On the 11th day of November we as a community paid our last tribute to a longtime friend of Texico-Farwell, Claude Rose Sr. As I sat on the platform with the other ministers and listened to the hymns of faith: *Because He Lives, How Great Thou Art, My God and I, The Old Rugged Cross*, I thought of this kind druggist's life, that we have come to celebrate. Not until he visited the churches of America and witnessed the pulpits of this land did he find his answer. Returning to France, he wrote, "America is great because America is good; and if America will cease to be good, America will cease to be great."

Down through history, our forefathers have given testimony of the need of faithful commitment to God and His principles.

Cumpton wins football contest

Cumpton said he doesn't expect to use the Cowboy tickets himself because the Steer football team will still be in the playoffs that weekend.

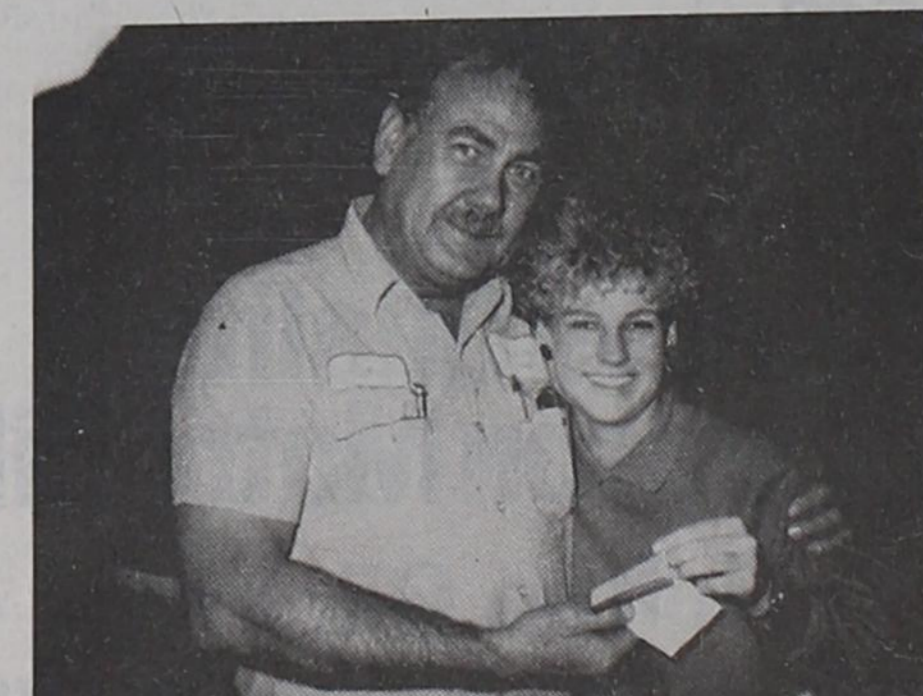

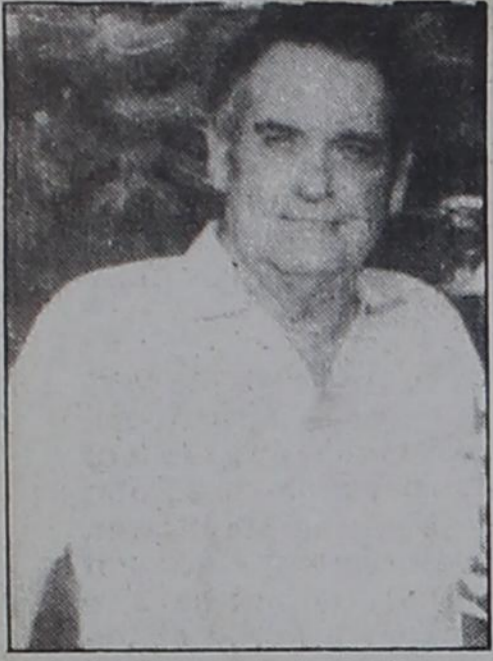

Actually, it was the 1956 team, Harold Carpenter discovered after checking his old annual.

