Families Anonymous
Chemical substance abuse is a pervasive problem in today's society. It disrupts the life of the abuser and devastates and destroys family relationships.

The daily stresses of living coupled with family pressures or problems may lead to chemical substance abuse as a means of "coping." To change or relieve this distressing effect on a family, the behavior patterns of all the family members is necessary.

Families Anonymous (FA) is a self-help group of families of chemical substance abusers and those with behavioral problems. It was founded in 1971 in Los Angeles and is based on a 12-step recovering program of Alcoholics Anonymous.

When a young person is in trouble, the whole family is also in trouble - and needs help. FA's purpose is to help the family, not just the abuser or person with a behavioral problem. Members include parents of chronic truants, run-aways, chemical substance abusers and social drop-outs of all ages.

At meetings, members come to realize they are not "alone." They learn how others in similar situations deal with their plights.

Members use first names only. Meetings begin with basic FA readings, followed by discussion of a topic chosen by the leader for the evening. It is a program of spiritual nature, but is not religious. Anyone who feels they might benefit is welcome; no prior arrangements are necessary. FA has no dues or fees.

Starting Jan. 25, the New Hope FA of Farwell will meet Thursdays at 8 p.m. at the Farwell home economics cottage at the corner of 8th Street and Avenue G.

LaRue to seek mayoral post

The lineup for this year's Texico city elections has taken a turn.

Doyal LaRue, who has been a city councilman for four years, had signed up last week for re-election.

Tuesday, he withdrew his name from the city council race for which he was unopposed. Instead, he plans to file Jan. 23 as a write-in candidate for mayor, LaRue said.

Tuesday was the deadline for removing your name from the ballot.

There are three city council posts on the ballot. The only

persons who have filed are the two incumbents: Oran Jay Autrey and Butch Tharp. Each is unopposed for his particular post.

The two-year council post that LaRue withdrew his name from has no candidates. However, persons can file for it as write-in candidates Jan. 23. These persons will not have their names listed on the ballot but can win election if someone writes their name in.

Thus, if only one person files for the two-year council post Jan. 23 and gets just

one vote, he is elected to the council. If there are no write-in candidates, then the council will appoint someone after the March election.

Similarly, if LaRue is the only write-in candidate for mayor, he needs just one vote to be elected.

There has been a flurry of activity the past couple of weeks where Texico residents have been trying to get folks to sign up for the mayoral post being vacated by Steve Chancy. But when filing day came up last week, no one had filed for mayor.

Police post applications received

The Farwell City Council has received four more applications for the post of city marshal that will be created.

The council plans to hold a special meeting in February to discuss the applications. The new applications are from men in Hereford, Clovis, Earth and Ruidoso, N.M.

Previously, the council had received three applications, from Walt Causey and John Armstrong, both of Farwell, and a Muleshoe resident.

Also at Tuesday's meeting, the council approved pay raises for city employees.

Salaried employees got 5 percent raises. Hourly employees got 25 cent an hour hikes, with the starting pay set at \$3.50 an hour.

City clerk Cynthia Thigpen received a higher raise because when she was hired two years ago it was indicated that after awhile she would get the same salary as her predecessor, Janie Bowers, was at. This was done Tuesday.

The council also:
- Accepted the lone bid it received for the city's insurance, from Town & Country, for \$12,993, up \$783 over last year.

- Approved the standard annual agreement with the city's engineers, Parkhill, Smith and Cooper of Lubbock. They are paid only when utilized.

- Was told that the Texas Water Commission wants a \$25 fee from businesses using 1,000 gallon-plus above-ground petroleum tanks. There are many exceptions to the new rule and the city will check into it before contacting local firms.

- Heard Water Dept. Supt. Dee Hammitt report about a pavement problem near the Grain Exchange on Third Street due to heavy truck usage. Hammitt was authorized to contact Eastwood Construction about repairs.

Parmer County eligible for drought aid

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought are being accepted at the Parmer County Farmers Home Administration office in Farwell.

