Excel begins quality plan

Friona's Excel Corp. plant, the area's number one employer, has instigated a Quality Improvement Process, in order to assure that the products from the giant beef processing plant will be of the best possible quality.

Four Excel officials, Terry Wilkerson, Dick Weikert, Alec Gordon and Hector Villarreal, recently attended an instruction training school held in Chicago. The week's session prepared these men to teach the quality improvement to other Excel Workers.

To begin with, all management and supervisory officials will be required to attend 20 hours of classroom instruction in the quality program starting April 17.

"We are hoping to better serve our customers. Today's consumers are very well-educated, and are quality conscious. We felt we owed it to our customers to improve the quality of our product," said Excel plant manager Terry Wilkerson.

Excel's parent company, Cargill, began a Quality Education System late in 1988, after some of their officials completed an intense four-month training program at Phillip Crosby Associates in Winter Park, Fla.

At Excel's Friona Division, a Quality Improvement Team was formed in February of this year, and at the same time plant officials passed a "quality policy."

The policy statement is as follows: "We will safely produce and deliver defect-free products and services to our customers. Everyone will understand the requirements of their jobs and conform to those requirements at all times."

Plant Manager Terry Wilkerson was elected as chair person of the plant's Quality Improvement Team. Bill Peak was named administrator.

Other members of the team include Dick Weikert, Quality Education; Kenny Sherbon, measurements; Leonal Kilgore, price of quality; Alec Gordon, quality awareness; Bill Geottl, corrective action, and Hector Villarreal, recognition.

"This dedication to quality improvement is a commitment that Excel has made in order to improve our products and meet the needs of our customers. We feel that it is absolutely essential in order to survive in this competitive market," said Gordon, who is in charge of quality awareness.

Gordon indicated that the clerical employees, hourly management personnel and hourly production workers would begin attending the special quality classes beginning the week of July 10.

Mike Langridge, one of the Cargill officials involved in the four-month training program, said "participants in the program typically begin the course very skeptical. But by the end of the week, everyone is very energetic and ready to resolve the quality problems of the world."

The quality improvement program is based on the principles developed by Philip B. Crosby in his book, "Quality Is Free."

"Doing things right the first time adds nothing to the cost of your product or service. Doing things wrong is what costs money," Crosby says.

The typical American corporation spends 15 to 20 percent of its sales dollar on reworking, scrapping, repeated service, inspection, tests, warranties, and other quality-related costs.

Lapses in quality also damage corporate reputations and provoke government regulation. Most, or all, of these headaches could be prevented by a properly managed quality operation, the Excel officials point out.

Hospital District bill moves along

The Texas Senate approved a set of bills at the end of last week that would authorize the creation of the Lamb County and Muleshoe area hospital districts.

The legislation sponsored by Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo and Rep. Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, goes to Gov. Bill Clements, who is expected to sign it into law.

Voters residing within the respective boundaries of each district would have the final say on whether to establish the hospital district.

The Muleshoe district would include most of the northern two-thirds of Bailey County and portions of the southern part of Parmer County that are close to Muleshoe. It would abut, but not overlap, the existing Farwell Hospital District.

Both bills name five temporary directors who can call an election on creation of the districts after petitions with 10 percent of that district's voters have been collected.

If the propositions fail, they cannot be resubmitted for 12 months.

The Muleshoe district proposition specifies that the district's annual tax levy be capped at an annual maximum property tax rate of 25 cents.

The maximum rates in both districts could be raised by voter approval, but in neither case could that exceed 75 cents per \$100 of property value.

No baseball this year

The Farwell Youth Baseball League will not function this summer. Only a handful of parents showed up for the planning meeting Tuesday.

It will be the second year in a row that the baseball league was not run.

State receives Texico request

Texico Mayor Steve Chancy traveled to Albuquerque April 13 to present the city's request for state assistance to the Community Development Block Grant Review Board.

The board is chaired by the state lieutenant governor. Helping present Texico's request for \$194,000 to help repair city streets was Lee Tillman, Eastern Plains Council of Governments director.

Also present was Chancy's

son, Preston, who got credit from his world history class for making the trip.

Chancy reported that he thought Texico's presentation went well and was received positively. He said it took more than 15 minutes to explain the request, show photos of the streets and answer several questions. Some other city requests were over with within 30 seconds.

Chancy and Tillman pointed out that this was the first time Texico had ever requested CDBG funds, which is a point in their favor. The board received more than 70 applications and decisions are expected in May.

Texico needed to get more information to the Review Board this week, such as a survey of the income levels of folks living along the streets in question.

Cancer specialist to be speaker

One of the top cancer researchers in the United States will be the guest speaker at the annual Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet.

