### Time to get on the stick

Okay, Texico residents, it's time to get on the stick. The BIG cleanup is scheduled this weekend.

That means you are asked to put out any large items of debris or junk you have today (Friday) so it can be picked up by work crews Saturday.

This is your opportunity to get rid of those hazardous items that are dangerous to our community's health.

As you know, the ad hoc cleanup committee put together a list of hazardous junk, vehicles, houses, etc., earlier this summer. This list has been given to the City Council.

I anticipate the council will be moving ahead on a lot of these hazardous problems later this year. It would be great if you could take advantage of the FREE pickups this weekend - and avoid dealing with these hazards later.

You may think the council will just avoid these hazardous problems later. I don't think so. Here's why:

The council has been given a list of the dangers throughout the community, ranging from abandoned houses to wrecked vehicles to larger debris. If a child were to get hurt from any of these hazards, a lawsuit likely would be brought against the council for allowing those hazards to stand (despite city ordinances prohibiting them) - unless the council has acted upon the hazards first.

So if the council doesn't act on upon the hazards, it's taking a real gamble with the financial health of Texico. I don't think the councilmen will do that, since they are all responsible community citizens.

You may think that no child will be hurt from any of these hazards. That could be. But just look around the community yourself at these dangers. Then ask yourself that question again.

Add to this recent understanding of what some junk can do to the groundwater in a community. That affects everyone. And that can be very dangerous to your health.

I am not trying to scare anyone. I'm simply trying to state a situation involving severe hazards. If we can work together to eliminate them now, we can eliminate future problems.

That seems better to me than the alternative.

## Saturday's THE day

The Texico cleanup campaign swings into high gear this weekend.

Residents are asked to put large items of junk next to the street today (Friday). Trucks will begin rolling early Saturday morning to pick them up.

Persons needing help to get their junk to the streets are asked to call City Hall by noon today.

The Curry County Highway Department will send equipment, and several Texico residents have agreed to donate their time and equipment. Credit will be given those folks in next week's Tribune.

Work crews will meet at the school parking lot at 8 a.m. mdt Saturday. All community residents are invited to participate in this project. Ronnie Warmuth is coordinating the cleanup.

Originally, the meeting place was to be at City Hall but due to the expected large number of participants, it has been moved to Texico School.

A pizza lunch is scheduled for teen-age workers at the First Baptist Church of Tex-

ico. Adults will have sandwiches at the Texico Community Center. And at 3 p.m., when the cleanup is expected to end, a watermelon feast will be held at KKR Park, courtesy of the Texico High School Student Council.

A large container has been placed by Waste Management behind City Hall for large items of debris. Residents can take such items there any time. This is not for wood, metal or garbage, but is for items too large to fit into the Polykarts.

The cleanup this weekend is part of a major cleanup being undertaken in Texico that may last for months or years. An ad hoc committee was organized earlier this summer that has identified what it believes are safety hazards throughout the community, such as wrecked vehicles, abandoned houses, large debris and junk, etc.

The City Council has gotten involved in the cleanup and has begun taking action involving vehicles. Also, it has funded a spruce-up of KKR Park, and authorized city employees to begin general cleanup work on city streets.

## Lumbrera jury selection begun

Jury selection is under way in Garden City, Kan., in the Diana Lumbrera case.

Ms. Lumbrera is a former Bovina resident who is on trial for the May 1 death of her 4 year old son, Jose Antonio Lumbrera in Garden City.

She has also been indicted in Parmer County in connection with the deaths of:

- Joanna Garza Lumbrera, 3 months, who died on Nov. 30, 1976 in Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona.

- Melissa Garza Lumbrera, 3, who died on Oct. 2, 1978 in the Parmer County Community Hospital.

- Melinda Ann Garza Lumbrera, 2, who died on Aug. 17, 1982, in Ms. Lumbrera's Bovina home.

Ms. Lumbrera has also been indicted in Bailey County on a murder charge in connection with the death of her cousin's child. The indictment concerned 6 week old Ericka Aleman who died on Oct. 8, 1980.

