
He came back but was never the same. He was in a slump much of the season - for him at least; another player getting 21 home runs

Zinck elected **FEA** president

Craig Zinck, newly elected president of the Farwell Educator's Association, said that he wanted the group to be a liaison between the administration and the teachers.

Zinck stressed at Tuesday's School Board meeting that the group "had no ax to grind, and was not an adversarial organization."

He indicated that teacher representatives will attend board meetings and keep the lines of communications open between board and staff.

"I hope you don't feel intimidated by us," he said. He also thanked board members Ronald Byrd and Katherine White for attending the meeting on Sept. 30 when school Supt. John Grigsby apologized to the teachers for keeping them waiting four hours while the board met in an executive session on Sept. 29

The board also:

Texico seeks tougher mobile home rules

At Tuesday's meeting, City Attorney Duane Hamar was instructed to put together a proposed ordinance incorporating "teeth" into the penalty part of those who bring mobile homes into the city but don't get them up to standards.

The proposed ordinance likely will include these standards:

Installed according to state statutes and maintained according to applicable state and municipal standards.

- Skirting meeting state standards.

Be set on permanent foundation either piers or on a slab as per state standards. - Removal of wheels.

- Installation of stairway Farwell over Nazareth, Hag- and landing for access to doorways.

> - Landscaping such as lawn or ground cover.

- Vehicles shall not be parked on the lot past the front setback line, unless on the paved off-street parking area.

- Anchoring, as needed

The Texico City Council is to reduce wind and flood damage.

> The proposed ordinance will not affect mobile homes already in Texico. But Hamar was asked to check on current state standards to see what the city can do about bring up existing mobile homes to standard.

In another action, the council rejected the mobile home variance request of Manford Turnbough for 305 Lamar St.

Eleven notices were sent adjacent property owners to get their views. Three replied - two against and one for. Apparently based on the fact that more opposed than favored, the council denied the request.



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
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

Several Parmer County residents came back winners in the Youth and Women's departments of the South Plains Fair in Lubbock.





In early history of the firm, Buster Gast, son of Karl, operated a body shop in connection with the automotive clinic. This portion of the business was terminated when Buster entered Armed Services during World War II. Buster rejoined the firm, as a mechainc after returning from service in 1945.


Smokey Gast, also a son of Karl and a present partner in the firm, joined the business after his return from service in '46.


From its beginning until February of '48, the business was housed in Muckleroy Building on Main Street in Farwell. At that time, the location was changed to a garage building which was near the present home after an auto repair service belonging to Tom Atkins and Will Hardage was purchased.

Fred Curtis, also one of the present partners, began work as an employee with the firm in 1950. In '52, Fred purchased the interest of Karl Gast and then Smokey and Fred bought the interest of Buster. There has been no change in ownership during the past eight years.



Cotton's market share increases

Donald Johnson of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. reports that cotton holds a 53 percent share of the clothing market, up from 49 percent in 1986. Sixty percent of this year's total cotton consumption of 5 million bales will go to the apparel industry.

Petition heard

A petition from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc, Lubbock, and other farm organizations that the U.S. Department of Agriculture issue rules to forestall sharp inequities in the administration of the 1989 Disaster Assistance Act isn't falling on deaf ears.

According to Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, that's the report from Texas senators and representatives in Washington who at PCG's request confronted USDA on potential disaster payment problems. The issues were detailed by PCG in an Aug. 30 letter to Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeuter and area legislators.

"Department officials have made no commitments of any kind," Johnson cautions, "but it's encouraging to know that the problems we anticipate are getting a hearing before final decisions are made, which isn't expected before mid - September."

A major concern expressed in PCG's letter involves the administration of the law's Section 110 which requires disaster payments to be reduced by an amount that reflects the value of any crop produced as a replacement for the crop on which a disaster payment is made. If further specifies that the value of the second crop shall be "based on" the actual yeild of the second crop and the average market price of such crop over a representative period.