Parmer County is one of 12 in Texas recently named by the federal government as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from drought.

Acting County Supervisor Lance Smith said farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer

must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," said Smith. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from these programs in determining their loss.

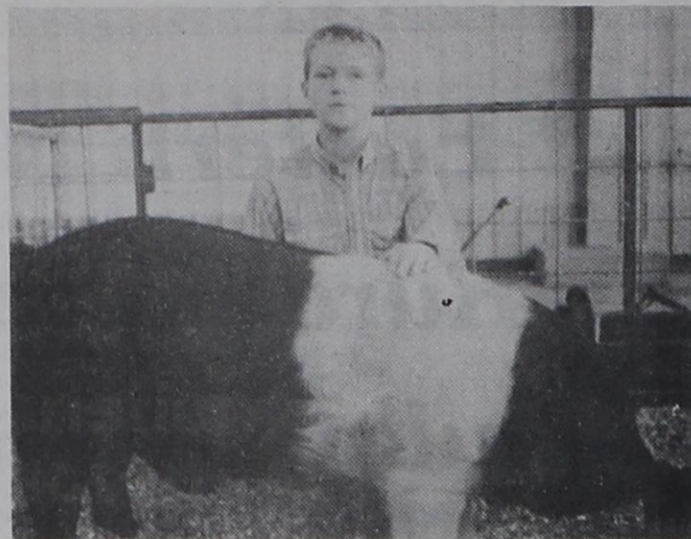

Jezebel Sauce

- 1 (10 oz.) jar apple jelly
- 1 (10 oz.) jar apricot preserves
- 1 (6 oz.) jar horseradish
- 1/2 (1 1/2 oz. can dry mustard)
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese, softened

Combine apple jelly, apricot preserves, horseradish, mustard, and pepper in a saucepan. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Cool. Place cream cheese in shallow serving dish. Pour sauce over top. Serve with snack crackers. Shredded wheat crackers are particularly good.