The speaker will be Dr. James A. Neidhart, director of the University of New Mexico Cancer Center, and chief of the Division of Hematology - Oncology, Department of Medicine, UNM.

He will speak on what persons' cancer dollar donations go for, both at the national level and at UNM. He also will present a slide presentation.

The banquet is slated at 7 p.m. MST April 25 at Texico School cafeteria. Tickets are \$7.50.

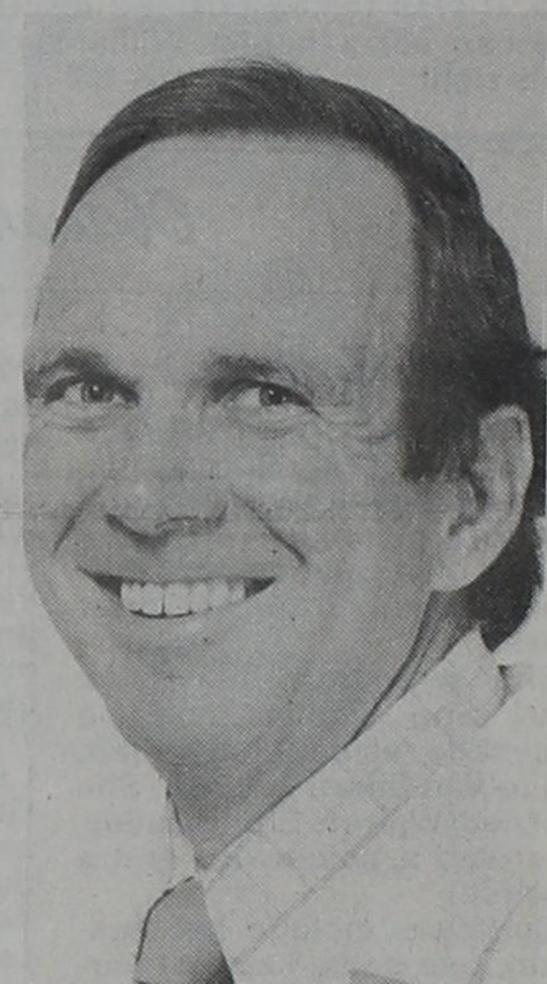
Dr. Neidhart graduated from Mt. Union College, Alliance, Ohio, before receiving his medical degree from Ohio State University. After residency work at Kalamazoo, Mich., and Columbus, Ohio, he became a post-doctoral fellow at Ohio State University Hospitals, followed by a NIH research fellowship there.

He has served as professor of medicine at UNM; M.D. Anderson Hospital, Houston; and Ohio State. Before becoming director of UNM's Cancer Center in 1986, he served as chairman of the

Department of Medical Oncology at M.D. Anderson for two years.

During the Vietnam War, he served as a battalion surgeon in the Marine Corps from 1967-69.

He is a member of the American Federation of Clinical Research, Southwest Oncology Group, American College of Physicians, American Society of Clinical Oncology, American Association for Cancer Research, American Society of Hematology, American Radium Society and the American Society for Clinical Pharmacology and Therapeutics.

Williams participates at cotton meeting

A regional cotton organization's internal fabric ripped April 13 when a board member accused officers of not using the proper procedure to adopt policy during a recent meeting in Lubbock.

Bert Williams, a farmer from Farwell, said Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. (PCG) leader Steve Verett of Ralls ignored one motion before the group but allowed a following motion to be voted on in executive session a week ago.

He also claimed that PCG bylaws should have prevented the motion from ever coming before the board.

The split at PCG came on the issue of whether Texas should make the agriculture commissioner's post elective or appointive. Texas is one of about a dozen states that continues to elect an agriculture commissioner, and there is a movement to abolish the office now held by Jim Hightower to replace it with a government appointed commissioner or multimember commission.

Williams made his accusations during a Lubbock news conference in which four people voiced their support for continuing the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) as is. "I stress to you that the board of PCG without proper guidance from the Executive President (Donald) Johnson, chairman of the board (Myrl) Mitchell and President Verett were in flagrant violation of the PCG bylaws," Williams told the news conference. "The PCG membership has every right to be informed of how their leaders are conducting their business."

Specifically, Williams said, parliamentary procedure states that it is not correct to take action on a motion on the floor and allow the main motion to be superseded by an invalid subsidiary motion. Williams also said Article VI, Sec. 1, of PCG by laws state that, "Only political subjects which affect the economic and civic welfare of cotton producers shall be considered. This corporation shall be forever prohibited at any of its meetings or elsewhere, from espousing or opposing the political cause of a person or party."