"Should this be construed to mean the simple product of yield times price, with no allowance for the cost of producing and harvesting the second crop," PCG points out, "a grave injustice will have been done. Thousands of producers will be denied much or all of their disaster payments by reason of having made an earnest, expensive and often futile effort to recoup at least a part of their losses."

Consumer preference for 100 percent cotton and cotton - rich blends was also evidenced by an increased use of cotton in knits such as sport shirts, sweatshirts, underwear, non - sheer hosiery and sweaters. Knit items used almost 2.3 million bales, 47 percent of the cotton that went into apparel. Comparable numbers for 1987 were 2.2 million bales and only 44 percent of the total.

Woven fabrics however continue to dominate cotton in apparel constructions, consuming over 2.5 million bales or 53 percent of total clothing use. Denim and twill cotton constructions proved the most popular end - uses.

Home furnishings, cotton's second strongest market sector, also consumed 2.5 million bales, about 32 percent of the total for 1988. That equals the 2.5 million consumed in home furnishings in 1987 and is a significant gain from the 2.3 million used in 1986.

A more detailed breakdown reveals that cotton's top five end - uses accounted for almost four million bales, about half the eight million consumed in all end - uses. Men's and boys' shirts, with 1.033 million bales used, topped the list.

They were joined in the top five by men's and boys' trousers and shorts, 976,000 bales; towels and washcloths, 895,000; drapery, upholstery and slipcover fabrics, 541,000, and women's slacks and jeans with 522,000 bales consumed.

The number one factor contributing to the increases in cotton consumption in 1988 and in the steady trend of gains in cotton's market share since the 1960's, Johnson believes, is producer support for the research and market development work of Cotton Incorporated.

Six gins in Parmer County were among the 680 gins to receive the Cotton Board's Distinguished Service Award

for achieving above 80 percent grower participation in the Cotton Research and Promotion Program.

Honored were Farwell Gin, Lawlis Gin, Oklahoma Lane Gin, North Lazbuddie Gin, and West Hub Gin.

The Cotton Research and Promotion Program is a commodity self-help program, administered by the Cotton Board, conducted by Cotton Incorporated and funded by U.S. Upland cotton producers through per - bale assessments. Through this collective marketing effort, U.S. Upland cotton producers have a team of scientists working for them to expand cotton's markets.

The school climate

(This article was submitted by the staff of Farwell Junior High School.)

In recent years, many studies have been conducted in the area of effective schools. The following ingredients have been consistently identified as characteristics in effective schools. They are instructional leadership and focus, high expectations, measurement and school climate.

We want to focus this article on school climate. School climate is an atmosphere which is orderly without being rigid. quiet without being oppressive and generally conducive to teaching and learning. Everyone is involved in school climate.

It starts when a child steps onto the school bus in the morning and ends what that child steps off. Bus drivers, teachers, custodians, administrators, secretaries, cafeteria workers and support personnel are all involved in creating and maintaining a positive school climate. It must be a team effort.

A school's climate or environment should encourage the capabilities and emphasize the worth of all individuals involved within its system. Six major areas contribute to positive school climate:

1. Caring - Interactions among students, staff and administrators must be one of caring for each other.

2. Respect - Everyone must be committed to the school's goals. The staff and students must show mutual respect for one another.

3. Trust - A climate of confidence and trust should exist between students, teachers, parents, administrators and trustees.

4. Morale - Staff and students must support one another and work harmoniously.

5. Social Development - A code of conduct should be developed by all concerned that specifies acceptable student behavior, procedures, and consequences. Staff members should serve as models of this conduct and reward appropriate student behaviors. Students, parents and staff need to accept the code and share the responsibility for discipline.

6. Academic Development - The school community believes that all students can learn and that the school can make a difference. The students and staff should expect success. Accomplishments of students and staff members should be recognized and awarded.

The goal of teaching and schooling is to effect learning and those processes and models which facilitate learning are worth of serious consideration. Creating a positive school climate within our Farwell schools is one means of helping our entire scholastic community make significant improvements in learning for all our students. Farwell Schools does many things well, but excellence comes by making what is working well work even better and by disseminating successful practices. We are striving for excellence!






