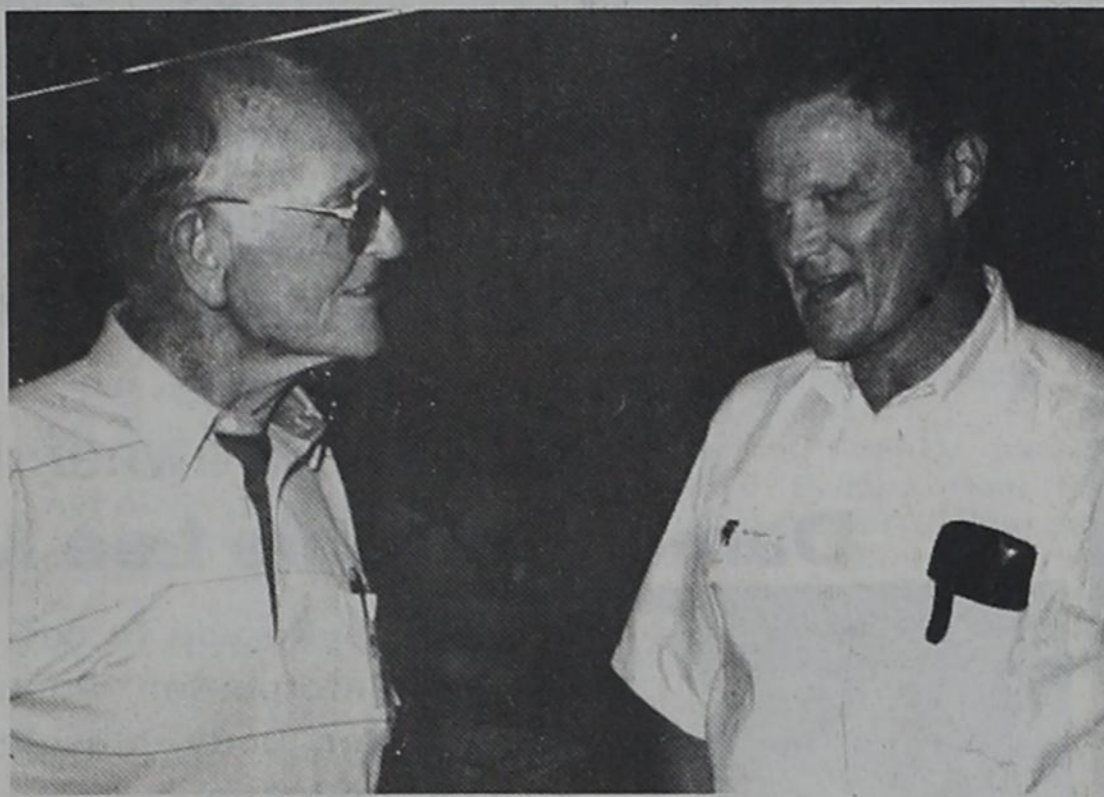
The winner of the competition receives \$200 in schol-

Myers speaks to ex-Tech students

Texas Tech longtime basketball coach Gerald Myers was the guest speaker Saturday of a meeting of the Tech ex-students association at the Farwell Community Center.

Alumni will be organizing an area chapter here. Teresa Mesman is heading the effort.

Myers, starting his 19th season this fall, is the second winningest basketball coach in Southwest Conference annals.

After telling an obligatory Aggie joke, he discussed how the athletic program was improving and that better students were being signed.

He said this was the first summer in his memory where not one of the basketball team players were attending

summer school in order to be eligible this fall.

He noted that Tech has upgraded its entrance requirements to the same level as Texas A&M and Texas. The school has a new chancellor, 3 new Board of Regents members and a 16 percent increase in its budget.

Also, member of Tech's Red Raiders Club and Ex-Students Association spoke to the gathering of 25. The Red Raiders Club has a new building on University across from the Tech campus.

Elmer Hargove, of Farwell, is on the board of directors of the Red Raiders Club.

Movies of Tech's football season and an overview of the university were shown, too.

Texico sets tax rates

The Texico City Council discussed its budget for the coming fiscal year Tuesday night and the tax rate will stay just about the same as the past year.

The new rates and assessed valuation will be: residential - .001558 and \$2,444,737; and non-residential - .002225 and \$1,045,980.

Not a lot of business was conducted due to the absence of city attorney Duane Hamar and councilmen Bryan Kube and Oran Jay Autrey.

