
Rubio triumphs in 3rd contest

The darndest thing is that by the time I got back to Farwell about noon, three folks already had been by the paper to ask about the mishap.


Stuff sure travels fast in a small town, doesn't it.





Shawn Stewart took the opening kick 18 yards to the Steer 26. Farwell was held and punted to the New Deal 38.

New Deal used a series of good runs and a 15-yard pass play to move the ball all the way to the Farwell 6. During this drive, tackles were made by Bruce White, Trent Schilling, Darren Haseloff and Shawn Stewart.



Farwell schools will help to field test a new examination which will eventually take the place of the TEAMS test.

Students in 5th and 11th grades will take a practice test of the new TAAS test which will one day be given instead of TEAMS.

Currently, students in odd numbered grades must pass the TEAMS - a test of minimum achievement- to show that they have mastered most of the basic points taught for

that grade level. The TEAMS test does not compare how students in one district fare in comparison with other students across the U.S. It simply shows whether a student has or has not mastered a skill.

The new test will be designed to show how well students achieve compared to their contemporaries across the nation.

"This is supposed to be a more rigorous test than the TEAMS test," said counselor Carol Sullivan.

Monday's Texico Chamber of Commerce meeting was cancelled.




