About once a year, I write this message. So I will keep it short and to the point because I don't want to bore our readers with the same info. But it is so important that I must do this periodically.

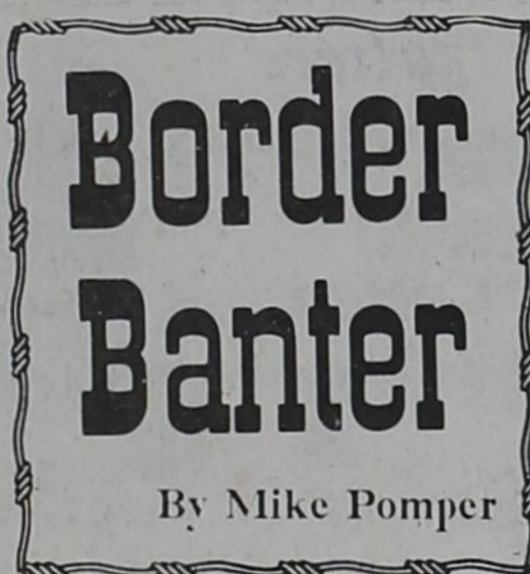
It is very, very important for you to shop locally. If you don't support our local businesses, you will have the opportunity to watch our community and area go downhill in a hurry.

## '37 squad was 212-0, then ran into Portales

Editor's note: This information is from the Farwell School annual "El Vaquero" of 1938, plus from Bob Anderson.

A season in which all opponents were held scoreless until the last fatal tilt with the New Mexico State Champions was the new grid record set in Farwell this year.

The 1937 grid season was probably the most successful in all the Steers' football history. Never before has Farwell produced such a good team that could win nine consecutive games from schools her own size and larger, and hold the New Mexico state champs to as close a score in the last game of the season.

Although the Steers showed more fight and stamina on that day than they had ever shown, they were overpowered, and lost mainly because of lack of reserves. The final score was 25-0 in favor of the Portales Rams.

This game was matched after the regular season was over by the two coaches. Portales had a week off before playing for the state cham-

Some of the season's success was due to excellent material in Farwell this year,

with most of the boys playing previously and the average weight of the team was good.

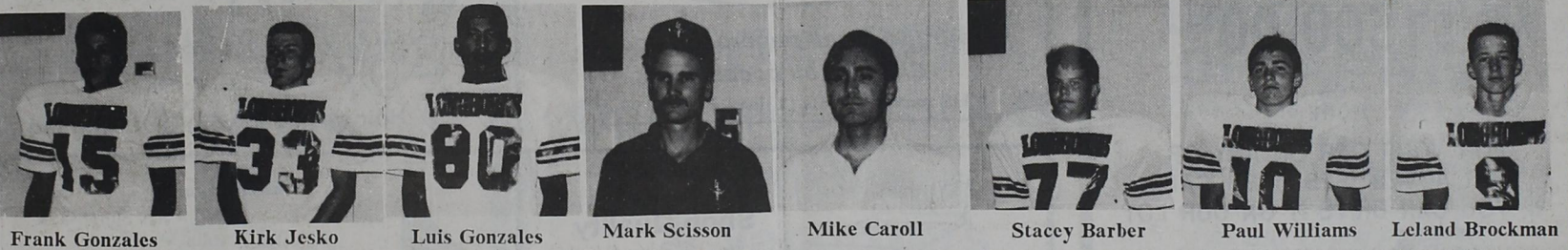
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# Texico Lady Spikers earn New Mexico state runner-up honors

"I was very pleased with the girls," said coach Michael Littlejohn of the Texico Lady Spikers' New Mexico State runner-up title in volleyball.

"We played one of the best matches of the year against Capitan on Friday night, but we just didn't have it in us to do it two nights in a row," said Littlejohn.

The championship game was pitted Texico against its old nemesis, Floyd, on Nov. 11. Floyd knew that it had to make short work of the Lady Spikers because Texico's long suit has been conditioning this year. They wore their opponents down in the long matches.

Floyd won 12-15, 7-17 and 10-15.

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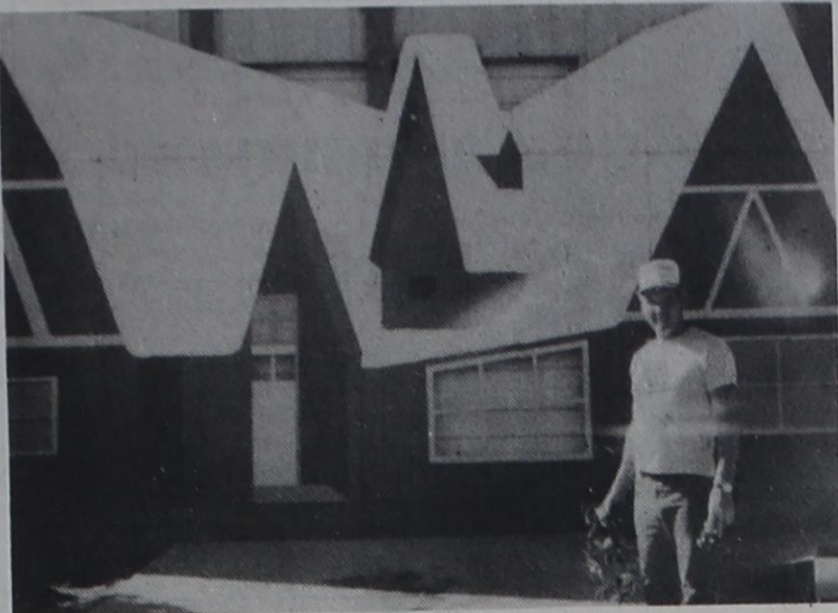