Tabled until the next meeting were discussions on meter deposits and collections, a communications radio for the new city pickup, street work, and community building east wall repairs.

Mayor Steve Chancy announced some good news: the state has given Texico a grant of \$35,500 for a street chip seal program. This is a cooperative program and the city's cost will be \$24,000.

Texico Marshal Brent Byrum said he has gotten several good applications for the post of deputy marshal from experienced persons.

None, however, are certified (having passed a course at the New Mexico Police Academy). The City Council, when it agreed at the last meeting to hire a deputy specified that it wanted a certified officer. But Byrum indicated something can be worked out. The deadline for applications is July 5.

In other business, the council:

- Heard Byrum report that some cleanup in the city is under way. He plans to talk with state building inspector Bill Nance about condemning 2 or 3 structures.

- Bought a mat and tool box for the new pickup.

- Received a letter from the state saying it had accepted the city's landfill as officially being closed and meeting state requirements for closure.

- Reiterated that the city is now paying full health insurance costs for city employees who desire it. Counting that extra cost in, city employees are receiving 8.3 percent pay hikes.

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Farwell Schools face cutbacks

The Farwell School Board will face next month what government agencies never look forward to: making cuts in the proposed budget.

At a called meeting Tuesday, Supt. John Grigsby presented the working budget, totalling \$2.7 million. This includes all requests and very little weeding out has been done, he said. Meanwhile, he estimated that the current tax rate can generate only \$2.2 million.

That means the board must cut \$500,000 from the working budget; or cut part of that total, and raise taxes to cover the increase or use reserves. Also, the board may seek its Permanent School Fund portion from the County Commissioners for a project such as asbestos removal if required by the state.

"House Bill 72 finally got us," said Grigsby. This is the statute passed by the Texas Legislature a couple

of years ago that mandated extra costs.

Traditionally, Farwell Schools use part of their reserves to cover some increased costs. But while this year started with the reserves at \$400,000, by September the total will be between \$200,000 and \$250,000. Those latter figures only cover 1 to 2 months of operating expenses.

Thus, the board may be hesitant to expend some of its smaller reserves on covering increased expenses as it has in the past.

Grigsby said that in the past few years when the board faced its usual cutting in July (the final budget is due out in mid-August), it made decreases in supply and material categories. "This time, we may have to look at the programs," he said.

Grigsby advised the board to put pressure on the gover-

nor to include more funds for schools in the current special session.

He noted that the state has mandated costs of an extra \$100,000 on Farwell Schools for the coming year - but is only providing \$40,000.

In other business, the board:

- Heard Grigsby report about needed repairs at the junior high: ceiling may have to be replaced because of water damage, estimated \$5,000; new drains will be needed to eliminate standing water on junior high, \$4,800; and gas line will have to be replaced because of leaks, \$2,000.

- Watched a movie on strategic planning.

- Awarded the bank depository contract to the only bidder, Security State Bank.

- Let bids for band uniforms to the lowest of 3 bidders - The Bandsman Company of Dallas, for \$16,422.

- Agreed to seek bids for selling a bus and van.

Friena Schools' plans approved

Friena Schools' plans for new administrative offices were approved by the Parmer County Commissioners Monday.

Supt. Hal Ratcliff asked for \$187,529 to buy the vacant Friena Industries' offices for use as school administrative offices. Also, Friena asked for \$46,000 for renovation of its present administrative offices into classrooms.

Approval was by a 4-0 vote. Funds will come from the Permanent School Fund that the county has administered.

All told, Friena is entitled to 49% of the \$972,000 fund - \$483,821. Thus, Friena still has \$250,000 in the fund.

Previously, the commissioners approved Bovina's plans. Lazbuddie and Farwell have not presented plans yet.

In other business, the commissioners learned that insurance costs are taking hefty raises.

Regardless, they accepted

the bid from Ethridge Spring of Friena for liability insurance for the sheriff's deputies and jail. County Judge Porter Roberts said it was the only bid they could find that had both the deputies and jail covered.

And the commissioners accepted a higher bid from Blue Cross - Blue Shield for health insurance for county employees. The county pays for this coverage, said Roberts. A meeting is set for July 5 for county employees to hear what the coverage includes.

Both insurance firms chosen already have been supplying the insurances that were approved.

Roberts also reported that the county paid \$565 to Amarillo Waste Management for hauling trash and lease of its container, which has been placed just south of Friena. It is the only container the county commissioners have placed in Parmer County.