The indictments charge that all of these deaths occurred while the children were under Ms. Lumbrera's care.

In pre trial arguments in Kansas, Ms. Lumbrera's attorney, Michael Quint, was unable to convince Judge Stephen Nyswonger that the potential jurors failed to reflect the racial and employment mix needed to assure a fair trial for his client. Quint had argued that the jury pool had too little Hispanic representation.

Nyswonger ruled that the jury pool would be sufficient to ensure a fair trial even though it did not contain the exact percentage of Hispanics that live in the community.

The judge's ruling took place after a jury list was formulated, but before the jurors actually appeared.

Jury selection began on Sept. 19. After the actual jurors have appeared, the judge will rule whether the trial will continue in Garden City, Kansas or whether a

change of venue will be necessary.

Ms. Lumbrera's lawyer has introduced videotapes of news broadcasts and copies of news articles to build a case that she will not receive a fair trial in Garden City because potential jurors have received too much prejudicial information in newscasts.

The judge will not rule on the change of venue motion until after he has carefully questioned the potential jurors.

The actual trial in Kansas is set to begin on Sept. 24. Ms. Lumbrera will not stand trial in Texas until the Kansas trial ends.

She indicated that this is a joint community effort with lots of Texico and Farwell residents participating.

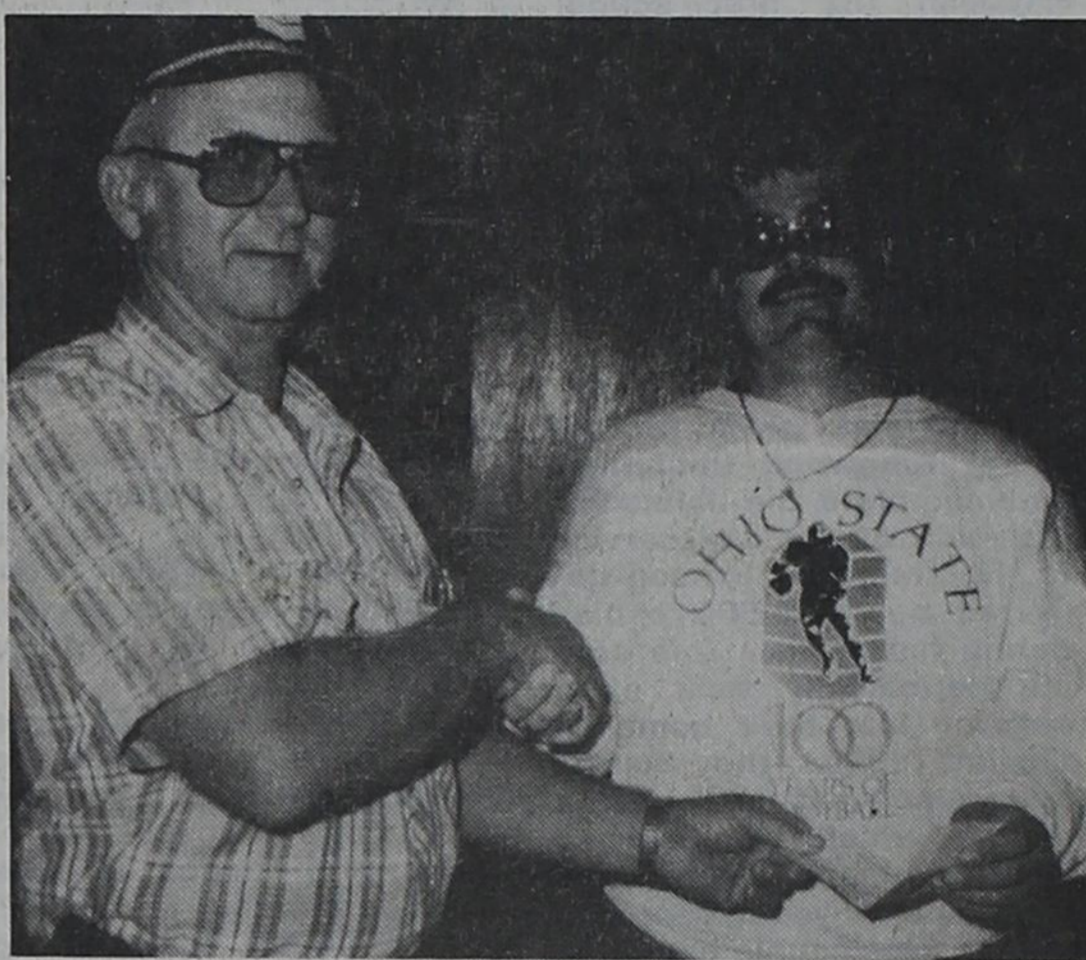
## School traffic pattern changed

The Texico City Council and Texico School Board met Tuesday to change the traffic pattern around the school area in an effort to increase safety.

The changes go into effect Monday.

The area between Katherine and Leftwich will be roped or fenced off between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. Katherine at Griffin and Griffin at Eunice will be blocked off at 8:30 a.m. each school day.

All vehicles except school buses will be prohibited from entering this area. Parents are encouraged to drop off children at the walk-through gate to the south of the old gym.

#### V. Scott Johnson

Services for Dr. V. Scott Johnson, 89, Clovis, were Monday at Kingswood United Methodist Church. The Rev. Ross Dunn and Dr. Cyril Stone officiated.