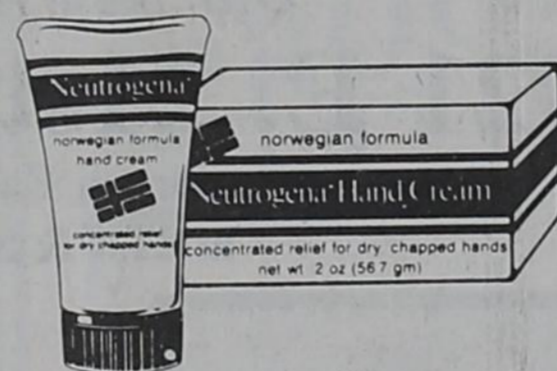

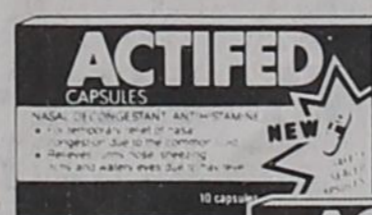
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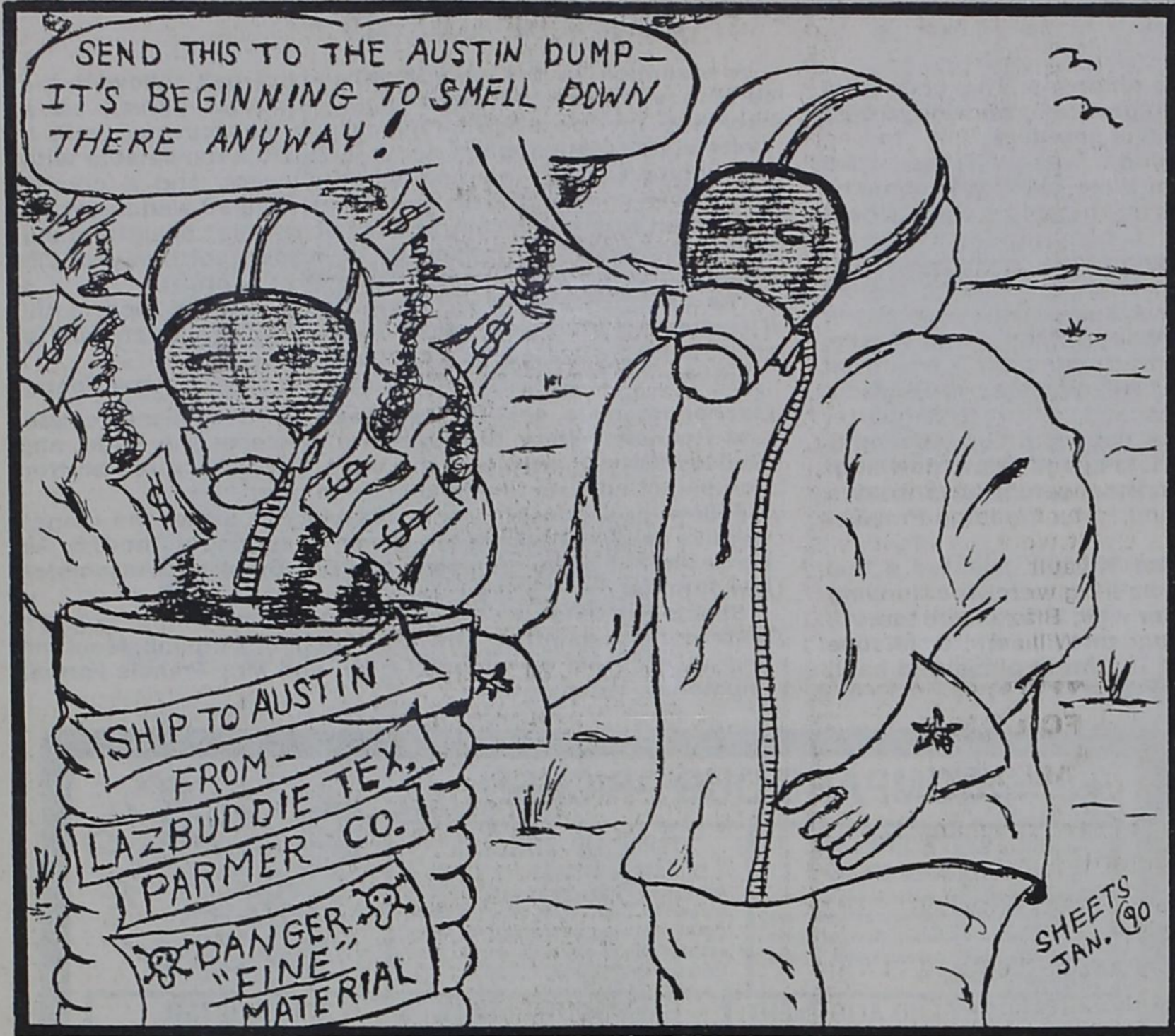

USDA requires signups for soybean program

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced the signup in the new 0-25 program for soybeans will be Jan. 16 through Feb. 16 for 1990 crops.

Since sunflowers and safflowers may also be planted on conservation use acres as approved non program crops, signup for those crops is not required.

Producers may sign up to plant soybeans on no more than 25 percent of their permitted acreages for 1990 wheat,

feed grains, upland cotton, extra long staple cotton and rice. Producers participating in this option will to lose or gain farm acreage base or individual crop acreage bases on their farms as a result of the 0-25 plantings.

Following the signup period, USDA will estimate whether, based on the anticipated additional 0-25 soybean plantings, the average market price for the 1990 crop of soybeans will be less than \$4.98 per bushel (110 percent of the 1989 loan rate for soybeans of \$4.53 per bushel). If the soybean price is expected to be below this level, CCC will reduce or eliminate all or a portion of the permitted acreage that may be planted to soybeans under this program.

