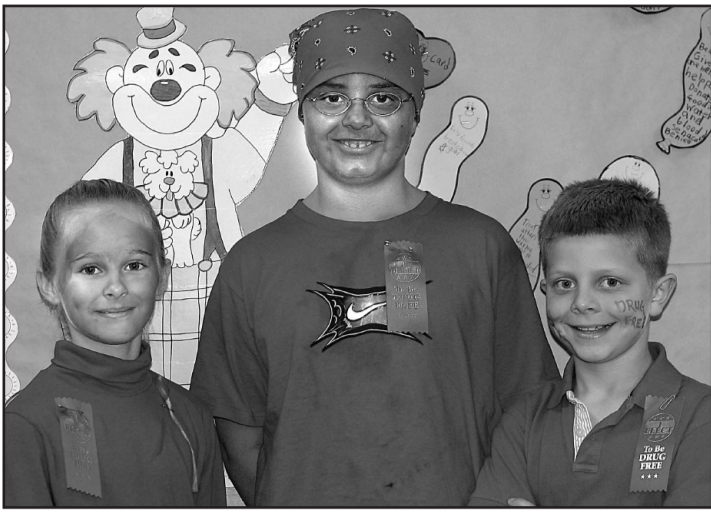

 -- Learned that the state will give Parmer County around \$10,000 for the indigent defense program. These funds go toward court-appointed attorneys, for example. The money given the county is very little toward what is needed, said County Judge Bonnie Clayton-Heald. Also, she noted last week's story about the county getting \$81,000 from the state. Mrs. Heald this will be funneled through a state agency to help the elderly winterize their homes.

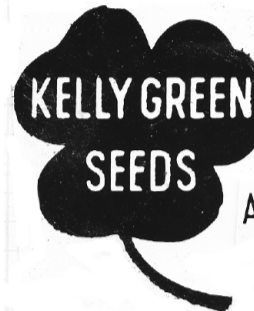

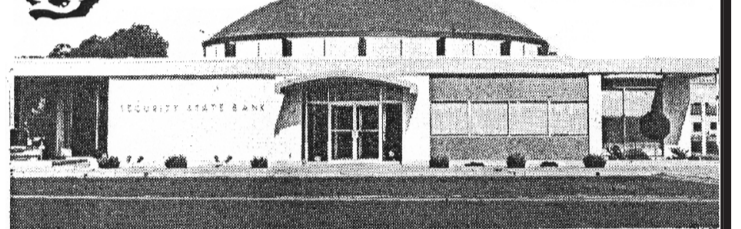

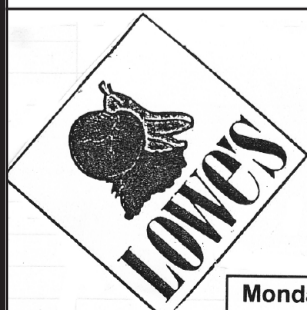

Wolverines smash Hagerman

Things started off badly for the Hagerman Bobcats and just got worse from there. On their first play from scrimmage from the 20 yard line, the ball flew over the quarterback's head into the end zone for a safety. Without breaking a sweat, the Wolverines were on the scoreboard.

Texico (8-0, 2-0) led 32-0 after the 1st quarter and 52-0 at halftime and never took more than 5 plays on any drive to score. The Wolverines finished off the Bobcats 66-0.

If the Wolverines defeat Ja this Friday there, Texico will be district champions and host the opening state playoff game the following weekend.

Jal defeated Loving last week in overtime and eliminated the Falcons' chances of getting to the playoffs.

The huge margin enabled Texico coaches to substitute players early in the game and give many of them some playing time. It's a perfect opportunity to recognize those kids that put in their time every day in practice but don't see much of the field. They all play a part in the success of the team!

Recognition goes to Justin Hepfinger, Weston Casey, Wacey Williams, Kyle Teitz, Billy Scott, Micah Grissom, Jonathan Sullivan, Casey Crist, Courtland Luscombe, and Brandon Bare. Also, Angel Gaytan, Andrew Castillo, Dustin McDaniel, Ethan McDaniel, Jesse Walthers, Johnny Ortiz, Jacob Freitas, Carlos Meza, Michael Reid, and Rolando Renova. Managers Jerry Aleman, Damien Robbs and Estevon Loera, and statistician Gabriel Sena should also be recognized for their valued assistance to the team.