Burial followed at Sunset Terrace Memorial Cemetery in Farwell. Steed-Todd Funeral Home handled the arrangements.

Dr. Johnson died Sept. 15 in Clovis.

He was born April 15, 1901, in Dublin, Texas. He moved to Spur, Texas, in 1911 and graduated from Spur High School in 1917. He graduated from Baylor Medical School in 1929 and was an intern at Missouri Baptist Hospital, St. Louis, from 1929-30.

After his internship, he moved to Clovis, then to Farwell. He worked for the State Board of Health. He opened his own office in Farwell in 1930. He moved his office to Clovis in 1945. He was a member of the Kingswood Church.

Dr. Johnson was active with the Boy Scouts, helped establish the first school cafeteria in Farwell and was chief of staff at Clovis Hospital.

Lucille Lampp moved to Farwell in 1930 to nurse for him. They were married May 5, 1931, in Nashville, Ill. In 1945, they moved the office to Clovis.

On Aug. 17, 1980, a celebration was given in Clovis at Kingwood Church to commemorate the Johnsons' 50 years of medical service to the area. Dr. Johnson delivered nearly 3,500 babies during his career. This couple periodically took extra children into their home. In the late 1940s, they bought and remodeled an airplane hangar which was dubbed "The Barn" and was a Christian place for young people to gather. This couple educated not only their own children but many others as well.

They provided counseling to both parents and youths and were active in their church. After Mrs. Johnson's death Dec. 31, 1987, the adult Sunday School class at Kingwood was renamed "The Johnson Class."

On the occasion of his 85th birthday in 1986, the governor of New Mexico declared April 15 as Dr. V. Scott Johnson Day in the state. And the mayor presented him a plaque to commemorate the day in Clovis.

Surviving are 2 daughters, Marcia Cole, Farwell, and Nancy Currier, Scottsdale, Ariz.; a son, V. Scott Johnson II, Portales, and 9 grandchildren.

Casket bearers were Bob Anderson, Charles Aycock, Buck Wilson, Jim Berry, Cleo Carpenter, Z.A. McCasland and Bob Vivien. Honorary casket bearers were his friends and former patients.

#### Roy Lee Day Jr.

Services for Roy Lee Day Jr., 70, formerly of Clovis, were held in California.

He died Sept. 13 at his Westlake, Calif., home.

He was born March 24, 1920, in DeLeon, Texas.

