This is a very important project. It appears the cost of a new City Hall complex is out of the city's means. So it's only right that the city work on fixing up its City Hall and community center. As the Chamber moves ahead on the inside renovation, the City Council is checking on the cost of fixing the outside east wall.

Speaking of the City Council, I would like to voice my opinion on how Steve Chancy, who took over as mayor last winter, is doing. In a nutshell, "excellent."

Since I have attended Texico City Council meeting on a regular basis for the past five years, I can say with certainty that it's been a pleasure to watch this young man grow in the job and attain maturity as a civic leader. Texico is fortunate to have Chancy in this leadership post.

I realize that one man's junk might be another man's treasure. However, if it looks like junk, walks like junk and talks like junk, then it's junk. Period.

Plus, there are homes, vacant and otherwise, that should be torn down if they are not sixed up.

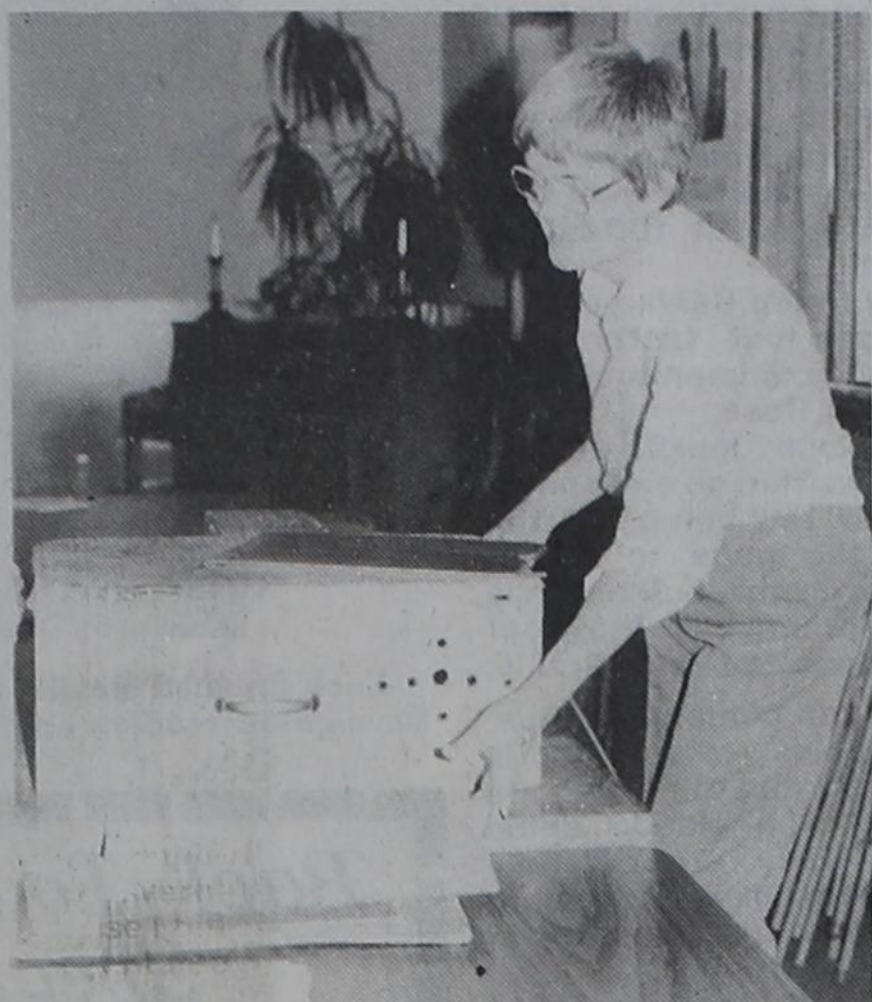
Maybe, I'm wrong, but I believe that most citizens of Texico take pride in their community and their property. I believe they would like to see a cleanup occur. I'm with them.

I think a five-year period is needed for legal reasons. If someone is asked to fix up his property, a reasonable amount of time is needed. But if a legal deadline is given, then it must be enforced.