After the safety to start the game, the Wolverines scored their first TD on a 5 play, 51-yard drive topped off by a 11-yard run by Tony Clements and highlighted by 15-yard runs by Zane Anderson and Chris Phillips. The score was 9-0.

Dustin McDaniel made a good tackle on the kickoff and Johnny Serrano recovered a Hagerman fumble on their 1st play from scrimmage to set up another scoring opportunity. In 3 plays, Phillips strolled in from 5 yards out. The Logan Brown kick made the score 16-0.

Wacey Williams made a good stop on the kickoff at the Bobcats 24 and 3 plays later Hagerman had to punt, thanks to a good tackle by Zac Morgan. The Wolverines were on the 5 yard line in 4 plays after a 36 yard pass from Braden Vaughan to Justin Garrison and a 14-yard run by Anderson. But, they fumbled the ball to Hagerman on the next play.

Johnny Ortiz made a tackle for a 1-yard loss and on the next play Hagerman hiked the ball out of the end zone for another safety. After the kickoff, Texico scored

again in 5 plays when Vaughan found Clements in the corner of the end zone for a 10-yard pass and the score was 25-0.

Billy Scott tackled the kick returner at the 17 yard line and the defense forced another punt after 3 plays. Phillips returned the punt 48 yards for a TD, making it 32-0.

The Bobcats threw an interception to Clements on the next play giving the Wolverines the ball on the 45 yard line. In 4 plays, Texico added another touchdown. Serrano ran the ball for 19, Vaughan hit Phillips on the sideline for 21, and Serrano ran it in from 24 yards out. The score was 38-0.

Good stops by Ricky Burns and Bryan Vannatta on the next series forced another punt. On the first play from scrimmage, Vaughan found Garrett Mayfield wide open down field for a 43 yard score making it 45-0.

Hagerman couldn't get a break when their best play of the night was called back because of an inadvertent whistle. The drive went no where from there thanks to a tackle by Anderson for a 3-yard loss and a QB sack by Carlos Meza.

Four plays later, the score was 52-0 after Vaughan found Garrison open for a 15-yard touchdown.

Good defensive plays by Vannatta, Leo Muniz, and Aaron Vaughan thwarted the Bobcats best offensive series as they made two 1st downs.

The Wolverines received the 2nd half kickoff and scored on their second play when Serrano scampered 53 yards making it 59-0. The defense held Hagerman again with a sack by Aarin Vaughan and Michael Johnson.

The second team started getting lots of playing time

The Steer offense got the ball one more time but again struggled and had to give it back on downs. Nazareth let the clock run out with the final score 22-7.

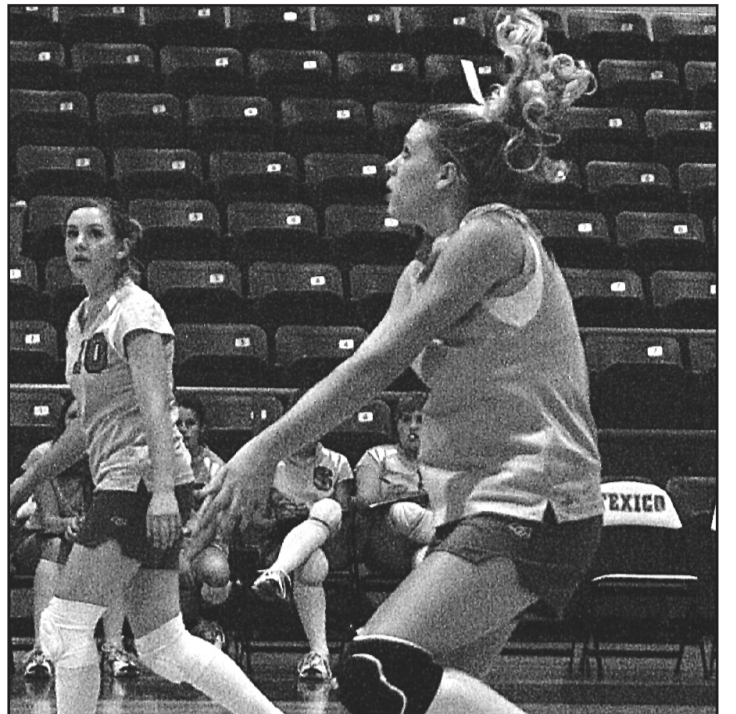
Texico wiped out Clayton, 28-26, 25-22, 25-9.