Surviving are his wife, Ellen, at home; 3 children; 5 stepchildren; his mother, Nora Day, Texico; 2 sisters, Lynette Thompson, Clovis, and Darlene Watson, San Antonio; 2 brothers, Harrell, Albuquerque, and Dan, Phoenix; and several grandchildren.

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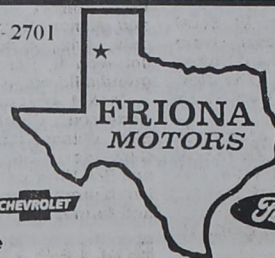

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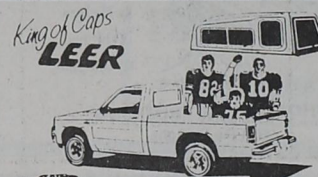
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## Holly Sugar expands in Hereford

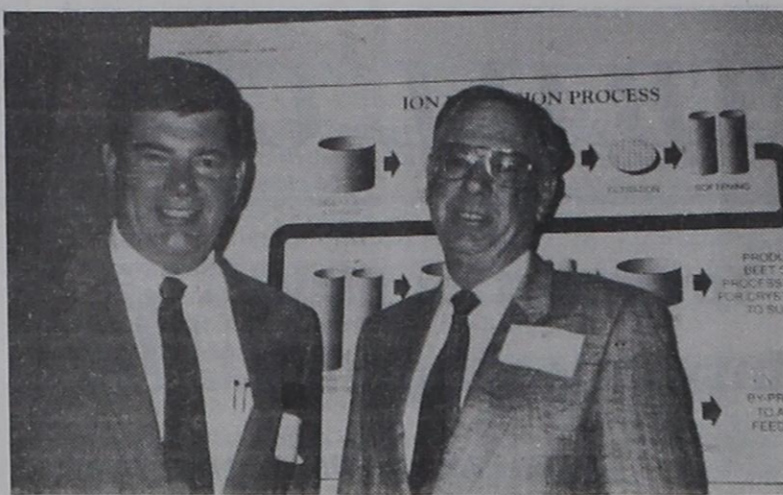
Holly Sugar Corporation broke ground on its new Ion Exclusion plant in Hereford Sept. 13.

Roger Hill, president of Holly Sugar Corporation, announced Holly's addition of the ion exclusion process at a press conference in Hereford, Aug. 10.

He described how the new \$12 million plant, which will be ready for the 1991 campaign, would increase sugar production approximately 500,000 hundredweight per year. The new facility will create up to 20 new employee positions. Holly Sugar has been Hereford's largest employer with 400 employees.

Robert C. Hanna, president of Imperial Holly Corporation spoke to a gathering of company officials, along with local government and business leaders on the significance both of ion exclusion capabilities and the selection of Hereford for the Imperial Holly facility.

Imperial Sugar Company of Sugar Land, Texas acquired the Colorado Springs-based Holly Corporation in 1988 and

merged it into Imperial Holly Corporation. At that time the new company embarked on a capital investment program intended in Hanna's words, "to balance Imperial Holly Corporation's interests and increase its capabilities for the long term."

"In the past three years we have committed almost \$60 million to bringing factories up to their most modern potential," Hanna said. "The single most important item in the 3-year program is the new facility in Hereford for desugaring molasses- a \$12 million project in itself." It is expected to start operation next August.

Imperial Holly Corporation, with eight beet sugar factories, and a cane sugar refinery at Sugar Land, is now the second largest publicly held sugar company in the United States and ranks among the Fortune 500 industrial corporations.

The new Hereford plant will allow the company to extract 10% more sugar from each beet than it has in the past. It will also allow the plant to operate for a longer period of time than previously.

Ion exclusion is a proven process wherein sugars in beet sugar molasses are separated from the non-sugars and made available for crystallization into refined sugar.

The ion exclusion separation process has been proven in the sugar industry and other industries. It improves sugar production via desugaring of molasses. It is an economical method of sugar production.