Some words from wife Judy: A couple of years ago, there was a burglary in Farwell. I asked one of the deputies at the sheriff's department if fingerprints had been taken at the scene.

He replied that I must watch too many detective shows. He went on to explain how really difficult it is to solve a burglary case with fingerprints. Luckily, things are changing very rapidly in the field of fingerprint identification.

First of all, the detectives have to dust for fingerprints. If the house is like mine, there are millions to choose from, and identifying a suspect's fingerprints from those of family members is a real chore. Secondly, the detectives have to lift a suspect's

fingerprints very carefully so that they are not damaged or smudged. There is a real skill involved.

If the police don't have a suspect with whom to compare the fingerprints from the crime site, the process is much, much more difficult.

If the police department is large enough to have fingerprint records, the new prints must be carefully compared to each fingerprint on record to see if they match. It has always taken a very skilled person and a lot of time to do this.

If the police department does not have records, the records can be sent to the

FBI. They have lots and lots of records, so identification takes quite a long time.

If the crime was committed by someone who has not ever been fingerprinted, the time is wasted.

Fortunately for law enforcement personnel, the fingerprint situation is changing rapidly. Research is being done for the FBI at Texas Tech University on the use of laser beams to lift fingerprints from surfaces that could not be fingerprinted in the past. Fluorescent surfaces, for instance, were nearly impossible to fingerprint.