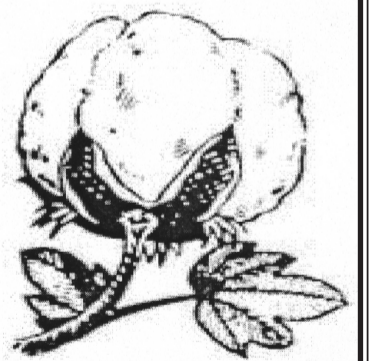

Texico increases water rates

The Texico City Council on Tuesday passed a water rate hike, effective Jan. 1.

The rate changes have been outlined in the Tribune the past two months.

In other business, the council:

-- Approved the request of Fire Chief Lewis Cooper to purchase 2 stair chairs and a transfer flat for the ambulances for \$4,178 from fire department funds.

-- Was told that the Brown Well has been out of service the past two months and needs repairs. Repair work will go out for bid.

-- Was told that Texico School is looking into punching a water well for use in the football and practice fields. But it is believed that the school doesn't have the needed water rights so this won't happen.

-- Heard that Steve Coe questioned why he was paying for city sewer service since the city won't service his private sewer line (only 4"). The reason is that his sewer connects with the city sewer system.

-- Renewed the contract with city building inspector Terry Martin with no changes.

-- Discussed animal control. Police officer Gilbert Salguero said he talked with Clovis animal control personnel and they will come to Texico to pick up animals for \$20 a visit - but the city must first catch them.

City Attorney Marion Ty Rutter will check into legalities involved in working together with Farwell on using an animal control officer, but this doesn't look promising, he said.

-- Discussed buying a mosquito fogger. This was tabled until more information could be received.

-- Had a lengthy discussion with the city's cemetery board which included:

1) Was told that the cemetery board has voted rules for "cremain" handling to include: 1 cremain and 1 body per space, or 2 cremains in 1 space; to be dug at least 2 feet deep, and a family can dig the space themselves.

2) The cemetery board urged that the city hire a part-time person to work at the cemetery, especially during the summer

months. If the city hires the person, then it eliminated an insurance problem that plagues "independent contractors."

It was said that Lewis Foster has done some mowing this year at the cemetery. The cemetery board will discuss this further and see how much money it can budget for a part-time person, then give money to the city council to pay for the worker, if this is legal.

3) Heard Councilman Oran Jay Autrey report he will haul some excellent top soil to the cemetery on Friday from Cannon Air Force Base.

4) Discussed whether plots in a corner of the old cemetery would be sold. It was said that it's rumored that persons are already buried there in unmarked

spaces.

A disagreement arose over whether the council had voted to allow plots in

the area to be sold, and city personnel will check

the cemetery board and council.

