The Spur Restaurant in Texico has been sold.

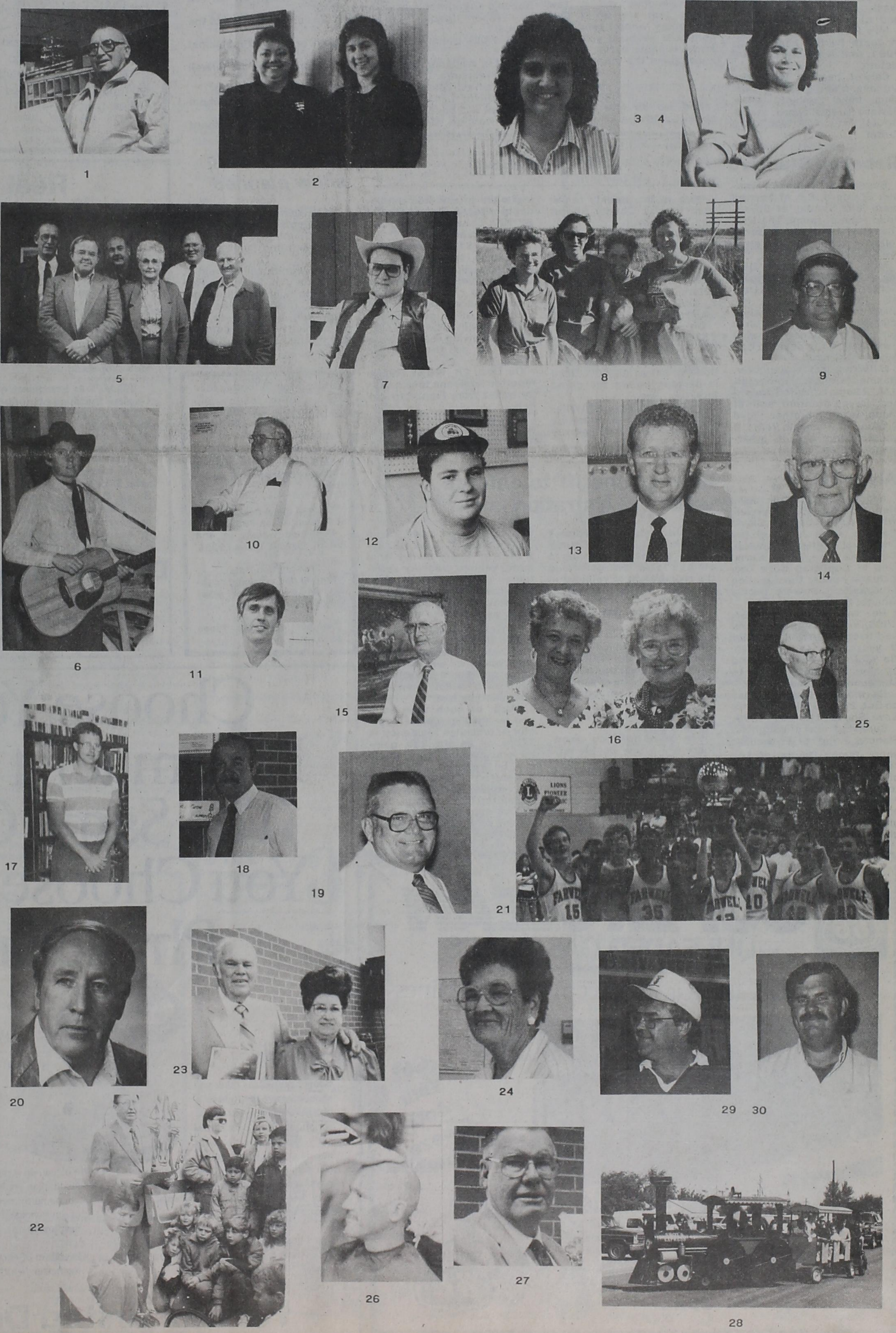
The new owners are Gordon and Marianne Travis. They hail from Calgary, Alberta, Canada. They have relatives in Lubbock.