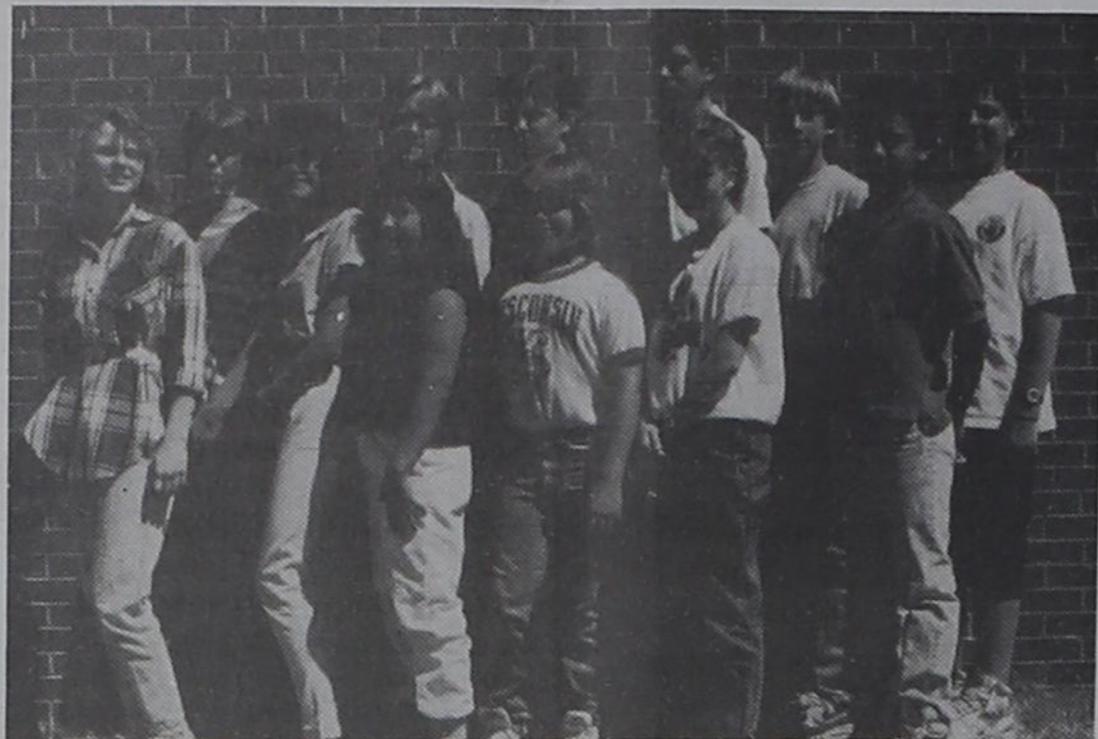
The PCG board adopted a resolution, 25-7, favoring an appointed commissioner or commission.

Verett, contacted by The Avalanche Journal on his farm near Ralls, disputed the charges.

"This (position) has nothing to do with a political decision. In fact, it was stated that the position was not taken as a reaction or action on Mr. Hightower," Verett said. "It simply had to do with how agriculture was to be best served, and they felt by an overwhelming majority that we feel it is best to have an appointed position."

Verett believes that parliamentary procedure was followed correctly.

"All I was doing was trying to keep order," Verett said. "It took one and a half hours. It was not a railroad job by either side. It was talked out and discussed in a gentleman-like way. I am sorry that Mr. Williams disagrees, but that certainly is his right."

Food Security Act plan running out

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District said the Food Security Act plan is running out. It requires that highly erodible fields in each ASCS farm number have an approved conservation plan by Dec. 31, 1989, in order to participate in U.S.D.A. programs. The Soil Conservation Service office in Friona has already received 2,003 "Highly Erodible Land" (HEL) determination requests. So far, 1,860 requests have been determined with 510 needing conservation plans. Once a determination has been made one of two actions will be taken. If there is no HEL, the producer will receive a letter stating this fact. If there is HEL, the producer will receive a letter inviting him to make an appointment to develop a conservation plan. HEL land that has a high potential for wind and/or water erosion. A HEL determination is made for each field, and is based on the soil type and number of acres of highly erodible soil. Highly erodible soils in Parmer County are: Amarillo, Arvana, Berda, Bipus, Estacado, Friona, Kimbrough, Likes, Lipan, Mobeetie, Posey, Potter, Tulia, and Zita.

The 800 m. relay team of Amanda Curtis, April Haseloff, Terri Hillock, and Lena Ortiz finished 6th.

