A message for our graduates

More of a personal column today, folks.

Instead, she hung tough. And it worked out. All I can say is that gal's got spit and vinegar. I like that.

As parents, Judy and I have tried to teach our children to be independent. We have tried to alert them to the problems of life, how to deal with the breaks - both good and bad, and how to keep their faith in God.

Now, I'm not saying that's what other parents should do. The No. 1 rule of life is that you never, ever tell other parents how to raise their children.

Anyway, I believe it's important to impress upon youngsters that they will get good and bad breaks during their lifetimes. Dealing with good breaks is not too tough. But dealing with a bad break is easier said than done.

Saturday, the commencement speaker gave the usual talk - about facing challenges, building bridges, etc. That's all well and good.

But, to me, what really counts is when you fail at a challenge. Do you go to pieces? Do you just give up? Or do you wipe the blood off and stand tall again?

What I have found out, through my experiences, is what often appears to be a bad break can turn out to be a good one in the longer run. So what matters here is the perspective to use. That's not too easy for a young'un to fathom. But it's why parents are so helpful in a time of need; they have the experience factor going for them.

Also, the words success and failure are relative. What may appear to be a success to one person may seem to be a failure to someone else.

One example is the high premium that society places on making money. However, if someone doesn't have a high salary, yet is happy in what he or she is doing, would you call that a success - or a failure? I'd call it a success.

I've been fortunate in having faced many challenges over the years. Some I have met successfully, others not. What that has done for me has been to eliminate the fear of failure.

Too many people get hung up on that fear. They worry about what others might say if they fail at a challenge. They shouldn't; "others" don't count as much as you do.

What is important is that the challenge is faced. How it turns out might not necessarily be known for quite awhile afterward. So don't fear what might occur if you feel you may "fail." Go for it!

That's my message for graduates.

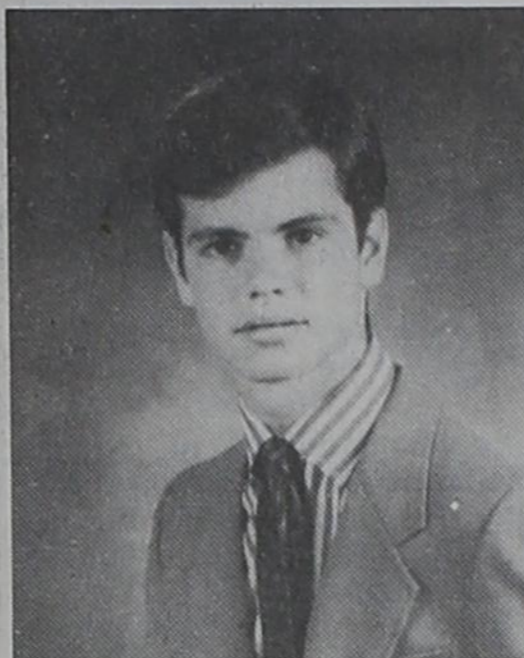
University of Oklahoma.

Shannon Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. Leon Smith, is historian.

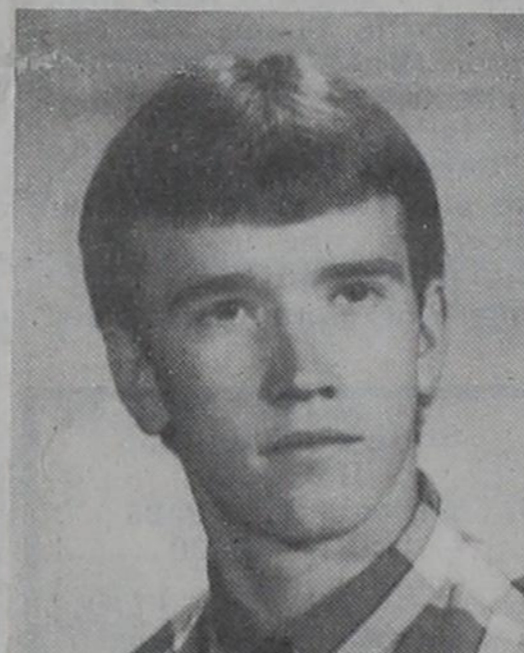
