Taking the hard road


Well, folks, this is a hard column to write today.

BTD Merchants' Giveaway starts



You see, if I were still working for a large paper, this would be no problem. I would name names, and identify the situation clearly. That's not how it's done in a small area. To be specific can cause more problems for the folks concerned than it's worth.

So I have to take the hard road here. I have to be ambiguous on purpose; that's rough.

The other option is to ignore the situation. That's the smart thing to do. But, as I said, I'm not very smart. I believe that any local newspaper worth its salt should not ignore local problems, especially when it appears they may escalate into serious ones.

It's difficult for a small community to attract good folks to lead their government. There's no pay. There are complaints. About all you get out of the job is the self-satisfaction from knowing you've done your part to help your community become a better place to live.

Folks should remember that when dealing with government leaders. And they should also remember that if they are really unhappy with their decision makers, they can either run for the office themselves or vote against the folks involved.

But late night phone calls at home? Spreading gossip? Listening to one side of a problem without taking the time to hear the other side? Putting everything into "black and white" terms instead of understanding that complex problems simply cannot be solved with "either or" decisions?

Wrong, wrong, wrong.

What this usually results in, whatever community is involved, is that the government leaders say "the heck with it" and guit. I wouldn't blame them. Think of how few races for City Council, for example, we've seen in the Twin Cities the past several years. There have not been a whole mess of candidates.

My viewpoint is simple: when we have good, decent, honest, hardworking folks in government positions, we need to keep them there. And it hurts me when I hear they may quit in disgust. That's my biggest complaint about what's happening throughout the United States. Folks are voting for or against candidates based on single issues, such as abortion. So candidates are reacting in ways just to get elected. The days of Henry Clay saying "I'd rather be right than President" may be over for good.

The Texico City Council held a special meeting last Friday to discuss filling the council post left vacant by the resignation of Bryan Kube, who has moved to Lubbock.

The council will meet at 6:30 p.m. July 13 to appoint a new councilman. The council also will name a new mayor pro tem (who takes over as mayor when the mayor is gone), since Kube had held that post.

Among the names suggested to fill Kube's post were: Hilda Montano, James Harding, Howard Duncan, Jim Burrows, Carolyn Burrows, Lewis Foster, Kathy Dionne and Ricky Hendricks.

Persons interested in serving on the council should talk the main office part-time. She will receive an 11 month contract.

The board also voted to reimburse her for 21 days of service that she has given this year without pay.

Board president Doyle Johnson noted that although the board had gone through a reduction in force procedure in the past, it feels that these changes may be made as it looks toward the future projected income and needs of the school system.

The board accepted resignations from teachers Nelle Craig, Jo Lynda Lusk and Barbara Wyatt, and from bus drivers Sheryl Taylor and Julia Grady.

They discussed, but could take no action upon, several verbal resignations which have Monday for the Border Town from Citizens Bank) at 9:45 been discussed. The board cannot take action until it has received formal written notice from the people resigning.

After meeting in executive session, the board voted to offer contracts to: Monette Welsh, beginning teacher in early childhood and special education; Dierdre Guthals, beginning teacher in elementary school, Maribell Estrada, junior high school aide in Chapter I, and Loveda Boothby, charge of the bike contest. elementary school aide in Chapter I. Southern Union Gas Company has installed an odorizer to make the natural gas used in Farwell smell.

Natural gas is odorless, and the gas companies in the U.S. add a distinctive odor to alert people of the danger of leaking gas. El Paso Natural Gas, which supplies Southern Union Gas with its product here, has always added some odor to the gas, but not enough.

The Texas State Railroad Commission requires that the odor be a readily detectable one. So the local office has begun using an odorizer to make the gas smell terrible.

Since they installed the odorizer, Larry Cochran said the local office has gotten about 26 calls from customers who suspect leaks in their gas lines. Normally, they only get about one call to check for gas leaks in a month.

"The leaks we are finding have been there all the time.


Something stinks in Far- but now they are noticeable," said Cochran. "All gas leaks need to be checked out to make sure you do or don't have a leak."


> danger of fire or explosion even with a small leak, the gas company offers a free service to check these leaks. "You never know how severe a leak is until we check them," said Cochran.

> When Cochran comes into a home or business that suspects a gas leak, he sniffs first. The gas has been treated with a very easily identifiable odor. Then he gets out his trusty soapy water spray bottle and sprays the gas lines with sudsy water to see whether he can see any bubbles of gas escaping from the gas line. Of-ten such small "seap leaks" can be repaired with a twist of a wrench or the change of an inexpensive coupling.

> If more extensive work is required, Cochran can advise the customer about how to handle the situation.