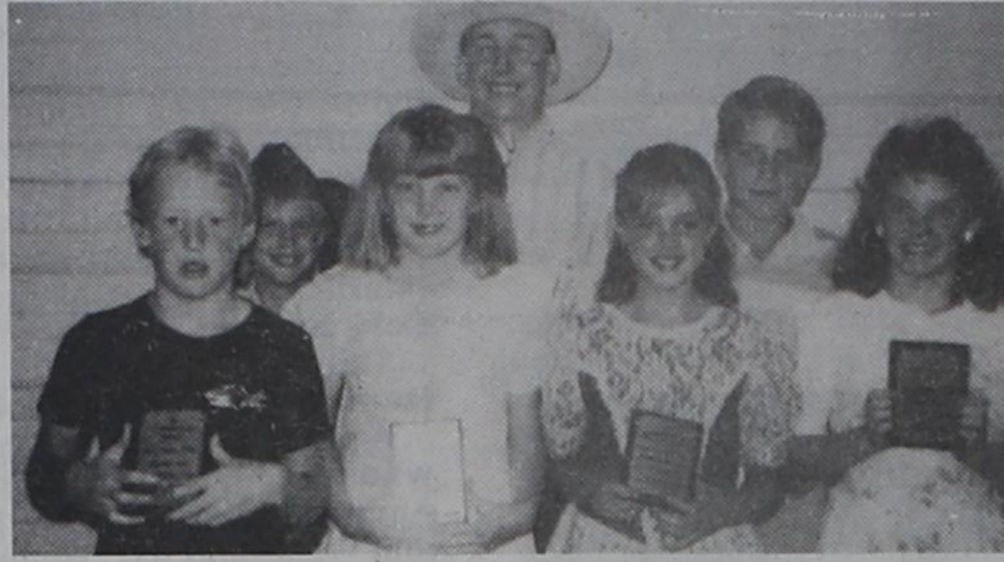

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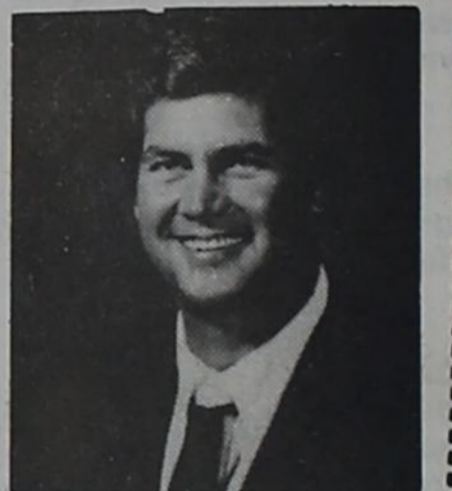
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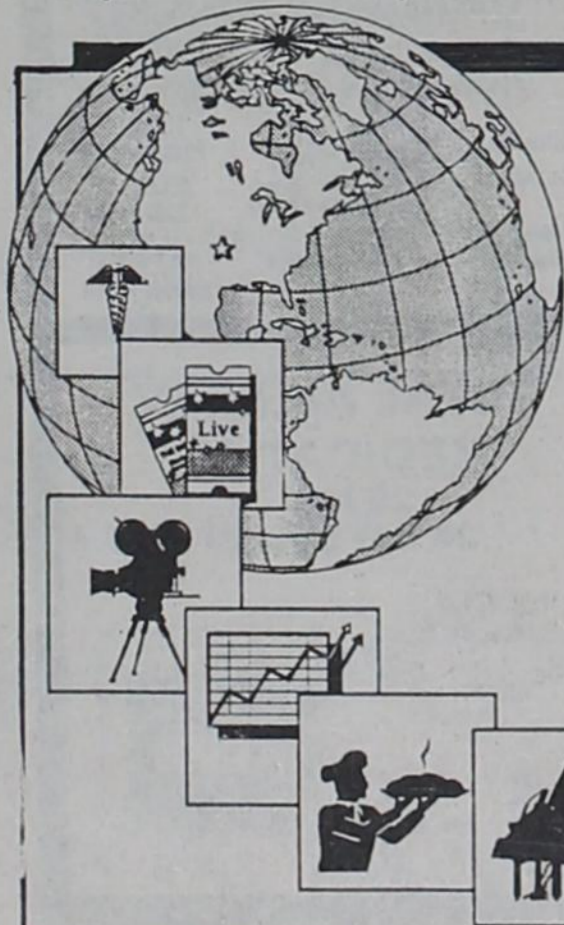
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## Lady Spikers take tournament second