Asked if the county had any plans to control open burning, since Farwell has indicated open burning will be banned in the city after Aug. 30, Roberts said the county commissioners haven't heard anything about a statewide ban and there has been no discussion of it.

The next commissioners' meeting will start at 9 a.m. July 10, an hour earlier than usual because some of the commissioners will be attending a school.

Bernie Gownes presented the annual audit report. He complimented the county on how the books shape up and for the cooperation of county employees.

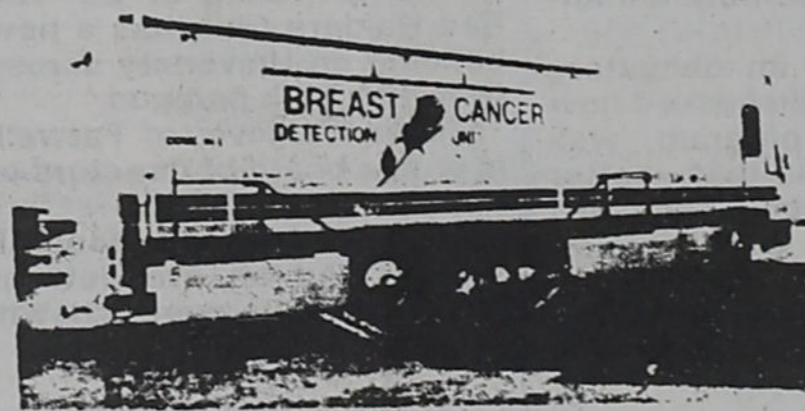

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments may be made by calling (806) 238-1116. The mobile breast cancer detection units will

be in Bovina at City Hall, 205 North St., on Friday, June 30, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and the American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

1. 35 - 40 years of age - one baseline mammogram.
2. 40 - 50 years of age - a mammogram every 1 - 2 years, depending on breast type and risk factor.
3. 50 years of age and over - an annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
4. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk

factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

5. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find every early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

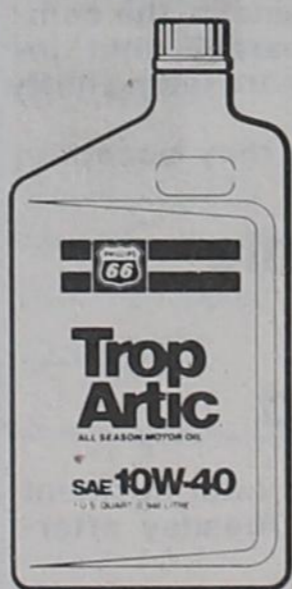
The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The unit accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard and American Express.

CRP signup set

As a result of the Food Security Act passed in 1985, farms which contain land this classified as highly erodible must have a conservation plan in order to remain eligible for any of the government's farm programs.

Howard Sprague, soil conservationist in Friona, said one of the best options for land protection offered in these plans is the planting of highly erodible land to grass. This can be done under the CRP program.

Under CRP, the landowner agrees to establish his land to grass and to control any problems which may arise during the 10-year contract. The landowner receives cost share for cost associates with establishing the grass. The landowner also receives a rental payment for land enrolled in the CRP program. This rental is determined by a bid submitted by the landowner and accepted by the government.

The next CRP sign-up will

be from July 17 to Aug. 4. If interested, you need to call the ASCS office in Farwell for an appointment.

Spider mites may be a problem

Spider mites are tiny, but they can cause big problems in home gardens.

These pests prefer tomatoes, beans and peas but will attack many other crops. They do most of their damage in hot, dry weather, said Mike Blanton, Parmer County entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Spider mites, also called red spiders, are only 1/60th of an inch in length and vary in color from white to green to red.

The tiny pests can build up quickly and completely engulf plants, Blanton said. Eggs laid on the underside of leaves hatch in four to five days. A complete life cycle takes three weeks, and as many as 20 overlapping generations can occur in a single year.

Mites spin a thin web which often can be seen on heavily infested plants. They feed by inserting their mouth - parts into plant tissue and sucking juices. While feeding, they inject toxic substance into the plant.

Infestation of spider mites can be identified by tiny white spots on plant leaves. Heavy infestations cause bleaching or yellowing, first along the main leaf veins and then through

out the plant. Heavy infestations cause plants to shed buds and small fruit. Spider mites can completely defoliate a plant if not controlled.

