

Farwell ranked No. 1 in state

For perhaps the first time in history, the Farwell Steers basketball team is ranked No. 1 in its class in the state of

The Steers, 16-1, are listed first in this week's Lubbock newspaper, in the opening Texas Association of Basketball Coaches - Lubbock Avalanche Journal weekly high school basketball poll.

Abernathy, 14-4, which is in Farwell's district, is ranked 5th among the state's Class 2A schools. There were no other area teams listed.

Edgewood, last year's state champs that defeated Farwell in overtime in the state semifinal, is listed 4th with a 14-3 record. Haskell, which lost to Farwell in the regional title match, is listed 8th with a 17-1 mark.

Interestingly, even though Farwell is ranked No. 1 in the state, some feel that the Steers are going to have to fight like the dickens just to earn a playoff berth due to a tough district this year. Abernathy and Hale Center are expected to field outstanding teams, too.

Farwell Schools okay cutbacks

The Farwell School Board Tuesday voted to enact a reduction in force and budget cuts during 1990.

The cuts are needed due to a reduction in state funding. tax collection rate, and decline in school enrollment.

The administrative officer position held by Gwen Corn was cut to halftime as of Feb. 1, and it will be eliminated as of June 30.

The school counselor's position held by Carol Sullivan will also be cut to halftime beginning Feb. 1.

Mrs. Corn and Mrs. Sullivan will be offered a chance to take any fulltime position which becomes available for which they are certified before it is offered to anyone

The school system also voted to reduce the budget by \$58,179 through immediate ine item budget cuts.

They also voted the administrators participating in the Texas School Improvement Initiative would not be reimbursed by the school system for travel. They would have to pay out of their own pockets to participate in the program which evaluates schools.

The board also: - Approved the district audit as presented by De'Aun Willoughby.

- Approved a request from a Farwell resident to use school room for Family Anonymous meetings. Family Anonymous is a support group based upon the philosophy of Alcoholics Anonymous for families of chemical abusers (alcohol, cigarettes, or drugs) and people with emotional

problems. - Heard Supt. John Grigsby report that the buildings in which new windows had been installed this year had utility bills totaling \$600 less than last year at the same time.

- Taste tested a new fruit slush drink which will be offered in the school cafeteria.

The Farwell Steers won their first district game by beating Hart 71-57 at Hart on

Tuesday night. "We didn't play very well just well enough to win," said

coach Larry Gregory.

Scoring were: Shawn Stewart, 28; Monty Delgado, 15; Greg Actkinson, 10; Adrian Smith, 6; Darren Haseloff, 4; Shannon Pool, 3; Chad Byrd, 2; Sammy Herrera, 1.

Delgado led the rebounding with 14; Stewart had 13.

"The big game will be here on Friday night," said Gregory. "Abernathy is ranked fifth in the state with a 17-4 record. They've beaten some very good people, real quality teams. They are much better than their record shows."

The victory against Hart brought the Steers to a 16-1 overall record and a 1-0 district record.

The Farwell Steers stopped Dimmitt, a 3A school, in its tracks last Friday, 61-50.

The game opened with Dimmitt, 17-5 and ranked highly in the area, maintaining an edge of 5 or 6

points. The Bobcats exhibited great quickness and movement, and based their offense around their guard play.

A crucial time came with 5 minutes left in the second quarter. Farwell was down by 6 points when Greg Actkinson picked up his third foul and had to go to the bench.

Even without their star center, the Steers narrowed the margin and went into the halftime behind by 2 points.

The game was close throughout the third quarter until the Steers broke it open in the final stanza when Dimmitt's hot shooting guards cooled

Scoring included: Monty Delgado, 19; Shawn Stewart, 15; Greg Actkinson, 11; Chad Byrd, 10; Michael Lovett, 5; Darren Haseloff, 1.

"We played good defense. It was good to win against a quality team like Dimmitt," said coach Larry Gregory. "The next 10 games are the ones that really count. Everybody will be tough at their own place. We've got to play good every game from here on out. We'll be lucky to get in the playoffs. We are in a very tough district. Between us, Abernathy, Hale Center, and Olton, the competition is really tough."

