Try to be understanding

Over the years, I've learned a few things about how to run a meeting.

As a reporter, I viewed many boards in action. At one time, I was responsible for covering 32 governmental boards. Also, I've run boards; one time I was president of four boards at the same time.

So, it is with some experience that I can comment on last week's Farwell School Board meeting which featured a lengthy executive session.

As was reported, it was an off night for the board. I believe the board members thought they were acting in the best interests of all involved when they called the executive session. It just simply didn't work out.

Executive sessions are popular with boards since they afford board members the opportunity to talk freely without the press or community around.

But what I've learned over the years is that executive sessions can be counter-productive. The reason is the perception of the executive session by the community. When a hot topic comes up, and a board calls an executive session (which are legal for discussions of individual personnel, land acquisition and pending litigation), it is easy for others to be suspicious.

That's something board members often don't understand well. They are on one level - and the others are viewing the situation from a different level. The two often don't meet.

I believe such is the case with last week's meeting. The career ladder is a gut issue - teachers' pocket books. It's an emotional issue. When the amount of your take-home pay may decrease drastically, that's emotional, right?

Meanwhile, the board is viewing its problems from a logical standpoint. There's a budget problem, not enough money, the state will be changing how the career ladder is set up, etc. So they make a logical decision.

Logic and emotions sometimes don't meet. And we just saw that occur.

I know some of the teachers were upset with the board's actions. I know that if I were standing outside a meeting for nearly 4 hours cooling my heels, I might not be in a very happy mood either.

But, remember, folks, boards are made up of people - just like you and me. We are not perfect individuals. We make mistakes every day. Try to look at this from a Christian standpoint.

A few weeks ago, the same board conducted a public hearing on the budget. A couple of the residents who attended brought up questions involving specific individuals.

It would have been clearly appropriate for the board president to stop those lines of questioning, explaining (quite correctly) that such discussion should only be held in executive session.

Instead, the board president allowed the questions to continue, and answers to be made. This was well done. It was better to let those folks say what they needed to rather than use a governmental screen, which would have antagonized folks further.

Running a board, especially when persons attend the meeting for one purpose or another, is not an easy chore. It takes a person dedicated to the community to even seek a board position.

Please remember that.

The pep rally will be held at 3 p.m. in the high school gym. The homecoming king and queen will be crowned at this time.

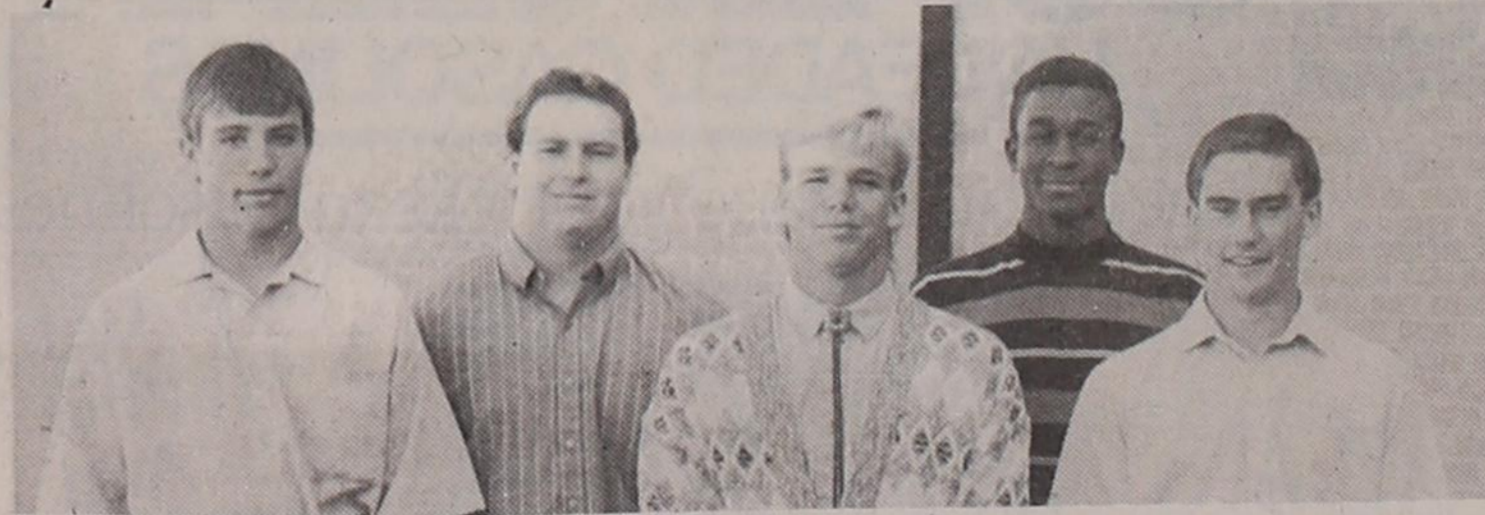
The senior class will sponsor an enchilada supper before the game. It will include enchiladas, beans, salad, homemade desserts, and drinks. Dinner will be served