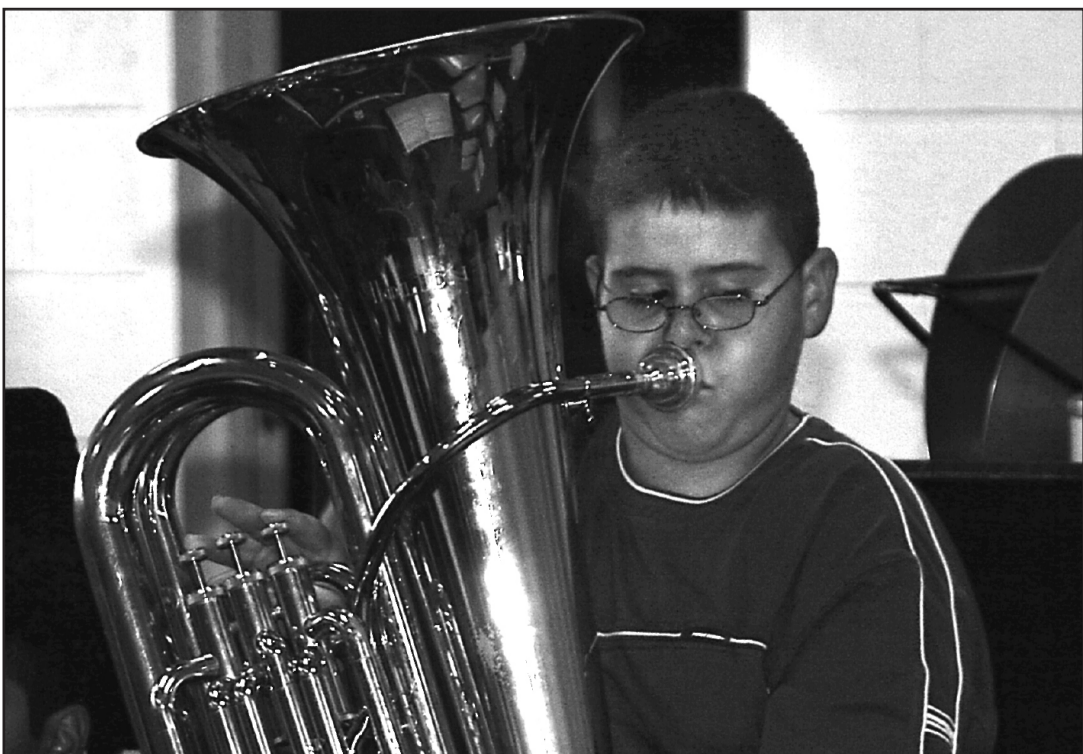
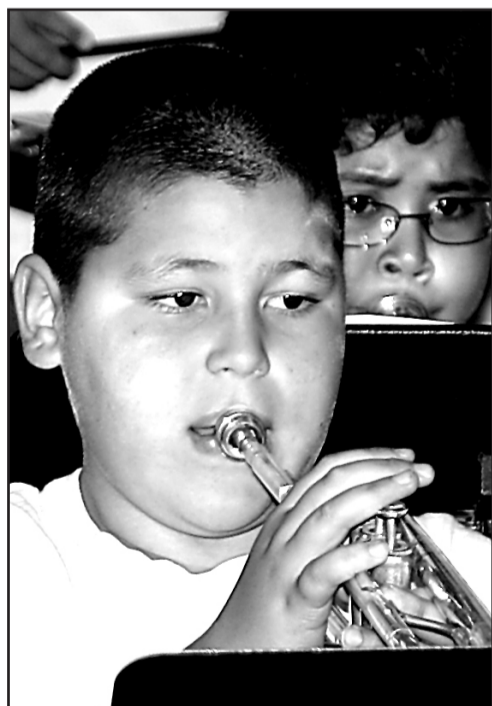

As for the game, Bovina took a 12-0 lead in the first half, with Segovia scoring from 5 yards out and Torbert from the 1. The kicks failed.

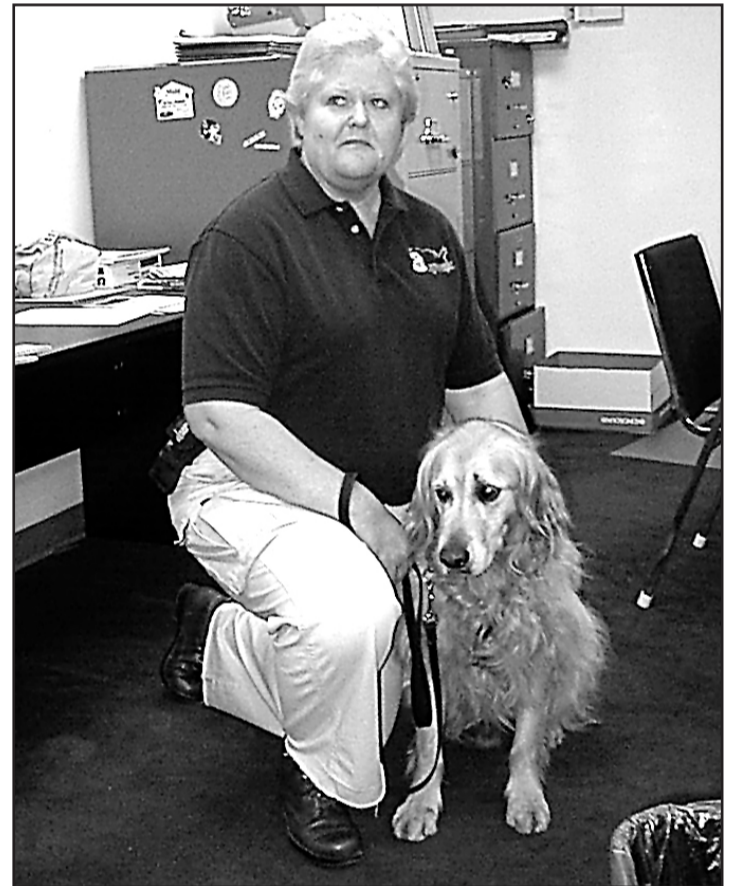