Books printed in Braille

If you happen to drop into the fellowship hall at St. John Lutheran Church in Lariat some Thursday morning and hear the hum of a washing machine, don't worry.

You won't be put to work doing the linens. But, you might be put to work if you don't watch out. The noise you hear was once a washing machine motor, but it powers a very special machine that the Lariat Braille group uses to crank out pages of a Braille book for the blind, and they can always use an extra hand.

Over the years they have had volunteers as young as 6 years old, and as old as 92. When Minnie Ramm was too ill to come in and help, she took pages home to number by hand. No special skill or education is necessary for volunteers. The work is simple, but terribly important for the blind of the world.

Blindness affects a small minority of people in the United States, but in underdeveloped countries it affects a much larger portion of the population.

About 70 percent of the world's sight impaired people live in under developed countries, according to the Lutheran Braille Works. In those countries the blind are often a terrible burden on those around them. Some of these underdeveloped countries, which now object to Christian missionaries who simply want to spread the word about Christ's teachings, will take any materials they can get to help teach the blind of their nation to become self-sufficient.

Lutheran Churches around the U.S. have set up 135 volunteer centers to print books written in Braille, the system of embossed dots that blind people can read with their fingers.

Some of the books they print are religious, and some are educational. The national group has copies of the Bible and U.S. Constitution and the Pledge of Allegiance in several languages.

On July 20th, the Lariat Braille group was printing a 39 page book titled



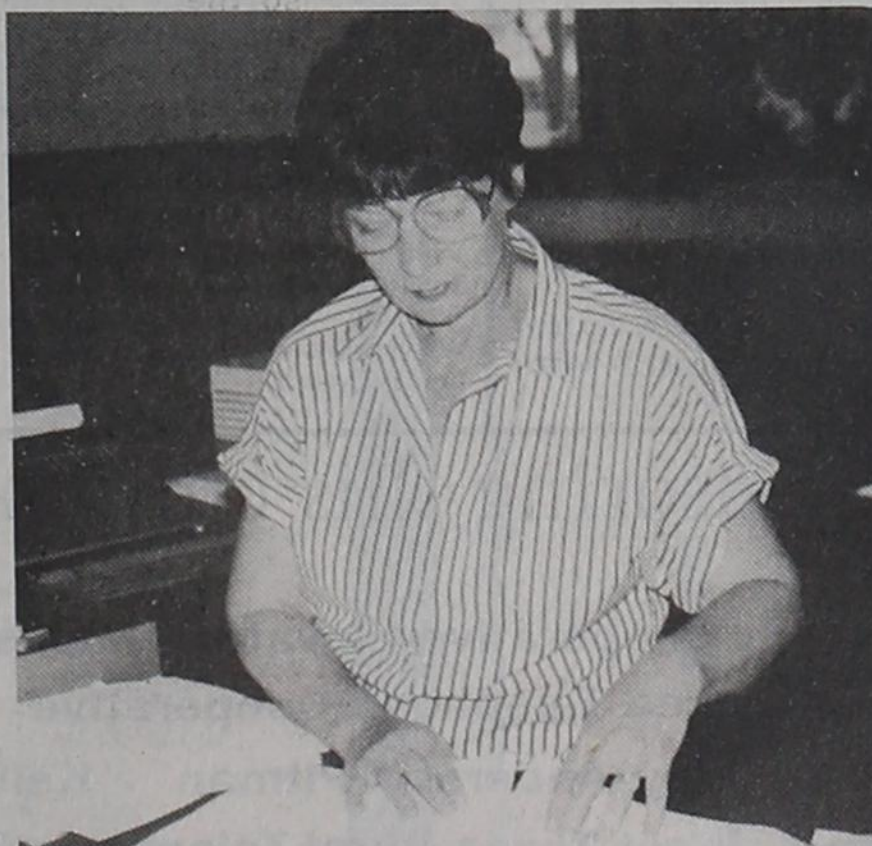
Alma Lingnau takes the papers out of the press and keeps them in numerical order.