Program benefits other than soybean price support loans and purchases will not be available to producers who participate in the 0-25 program.

Producers may obtain further information from county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices.



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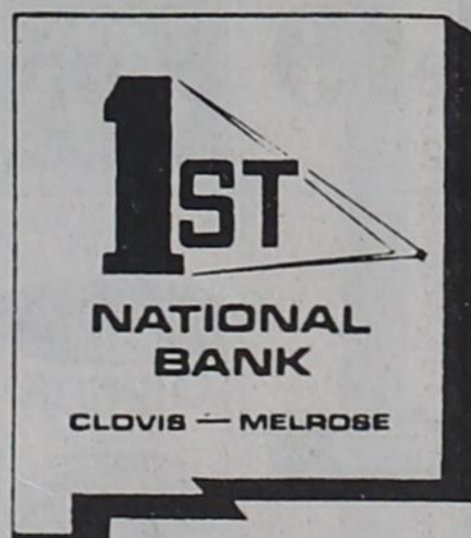


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Steers stop Lockney to improve record to 17-2

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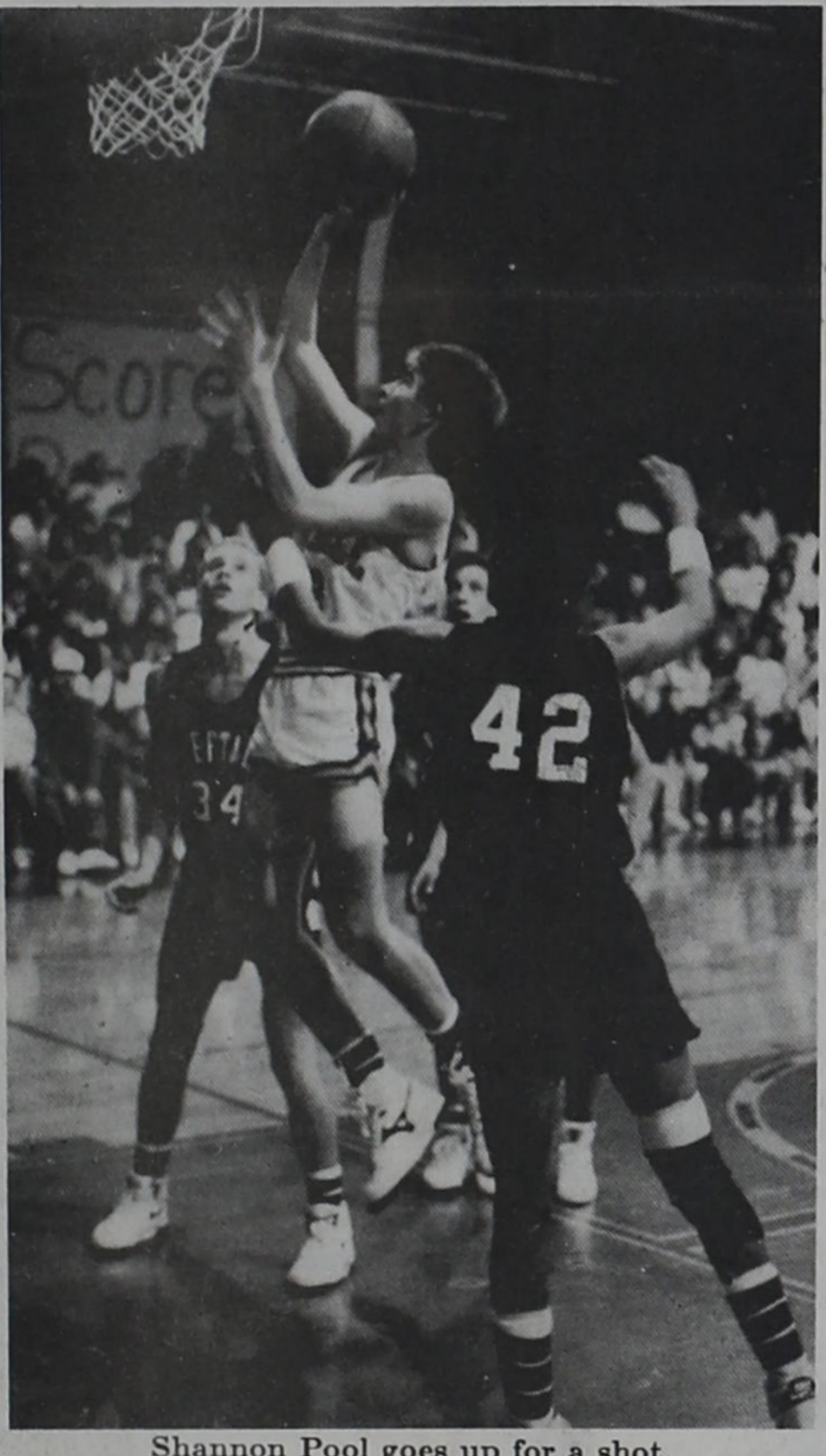