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# Clayton seeks judge's post

It's official: there are five candidates in the Democrat primary for Parmer County judge.

Bonnie Clayton, Justice of the Peace in the Bovina area for the past three years, announced her candidacy this week, joining Jimmie Mace, B.K. Buske, Eva Ancira and Leland Gustin in the race.

The filing period ended Tuesday.

Mrs. Clayton is a lifelong Parmer County resident. She graduated Farwell High School and attended business college in Lubbock.

She and her husband, Dickey, have two children - Holli, 22, and Chad, 20.

She has worked in the accounting departments of Sherley Grain, Parmer County Implement and Herring Implement.

During her JP tenure, Mrs. Clayton had had four 20-hour schools and one 40-hour school on judicial procedures and other legal matters.

"If elected, I promise to listen, be informative, fairminded and responsible to all the citizens of Parmer County," said Mrs. Clayton.

Current County Judge Porter Roberts is retiring and not

seeking re-election. There are two other races in the primary.

One concerns the Farwell area Justice of the Peace post. Louise Hancock and Irene Woods are seeking that position.

Albert "Blackie" Smith has retired from the post. Mrs. Hancock was picked by the County Commissioners to finish the last year on his term.

The other race is for Bovina area Justice of the Peace, be-

ing vacated by Bonnie Clayton. Seeking it are Mearle Morgan and Vivaleal Hutto.

Unopposed in the Democrat primary are:

Jack Young, incumbent District Judge; Marjorie Watkins, incumbent district clerk; Bonnie Warren, incumbent county clerk; Raymond McGehee, incumbent Lazbuddie County Commissioner; Tom Ware, incumbent Bovina area County Commissioner; Anne Norton, incumbent county treasurer; Wendol Christian, county chairman, and all the precinct chairmen.

No one filed in the Parmer County Republican primary, reports county chairman Phil Johnson.

# Chancy decides not to seek election as Texico mayor

Jan. 9 is the day for Texico residents to file for this year's city election.

You must file between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at City Hall. You must show a certified copy of your voter registration.

On the ballot will be the mayoral post and three city council posts.

The men holding the three council posts - Doyal LaRue, Oran Jay Autrey and Butch Tharp - are expected to either file for re-election or for the mayoral post.

Current Mayor Steve Chancy will not seek election.

The Clovis City Council recently passed a law not allowing its employees to

hold elective office, but put in a "grandfather" clause to allow those outside the city (such as Chancy, a Clovis firefighter) to keep the office they are in. To run again, the employee must take an unpaid leave of absence 9 days before the election.

However, Chancy, due to his personal situation, won't run again. Thus, it's possible that LaRue or Tharp will seek the mayoral post.

Here's what Chancy said: "As my time on the Texico City Council comes to an end, I would like to thank the people of Texico for the opportunity to have served. It has been a learning experience as well as any enjoyable one. "I was brought up to believe that responsible peo-

ple give back to their communities. How you choose to do this through your church, school, local government, fire department, charities or any of a 100 different ways matters not. What is important is that you do it. Without commitment from people, none of these important institutions can exist.

"As we come to another city election, I would ask you to make a commitment to the city. That is the only requirement that counts in running for city office: Your willingness to step forward and say that you are ready to help.

"Your community cannot grow and prosper without

the strength and creativity it receives from people that are concerned about their families' future enough to step forward and say 'Let me help.'

"Texico is our community and it's up to us to see her remain strong into the 90's and beyond."

# Logos posted for viewing

The Texico City Council voted Dec. 21 to look into the possibility of seeking a second Highway Cooperative grant to repair streets.

Last year Texico received federal and state funds to repair pavement on municipal streets through a 60-40 grant program.

At the time they sought that grant, the council had to gather a great deal of data and prioritize the work that needed to be done. The first stage of the road repairs began this year.