Services were held for former Farwell resident Lenton Samuel Pool, 84, of High Point, N.C., Oct. 1 at Greenstreet Baptist Church Chapel in High Point. Dr. J. Gary Marsh and Dr. Elliot B. Stewart officiated.

Burial followed at Floral Garden Park Cemetery in High Point.

Mr. Pool died Sept. 29 at Wesleyan Arms Nursing Center.

He was born March 15, 1905 in Floyd County, Texas, the son of Joseph Samuel and Nettie Williams Pool. He received his bachelor's degree from West Texas State University. He married Loretta Simpson Pool on July 20, 1931.

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Unresolved grief over loss or trauma accounts for most, if not all, of our emotional disturbance. It isn't the trauma or loss that makes us emotionally ill - it is our refusal to express our feelings about it. The ways we 'hold it in' or as the saying goes 'sit on it' are many. Some examples are:

- Behave socially acceptably (don't embarrass me, sez someone from long ago.)
- We don't cry when it is appropriate.
- We don't get angry when it's appropriate (and to the appropriate person).
- We don't scream or lash out when we should.

Most of the time these are parental injunctions planted in our subconscious, by our elders when we were little kids, still playing in our minds and telling us how we should *be, feel, act and think*. There are many other ways of 'sitting on it' instead of getting it out healthily; these keep a person *unwell* emotionally. The name of it is *chronic depression*. It is a choice. Not one you consciously make, but nevertheless, a choice.

Chronic depression is the result of refusing to deal with normal human trauma and loss. Acute depression, on the other hand, is the healthy condition experienced by all of us. From time to time, things hurt us, make us sad; or hurt a lot, even devastate us. We have the choice. It isn't an easy choice, but it is *ours*.

The person who refuses to give in to the hurt or the loss; instead chooses to push it under the rug, under the rug, not express their true feelings accompany the hurt, will in essence, never get over it. They suffer the rest of their lives. They are the chronic depressed.

On the other hand, if you will face your hurt/loss straightforwardly; feel the feelings; express those feelings that are normal, you will experience acute depression. The acute kind passes after several days, weeks, months, depending on the degree of hurt/loss. Chronic depression, however, can keep you down for the rest of your life. Plus - there's a stinger - you'll be forever reacting to life instead of really living it.

Classifications are checked every two years by the UIL.

*Recipe of Week*

After Work Fish Fillets

- 1 lb. lean white fish fillets
  - 1 1/2 T. melted margarine
  - 1/4 c. seasoned dry bread crumbs
  - 1 T. Parmesan cheese
  - 1 T. chopped parsley
  - 1/8 tsp. black pepper
  - 1/8 tsp. paprika
  - Lemon wedges
- Cut fillets into serving pieces. Coat on all sides with margarine. Place in microwave - proof dish. Combine bread crumbs, Parmesan cheese, parsley and seasonings. Sprinkle crumb mixture over fillets. Cover with plastic wrap; microwave on High 2 minutes. Rotate dish 1/4 turn; microwave on High 1-2 minutes longer or until fish flakes when tested with a fork. Serve with lemon wedges. Makes 4 servings.

Farwell moved up in class two years ago when its high school enrollment was in the 140s. It was barely over the minimum criteria used that year to determine classifications.

Last Friday, the enrollment in Farwell High was 136.