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
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Letter To The Editor

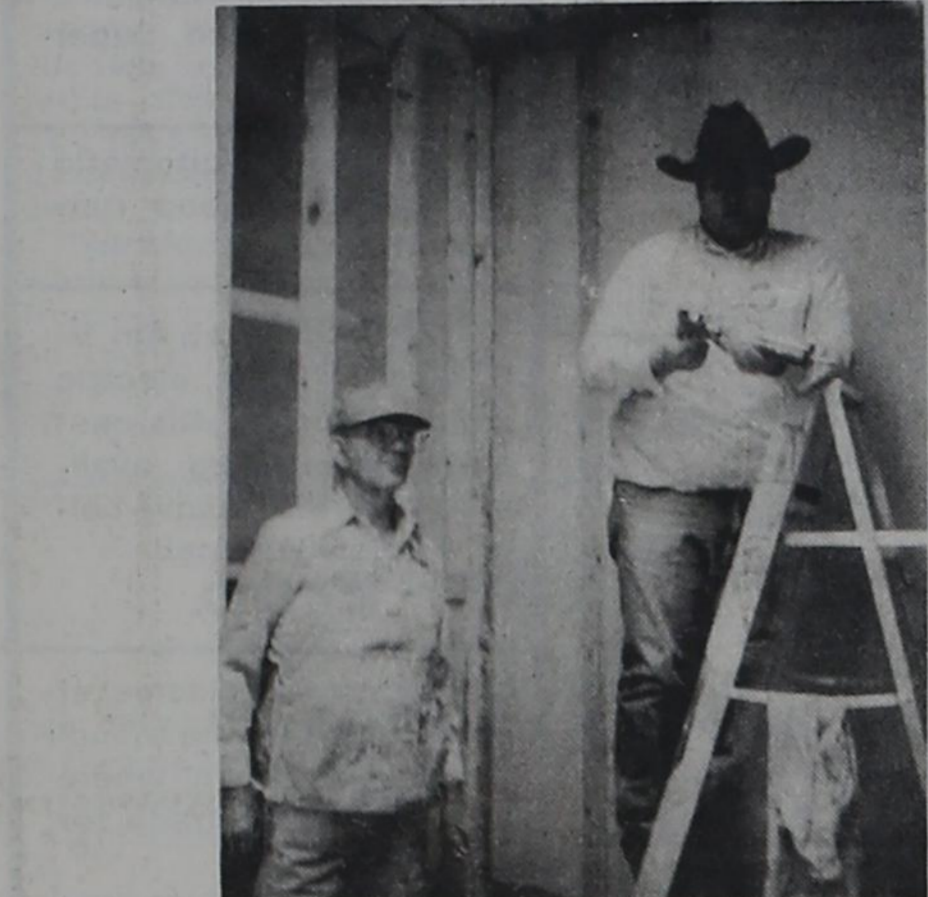