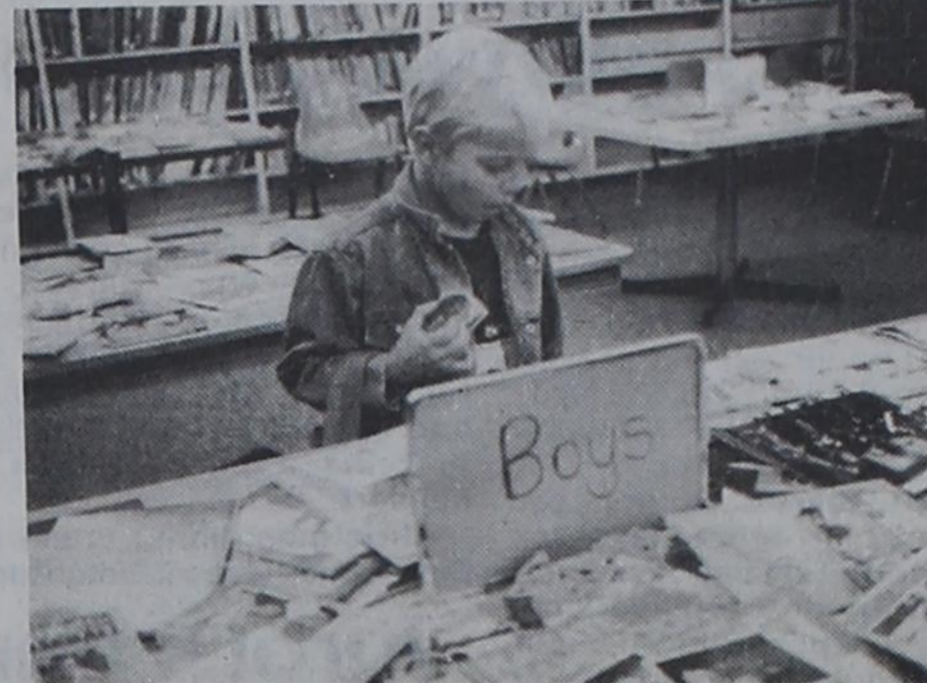

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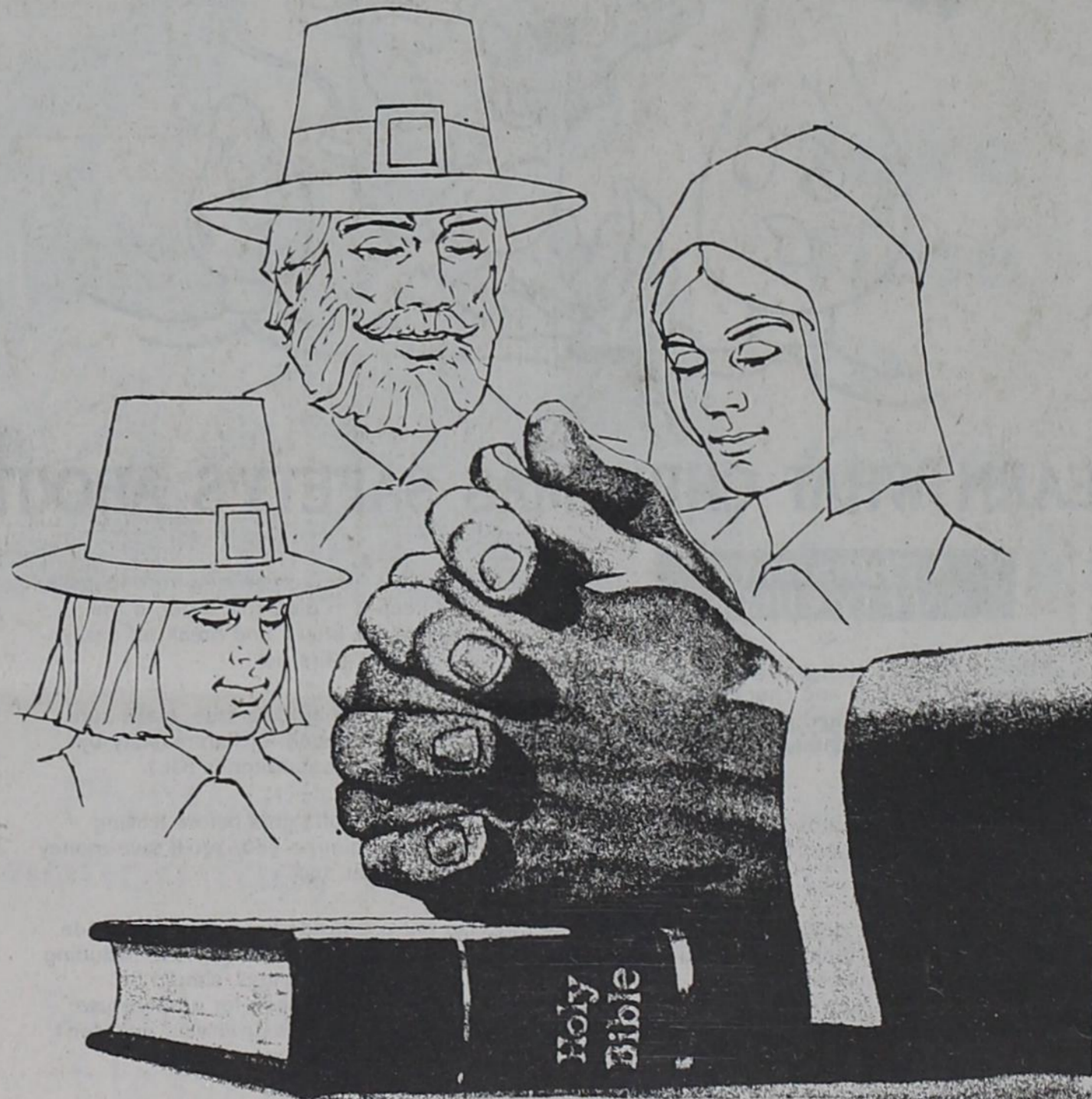

