Understanding the pain

Folks, I'd like to talk today about the past few weeks at our home. This will be a rambling column because I want to touch on several points. Hopefully, some may help others in the same position - or who might be in the same position down the road.

The background: 5 months ago, we invited my mother-in-law, Violet Allen, to live with us. She was suffering from emphysema, a very serious lung problem. She died last week at a Lubbock hospital at age 70.

For many years, she smoked three to four packs of cigarettes a day. There are those who believe that there's a direct cause between heavy cigarette smoking and emphysema. And I'm sure the tobacco companies insist that there has been no cause-and-effect scientifically shown. Each of us should form his own opinion.

Before I continue, besides running a "thank you" ad in today's issue, I can't say enough of the wonderful concern folks here have shown us during the week Judy stayed at the hospital with her mom, then awaiting the arrival of friends and relatives for the services.

Judy's a member of Beta Sigma Phi sorority. Those gals went out of their way to help us. I guess what really opened my heart is that this is the first time I have ever been through something like this.

And there's the folks at our Methodist Church. Not only did many attend the service, which we appreciated, they even prepared a luncheon for the relatives who flew in.

Since I didn't grow up as part of a family, and living in a big city, I never knew how wonderful it felt when folks showed concern like this. I'm told that this is the norm for the small community of Texico-Farwell. That's one mighty "plus" for our town - and one more reason why living here beats the heck out of living in a major metropolis.

And all those folks who brought casseroles and desserts and flowers and plants to our home. At first, I thought we had too much food. So I was pleasantly stunned to see how quickly it went when you have relatives and friends visit at the same time. It was very much appreciated.

As most of you folks know, we don't have any kinfolk here - the closest ones are 300 miles away. So to see friends and neighbors help out like they did is really special. Very, very special. And it won't be forgotten.

I didn't know a thing about emphysema when Vi arrived. I just knew she had a great deal of trouble breathing and it was difficult for her to get around. But I learned fast. Emphysema is a horrible illness. It's one to be avoided if possible. It's not a matter of just dying from it - it causes a slow, lingering, painful death. It's like living with a heavy towel held tightly around your head.

I point that out because there may be some kids who get hooked on various drugs, not worrying about the end result. They may say "What difference is it if I die from the drug - or in another way. I'm going to die someday anyway."

Well, there is a difference, kids. Just re-read the sentences I wrote two paragraphs up. And read 'em again.

There's an Russian proverb that I always think of when illness is the topic: "When your foot hurts, nothing else matters."

What is meant is that if you are not feeling well, it's hard to concentrate on anything

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Farwell to set up police post

The Farwell City Council Oct. 19 voted 5-0 to seek applications for a law enforcement officer for the city. Whether the person hired will be called "police chief" or "city marshal" has not been determined.

The meeting began with Mayor Chris Gikas saying that many parents are unhappy about vehicles driving too fast in the city, especially around the schools and city park. If a child is injured, the city could be sued - which can also be done even if the city has a marshal.

Also, there have been a number of burglaries, Gikas said, and it has gotten to the point where people know Farwell has no city marshal.

"I see no way around hiring a fulltime marshal," he said. Higher taxes will be called for.

Gikas said he has tried to have the county participate but the state won't allow it.

Also, if a disaster hits, such as a tornado, a marshal would be in charge.

Also present at the meeting were County Sheriff Rex Williams and Deputy Wayne Causey.

Williams said he surveyed how much time the sheriff's department spent on working on Farwell calls from Jan. 1 to May 1 - 264 hours. Ninety percent were night-time (overtime) calls.

Williams said he wasn't complaining about this but pointed out the statistics to show the amount of activity and that a night-time officer could stop some of the vehicles speeding and burglaries.

By state law, the sheriff's department can't enforce city ordinances, he said. "We don't work traffic; we have no radar," Williams said. "Normally, sheriff's departments don't work traffic."

Williams said a city marshal could use the sheriff's dispatcher and jail.

In discussing what percentage of a traffic ticket would go to the city, officials weren't sure but estimated that one-third of the revenue goes to the city and two-thirds to the state. City judge

William Dannheim would set the traffic fine rates.

Causey said he was interested in the city marshal's post and Williams praised him for his work.

The city faces \$30,000 to \$40,000 in start-up costs: a minimum salary of \$18,000, a state surplus car at \$3,000, and uniforms and supplies. A better look at costs will be presented at the November meeting.

A person with police experience will have an advantage in seeking the post.

In other business, a report was made on the city's future trash pickups, since open burning is being outlawed.

Waste Management, which handles Texico's trash, informed the city that Farwell needs to enter into its own contract with the Clovis landfill. Water Dept. Supt. Dee Hammitt said Clovis sanitation department officials see no problem with this but it must be acted upon by the City Commission Nov. 2.

Councilmen Fred Chandler and Gloria Hutchins said Farwell residents oppose the use of Poly Karts, such as are provided in Texico by Waste Management.

Farwell will look into buying its own truck and containers. Also, it will check with BFI of Amarillo on hauling trash to Clovis.

