## 'Cicada killer' arrives here

A very large wasp, the "cicada killer" is making its annua
summer appearance on the South Plains, says Mike D. Blanton, Parmer and Bailey Couth Plains, says Mike D. is the largest in our area, being about $11 / 2$ " in length. This wasp is much more interested in stinging clicadas than people. They can often be seen dragging or flying and carrying paralyzed cicadas back to their nests.