"wonder of the World," a religious tract. You would assume that the finished printed tract would be small, but the 39 pages, printed on 1 1/2 grade Braille paper is nearly 1" thick when completed. The books will be sent

to Bangladesh when they are completed. Next month the group will begin printing copies of the book of Joshua from the Bible in Swahili. No, there aren't any members of the Lariat group that read Swahili. Nor are there any members that even read Braille.

The group receives zinc plates for its "printing press" ready made. The plate is embossed with Braille symbols. The foreign language has been converted into phonetic Braille symbols. Each letter is represented by anywhere from 1 - 6 dots. The Braille - trained reader can feel the dots with his fingers and translate the sym-

Texico names Luscombe as grid coach

Richard Luscombe will be the head Texico football coach this year.

He will fill the position vacated when Curt Cook accepted a coaching position at the University of Texas - Arlington.

Luscombe had been the head basketball coach (for both teams) and assistant football coach at Lazbuddie for the past four years before resigning this summer.

Last year the Lazbuddie Longhorns under coach C.W. Williams and Luscombe were Texas State 6-Man football runners-up. They lost to state champion Cristoval in the playoffs.

Lazbuddie switched to 6-Man ball two years ago because they found it difficult to field an 11-Man team with their small enrollment. The junior high changed from 11-Man to 6-Man ball last year.

Luscombe was in charge of defense for the Lazbuddie football teams.

There weren't many teams that were able to score very often against the Longhorns last year. But Luscombe notes that he will have to make some changes when he moves to Texico.

"In 6-Man, everyone is eligible to receive a pass," said Luscombe. He indicated that this will be a big change, but one that he can adjust to since he has worked with both 6-Man and 11-Man teams.

He also noted that in 6-Man football there is 45 point rule which allows the game to be cancelled if any team is ahead of the other by 45 points. Also, there is a slightly shorter and narrower field used for 6-Man football. In spite of the differences, the two games are very similar.

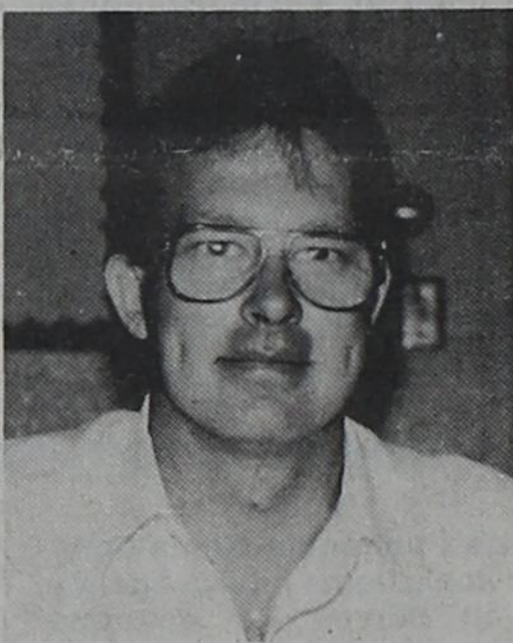
Right now, coach Luscombe is feeling anticipation. "I'll feel more comfortable once I get things going," he said. "I want to get things off in the right direction."

Luscombe met with the team officially for the first time on Saturday morning and was favorably impressed by the meeting.

"They are excited by the chance to start the season over. If we have a good game Friday, it will help them forget about the cancelled game."

Texico hosts Cloudcroft tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. It will be Parent's Night. The team members and their parents will be recognized at this game.

bols into a letter in his language. When the Lariat Braille group meets, a worker places a piece of cardboard on a table. Then he places a sheet of embossed zinc on the cardboard; it is the plate for the printing press. A piece of thick paper is placed on top of that. Another zinc plate is placed on top of the paper, and another piece of cardboard is added. The trick is getting the right two plates together with the symbols going the right direction. Then the stack of cardboard, paper, and plates for the printing press is fed through the printing press. It is actually a washing machine motor powered set of rollers that press the plates against the paper. It embosses the paper with bumps on both sides of the sheet. The bumps are the symbols

that the blind can read. When the group gets into full swing, a full 39 page book can be printed in about 4 minutes. The three groups that meet at St. John's Lutheran Church (one from Lariat, one from Rhea, and one from Clovis) print at least 100 books per month.