Stewart intercepted at the 50. He then had a 43-yard TD run at 5:04. Haseloff kicked the point after and it was 55-0.

The highlights of the final 20 minutes included a QB sack by Brian Johnson, a QB sack by Arce and Delgado, a fumble recovery by Kade Kent and a 14-yard run by Smith.

With 21 seconds left, Olton scored on a 15-yard pass and

made the 2-point extra play.

The Steers host Hart tonight (Friday) at 8.

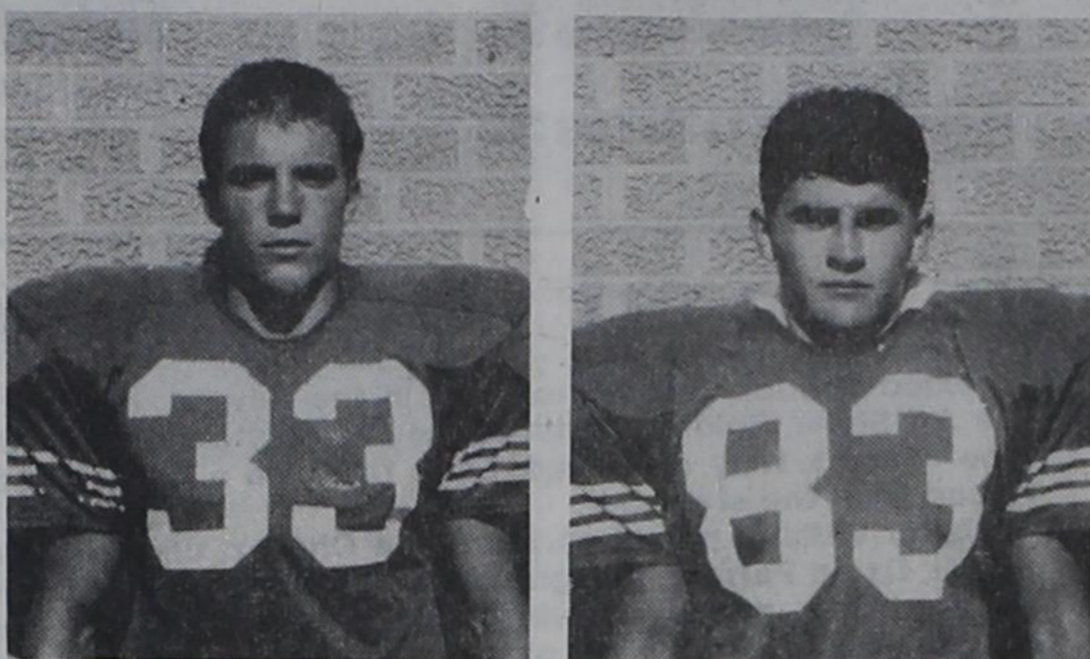
Farwell ranks 2nd in team offense with 324 yards per game, and fifth in team defense, allowing 147 yards a game.

Valley's Kirk Gardner carried the ball in 2 yards to end the half four points behind Lazbuddie - 30-26.