Because this groundwork has been done, the city council members felt that an application could be completed by the Jan. 19 deadline.

City Clerk Marie Christian will prepare a report based upon the information used in last year's application. She will note the items that need to be updated. Then the city council will decide whether to submit the application or not when they review it at their meeting on Jan. 9.

In other business, Texico is seeking an independent contractor to operate the mu-

nicipal swimming pool. Interested parties should check the requirements at city hall now.

Mayor Steve Chancy noted that "now is the time for certification." He noted that courses such as advanced life saving are not offered in the summertime, and a city pool operator must be certified before the pool opens.

The swimming pool operator receives a percentage of the receipts at the swimming pool.

The council reviewed the many logos which were submitted for the city logo contest. They decided to wait until the next meeting to pick the winner. The proposed logos will be posted in the City Hall where everyone can see them.

"We really appreciate the interest," said Chancy.

The council also voted to accept a bid from Joe Hughes True Value for the purchase of a big wheel lawn mower. City Water department head Billy Hammitt had sought bids from several local businesses, and the council chose the lowest bid.

The council tabled the personnel policy update.

# Record-breaking amount of Christmas toys collected

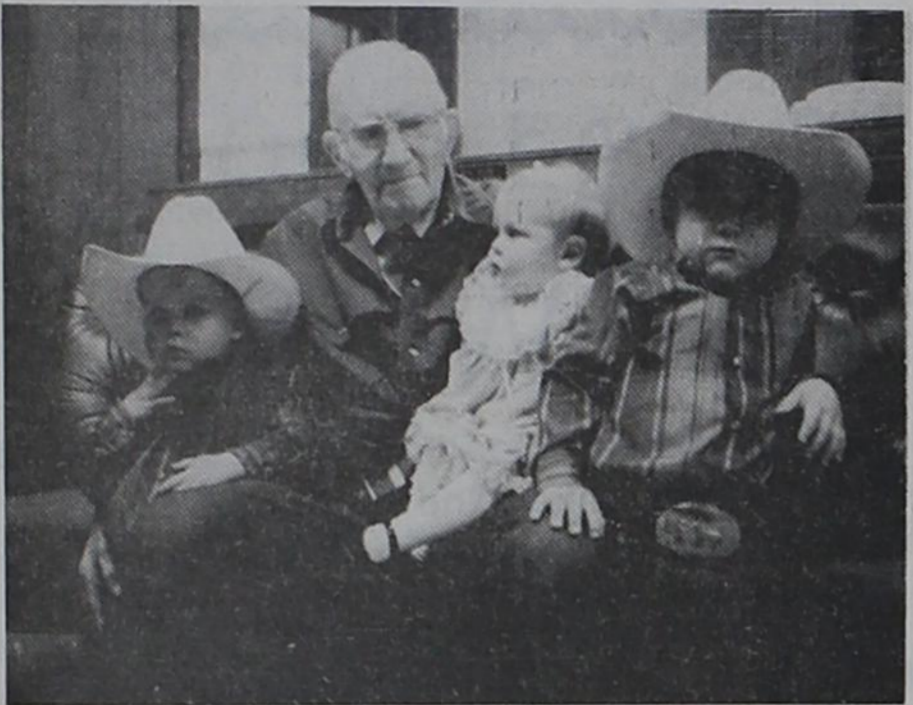

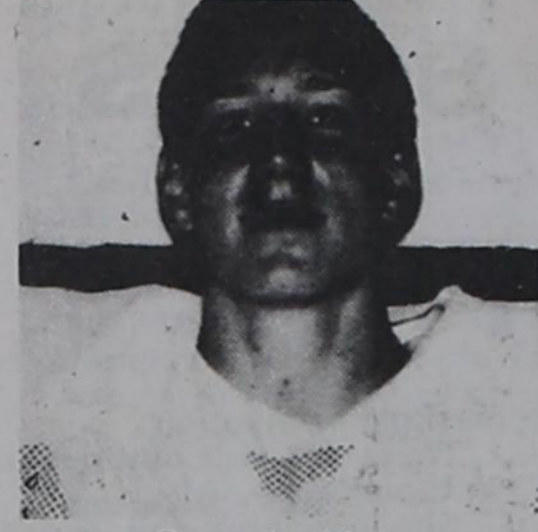

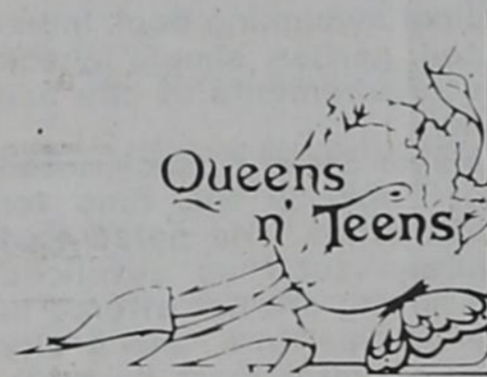

**Combest to host meeting regarding 1990 Farm Bill**

U. S. Representative Larry Combest (R- Texas) will host a House Agriculture Subcommittee in Lubbock for a congressional field hearing Jan. 11.

Combest, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, announced that the Subcommittee on Cotton, Rice, and Sugar will conduct a series of field hearings in Missouri, Texas, Louisiana, and Florida regarding the 1990 Farm Bill.

"It is important that producers in the 19th District have direct input into the upcoming farm bill," said Combest. "The current farm bill appears to be working fairly well, especially the cotton provisions, but it is critical that our farmers have a voice in agricultural policy. The Congress will review each commodity program to determine what has and has not worked in the 1985 Farm Bill. Already several producers and commodity groups are telling us to leave many of the major provisions alone. That would have been unheard of in years past," Combest said.