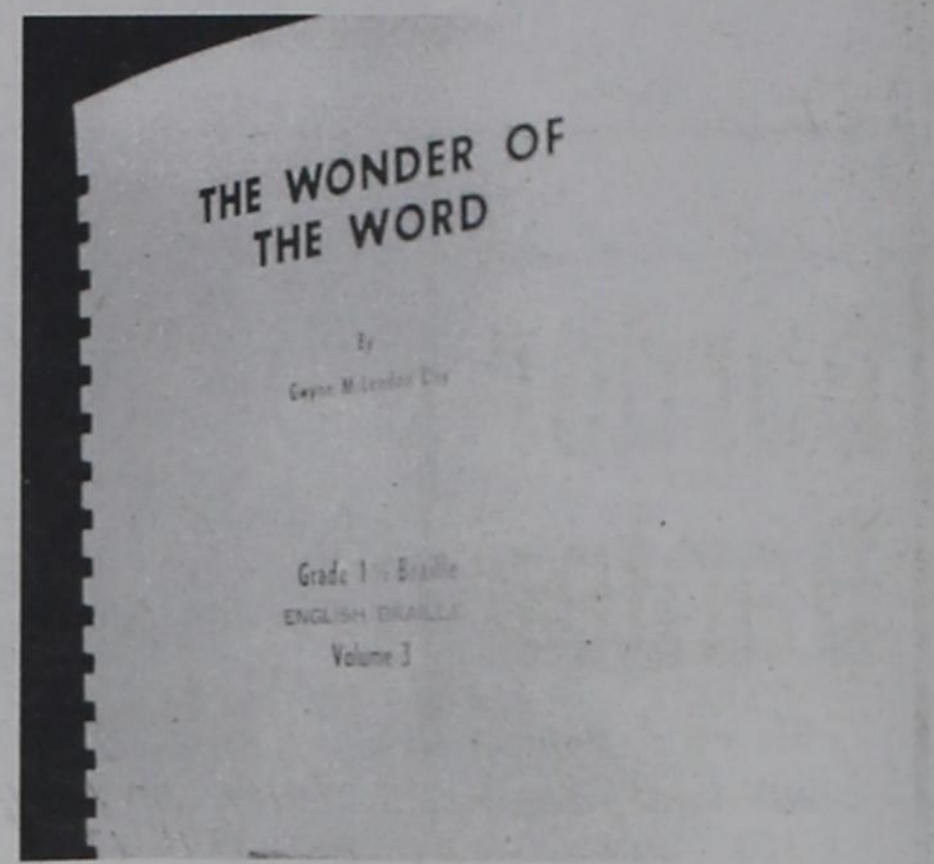
"Mary Helen Gohlke cranks the pages out faster than anyone," comments proof-reader Pat Rose.

Mrs. Rose looks at the number written on each page, and feels the bumps at the top of the page to see if they match the bumps on a finished proof copy. The proof reader does not read Braille, but she can compare bumps.

Then holes are punched in each page, and the pages are fitted with a plastic spiral binding. They are carefully packed into boxes and sent to the national headquarters in Yucaipa, California.

The Lariat group includes Liz Kaltwasser, Mary Kalbas, Esther and Melvin Sachs of Rhea, Mary Helen Gohlke, Alma Lingnau, Pat Rose, and Marie Kriedgel.

They meet on the third Thursday of each month. The Clovis group meets at St. John on the fourth Thursday of each month, and the Rhea group meets on the second Monday of each month.

Farwell officials want your views on '911'

The Farwell City Council will vote at its Sept. 12 meeting on whether to join the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in its Enhanced 911 Emergency Telephone system.

They would like to hear from residents about whether to join or not.

According to Ronnie Scott of ENMR Telephone Com-

pany, Farwell already has essentially the same system through ENMR as the PRPC is proposing. And it is not costing Farwell residents anything extra on their phone bills.