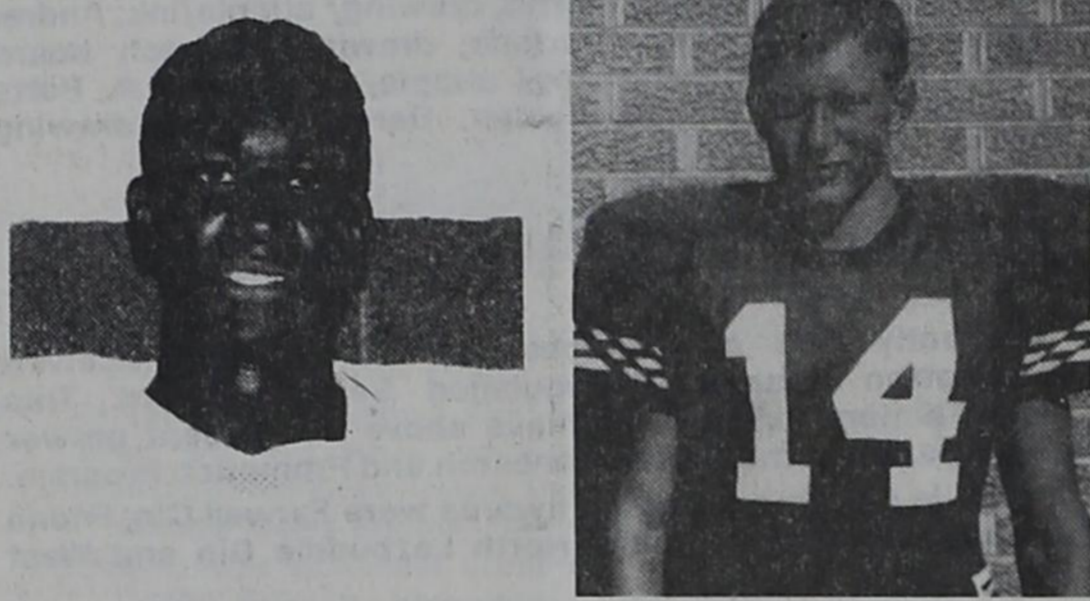
"We didn't play very good defense the first half," said coach C.W. Williams. "We made some adjustments during the halftime that helped."

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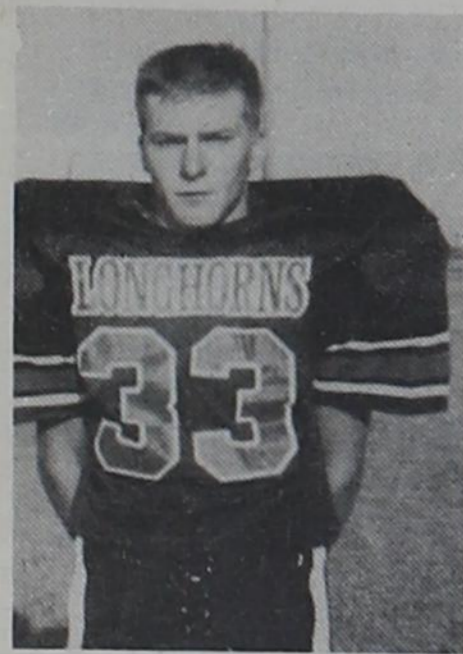
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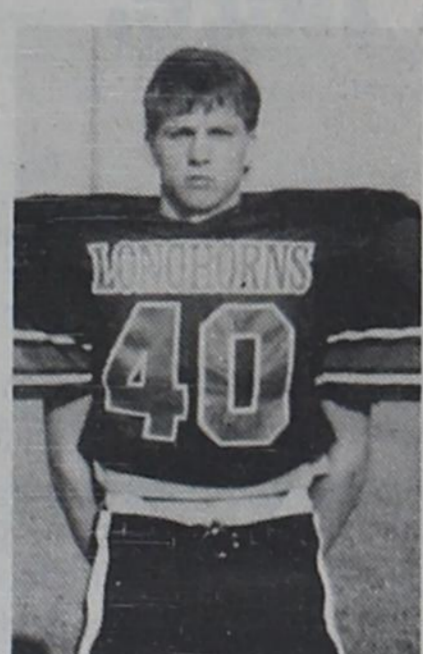

Talk about defense: The Texico Wolverines posted their third consecutive shutout when they rolled over Capitan last Friday in an away game, 41-0.