But the number used to differentiate between Class 1A and Class 2A won't be decided on until this winter.

And the UIL also takes into account the number of schools in a given area to determine which classification they will be put into. For example, although Farwell is now in Class 2A, there are some Texas schools with bigger enrollments - but are in Class 1A.

If Farwell gets moved back down to Class 1A, it would take effect in September 1990.

**October attendance bears on state \$\$**

Financially, October is the most important month of the year for the Farwell Schools and all Texas public schools. It is the attendance accounting period. This single month determines our state funding allocation for the entire 1989-90 school year.

For every student that is in attendance during October, Farwell Schools will receive about \$2,478. The lower the attendance, the fewer state dollars we will receive. Please note that I

said "in attendance" - not enrolled.

Districts are not paid by the state on the basis of enrollment. They are paid according to the actual number of students present in class during October. Each day that an individual student is absent during October results in the loss of \$124 in state revenue.

It is important for everyone to know this information. The amount of state revenue has a direct impact on our local tax rate. The lower our state revenue, the higher taxes have to be. State curriculum requirements are not reduced because of low attendance.

We still have to meet the same mandates, but with less state funding. This means that the local community must make up the difference (our current enrollment is about 25 students lower than last year).

Educationally, regular student attendance is the single greatest indicator of student learning, achievement and success. Common sense, as well as current research, tells us that those students who do best in school are

those students having the best attendance record.

Of course, we do not ask that you send your children to school ill. We would never ask anything that would jeopardize the health or well-being of your children. We do ask parents to do all in their power to see that their children are in school every day if possible.

Simply stated, it is best for you children's education and critical to the district financially.

Clint Kelley returned the Herd kickoff to the Steer 33. Runs by Stewart and Monty Delgado, plus passes from Byrd to Delgado and Joel Smith moved the ball to the Herd 5. Stewart then twisted his way through the Herd defense for the tally at 6:35. The kick was blocked.

Both defenses dominated the rest of the first quarter.

In the 2nd period, a bad punt by Hereford gave Farwell the ball at the Herd 11. Byrd scored from the 2 on a keeper at 9:20. The pass for extra points failed and Farwell led 12-7.

Hereford used its passing game to score again at 5:44. Then the Herd tried for two extra points on a fake kick and option. But they fumbled and Stewart took the ball the other way for a Farwell lead.

Farwell was stopped on an interception at the Steer 45. Michael Arce knocked down a pass to halt the Herd drive. After a fumble recovery, though, the Herd got a first down on the Steer 1. It wasn't until the 4th down that they could score with 25 seconds left in the half. The kick was good and Hereford led 20-14.

The second half was all Farwell.

It opened with a 30-yard run by Arce. The Steers moved the ball quickly and Stewart scored from the 12 at 9:39. The run by Byrd for the extra points was good and it was 22-20.

A good tackle was made by Trent Schilling as the Herd was stopped. Passes from Byrd to Stewart and Darren Haseloff moved the ball downfield and Stewart scored from the 2. The run failed.

The quarter ended with a good run by Kelley, a punt return by Stewart and a pass catch by Arce.

Byrd hit Stewart with a 7-yard TD pass at 10:44 of the final period. The kick was good.

At 8:30, Arce scored on a 45-yard interception. The kick was blocked. This ended the scoring.

Pool took over at QB for the rest of the game. It also featured interceptions by Delgado and Sammy Hererra, the tackle of a Hereford interceptor by Lance Castleberry and a QB sack by Ruben Lucio.

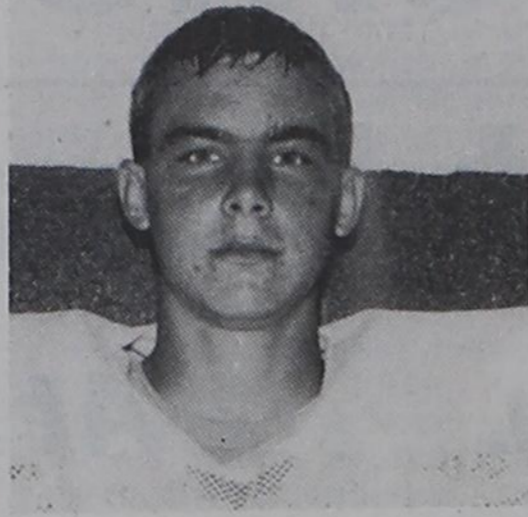

## Texico students attend National Business Week

Byron Martin, Vicky Juarez, Todd Cash, and Mark Holmes were among 200 New Mexico students who were chosen to attend Business Awareness Week at New Mexico State University this summer.