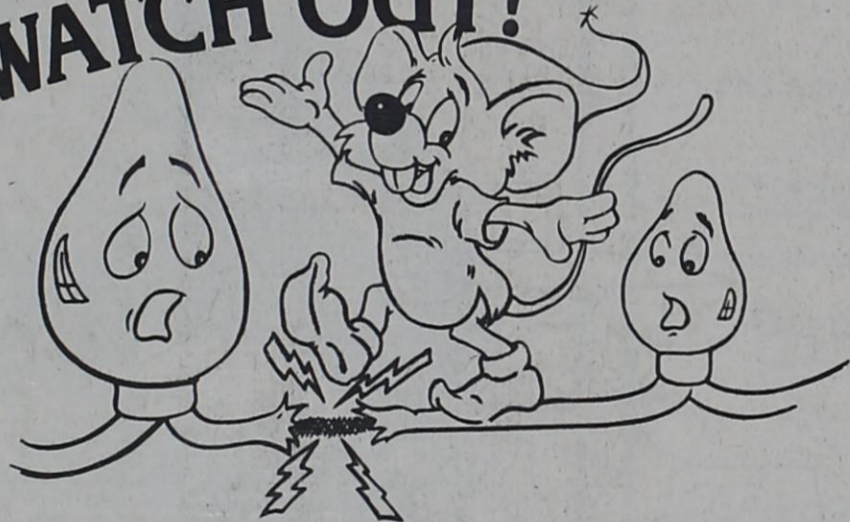

A CHRISTMAS SAFETY CHECK

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.

- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.

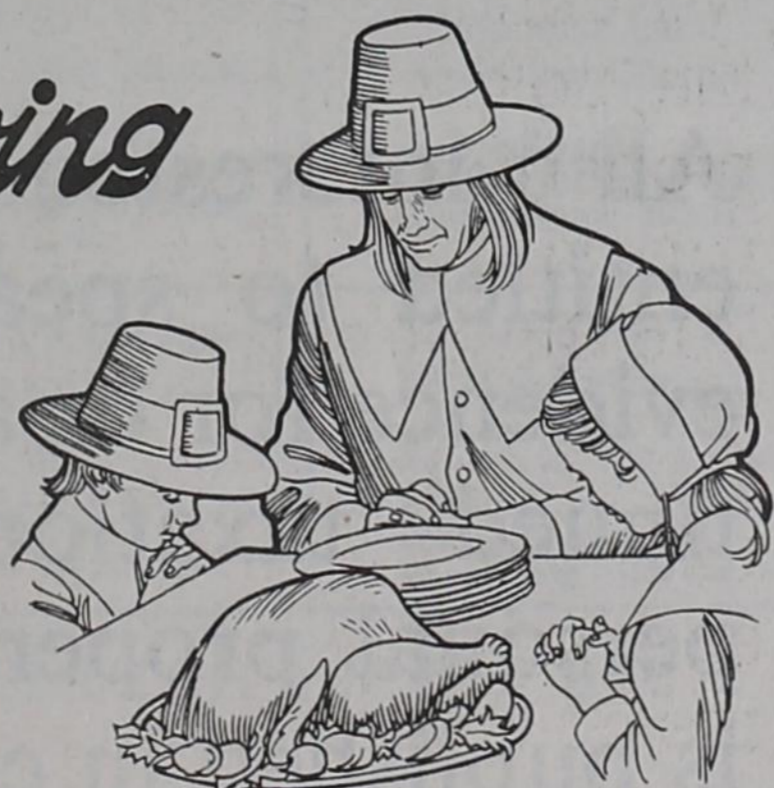

The high-powered Lazbuddie attack was too much for Silvertown last Friday, as the Longhorns charged to a Bi-District Championship in Six-Man Football.

The Longhorns won 47-36 in a game played at Longhorn Stadium. Earlier, the same two teams had met and fought to a 20-20 tie; but a couple of Lazbuddie starters were out that time.

Lazbuddie is now 9-1-1; Silvertown ended its season at

6-4-1.

Lazbuddie plays New Home at Smyer at 7:30 tonight (Friday) for the Area Championship.

Once again, Lazbuddie quarterback Michael Williams figured prominently in the Longhorn attack. Going into the game, he ranked first among area passers in his division, and it appears the numbers he put on the board in this game won't hurt him.