In their first three games, the Wolverines have outscored their opponents, 93-0. Texico has yielded only 145 total yards so far this year.

Texico scored in the middle of the first quarter when senior Josh Autrey raced in 4 yards for a TD. Then Warren Martin put 2 more points on the board when he caught a pass from Hector Orozco. Texico led 8-0.

Autrey broke loose quickly in the 2nd quarter and ran 63 yards for another touchdown. Orozco kicked the extra point and it was 15-0.

Rusty Foreman intercepted a pass and shut down Capitan's chance to score. Then, with 5:53 left in the first half, senior Benji McDaniel plunged over from the 1. On this drive, McDaniel completed three passes for 30 yards. Orozco kicked the point after and the Wolverines were on top 22-0.

Texico's offense was in high gear during the game. On one possession, the Wolverines kept the ball for six minutes before scoring. Texico had 17 first downs to Capitan's 4.

It was a long second quarter for Capitan as Kenny Shaw intercepted a pass with 2:40 left in the half and raced back 55 yards for Texico's 4th TD. Orozco's kick was good and Texico led 29-0 at the half.

Texico's Anthony Garcia and Steven Horner both recovered fumbles and played super defense. Dwayne Hamilton was also cited for superior defense as he was in on a number of tackles. Coach Bruce Scroggins let several younger players get into the game in the second half.

Neither team scored in the third quarter. But Texico's Greg Akers ran 11 yards for a TD at 7:26 of the 4th quarter. The extra point failed. Akers totalled 47 rushing yards.

With 1:25 left in the game, sophomore Kelvin Gooden ran in 13 yards for Texico's final TD. The kick was blocked.

Texico's defense held Capitan to 28 net rushing yards and 7 yards through the air. Meanwhile, the Wolverines posted 360 rushing yards and 33 aerial yards. The total of 393 yards outdistanced Capitan's 35 total.

Autrey had 208 rushing yards and 2 TDs for a super night. Orozco rushed for 67 yards and had 3 kicks for extra points. McDaniel rushed for 11 yards and 1 TD. Gooden had 27 yards and a TD.

Martin caught 2 passes for 17 yards and Freddie Chavez caught 1 for 16 yards.

Enough isn't being said about Texico's strong defense. The line is playing tough and allowing Texico to get more possessions.

The one negative was in penalties: Texico was penalized 8 times for 90 yards; Capitan 5 for 35. One Wolverine TD was called back.

"As a team, we improved," said coach Bruce Scroggins of the Wolverines' win.

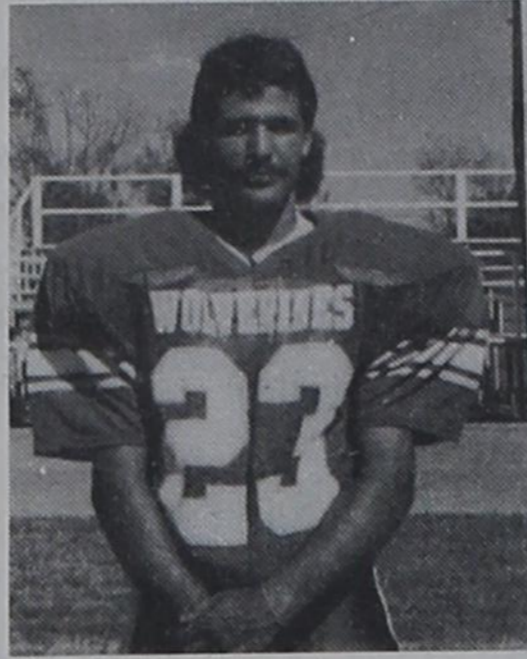
"Our offensive line gets better every week. When they came out in an offense, we blocked it," Scroggins.

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### PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1990

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."