## Lambert pleads not guilty in shooting

Travis Gene Lambert pled "not guilty" at his hearing on Nov. 15 after apparently agreeing to a plea bargained guilty plea.

He is charged with shooting Bovina Chief of Police Gary Coleman last July.

The hearing was declared a mistrial by Judge Jack Young at the Parmer County Courthouse. A new trial has been set for Nov. 27.

"We will now be asking for 5-99 years in prison and a possible \$10,000 fine," said District Attorney Johnny Atkinson.

Lambert was apprehended atop a building.

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# Professional consultant to be hired

Junior High Principal Jerry Dee Owen reported that the insurance committee has a problem. The cost of policies has increased in price 105 percent since September, while the number of members in the group has declined.

Owen asked to allow junior high students to drop out of UIL Literary competitions that involve public speaking. "Preparing for these com-

petitions is time consuming, and it is getting more difficult to get students to participate."

He noted that last year the events were judged by Muleshoe High School students, and they use different criteria for judging than the students were taught.

"We have 19 different programs going on, and we need to weed out the ones that aren't working," said Owen.

He also commended the work done by Leslie Lunsford and Debbie Grigsby.

Craig commended substitute Sherry Curtis for her work.

Johnson commended Craig Zinck and the Farwell High School Band for winning first division recognition at the Regional Band Competition. Board members also noted that the new uniforms really make the band look good.

Superintendent John Grigsby said that Farwell has lost 25.66 students since last year. This will cause a loss of \$13,958 in state funding despite the fact the amount of state money per pupil has been increased this year.

During the public forum, Judy Pomper recommended that algebra textbooks be purchased for each student, and that supplementary algebra materials should be purchased for the library.

The board cast its ballots for Mark Schwertner to the Parmer County Appraisal District Board.

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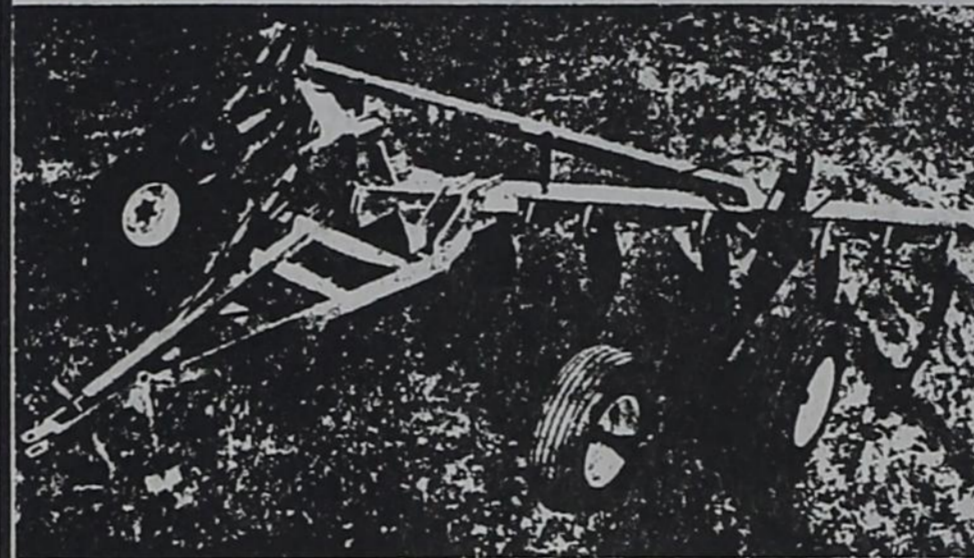

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

But the commissioners say they were told by state officials that the county would not be fined if they closed the dump promptly, which they did.

So County Judge Porter Roberts and Lazbuddie Commissioner Raymond McGehee called the state to give their views of the discussion in 1988, saying Parmer County doesn't owe any money. The state officials will discuss this and get back to Parmer County.

City of Texico  
Ordinance No. 246

An Ordinance related to zoning and the regulation of manufactured housing and mobile homes; providing for an aesthetic review permit to preserve the property values; and providing for violation of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the governing body of the town of Texico, New Mexico:

Section 1. Definitions.

A. "Manufactured Housing" or "Manufactured Home" is defined as set forth in Subsection A of Section 2 of Chapter 196, Laws of 1987, which is the Manufactured Housing and Zoning Act.