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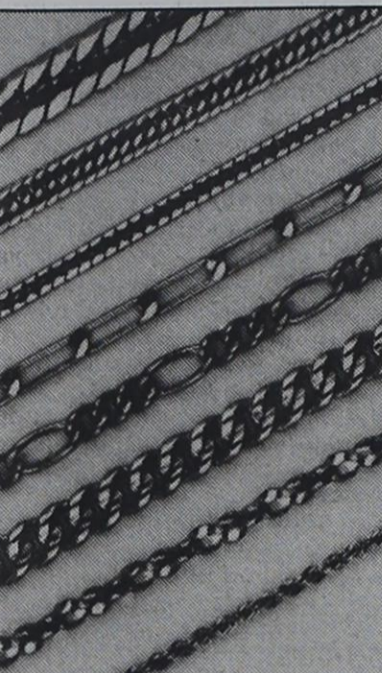
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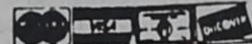

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Farwell girls go 1-1

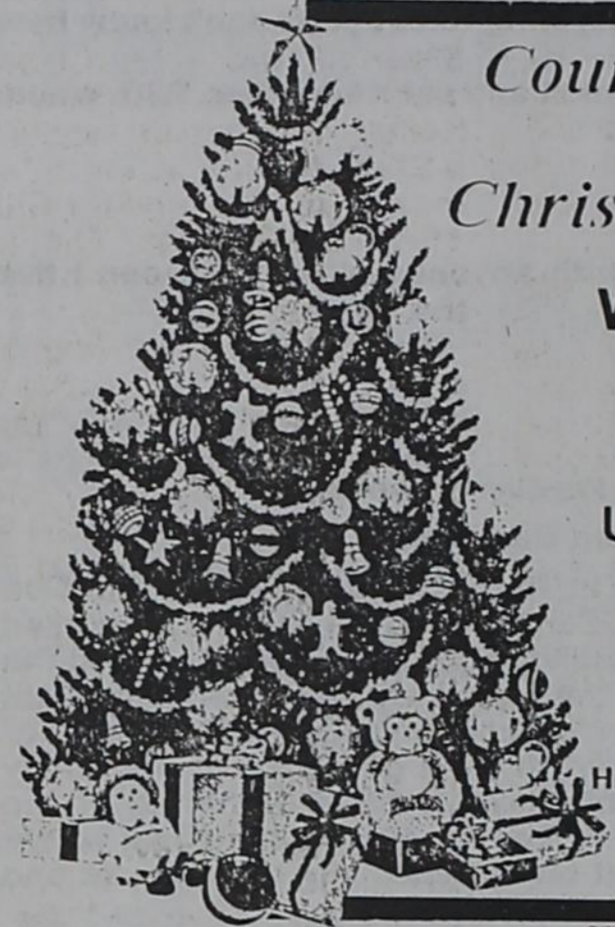
It looks like the Farwell varsity basketball team will be looking forward to an even better season this year than last.

Farwell's varsity girls lost to Sudan 78-29 Saturday. "Sudan has a good team," said Coach Libby. The team is now 1-1.