The subcommittee's hearings next month in Lubbock will focus on export programs, domestic policy, and a review of the current 1985 Farm Bill as it relates to cotton and sugar produced on South Plains. "Many opportunities may exist for producers who foresee an opening in the export markets into Eastern Bloc countries," said Combest. "The Soviet Union could become a major agricultural customer of the United States in the years ahead."

Lubbock is one of the four sites in the nation where subcommittee members will convene their field hearings. Lubbock's congressional hearing on Jan. 11, will begin at 9 a.m. on the Texas Tech University Campus.

## Water quality to be topic

Public concern over water quality and water availability, now and in the years ahead will be addressed at the annual High Plains Irrigation Conference in Amarillo on Jan. 9.

Presented by the Agricultural Extension Service and its Panhandle Economic Program, the conference will be at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West. Registration opens at 8:30 a.m.

Use of water, rights to water and the permits and laws which regulate these are under scrutiny and being challenged in some areas, said Leon New, Extension Service irrigation engineer and conference coordinator.

Such legal issues and their implications for the Texas High Plains will be explained by Frank Booth, Austin attorney.

Recent legislative activities addressing urban and agricultural water issues will be reviewed by Richard Bowers, manager of the North Plains Underground Water District, Panhandle.

Protection of groundwater quality is another public concern. Wayne Wyatt, manager of the High Plains Underground Water District, Lubbock, will report on the present condition of water quality, especially in the Ogallala Aquifer.

The impact of water availability and the quality on land value will be examined by Jim Hayes, real estate agent and appraiser, Clarendon.

After lunch, the conference will focus on irrigation management decisions and provide an update on pesticide application regulations.

Furrow irrigation with limited water supply will be explained by Hereford producer Charles Schlabs. Harold Grall, farm manager for Coleman Agri Enterprises in Dumas, will discuss the economics of center pivot and other types of irrigation.

Managing Old World Bluestem as an irrigated grass in cattle operations will be discussed by Larry Jeffus, Guymon, Okla., producer. Byron Gossett, Dumas cattleman, will examine key points in the decision to use irrigated grasses.

The pesticide update will be presented by Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension Service entomologist, Amarillo.