B. "Mobile Home" is defined as a movable or portable housing structure which does not meet the definition of manufactured housing or manufactured home.

Section 2. Regulation of Mobile Homes.

A. No mobile home shall be occupied, located, or used for residential purposes unless the mobile home is located within a mobile home park subdivision or mobile home park approved in accordance with applicable ordinances and regulations.

Section 3. Regulations of Mobile Home.

A. No mobile home shall be occupied, located or used for residential purposes in any zoning district in which single-family, site-built housing is not an allowable use or on any lot in which single-family, site-built housing is not allowed as of right.

B. In addition, no mobile home shall be occupied, located, or used for residential purposes unless an Aesthetic Review Permit has been obtained pursuant to the provisions of Section 4 of this ordinance.

Section 4. Aesthetic Review Permit.

A. The purpose of the Aesthetic Review Permit is to preserve the property's values of residential neighborhoods and protect the public's general welfare by assuring that certain minimum aesthetic standards are met before mobile homes are occupied, located, or used for residential purposes.

B. No mobile home shall be occupied, placed or used for residential purposes in a zone in which single-family, site-built housing is a permitted use, unless the owner or proposed occupant of the mobile home as received an Aesthetic Review Permit.

C. Each application for an Aesthetic Review Permit shall include:

(1) a site plan showing the manner in which the mobile home will be placed on the lot.

(2) a drawing showing the appearance of the mobile home from all streets and neighboring properties.

(3) a landscaping plan.

D. No application of an Aesthetic Review Permit shall be granted unless:

(1) the mobile home is placed on the lot within the applicable setbacks;

(2) the mobile home is oriented so that the front of the mobile home is approximately parallel to the front of the lot, unless such mobile home is located in a mobile home park or other area where such placement would detract from the general appearance of the neighborhood. Regarding corner lots, the owner or occupant of the mobile home may choose which street front the home will be parallel to, unless the lot dimensions parallel to the two streets are more than 20 feet different. In such as case, the front of the mobile home shall be oriented so that it is approximately parallel to the longer of the two lot dimensions;

(3) the mobile home will be skirted, if necessary, with material similar in color and texture to the exterior of the mobile home so that the home will, to the extent possible, look like a home site-built on a foundation. In no case shall there be a gap visible between the bottom of the mobile home and the ground; and

(4) the applicant agrees to approximately landscape the lot within six months of the issuance of the Aesthetic Review Permit, pursuant to an approval landscaping plan. The landscaping plan shall provide appropriate shrubs or other foliage to camouflage the joint between the bottom of the mobile home and its skirting.

E. If appropriate landscaping is not planted and maintained as required by the landscaping plan, then the Aesthetic Review Permit may be revoked upon not less than ten days notice to the occupant of the mobile housing. Upon revocation, the mobile home shall be removed.

F. The application for Aesthetic Review Permit shall be submitted to the City Council.

G. The City Council shall use the limitations provided hereinabove as guidelines for its decisions to issue or not to issue a permit, however, the Council may consider all matters and waive any limitation it deems to be in the best interest of the City of Texico.

Section 5. Penalty.

A. Any violation of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not less than \$250 nor more than \$500 or by imprisonment for not less than 90 days, or both. Each day that a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 6. Severability.

A. In the event that any portion of this ordinance shall be declared illegal or void for any reason by a court of competent jurisdiction, then the remainder of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

The council will check on the backgrounds of the applicants before making a decision.

In other business, the council:  
- Received one bid for fire department radio equipment, from Motorola, of Lubbock, for \$15,661. It was accepted. The equipment will allow the fire department to use a high band frequency; the lower bands are now used by many agencies which causes confusion.

- Cast its 67 allotted votes for Mark Schwertner's reelection to the Parmer County Appraisal District Board.

- Heard a presentation from Dave McReynolds of the newly-formed Panhandle Area Alliance. A decision to pay \$273 in dues was taken under advisement. Mayor Chris

Gikas supported joining the group of governmental agencies and the private sector in promoting the Panhandle.

- Agreed to allow Joann Hobbs-Walker to place a large shed in her backyard. It will be plumbed for use while the main house is being remodeled. Mrs. Hobbs-Walker said no one will live in the shed. The area is zoned single-family. The shed will be used for her husband's tools and for her painting.

- Approved the annual dues to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

- Discussed with water Supt. D.E. Hammit buying a garbage truck and containers. The mayor and council appeared favorable to buying Polykarts, such as used in Texico, which would be placed in alleys in Farwell.

The city is still waiting word from Clovis on whether it can haul trash to the Clovis dump. There's a good chance the Farwell landfill will officially

be closed by Feb. 1. Gikas and Hammit will see the Clovis city manager about this shortly.

- Scheduled an open house for the new water department building (by the water tower) from 2 to 4 p.m. Nov. 26. The public is invited.

- Issued a proclamation honoring the Farwell Steers for going 10-0.



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
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