Farwell has a good team this year, but it is different

than last year. "Last year's team was a flashy team. They made those flashy three point shots. We are stronger in the paint this year than we were last year," said Gregory.

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Fire departments to receive more funding

The Parmer County Commissioners voted Monday to increase its assistance to the four county volunteer fire departments and to base the aid on a population percentage basis (using scholastic figures).

Thus, this year the aid will be: Friona, \$13,000; Bovina, \$6,000; Farwell, \$6,000, and Lazbuddie, \$5,000.

The \$30,000 total is up from last year's \$16,000, when all four departments received \$4,000 apiece.

The commissioners also appointed an administrator and engineer for the Lazbuddie waste water project.

Several wells in Lazbuddie have been contaminated from sewage runoff, said County Judge Porter Roberts. So Lazbuddie was able to get a \$400,000 grant for a sewer along the highway and running past the school and churches.

The plans have been prepared and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, the project administrator, will start seeking easements.

The commissioners also: - Approved a new tax on vehicles.

- Approved the plans for the proposed courthouse elevator. Bids will be opened Feb.

port that their junior class achieved 100 percent of the exit level TEAMS test.

The test, Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills, is a state mandatory exam given to determine whether or not Texas

students are mastering basic minimum skills in math and English language arts.

The exit level TEAMS is given to juniors in October of each year. By law, a student must pass both the mathematics and English components of the test before he is awarded a high school diploma. If a junior fails the

Lazbuddie administrators re- test in October, he or she is given three chances to pass the exam before graduation the following year. However, all of the Lazbuddie juniors passed the October exam the first time.

Lazbuddie is one of very few schools in the state whose students achieved 100% dents." mastery on both sections of the TEAMS. In fact, the preliminary results showed that only 77 % of the juniors statewide passed the test.

Lazbuddie administrators, Anne Farris, who is the elementary principal, high school counselor, and standardized test coordinator, and high school principal, Roy Will-

ingham, praised student and faculty efforts. "High academic achievement and quality instructional programs are some of our goals at Lazbuddie I.S.D., and 100% mastery on the TEAMS is evidence of strong commitment on the part of the faculty and stu-

The school offers higher level mathematics, science, history, and English courses to high school students who wish to achieve honors credit. However, the emphasis on high academic achievement has a positive influence on all students on all levels. Writing

skills are taught very early in elementary school.

Lazbuddie's elementary and secondary teachers attend writing workshops each year, and TEAMS scores from elementary through high school have risen dramatically over the past four years. Lazbuddie's administrators credit the higher academic achievements to a dedicated faculty, goal oriented students, and supportive parents, along with administrative efforts to cooperate with and surpass state goals for improving the quality of education in Texas schools.

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

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Congressional debates on the 1990 Farm Bill and the Controversial General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) negotiations will be hot topics when the Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association holds its Silver Anniversary meeting and banquet Jan. 19-20 in Hereford.

The meeting will be at 9:30 a.m. Jan. 19 at the Hereford Community Center. The banquet will be at 7 p.m. Jan. 20 at the Bull Barn Expo center. Scheduled speakers include the incoming and outgoing presidents of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association which represents growers in 13 states.

Bill Cleavinger, a Wildorado farmer - rancher who is president of both the Texas and national associations, will discuss state and national issues facing beet and corn growers in the Panhandle and cane farmers in South Texas.

"The congressional debate on the new farm bill is beginning to heat up and the sugar program will receive much attention," says Cleavinger. "The program has enabled many producers to remain in business and given them an opportunity to earn a reasonable profit. At the same time, it has guaranteed consumers a stable sugar supply at a stable price below that of most other sugar producing countries. We're working to maintain a strong sugar program in the farm

Pat Mahar, a grower in Cavalier, N.D. and currently ASGA first vice president, will speak on the national association's campaign to educate the public on how the sugar program benefits consumers as well as producers. Mahar is chairman of the ASGA public relations committee.