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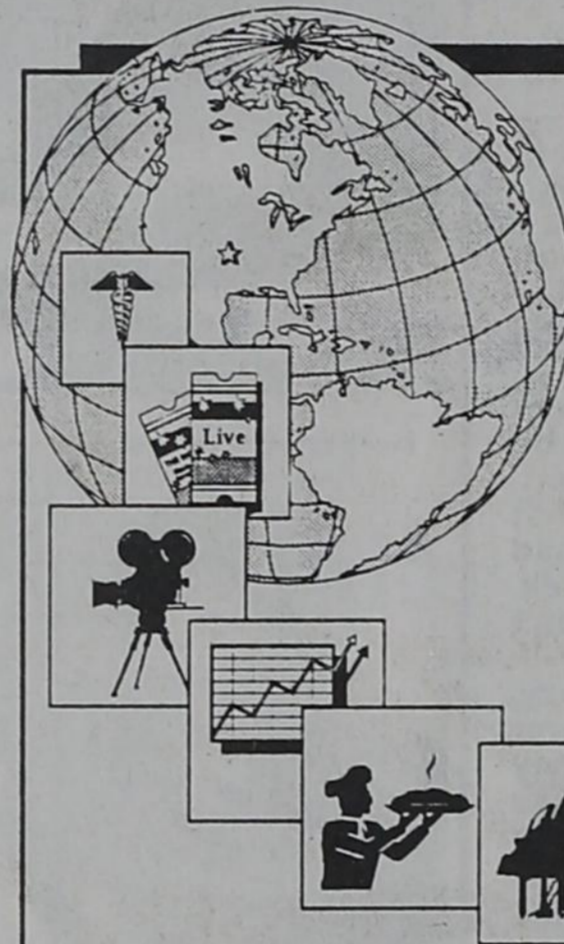
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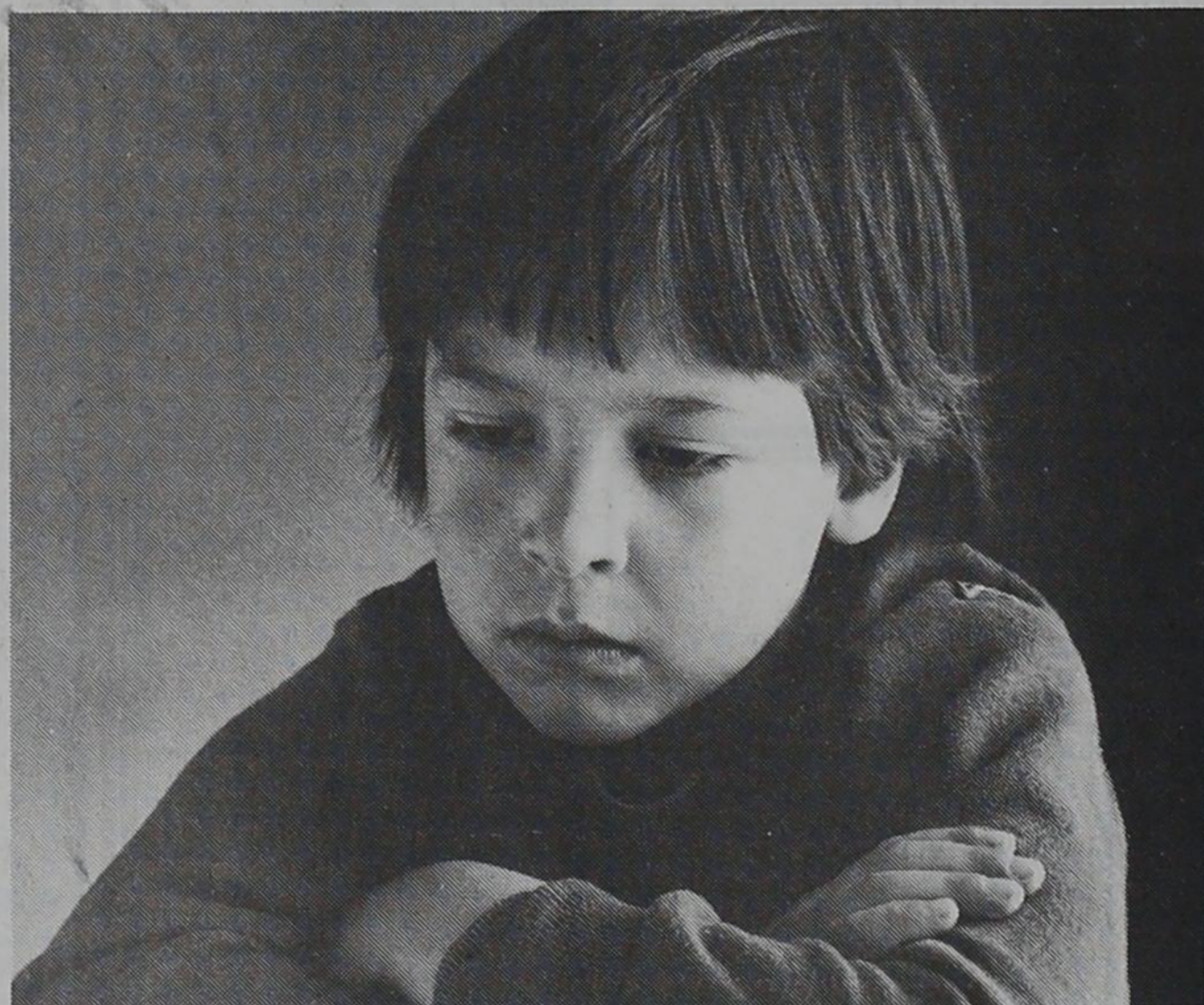


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Steers win playoff opener over Seagraves

The Farwell Steers kept their perfect record unblemished by defeating the Seagraves Eagles, 30-26, last Friday at Plainview to win the Bi-District Championship.