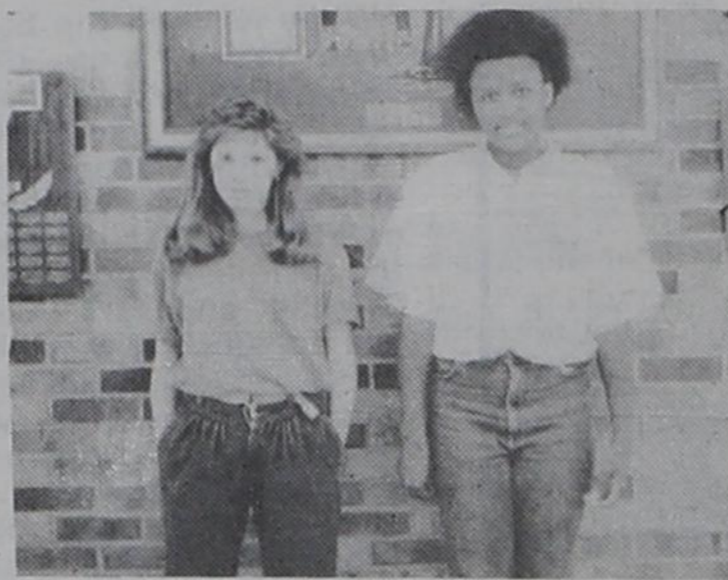

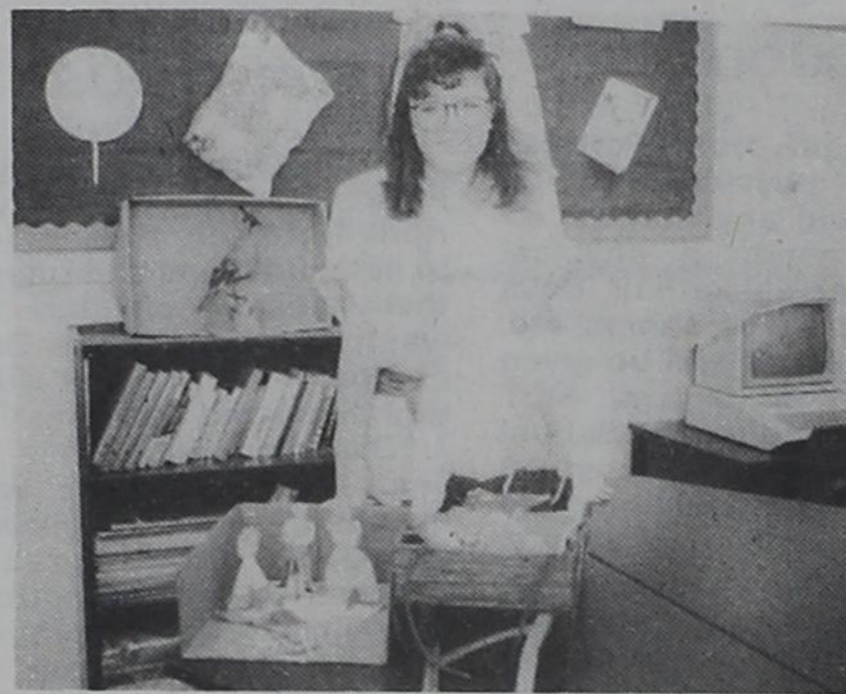

Grigsby discusses 'effective schools'

Farwell School Superintendent John Grigsby wrote the following article to explain five important factors necessary for effective schools:

"As I have stated many times, much has changed about the business of schools since the advent of H.B. 72 in 1984. We know a great deal more about how children learn and the qualities which must be evident in a school for it to be an 'effective school'."

"Over the next few weeks, a series of articles will be published, written by the staff of our schools, which will address each of the five correlates of effective schools. The articles will not only explain the specific correlate, but tell how that correlate is demonstrated in that school."

"My purpose is to introduce you to this integral part of the new state accreditation process: the five correlates of effective schools. They are:

1. Instructional leadership;
2. High expectations and teacher behavior;
3. Instructional focus;
4. School climate; and,
5. Measurement.

"Instructional leadership means that the principal takes an active role in the instructional program of the school."

"High expectations/ teacher behavior means that teachers expect all students to learn; their behavior conveys that expectation and their classroom practices encourage and demand that all students be active in the learning process."

"Instructional focus means that an effective school possesses a written document which states the instructional objectives to be taught and mastered by all students. Focus should be broadly understood and instructionally oriented. A well defined, uniform curriculum is a key component. In other words, what does the school care about most?"

"School climate: The school exhibits physical orderliness and safety, as well as a business-line atmosphere which is designed to promote and reward student achievement."

"Measurement: Effectiveness is defined in terms of student achievement. The school chooses tests which will provide the appropriate information and then analyzes that information to identify strengths and weaknesses to improve its instructional program."

"All of the correlates must exist in each building to be effective, and they must work together. We feel that these correlates are live and well in Farwell."

"How do they demonstrate themselves in our schools? 'Stay tuned to this station' for the answers in the articles to come. If you have any comments or questions, please contact me at 481-3371. I look forward to hearing from you."