Discussing GATT negotiations will be Kraig Gallimore of the Texas Department of Agriculture Farmer's Assistance

program. "GATT is an extremely complex issue which will have a major impact on beets, cane, corn, and other U.S. farm commodities," says Cleavinger. "Mr. Gallimore's presentation should help answer many questions farmers and others have on the controversial international trade talks."

Various beet research efforts by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station will be reviewed at the meeting. Dr. Charlie Rush and Dr. Steve Winter, two key TAES beat research program which is partially funded by the state beet

association.

'Debates' will be topic

Steve Reynolds, sales manager for the Holly Sugar Seed Division, will discuss Holly's seed breeding research program, including new breeding materials Holly has obtained from European sugar beet entities.



Cheer up! January is time to re-energize for the new year. As one of our residents told me, "I have a whole new year to see what kind of trouble I can get into."



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
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
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Wolverines win first two district matches





"Also, at such time as a non-resident owner or operator establishes residency in Texas or enters into gainful employment, his vehicle may be operated 30 days thereafter, after which time the vehicle must be currently registered in Texas.

"The Parmer County Sheriff's Department will, after 30 days from the date of this publication, start issuing citations for violation of this law

Measurements taken at well sites

Now that groundwater levels have been allowed to stabilize following the 1989 pumping season, High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 Technical Division staff will begin making annual depth - to - water measurements at area well sites starting Jan. 2.

The Water District maintains a network of fore than 1,000 privately - owned water wells throughout its 15- county service area. Each year, field personnel visit each well site to make a depth - to - water measurement.

During the measurement, a steel tape coated with a few feet of blue carpenters' chalk is lowered into the well. On the part of the tape that enters the water, the chalk turns a darker shade of blue. By subtracting the length of the darker blue area from the total length of the tape lowered into the well, the current depth - to - water is determined.

A vinyl sticker showing the assigned well number, the depth - to - water measurement and the date of measurement is attached to equipment at the well site for the well owner and or landowner's information.

The same observation wells are measured each year, and the data collected during the January and February 1990 measurements will be compared to the previous year's data to determine any changes in the water levels in the Ogallala Formation.

Maps showing the location of each observation well in a county or portion of a county served by the Water District are published annually in the April issue of the District's newsletter, The Cross Section.

Tables listing the observation wells in each county and the depth to water measurement at one, five, and 10 year intervals are included in this special issue. The annual average water level changes in feet for one, five and 10 year intervals are also published.

Technical Division staff will be traveling to each wll site in blue and white Water District vehicles. Staff members will be happy to answer any questions from landowners and or producers while the depth - to - water measurement is being


Deficiency payment projected

Officials of the Lubbock - based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. are projecting a final 1989- crop cotton deficiency payment of about 4 cents per pound as of Jan. 5.

The total payment for the year will equal the difference between the 73.4 cent 1989 target price and the January December weighted average price paid to U.S. farmers for cotton. PCG expects the farm level price for the year to be 60.9 cents per pound, 12.5 cents below the target. However, most producers late in 1988 or in early 1989 requested and received advance payment of 8.56 cents. Thus if PCG's estimate of the calendar year farm price should prove accurate, the exact final payment would be 3.94 cents.

With the monthly average prices and marketing totals in hand for 11 months, leaving only the figures for Decmeber to be plugged into the caluclation, PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson says, "I don't think there's any way our projections can be very far off the mark."

USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS)



Herman Geries

reports the average price and marketing volume for each month during the year. NASS compiles its figures from a statistical sampling of sales figures supplied by members of the cotton trade. This procedure creates a thirty - day lag in the release of each month's figures, and the December report won't be released until January 31.

Through November, NASS has reported total marketings of 11,809,000 bales at a weighted average price of 60.2 cents. Almost a fourth of that volume, 2,879,000 bales, was traded in November alone at an average price of 65.7 cents per pound. Although the mid-month December price has been reported at only 62.7 cents, mid - month prices in the past have been misleading. So PCG in its projections couples a 64-cent December price with a 3 million bale volume to come up with its 60.9 cent weighted average price for the year.

Each producer's total payment, expected in Februrary, will be determined by multiplying the payment rate times his farm's established per - acre program yield times planted