Control of spider mites is often difficult and requires two to four applications of insecticide at five to seven - day intervals. Check plants frequently for spider mites since the pests can build up rapidly.

Insecticides registered for controlling spider mites in gardens are diazinon, kelthane, malathion and sulfur. However, do not use sulfur on cucurbits (cucumbers, squash, or melons) as severe plant change can occur.

As always, read and follow label directions on all insecticides, said Blanton.

Blanton noted that spider mite infestations can be seen in evergreens and cedar trees that have dry, brown and yellowing leaves on their limbs and small webs.

Lawns with spider mite infestations will look yellow. The mites will fall off the plant when it is shaken into the palm of your hand.

Jeff, a senior at Farwell High, was sponsored by the Texico-Farwell Lions Club. The Farwell Band Boosters also contributed funds.

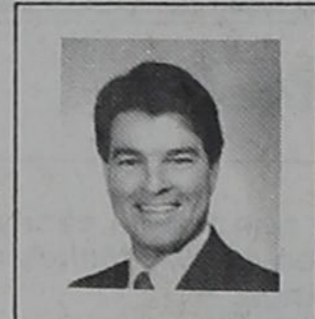

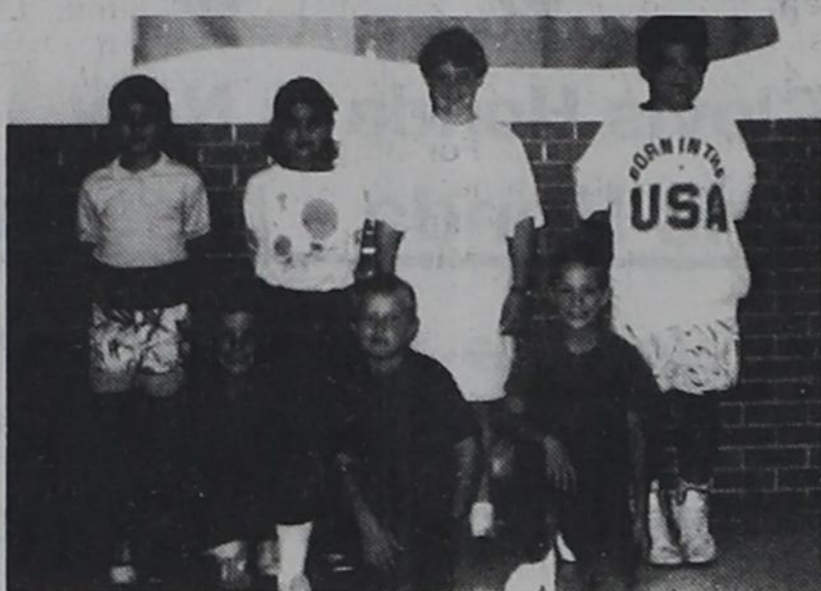

Angie White, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert White, and a Farwell High senior, was a representative to Girls' State at Texas Lutheran College in Seguin.

Here's her story:
 "About 20 girls from the Panhandle area met at Amarillo Airport June 13 to travel as a group to Seguin. We were all nervous but after 3 hours of flight delays we had all become friends by the time we arrived.

"When we arrived, we were assigned to 1 of 12 cities, to the House of Representatives and to either the Nationalist or Federalist political party. I was in City K, the Senate and a member of the Nationalists. We were also encouraged to run for a city, county or state office. I ran for county clerk and was elected. As Texas County Clerk, I kept minutes of the County Commission meetings and issued marriage and business licenses.

"At Girls' State, we learned how our city, county and state governments function. We began by having an assembly in which municipal governments were explained. Following this, citizens filed for office, campaigned and city elections were held. This same procedure was followed later in the week for county and state governments. In addition to the instruction given by the Girls' State staff, we were privileged to hear Ann Richards, state treasurer and gubernatorial candidate; Rep. George Strake; and Carol Rylander, former Austin mayor and current Austin TV talk show hostess. I was very impressed with Ann Richards because of her honesty, wit and straightforwardness.

"Any member of the legislature could write a bill or resolution to be presented to the House or Senate, and there were many submitted. In the 10 sessions that were held, we debated such issues as state lottery, the death penalty for minors, punishment for rapists, mandatory child care for businesses, ways to decrease environmental problems, and the legalization of prostitution.