"The only real difference between their system and what Farwell residents already have is that the caller's physical address flashes on the screen when 911 is dialed," said Scott.

"We are in the process of looking into upgrading our system right now and it won't cost anything extra," he added.

Currently, when 911 is dialed in Farwell the dispatcher in the sheriff's office alerts the appropriate fire, rescue, or law enforcement personnel. The rest of Parmer County does not have this service yet.

Lazbuddie residents will be joining with Bailey County for a 911 system that is not connected with PRPC.

Recently Wayne Hughes of the PRPC spoke to the Farwell City Council and to representatives of the Farwell Fire Department about the Enhanced 911 system which they want the rest of Parmer County to join.

The Parmer County Commissioners have already voted to go with the PRPC program because most Parmer County residents do not have ENMR's system. They have not had a 911 number to call in emergency situations.

Under the Enhanced 911 system offered by PRPC, anyone in Parmer County who had an emergency could dial 911 and the call would be answered by a dispatcher in the Friona Police Department

who would alert the appropriate fire, rescue, or law enforcement personnel. The system would cost the residents of the county 50 cents per month extra on their telephone bills.

The total cost of the PRPC program will be about \$1.5 million. It will be shared by several counties.

Parmer's jobless rate: 3.6%

Parmer and Bailey Counties had lower July unemployment rates than the rest of the state of Texas. Parmer County's unemployment rate was 3.6 percent and Bailey County's rate was 5.2 percent in July. The statewide rate for July was 7.3 percent unemployed. Approximately 614,500 unemployed Texans sought work in July and that pushed the state's unemployment rate up according to the office of Commissioner Nabers. "The rate in July was 7.3 percent, up from 7.1 percent for June 1989 and while it is not unusual for unemployment to be relatively high in July," Nabers said, "the somewhat surprising fact is that this rate is up considerably from the 6.6 percent rate recorded in July of last year."

'It was a good scrimmage'

"It was a good scrimmage for the varsity," said Farwell athletic director Rex Cump-ton of last week's 1-1 contest with Vega. "We had to cut it short due to lightning, but we were pleased with the scrimmage as a whole." Cump-ton especially praised the run defense. "We tried some players in new positions, and there were some who really came along," he said. He indicated that the varsity pass defense will need some realignment. According to Cump-ton the Steer offense was a little tentative at first, but they made good progress as the tilt wore on. "We had never run some of the offensive plays against another team, and we were doing some new things." The Farwell offense did better the second series than the first. "Hopefully our ability to catch will improve with practice. But, overall I was pleased with the scrimmage," he said. Fans had trouble identifying the players on the field since there were no numbers on jerseys or programs for the first scrimmage. But they did

note that each team only crossed the other team's goal once. In scrimmage terms, the score was 1-1. "Game jerseys cost about twice what practice jerseys cost, so we go with the practice jerseys for scrimmages," Cump-ton explained. He looks at scrimmages as learning experiences for both the players and the coaching staff. "We'll look at the film of the varsity and evaluate what we are doing. Over all, we may have to make some changes and move some people. Many of the players are in unfamiliar positions, and they learned their lessons well," said Cump-ton. The JV also scrimmaged last Thursday night. Neither Farwell nor Vega scored. "We had a lot of young kids in new positions," said Cump-ton. Some had grown over the summer, and were playing positions that they had never played in junior high. "We employed a 'bend, don't break' theory of defense. We let Vega make some yards, but we just didn't

let them score," said Cump-ton. The Steers next scrimmage on Aug. 31 at Morton. The JV begins at 6 p.m., and the varsity follows. Morton is a 2A school which is highly ranked in its district.