The 11-0 Steers will meet West Texas at 7:30 tonight (Friday) at Canyon High School for the Area Championship.

West Texas has a perfect 11-0 record, too.

The Steers will be an underdog against West Texas, which was formed by consolidating three school districts and is about the largest in Class 2 in Texas.

To get to Canyon High School, if you are coming in on the Amarillo highway: take the exit by the "Big Cowboy" - 11th Street. Eleventh Street goes directly to the school (on the south side of the highway).

Tickets cost \$4 for adults and \$3 for students. College students will have to pay \$4.

Seagraves showed a lot of character by fighting back after Farwell had taken a 30-13 lead in the final period. The Eagles ran a trap play that they had been running for decades - and were very successful with it.

Farwell kicked off the the Eagles started on their own 15. Three rushing plays gained 1 yard. Shawn Stewart took the Eagle punt back 20 yards to the Seagraves 38.

A pass from Greg Actkinson to Michael Arce gained 20. Clint Kelley ran for 9. But Farwell stalled and attempted a 25-yard field goal at 5:53 which failed.

Seagraves' speedy halfback Quincy Anderson burst up the middle on a 3rd and 1 play, and went 55 yards for a TD. The kick was good and Seagraves led 7-0 at 3:56 of the first quarter.

Farwell replied quickly when Actkinson arched a 61-yard TD bomb to Arce at 3:00. The Darren Haseloff kick was good and the game was tied.

Seagraves moved to the Steer 33 but a fourth down pass was knocked down by Kelley. Seagraves recovered a Steer fumble at the 37 and moved quickly, ending with a 15-yard TD jaunt. The kick was low and it was 13-7 in the Eagles' favor.

Farwell used the long pass effectively again. Actkinson hit Delgado for 36 yards. Shawn Stewart ran for another first down by Seagraves intercepted in the end zone when the Steers had reached inside the 10.

The Eagles were held and punted to the Steer 25. Then came what Coach Rex Cumpston called the turning point in the game.

Actkinson threw the ball about 30 yards in the air. It deflected off Darren Haseloff's hands into Stewart's arms. Stewart then raced the next 45 yards untouched into the end zone.

Actkinson scored the 2 extra points on a keeper and Farwell led 15-13. Seagraves was held after a quarterback sack by Haseloff. Kelley caught at 25-yard pass as time ran out in the half.

The third quarter was all Farwell. After the two teams

exchanged possessions, the Steers moved in short bursts: Runs by Stewart for 14 and 15 yards; a pass to Stewart for 14 yards; a run by Actkinson for 10; a run by Joel Smith for 5; a run by Kelley for 19, then a keeper into the end zone by Actkinson from the 6.

The kick was blocked and Farwell led 21-13 at 3:52.

Then the Eagle kick receiver made an error. He fumbled the kickoff at the 6, picked it up and ran into his own end zone, thinking the ball would come out to the 20. Instead, the safety was called. Farwell led 23-13 and Seagraves had to kick off.

Farwell started on its 47. Stewart ran for 17 and 10 but a fumble was lost on the Eagle 8.

Seagraves returned the favor, with Adrian Nicolas recovering a fumble on the Eagle 5. Actkinson scored from the 1. The Haseloff kick was good and Farwell led 30-13 at

11:58.

The Eagles fought back in the 4th quarter. They scored on a 52-yard TD pass at 6:46. The kick was good and it was 30-20.

Kelley had a 25-yard run for Farwell but the Steers were held and punted to the Seagraves 20. An 80-yard TD run made it 30-26 at 2:55. The conversion was a fake field goal attempt, and the run was stopped short of the goal line.

If the game had ended in a tie, the winner would have been picked by the number of penetrations made within the 20 yard line. Farwell led in this category, 6-4.
