"Also, as sheriff, I am charged by Texas State Law to enforce Texas Laws. Texas State Law \#V.C.S. Art. 6675a-2 states: 'Every owner of a motor vehicle, trailer or semi-trailer or to be used upon the public highways and roadways of this state shall apply each year to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation through the County Tax Collector of the county in which he resides, for the registration or each such vehicle owned or controlled by him.
"Also, at such time as a non-resident owner or operator establishes residency in Texas or enters into gainful employment, his vehicle may be operated 30 days thereafter, after which time the vehicle must be currently registered in Texas.
"The Parmer County Sheriff's Department will, after 30 days from the date of this publication, start issuing citations for violation of this law
