And as He entered a certain village, ten leprous men who stood at a distance met Him; and they raised their voices, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" And when He saw them, He said to them, "Go and

show yourselves to the priests."

And it came about that as they were going, they were cleansed. Now one of them, when he saw that he had been healed, turned back, glorifying God with a loud voice. And he fell on his face at His feet, giving thanks to Him. And he was a Samaritan.

And Jesus answered and said, "Were there not ten cleansed? But the nine - where are they? Was no one found who turned back to give glory to God, except this foreigner?" and He said to him, "Rise, and go your way; your faith has made you well."

Man is quick to express his needs to the Lord, but very slow to give thanks. Think for a moment and ask yourself this question: "How often do I thank the Lord?" Then think of how often you ask the Lord in prayer to help you, to meet your needs, and to be with you.

There are three outstanding items in Jesus' experience:

* The <u>people</u> - they were people who had real needs in thei lives. Needs that they could not handle themselves. Needs that brought them to Christ.

* The power - only Christ could meet their need. He was the one who had the power to change their lives. Will you allow your needs to bring you

to Christ?

* The <u>problem</u> - only one was grateful for what God had done. Only one returned for the giving of thanks!

On this Thanksgiving in 1990, let us not be as the nine who forgot to give thanks. Let's "render thanksgiving to ye almighty God for all His blessings."

When I was in junior high school I thought fire drills were simply part of the routine of going to school. They were fun in warm weather, and an annoyance in cold, rainy weather.

Then one day when I got home from school the Mickey Mouse Club was interrupted by a news bulletin. There was a fire at Our Lady of Angels School in Chicago. For the next few hours I watched as more news bulletins interrupted the TV programs, and finally there were photographs of the fire.

I saw children my own age covered with flames jumping from the second story of the old building. It made a lasting impression. I could never take a fire drill lightly again.

One hundred and thirteen children and teachers lost their lives in that fire. Many more were injured for life.

Obviously, tragedies happen every day of the week some place in the world. But when they involve someone we know and love or someone with whom we can have empathy these tragedies become our tragedies.

We cannot all go help the starving Ethiopians or the earthquake victims in some far-off spot in the world. God bless those who can, but most of us can only respond to those nearest us.

One of the wonderful things about Farwell is that people do respond in times of need. They are there with a hug or a helping hand for those who need it.

Longhorns roll over Meadow, 66-44

The Lazbuddie Longhorns won their state playoff opener Nov. 15 at home against the Meadow Broncos, 66-44.

In winning the 6-Man Bi-District title, the Longhorns showed that a team with a balanced attack usually can beat a team built around one runner. Lazbuddie was able to move the ball almost flawlessly through the air, via Paul Williams' passes, and on the ground, with Kirk Jesko carrying the ball.

But Meadow displayed virtually no passing attack and attempted to win with Cody Andrews moving the ball for them. While he did get free a couple of times, the Longhorns keved on him and were able to shut him down effectively, especially in the second half.

Lazbuddie, now 8-3, was ranked 7th in the area in the final Lubbock newspaper standings, and Meadow, which had entered the game at 9-1, was ranked 6th.

The Longhorns now have a regional match with Guthrie, 11-0, at 7:30 p.m. Friday (today) at Bobcat Stadium in Smyer.

The game opened with Meadow kicking off. Lazbuddie was stopped and punted to the Bronco 36. Meadow moved to the Longhorn 16. After Jesko had a big tackle, Leland Brockman threw the quarterback for a 6- yard loss. Matt Cozbey's tackle created another 2 yard loss and a 4th down pass failed due to the line rush.

The Longhorns now went to work. Jesko took a pitch and rolled around end for a 56-yard TD. The Luis Gonzales kick made it 8-0 midway through the first period.

Meadow was stymied. Frank Gonazales had a big tackle and the Longhorns recovered a fumble at the Broco 32. Williams then tossed a 32-yard TD bomb to Cozbey. After a high snap for the extra point, holder Doug Barnes passed

Meadow came back with a score with a minute left, making the final score 66-44.





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
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Wolverines claw way to state title