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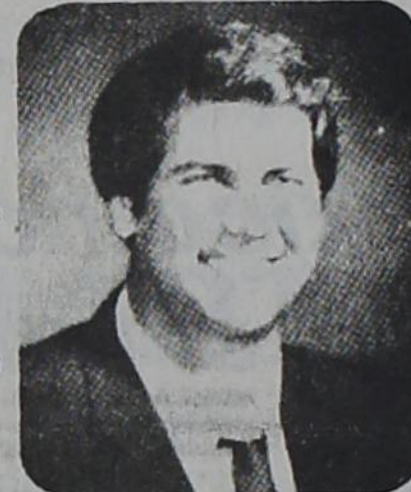

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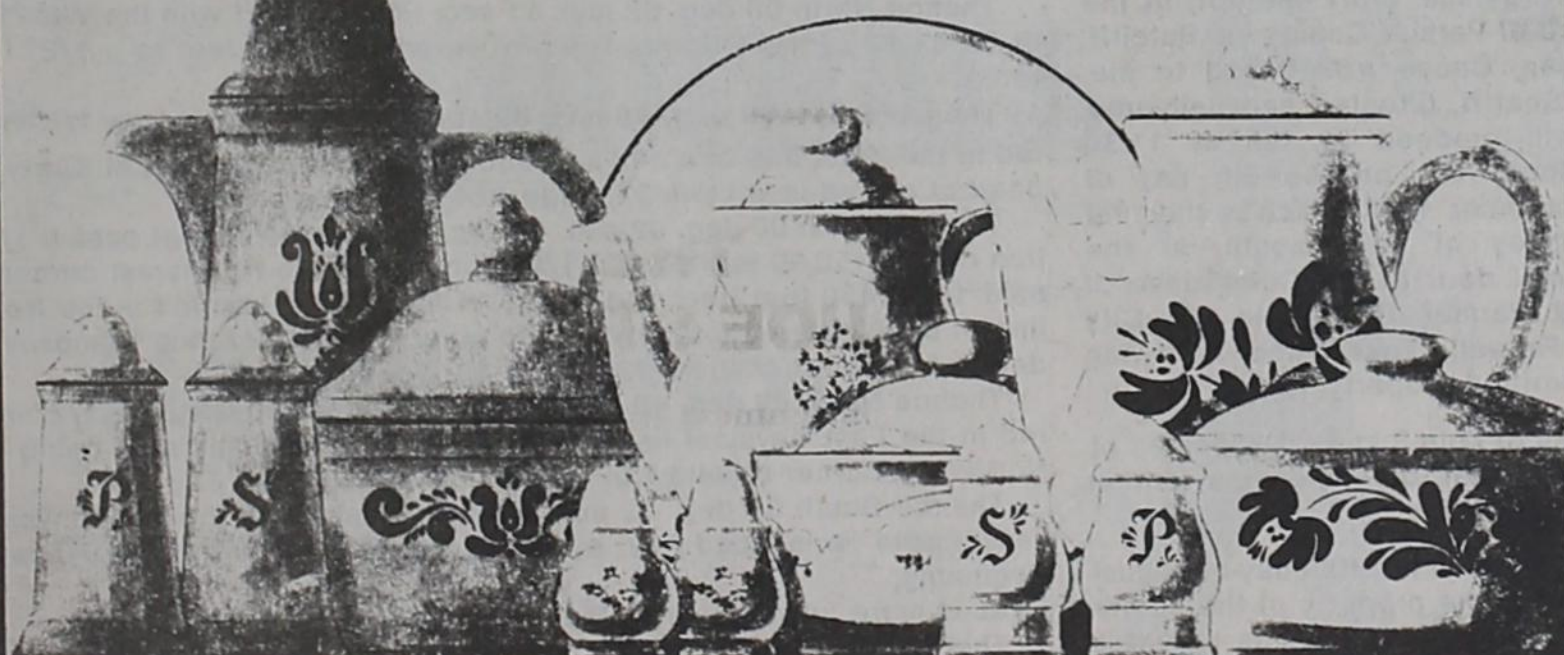

Rains help some, hurt some

An inch and a half of rain fell in the Twin Cities on the evening of Aug. 28, according to Fred Chandler of the Sherley Anderson Grain elevator in Farwell.