All four returned to Texico High School with enthusiastic comments about the program.

Even the speakers were interesting at this meeting. "I thought I knew a lot about business, but I found out I didn't know about a lot of things," said Vicky Juarez. She explained that the speakers she heard raised many complex points that went beyond the simple explanations a high school textbook might contain.

Byron Martin was interested in what the speakers had to say about "all the things the government is doing to business." Martin especially enjoyed hearing the speech of a self-made New Mexico millionaire who is only 21 years old.

Todd Cash was interested in the speaker who told them about the new WHIPP site near Carlsbad Caverns where nuclear and toxic wastes will be stored. It will be one of the largest landfills in the country.

Vicky Juarez summed up the importance of the meetings when she said, "Whatever you go into (as a profession), you will be in some business."

Mark Holmes decided that the group had talked quite enough about the speakers they had heard. He opined that the dances were the high point of the week. Since the fellows were outnumbered by girls 2 to 1 at Business Week, Mark, Todd and Byron really enjoyed the social experiences as well as the learning experiences.

The Texico students didn't see much of each other in Las Cruces. When they arrived they were assigned to groups of 10 or 12 students from all over the state of New Mexico. Part of the experience was the opportunity to make new friends and acquaintances.

They met in small seminar groups part of each day to discuss information that they had heard. And, they played a computer business simulation game with their group.

Todd Cash brought home a computer print-out that was used in the game. It was a detailed analysis of his group's hypothetical business's financial situation.

The seminar groups met as officers of a corporation. The board of directors made decisions for their company. They also issued shares of stock in their company which could be traded.

"My whole company thought I was stupid until the last day," said Martin who figured out early that the key word in the game was retained earnings, not gross earnings.

Each company was given the annual report from an actual company. They were asked each day to make corporate decisions about hypothetical situations. The computer analyzed the decisions and projected the probable dollar outcomes of their decisions. The group that had the most retained earnings at the end of the week won the game.

Each group also had to plan the advertising campaigns for their companies. They wrote and produced skits to advertise their products. Then there was a "talent show" to show off the advertising skits.

Each group had an advisor. "The advisors were actual business people from all over New Mexico. They were really neat people."

Part of the experience at Business Awareness Week was listening to the experiences of successful New Mexico businessmen. They met regional directors of national companies, representatives of government, and owners of small businesses that grew into corporations.

"A lot of the students in this part of the country have never had any contact with really big corporations. Business Awareness Week gave them the opportunity to meet heads of corporations and learn about how they work," said Texico business teacher Ann Liethen.

It wasn't easy to be picked for Business Awareness Week. Each student who participated in Business Awareness Week was recommended by his business teacher and by the school principal. Each candidate filled out an application that was also screened by a group of businessmen before the final selection was made.

"You really want to try for it," said Martin, "it was really worth it."