"One of the most significant bills passed was the state lottery. After it was passed, we held the first Girls' State lottery, selling tickets for 50 cents with lottery winners receiving Girls' State T-shirts. As a member of the Senate, I learned first-hand how Texas laws are made.

"Although we were kept very busy for 10 full days, I enjoyed my experience at Girls' State. I made friends with girls from all over the state of Texas, and learned a great deal about how our government works. I would like to thank everyone who contributed to make it possible for me to attend Girls' State. It was an experience of a lifetime."

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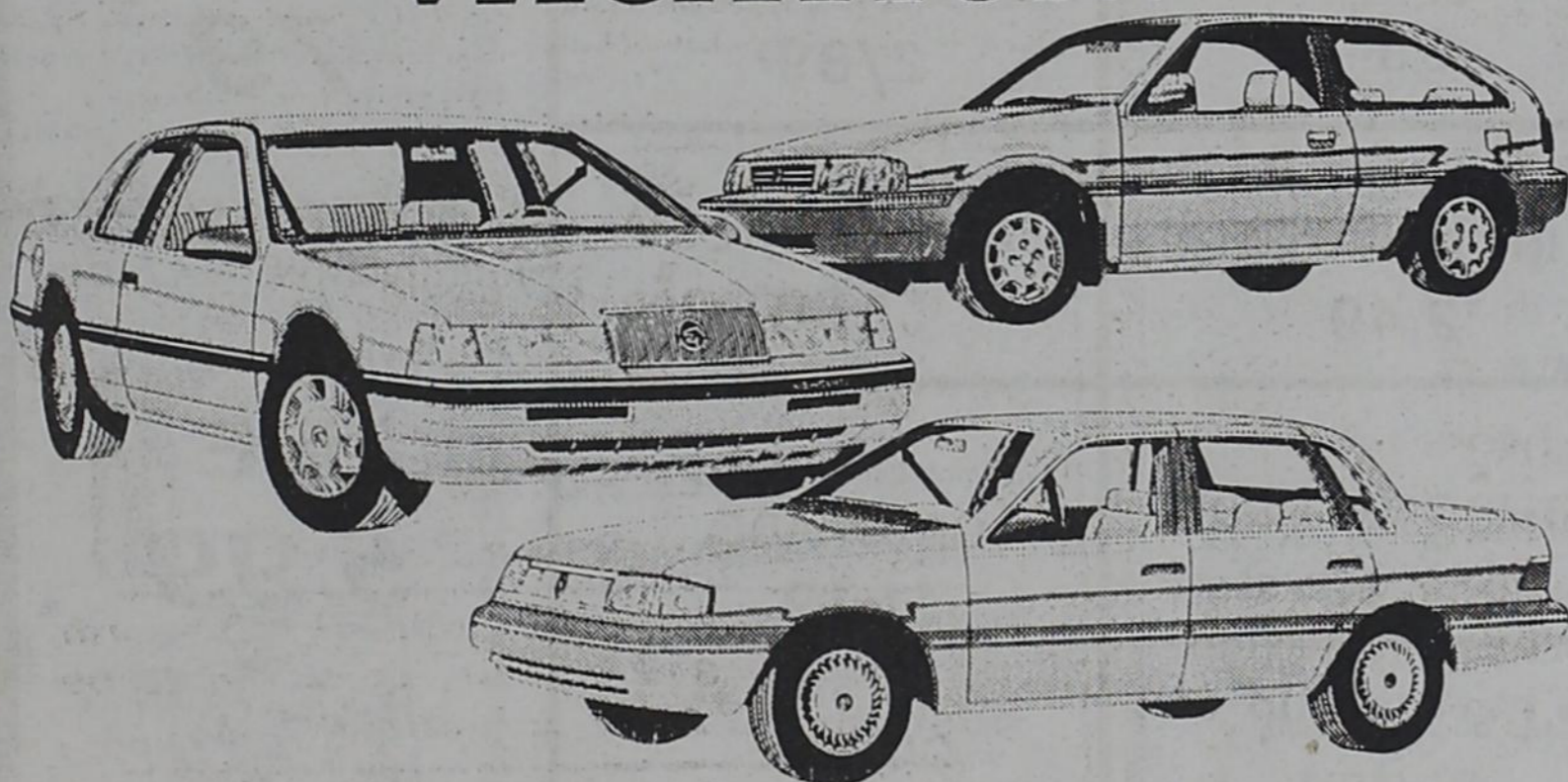