He said the rain helped some area farmers, but hurt others. He said that it was great for feed corn farmers, but it would hurt those cutting ensilage right now. It is also good for the farmers who are planning to plant wheat soon.

Vegetable and fruit farmers aren't too happy about the timing of this rain, said Chandler. Wet weather hampers the harvesting of cantaloupes which can get moldy in the fields, cucumbers and beans can grow too big to be commercially profitable if they get too much moisture right now.

Cotton farmers don't mind the rain, but they could really use some hot dry days for the fiber to mature correctly.

The Twin Cities are now ahead of last year in rainfall totals.

According to Lonnie McFarland's records in Lariat, the area has gotten 13.5" so far this year as compared to 11.79" on Aug. 31 of last year. This year started out quite dry, but it is now wetter than last year.

Not all of the area got as much rainfall as Farwell did with this rain. According to McFarland, Lariat got .37" of rain on Aug. 28. In Lazbuddie, there was barely a sprinkle according to June Hunt at the Sherley Grain Elevator in Lazbuddie.

Thunder showers on Aug. 26 and 27 brought about an inch of rain to the Twin Cities area.

Fred Chandler of Sherley Anderson Pitman in Farwell reported .75" of rain on Sunday at the elevator in town, and 1 3/10" of rain at

the farm north of Farwell.

Mike Pomper noted .9" fell at his Farwell home between the two days.

Lonnie McFarland reported that .9" fell in Lariat on the 24th, and .21" on Sunday. He noted that 1.3" fell at the

Sherley Anderson Grain Elevator on Aug. 23 when Farwell didn't get any measurable rain.

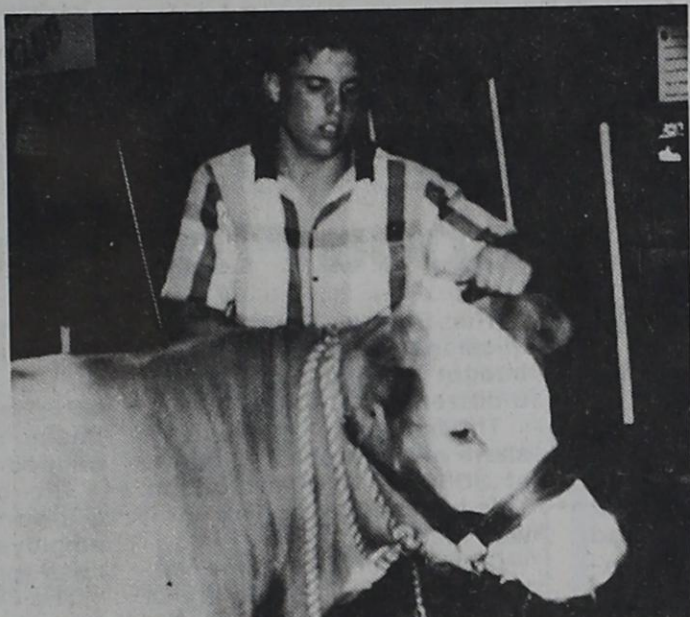

The Parmer County Commissioners held their annual budget hearing Aug. 28 with 6 citizens attending. The budget set the county's share of the property tax rate at 3050 per \$100 evaluation. This is almost exactly what it was last year. County Treasurer Anne Norton presented a summary of the important points in the budget. The budget for 1990 includes the transfer of funds from several accounts so that the courthouse elevator project can be built. The elevator would make the courthouse accessible to handicapped citizens. The budget also includes a 3 percent raise for county employees and a 5 percent raise for office holders. The County Commissioners accepted the budget and set the tax rate when there were no questions or complaints.

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

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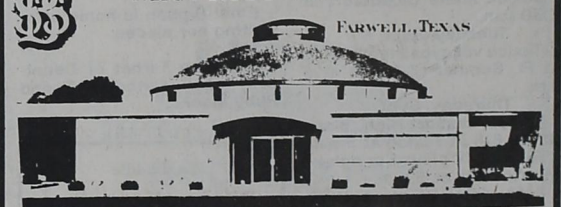


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