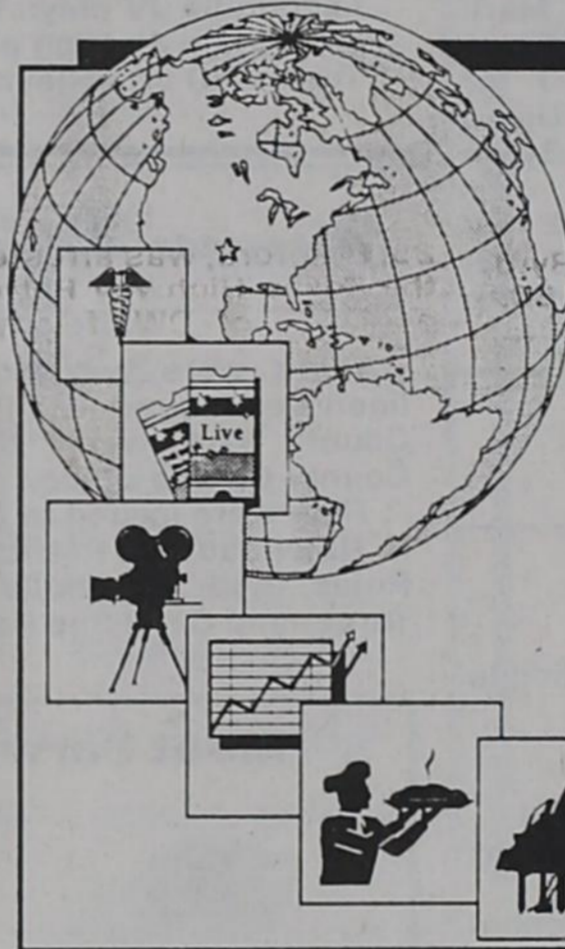
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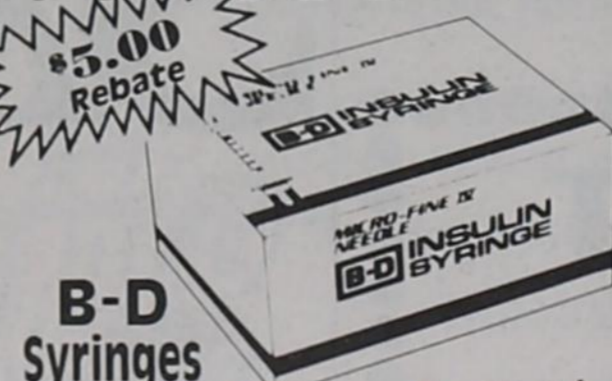
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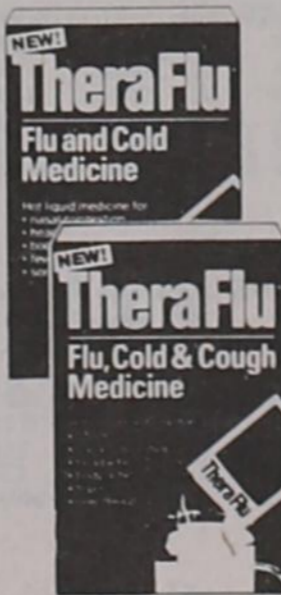
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# Texico trips Springer

"They were completely exhausted, and so was I," said Luscombe.

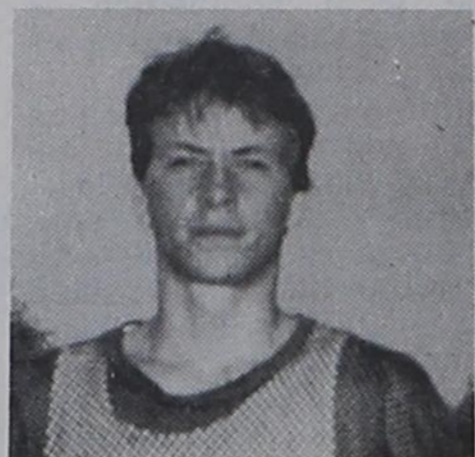
Texico survived 3 blocked conversion kicks and 1 blocked field goal attempt and still came up with a win.

Springer had 12 first downs. They rushed for 122 yards and threw for 121 yards. Springer hit 11 of 25 passes.

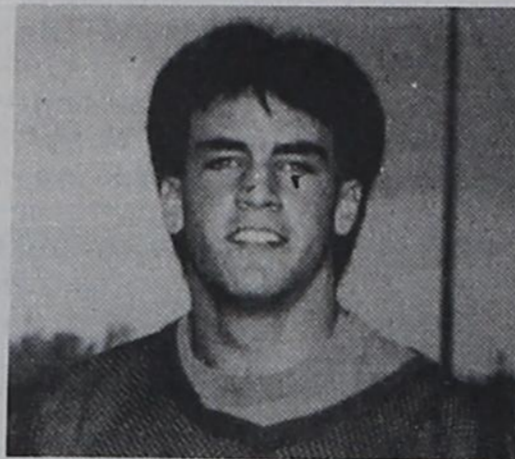