The council also:
- Approved a house addition for JoAnn Hobbs-Walker, but said no (pending more information) to a storage building for her.

- Said Joel White will need to poll his neighbors before the council acts on his request to build a storage building at his residence.

- Approved a carport for R.T. Langston.

- Approved buying a computer for the water department.

- Talked about a lease-purchase plan for improved communications for the fire department.

- Agreed to clear up a problem where two residences are listed as 105 E. and 105 W. Ave. I. The "105 W." will become "107."

That's so true. When an elderly parent is in pain, and does something to affront us, we must remember - it's not our mom or dad speaking, it's the pain speaking.

If the loved one takes an action that's not customary, remember it's the pain doing it, not the mom or pop you love.

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This is important because many of us have wonderful memories of our folks. And it's difficult to see them elderly and ill - and unhappy. And if they are crabby, don't take it personally - you're hearing the pain, not the parent.

I also learned during the last several weeks about the true meaning of stress. I've never worried much about stress. As a reporter, then editor, then publisher, of daily newspapers for many years, you learn quickly to deal with the stress of deadlines and having to make split second decisions.

But I had no idea of the stress involved when you have an ill loved one - and you can't improve the situation.

During the past several weeks, I talked to many folks here about how best to deal with this situation; what should be done to make it as good as possible for Vi.

What I learned is how prevalent it is to have an elderly parent live with their children. We always hear about hospitals and nursing homes but we don't hear much about the care given in the children's home.

And the advice I received

was always the same: do the best you can and don't worry about it. There's going to be stress involved and that's the way it is.

How easy that sounds - "and don't worry about it." And how hard to achieve. In other words, there is no answer, no solution. It's just a matter of dealing with the problem. And if you get down about it, as you will, just realize that that's perfectly normal.

Get help. Make sure others participate. Don't feel like you're a "wimp" if you seek assistance. We're just human and in this type of stressful situation, we all need help.

And if it gets to the point where you can't handle it

any more, there are excellent nursing homes available, like the Farwell Convalescent Center. Use them.

Speaking of stress, I'd like to take a moment to apologize to any folks we might have been rude to the past several weeks. I know that I have been short-tempered more than usual. Stress does that.

I also wasn't sure how to react when folks offered their sympathies after Vi's death. On one hand, I'm going to miss her. I had sort of adopted her and her late husband, Ed, as my own parents. They were fine hard-working, honest folks.

But it's good to know the pain is gone.

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7-0 Steers stop Abernathy win streak

The Farwell Steers put themselves in the driver's seat toward winning their district this year by upending Abernathy, 23-7, last Friday in an away game.

The win broke Abernathy's streak of 26 straight wins in district after coming down from Class 3. Abernathy is 1-1 in district and 3-4 overall.

Farwell, 2-0 in district and 7-0 overall, hosts Lockney at 7:30 p.m. tonight (Friday).

The game started on an upbeat note as Monty Delgado intercepted a pass at the Steer 43. Abernathy only completed 1 of 10 passes - for minus 5 yards.

The previous week, Abernathy had rolled up more than 400 rushing yards in its win. So Steer Coach Rex Cumpton put 10 men up virtually on the line of scrimmage to halt the ground game and force the pass.

The Steers used runs by Clint Kelley and Greg Actkinson and a reception by Darren Haseloff to move to the Abernathy 10. On 4th and 4 at the 4, Shawn Stewart raced in for the TD at 5:29 of the first period. Haseloff's kick was good.

The rest of the first quarter stayed scoreless. Joel Smith had a good tackle for Farwell.

In the second quarter, Farwell was stopped at the Abernathy 35 and Abernathy drove straight down field to score at 6:01. The kick was good to tie the score.

The Steers then mounted an 80-yard scoring drive. On two 3rd down situations, Actkinson completed long passes - 35 yards to Delgado and 23 yards to Stewart. Actkinson then snuck in from the 1 at 1:21 for the TD. The Haseloff kick was good.

Abernathy was unable to score as Haseloff made a strong tackle.

Farwell dominated the second half as the Abernathy offense was stopped cold.

Farwell had a good drive immediately, using 2 runs by Kelley and a Haseloff catch. But Abernathy recovered a fumble at its own 17.

Abernathy was stopped as Actkinson contributed a key tackle.

In the 4th quarter, Farwell lost another fumble at the Abernathy 30. But after stopping Abernathy on three plays, a bad snap sailed over the head of the Abernathy punter, who recovered the ball in the end zone for a Steer safety at 10:27. So Farwell led 16-7.

After a penalty, Farwell had a 1st down and 25 from its own 20. But runs by Delgado and Stewart gained a first down at the Abernathy 47. Abernathy then intercepted.

Abernathy was stopped as Delgado, Haseloff and Kelley tackled a runner for an 8-yard loss.

Then the Steers ended the scoring as Smith zigzagged through the middle for a 35-yard TD run at 3:25. The Haseloff kick was good.

There was no more scoring.

Such complaint must be filed not later than 180 days after the alleged discrimination or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time of filing. Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the rules and regulations of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
